Richard Paul Jordan Jr. (Dick), 57, of Sheridan, passed away Sunday, Jan. 16, 2022. He had been ill with cardiac and diabetes diseases, succumbing to those complications.

Dick was the oldest of four children born to Richard Paul Jordan Sr. and Verna Lea (Martin) Jordan. He was born on Nov. 8, 1964, in McMinnville.

Growing up, Dick was an active boy always on the move and playing outside with the neighborhood kids. He enjoyed camping and water ski racing with his family; winning Oregon State Champion in the Kids Jr. Bracket at age nine. He played Little League baseball on his dad's team, as well as football and wrestling.

As a teenager he liked being outdoors and hunting with his dad and brothers, taking his youngest brother, Andy, on his first snipe hunting venture.

Dick attended Sheridan High School from 1979-1983. He participated in football, wrestling, and baseball, earning eleven letter awards. He was a two-time District Wrestling Champion, placed fourth in State his Junior year, and qualified for State his senior year but couldn't participate due to an injury. His favorite classes were PE and shop, which led to his love of working on cars and projects as an adult. After graduation he joined the United States Marine Corp.

Dick worked many types of jobs over the years and enjoyed learning new skills. His pastimes included working on cars and cooking in the kitchen.

Having lived in several different places, Dick returned to Sheridan a few years ago. His children were his greatest joy, and he loved spending time with them



most.

Dick is survived by his parents Dick and Verna Jordan; children Tyler Jordan, Katie Christensen, Tanner Jordan, Hannah Jordan, and Savannah Jordan; stepchildren Jennifer Adams (and her daughter Hailey) and Michael Gentry. He is also survived by his siblings Tim Jordan (Kori), Poli Vandewettering (Russ), and Andy Jordan, as well as many nieces, nephews, aunts, uncles, and cousins.

He was preceded in death by his grandparents Charlie and Pauline Jordan; and Andrew and Frances Martin; uncles Bob Jordan, Clare Wren, and Gary Reibach; aunts Karen Wren and Jan Thomas; and cousin, Marc Jordan.

## Fatal Crash on Hwy 18-Polk County

On Saturday, Jan. 22, at approximately 5:40 p.m., Oregon State Police Troopers and emergency personnel responded to a three-vehicle collision on Hwy. 18 near milepost 17.

Preliminary investigation revealed a westbound black Mercedes 4D, operated by Gary Young, age 76, of Naches, Wash., crossed into the eastbound lane and collided with a grey Dodge van, operated by Cheryl Kaesemeyer, age 49, of Monmouth. After the initial collision a GMC pickup, operated by Jason Foidel, age 50, of Vancouver, Wash., struck the Dodge van.

Young sustained fatal injuries and was pronounced deceased. A passenger in the Mercedes, Judy Zazzaro, age 63, of Naches, Wash., was injured and transported to a local hospital.

Kaesemeyer and her passenger Raymond Kaesemeyer Jr, age 53, were both injured and transported to a local area hospital.



Foidel and his passenger, Becky Lindsay, age 58, of Vancouver, Wash., were uninjured. Hwy. 18 was closed for approxi-

mately 4 hours. OSP was assisted by Grand Ronde Fire Department, Grand Ronde Police Department and ODOT.

## City Manager Receives Round of Applause for Landing \$1,185

Applause erupted for City Manager Heidi Bell at the Jan. 18 meeting of the Sheridan City Council when she announced that the Yamhill County Board of Commissioners approved a \$1 million project implementation grant for a water loop project underneath Sheridan Road and a second grant for an additional \$185,000 to create a 20-year water master plan for Sheridan.

Heidi responded with thanks and added, "I had a lot of help along the way, including Kie. I'm very excited about getting really focused on improvements to Sheridan Road."

The water loop project will boost water pressure and water quality in this area.

Heidi said the City would pursue ODOT state money for Sheridan Road's surface and said she would address the Council about using the City's ARPA funds to help complete the project.

Councilor Lucy Hebert, referring to how much Heidi has accomplished in such a short time, laughingly asked, "How long have you been here?"

Heidi became Sheridan's city manager on Nov. 1, approxi-



mately 2.5 months ago.

The Council moved back to the Monroe Event Center for its Jan. 18 meeting to enable a limited number of people to attend in person. In addition, City staff provided councilors with microphones to allow other councilors and the public to hear them speak.

Even with these improvements, those attending via Zoom continued to have trouble hearing parts of the discussions. Those attending online included Library Director Gwen Gorham and Public Works Director Kie Cottom.

City Manager Heidi Bell will fill a vacant seat on the Yamhill County Affordable Housing Corporation board. This board works to provide affordable housing solutions in Yamhill County. The Council unanimously approved a motion to this effect.

The Council discussed the pros and cons of a proposed ordinance that would allow city residents to raise a limited number of chickens within the city limits of Sheridan.

City Attorney Walt Gowell provided example ordinances from other cities that allow chickens, including McMinnville, Amity Monmouth, and Portland.

If approved, a permit would be required, and several other considerations would be in place.

The attorney will change the proposed ordinance to better align with Council and public comments from the meeting and present this new document to the Council for further discussion or approval.

The Council elected Councilor Roxie Acuff as its new council president. She will take over for Sandy Walker, whose term expired.



Heidi visited the City's Cherry Hill yard debris station and reports it is being used and is filling up. She asked the Council to help get the word out that this service is available and monitored by Public Works employees.

