




Santa and Crew Deliver Miles of Smiles to Children at Toy Drive-Throu



We have a lady who prepares our lunches. Today it is beans. When my grandmother makes beans, they cook on the woodstove from morning until suppertime. They have hamhocks and onions in them. These beans aren't done and they have no flavor. I don't eat them and the lady says, "Young lady, you will sit there until they are eaten."

I say to myself, "I will sit here until she gets her kitchen cleaned then she will want to go home." A little later she said, "You can go." I have to walk back to school all

by myself. As I approached the school, there is a little bridge. I have to crossover the creek (algae and frogs in the water). As I step on the bridge this boy jumps from under that bridge covered with algae and dripping wet. He grabs me and kisses me. I run crying into the room and the teacher says, "What's wrong?" As I hiccup and sputter crying that this boy kissed me. She puts her arms around me and sits me by the woodstove, wipes my tears, and hugs me, and says I'll be right back. She goes to the classroom next door.

Years later as a grown up, I say, "You went next door and told that teacher, didn't you?"

"Yes, I did. You were so cute and upset and dripping wet, I just had to share with my other teachers."

The Bulletin Board Takes a Not-So-Complete Look Back

The West Valley, populated with mostly good-natured and endearing people, bravely took on the challenges of 2021 (primarily Covid-19), focusing their energy on lending a hand where needed and finding a little time to enjoy each other's company.

Craig Johnson, Rita Baller, and Barry Wilson were sworn in as Willamina Councilors in January. On Jan. 19, Sheridan Council members Jim Buckles, Aaron Baer, and Roxie Acuff took the oath of office. Later, Aaron Baer took over as mayor for Harry Cooley after Harry moved outside the city limits. Dennis McElroy was unanimously appointed to fill Aaron's council seat.

John Bargero and Curt Edmondson purchased the old Masonic Lodge building at 106 S. Bridge Street in Sheridan from Rich Mathis. Unfortunately, less than two days later, the building imploded on Jan. 31. Fortunately, no one was injured.

In February, excavation work got underway for the new six-building apartment complex on Sheridan Road. By the end of this year, two apartment buildings and the commons building were nearing completion.

On Feb. 4, 103-year-old Dudley Carson passed on. Dudley held a master's degree in music education, was a talented gardener, and was an artist.

Also in February, the Sheridan School District, under the leadership of Superintendent Dorie Vickery, took a tour of industrial property on Jefferson Street in Sheridan as a possible location to launch a new career and technical education center. (The school district purchased the property in October thanks to the superintendent working with Rep. Gomberg to obtain a \$1.9 million state grant.)

Generous neighbors from Mc-Minnville and Carlton donated seasoned firewood for folks in Willamina and Sheridan who'd been without power for more than a week due to an ice storm. The West Valley welcomed new First Federal Bank Manager Sara Myer. Sara's bright personality and willingness to get involved in the community have made her a true West Valley asset.

The struggle to keep the Sheridan Japanese School from closing got underway following a Feb. 22 decision by the SJS board to close the school due to low enrollment and inadequate long-term financial stability. (Due to community involvement, the school remains

open.)

We hosted Red Cross blood drives, mammography vans, and dental vans, offering free services for the uninsured and unemployed. In addition, we held meetings via Zoom, donated recyclable cans to the Grand Sheramina Food Bank, and took the kids to visit adorable baby chicks and Catnip the bunny at the West Valley Mercantile.

In early March, restaurants and bank lobbies began reopening after mandatory Covid shutdowns. In mid-March, the Sheridan City Council resumed in-person council meetings at the Monroe Event Center, following a series of Zoom meetings due to Covid. (Since that time, the council went back to Zoom meetings.) In addition, a bookmobile distributed spring books to Sheridan's young readers at the city park.

With a delay due to Covid, Phiit Werx gym opened its doors on March 15 in Sheridan, offering fitness classes, yoga, and various gym equipment.

American Legion Bingo resumed on March 19, and Dillon's Bar and Grill was in operation with restricted Covid hours.

In April, the good citizens of Sheridan donned their masks and pitched in to help with the town's annual spring clean-up.

Faulconer-Chapman 7th-grade student Emily Dryer won a logo drawing contest with her original rendition of the school's Titan logo.

Ginny Wymore and Bob and Rita Burr attended the March 24 Willamina Chamber meeting decked out in their St. Patrick's Day finest.

By mid-March, the West Valley Community Campus had received \$11,592 in donations from the public in their efforts to replace the roof at the campus.

On March 17, the reach on a log truck trailer broke as it passed Coyote Joe's, which caused the truck to leave the roadway. The trailer struck a support beam, broke a power pole, and came to a stop on a guidewire. The incident knocked the power out for a few minutes, but no one was injured.

Ruff Life Rescue generously offered pet food for pet owners experiencing financial difficulties. In April, the Sheridan Chamber and Rotary Clubs began holding joint meetings on the fourth Wednesday of each month.

