

The mission for the West Valley Community Campus is to provide a place to foster community and individual growth through educational, recreational, and cultural activities.

The facility was built during President Franklin Delano Roosevelt's presidency as part of the New Deal economic recovery plan. The Willamina School District used it as the Willamina High School until the school district built the new school at Oaken Hills.

The last class to graduate from this old school was in 2003. The building sat empty for several years before a private party purchased it in 2011.

In 2013, the West Valley Community Campus nonprofit organization was formed, and the board obtained a 501c3. Community work parties were held to save the building from further disrepair by patching the roof, cleaning, painting, installing heating systems, and more.

Valley Market Convenience Store and Gas Station to Open this Spring

Valley Market and Gas Station plans to open for business this spring, either late March or early April, said owner Birpal (Paul) Johal. The new station is next door to the Dairy Queen on Highway 18. Paul also owns the Sheridan IGA.

The new full-service Chevron station will offer diesel, regular, premium, and premium-plus. Fuel that is especially good for motorcycles will also be available.

The station will also feature a recharging station for electric cars and have air and water available for customers' use.

The 5,000 sq. ft. Valley Market convenience store will carry almost everything a typical grocery store offers, except it will not have a produce or meat department.

A 20-door cooler filled with beer, wine, and other beverages, will span the entire length of the back wall.

Offices, an electrical room, and restrooms will be built on the west wall.

A drive-through coffee window will be on the east side of the store (facing the Dairy Queen). This convenient drive-through service will offer a variety of coffee drinks, sodas, and hot deli foods, such as chicken, pizza, corndogs, and more.

Paul said he purchased the property about a year ago but waited to finalize the deal and start construction until he was sure ODOT would approve access on and off the highway at this location with all of the highway traffic.

The general contractors on this project are Erick and Melissa Poland of E&M Remodeling and Concrete of Dallas.

Erick said his work on the project began with cutting down the trees, digging out the stumps, and demolishing the existing buildings. E&M will handle all of the excavation and concrete work and subcontract the finish work

Erick said he expects to finish the job by March or April but acknowledged that other factors, such as winter weather, could weigh into the plans and slow things down a little.

Erick explained that ODOT would not allow them to change the entrance and exit, so they intend to keep both of the existing ones. They will restripe but Erick said ODOT would not let them do anything else. He said they'd petitioned ODOT to reduce the speed limit through this busy area, but whether ODOT will do this or not is out of their control. They've also asked ODOT for additional signs, so they're waiting to see whether they will do any of that. Erick said there is a pullout lane now, and they plan to mark the in and out lanes before they open for business.

Since the fuel tanks are only certified for 30 years, the gas pumps will not be installed over the top of them. Instead, the pumps will be to the west of the enormous hole (shown in the photo below), so it will be easier to replace the tanks down the road if it becomes necessary.





This giant hole will be filled with two fuel tanks.

Holiday Crafts Families Can Make

Decorating for the holidays can be made even more special when decorations are handmade creations families can cherish for years. The following are crafts families can make together.

Personalized elf: For families who want to make their own personalized elf dolls, all it takes is a little computer knowledge, some clever photo work and a some sewing skills. Find a template for a rag doll sewing pattern or an illustration of an elf online. Superimpose an image of your child's face on the template in a photo editing program. Print out the entire image onto iron-on fabric transfer paper. Iron it on to a light-colored piece of fabric from the craft store according to the product directions. Cut out the fabric with ironed-on decal, leaving about a one-inch margin to allow for sewing and eventual stuffing. Duplicate the shape of the doll onto another piece of fabric to make the back of the elf doll. Place the front elf image face down on the back piece of fabric and sew the edges together, leaving a small opening at the end. Using that opening, flip the elf right-side out and stuff with pillow fill material. Sew the small opening closed and enjoy a personalized elf doll for the holidavs.

Growth indicator ornament:

Purchase a large glass or plastic Christmas tree ball. Select an acrylic paint in your color of choice and squirt some into a paper plate. Have a child dip his or her hand into the paint and then transfer the hand-print to the ornament. Let dry and then attach a ribbon to hang on the tree. Through the years see how much children have grown from that little hand-print.