Heidi would also like residents to know that public parking is available in the downtown area behind Benny Huie's:



Public Works plans to make this City parking area more noticeable with paint and signs soon. Heidi wants the public to know about resources currently available to them, including the yard debris disposal, downtown parking, and South Side Park, an underused fishing pond with play equipment located just north of the prison.

A discussion regarding library hours followed. Currently, the library is open from 10 a.m.-5 p.m. Monday through Friday. A citizen commented that she and several others would like to see the library open on Saturdays and offer some weeknight hours.

Heidi said the matter is already under review, and the library director is excited. Heidi said the director has a couple of things up her sleeve and will include a flyer on this topic in an upcoming water bill.

Councilor Lucy added that several residents said they would like the library to be open Saturday and Sunday and possibly closed on Monday and Tuesday. She said that, during the current hours, kids are in school and, for the most part, are unable to use the library. Lucy would like to see the library open more user-friendly hours for children and families.

Heidi encouraged the community to email the library director at GGorham@cityofsheridanor. com with their thoughts and opinions about how the library can better serve the Sheridan community.

Councilor Jim Buckles questioned the contents of a 12'x14' storage unit the City has rented from Acuff Storage and Rentals, (which belongs to Councilor Roxie Acuff) for several years. He asked whether the City should include it in the citywide cleanup this May.

Roxie commented, "It belongs to the City. I have no idea what's in there."

Heidi said she and City Recorder Yvonne Hamilton would take a field trip to the unit, take a video and photos of the contents, and report back to the Council.

City staff changed Sheridan's citywide cleanup date to May 7. Heidi asked everyone to help spread the word about this date change.

The Council then closed the regular meeting to go into an executive session to discuss City property transactions.

When the Council reconvened in regular session, Councilor Dennis McElroy brought up the recently inspected City rental houses. He questioned the City's liability concerning continued tenancy after inspectors reported that all three homes could be considered dangerous. In addition, Dennis noted wiring problems and leaks in the walls that may cause black mold, along with nonoperational fire and carbon monoxide alarms.

"I worry about fire. A tenant goes to sleep, and the house catches fire, no alarms, bad wiring, the chimneys haven't been cleaned. Those are all duties of the property owners. The City's property manager should have been the person to deal with all of that, but it hasn't been done."

Jim commented, "Probably more liability now that we've seen the reports."

The attorney, citing ORS 90.427, said, "There are several ways that you can terminate an existing tenancy. One of which is to sell the property to somebody who wants to move in. That is probably not the circumstance here, though it's one of the possibilities.

"Second is because you intend to change the use. That may be the most likely of the three.

"And, third, is because you need to make major repairs and it's not safe and habitable at the present time, or you need to vacate the property to make the repairs. You would give that notice only if

you were determining to continue on as rental property.

"So you'd have to make the decision between, are you going to change the use, or are you going to continue on with rentals, before the City can give a notice to terminate."

Dennis, "My question is, though, these properties are not safe. They're not fit to have anyone living in them. With the landlord's knowledge that fixing the place would cost more than they're



Walt went on to more or less repeat the law he had quoted a few minutes earlier but added, "I concur with you that the City has liability for damages resulting from lack of maintenance. You do have coverage for that type of liability.

"That doesn't change the moral issue of resolving the issue of what you intend to do with those properties. If you intend for them to become something other than rental property, then that's an easy notice to give, and we can start the clock ticking.

"And, you can provide assistance, if you wish, to tenants to help them relocate. There is nothing prohibiting you from doing that. "If, on the other hand, you intend to vacate the properties for the purpose of repairing and restoring, and you have the dollars to do that, and it's budgeted, then

you can go that direction. "But, this Council has to tell staff which direction to take. We're not telling you what road to take tonight."

This matter will be on the next agenda.





## Laundromat, Dog Wash Station, Automatic Car Wash to Open

Birpal Johal, or Paul, as most locals know him, purchased the existing car wash and storage units located at the corner of Main and E Street in Willamina last February.

With the help of the contractors E&M Remodeling and Concrete of Dallas, Paul will open a laundromat, an automatic car wash, and a self-serve dog washing station at this location.

The new laundromat is now in the final stages of construction. It will offer eight new washers and nine new dryers, which will range in size from standard to industrial. The larger size machines will easily accommodate oversized bedding.

Prices for the coin-operated machines will vary based on the size of the washer or dryer. The laundromat will also offer a small waiting area with vending machines selling detergents, fabric softeners, sodas, and snacks. A change machine will be available.

The laundromat, expected to open in mid-February, will be accessible from 6 a.m. to 9 p.m., seven days a week.

Paul does not plan to have an attendant on the premises; however, a service technician will be nearby if assistance is needed.

Directly next door, "All Paws," a self-service dog and pet washing station, is expected to open by the end of February. The one-station pet wash will operate the same hours as the laundromat. Paul said he saw this idea on Tik Tok, and having the space available, he thought it would be an excellent addition for residents. The station will offer everything needed to wash pets without the backbreaking work of continuously bending over.

In addition, a new "touchless" automatic car wash will replace one of the current self-wash bays. This new car wash has been ordered and should be delivered and operating sometime this spring.

Paul, who also owns Willamina IGA, originally planned to use some open space near the grocery store. However, when the building and existing car wash came up for sale, he thought this space would be a better fit. Two of the large front bays of the storage units were remodeled to become the laundromat and dog washing stations. The remaining storage units will continue to be public storage.