Tina Miller Youth Center reopened on Saturdays and Sundays. The Willamina Food Pantry distributed food boxes from the Willamina Civic Club, and we gathered for the Easter sunrise service at the Willamina fishing pond.

Both Willamina Chamber and Hampton Lumber sold truckloads of bark dust to help with various community projects.

Many of us wore blue on April 21 to show support for children who needed our help.

Well-known Children's author Beverly Cleary died at age 104. The basketball hoops were re-installed at Sheridan City Park.

Willamina Library distributed spring craft packets, Earth Day activities, and free books for all kids ages newborn to teens.

Andrea Nutt, DNP, and Katie Devany, FNP, joined the staff at Adventist Health in Sheridan and the Baptist Church treated kids to an Easter egg hunt.

The Willamina Old-Fashioned Fourth of July Committee held a bake sale fireworks fundraiser in front of the Best Stop Market.

A town hall meeting took place at the high school to publicly debate the pros and cons of consolidating the SW Polk and Sheridan fire districts. (Sheridan opted out of consolidation.)

The South Yamhill River Astrology Club gazed at the stars, and an astronomical number of jobs openings to suit most any interest and education level became available.

The Fendall Community Club held its annual pie auction and stew feed outdoors due to Covid, and "The Lunch Bunch" struck again with a free brown bag lunch of Beanie weenies, chips, and fruit. West Valley Kiwanis created "Mount Trashmore" consisting of trash they and other volunteers collected along Hwy. 18B.

The Sheridan Council voted to budget for a new part-time code enforcement position.

The Arts Conspiracy canceled its annual summer arts program due to Covid concerns.

Leisha Myer created a successful Saturday Market in Sheridan, held monthly from May through September. The Mercantile, Sheridan Chamber, and Rotary Club sponsored the market.

Easton Hembree, age 7, set up a lemonade stand to raise funds for the Willamina VFW as his way to thank them for helping his Dad. When the word got out about this thoughtful, thankful, and industrious 7-year-old, there was no shortage of big-hearted community members suddenly thirsty for a glass of lemonade.

More than 50 residents on Yamhill River Road, Gold Creek Road, Sawtell Road, and surrounding areas met to express their concerns about abandoned and derelict RVs collecting on the sides of these roads. They were largely successful in getting them removed.

Sheridan selected "A Day at the Farm" as the theme for the 2021 Hometown Days.

In May, Vic Singh purchased TJ's Superette and began an extensive remodel of the store shortly after that. He also announced plans to start a remodel of the gas station in the fall. (The new gas station was nearing completion by the end of the year.)

The Willamina Farmers Market opened for the season on May 16.

The Highway 18 Riders rallied the community for a bike show, live music, and family fun event at the American Legion on June 5. In addition, Kiwanis hosted its annual fishing derby for kids at Hampton Pond.

A missing 73-year-old man was found alive after three days missing in the Grand Ronde area.

On May 12, the Willamina Chamber thanked City Manager Kenna West for the \$1.3 million in grants she had written and received to that point. (She has since added considerably more to that total.) The Rotary Club drive-in showed family-friendly movies monthly, complete with concessions, at the Faulconer-Chapman school grounds throughout the summer. We honored our veterans and congratulated our high school grads in May and June.

The Willamina Library presented an impressive dinosaur exhibit examining their Oregon history. Sheridan Baptist offered a fourday vacation Bible school, and the Sheridan School District provided summer camp for kindergarten through eighth-grade students. In mid-June, Willamina held its fifth annual citywide garage sale. Country Bargains began offering

Willamina Museum reopened following a Covid closure.

Willamina moved forward with a full-blown Fourth of July celebration, with Tom Coblentz as parade grand marshal and an incredible fireworks display. The Willamina Free Methodist Church added to the fun with a block party featuring a mechanical bull, bounce houses, and free Elephant Ears. In addition, arm Wrestlers wrestled, loggers showcased their talents, and a car show featured beautiful old classics, modern hot rods,

Dorothy Agee Olson celebrated her 100th birthday with family and friends in a beautiful outdoor park-like setting. (Dorothy and her husband Norm, brother-in-law Mel Agee and wife Rita built Agee's Market, now Sheridan IGA, in 1965. They also purchased the properties in front of the store to provide parking.)

In June, the West Valley Fire Hall got a fresh coat of red paint.

Austin White, age 15, was honored for being the number one helper in Willamina's 2021 yard clean-up campaign. Austin helped many seniors and disabled citizens with vard chores over the summer. Ila Skyberg surprised him with a delicious cake, and Skyberg's, the Chamber, and First Federal chipped in to present Austin with a new lawnmower and weed-eater.

Lighthouse Ranch offered roadside assistance classes demonstrating how to change a tire, change oil, and other essential vehicle information.


Scouts in Grand Ronde Enjoy Overnight Camp