Holiday candle: This craft is attractive and also smells good. Gather one bar of fragrant soap (like Irish spring); a small, white washcloth; red and green ribbon; a round of colorful mesh or tulle fabric measuring roughly 12 inches or enough to wrap your bar of soap; craft glue; a piece of yellow felt cut to look like a flame; and one or two sewing pins. Roll the washcloth into a cylinder shape to serve as the "wick" of the candle. Glue the edges together and wrap a piece of ribbon diagonally around the wick and adhere to secure even further. Glue the felt flame to the top of the wick. Place the soap in the center of the round piece of fabric. Attach the wick vertically to the soap using the pins. Then gather the tops of the mesh fabric around the base of the wick and use another piece of ribbon to tie into a bow and secure the fabric to the wick base. The soap and pins should now be concealed. Place the "candle" out of direct sunlight and away from heat, preferably on a little dish so the soap will not damage any

A Message from the Sheridan Superintendent

Changes in Early Learning

It is an exciting time in early learning at Sheridan School District. Our preschool and childcare programs are growing! There is a community need for childcare and preschool, and the District is working to meet this need.

We project a childcare program with 15-20 children, ages three months to three years old. To accommodate this number, our preschool program at Building 1 (next to the tennis courts) will move to Faulconer-Chapman School. This change will allow the District to use Building 1 as the childcare site, allowing for more children to enroll.

Eventually, the childcare program will become an educational career pathway for high school students who will manage the program. High school students will earn credit for the early childhood career pathway.

Titan Preschool, currently with two classrooms, will need a third classroom. The District will hire another preschool teacher and create a third preschool program for another 18 children. For qualifying families, our Preschool Promise Grant covers the cost of the preschool program.

Sheridan School District values the early learning experience for our children. It is our goal to serve working families, provide quality childcare and preschool programs and have children prepared for kindergarten.



Reindeer Chow (Muddy Buddies)

Ingredients

14 cups Chex cereal

18 oz. holiday M&Ms

12 oz. semi-sweet chocolate bar or chips

1/2 cup unsalted butter

1 cup peanut butter

1 tsp. vanilla extract

4-5 cups powdered sugar

Instructions

Melt the peanut butter and butter in a microwave safe dish. Microwave in 30 second intervals until butter is melted. Add the chocolate a little at a time until all is melted into the mix.

You might need to microwave one last time to make sure everything is melted and add the vanilla. Stir together.

In a large bowl add half of the cereal. Drizzle half of the chocolate peanut butter mixture into the cereal in the bowl. Mix with a spoon.

Place one large paper bag into another one. Add 1/2 cup of the powdered sugar and half of the mixed cereal into the bag. Close this tightly and shake vigorously. Add more powdered sugar 1/2 cup at a time if needed until all the cereal is coated. Add 1/4 of the M&Ms into the bag and toss. Place in an air tight container.

Continue these steps with the remaining ingredients. Keep stored in an airtight container or keep it in the freezer.

Notes

• You can use any Chex cereal that you like, but the rice version is a nice choice.



WVFD Board Considers Neighboring Fire Districts for Providing Service

The West Valley Fire District Board convened on Nov. 30 for another special planning meeting.

West Valley Fire Board member Connie Brown, also a member of the stakeholder's committee, presented options for the board to discuss. All options require WVFD to hire a fire chief and finance staff since WVFD will no longer have these employees as of Dec. 31 when the Intergovernmental Agency agreement (IGA) expires with Southwest Polk Fire District (SWP). WVFD will also need to fill open line-staff positions.

Connie said, "So even though the community would love to have an ambulance here, we've always had an ambulance here; it may be that the public will need to be educated that we just can't financially do that at this time."

Ryan Melhoff, a member of the finance committee, mentioned selling the new ambulance to the Sheridan Fire District (SFD), in return asking they run the unit out of WVFD and keep the WVFD name on the door while under contract.

Connie said she did not feel taxpayers would be okay with that.

Board member Rick Mishler asked Deputy Fire Chief Scott Magers about selling property purchased through a tax levy. Magers said he was not positive but believes that, since the levy that passed was to purchase an ambulance, which occurred, the public was not lied to, and the situation has changed. The district owns that property and can do with it as needed. Magers also clarified that the board should seek legal counsel for advice.

Board President Chris Greenhill said the Special Districts Association of Oregon (SDAO) said the district is not required to return the money to the citizens. However, if the property is sold and used for its intended purpose, the obligation is fulfilled.

Chris proposed selling the ambulance to the Confederated Tribes of Grand Ronde Fire Department (CTGRFD) and paying them an additional \$50,000 per year (instead of the original \$150,000) in compensation for a three-year contract for services, with a sixmonth review and a 90-day out clause for either party.

Chris made a new motion to offer Sheridan Fire \$275,000 annually to include the chief and finance staff services; remove the sale of the ambulance; and staff the West Valley station.

The board received a short extension from the Board of Commissioners to submit a working plan. The deadline is now Dec. 15, 2021.

Connie suggested improving communication with the public through publishing articles. Board member Roy Whitman will draft these communications.

Christmas Food Box Applications Available For Willamina Residents

Christmas food box applications for Willamina residents are now available during regular business hours at both IGA Willamina, 112 NW Main Street, and Skyberg's Lumber and Hardware, 121 NE Main Street.

The absolute deadline for submitting an application is Dec. 13. Organizers appreciate receiving the applications earlier for planning purposes.

The Naughty List: Better Business Bureau's 12 Scams of Christmas

While 2021 is quickly winding down, scams targeting the public continue to cause trouble. Consumers should watch out for any fraudulent schemes aimed at swiping their cash and stealing personal information. Better Business Bureau (BBB) has a Naughty List with the top 12 scams of Christmas that are most likely to catch consumers and donors off guard during this season. Many of these scams are facilitated through emails and social media platforms, however the latter is where most people are vulnerable. The BBB advises exercising caution when coming across social media ads about discounted items, event promotions, job opportunities and donation requests, as well as direct messages from strangers. If you are asked to make a payment or donation by wire or e-transfer, through third parties, by prepaid debit or gift cards, treat this as a

Be mindful of these scams that could cut into your holiday cheer:

Misleading Social Media Ads: The most common cons and the category with the most victims are ads on social media that offer items that claim to support a charity or offer a free trial. The BBB says victims never receive the items, are charged monthly for something they never signed up for, or receive a counterfeit item that is much different than the one advertised. Always check the business at bbb.org and read the reviews.

Social Media Gift Exchanges: Each holiday season this scheme pops back up. A new version revolves around exchanging bottles of wine; another suggests purchasing \$10 gifts online. Another asks you to submit your email into a list where participants get to pick a name and send money to strangers to "pay it forward." In this scam, participants unwittingly share their personal information, along with those of their family members and friends, and are tricked into buying and shipping gifts or money to unknown individuals.

Holiday Apps: Be wary of holiday-themed apps, especially those for children, that will sometimes contain lots of advertising, as they may contain malware.

Compromised Accounts Alerts: Phishing emails that look like Amazon, Paypal, Netflix, bank emails and others, suggest your account has been compromised. The email says there has been suspicious activity and urges victims to click a link and give their personal information.

Free Gift Cards: Nothing brings good cheer like the word 'FREE'. Scammers who offer "free" gift cards in exchange for personal information should be marked as spam or junk.

Temporary Holiday Jobs: Retailers typically hire seasonal workers to help meet the demands of holiday shoppers. However, scammers may pose as employers offering employment to seek money and personal information from job applicants.

Look-Alike Websites: The holiday season brings endless emails offering deals, sales and bargains. Be wary of emails with links enclosed. Some may lead to look-alike websites created by scammers to trick people into downloading malware, making

dead-end purchases and sharing private information.

Fake Charities: Typically, 40% of all charitable donations are received during the last few weeks of the year. Be alert for requests of money from scammers pretending to be individuals in need. Avoid impromptu donations to unfamiliar organizations or people.

Fake Shipping Notifications: Phishing emails that appear to be emails from businesses like FedEx and UPS, ask for personal information to "verify" details or download malware to your device if you click on any links.

Pop Up Holiday Virtual Events: Scammers are creating fake event pages, social media posts and emails to charge admission to an event that is usually free.

Top Holiday Wishlist Items: Low or ridiculously priced luxury

goods, jewelry, designer clothing, and electronics are almost always cheap counterfeits and knockoffs. This year, the Galactic Snackin' Grogu Animatronic (aka Baby Yoda) and game consoles are some of the items in high demand. Be very cautious when considering whether to purchase these high-value items from individuals through social sites.

Puppy Scams: Many families, especially those with children, may be considering the addition of a furry friend to their household this year. However, you could fall victim to a pet scam, which are on the rise this year. Request to see the pet in person before making a purchase.




