Yamhill County Sheriff's Office Invites Volunteers to Participa

The Yamhill County Sheriff's Office invites volunteers to serve in its wide range of programs.

Volunteers who qualify can serve on the Yamhill County Search and Rescue, Yamhill County Volunteer Response Unit, Yamhill County Amateur Radio Emergency Services, Yamhill County Community Emergency Response Team, Yamhill County Mounted Posse, and for those ages 15 through 20, the Yamhill County Cadet Program.

The mission of the Yamhill County Search and Rescue Team, one of the largest groups, is to recruit and train volunteers who can quickly and effectively look for and rescue lost people, respond to disasters, and provide community education on safety and survival.

Community members work together to serve the people of Yamhill County and beyond. All members receive the necessary training to equip them for the

Deputy Walters is this program's coordinator, which offers many different opportunities. For example, SAR has an ATV team, an E-bike team (a bicycle that can run on electric power or by pedaling), a kayak team, drones, and a couple of canines.

Deputy Walters said it is very rewarding when the team finds someone and makes a rescue. "Our volunteers are just like you guys. Some are retired cops or firefighters, but we also welcome bakers and candlestick makers," Brady added with a laugh. "Everybody has a skill set they can bring to the table."

Day or night, rain or shine, Yamhill County Search and Rescue is ready to save lives. The team of volunteers is highly skilled and dedicated to its mission. The team responds to calls in Yamhill County and the Pacific Northwest.

Volunteers must attend the Academy, attend one monthly meeting, and be available for callouts.

The Volunteer Response Unit (VRU) is a dynamic, progressive, and professional unit dedicated to maintaining community part-

nerships to promote a high quality of life for the county's diverse population.

The VRU unit promotes safety, assists the sheriff's office with preventing and suppressing crime, and provides assistance when called on for emergency and non-emergency services.

This team creates and maintains strong community partnerships and adopts a multi-disciplinary approach to solving community problems.

VRU volunteers patrol parks and participate in traffic control, crime scene containment, vacation home checks, emergency management assistance, community events, substation assistance, special projects, fingerprinting, and more.

The Amateur Radio Emergency **Services Organization** started in the 1930s to support local public service agencies in times of disaster. These volunteers are licensed amateur radio operators who operate their equipment in and around their neighborhoods, counties and states to relieve public service personnel so they can perform other jobs. This group usually reports to the county emergency manager or their county sheriff.

The Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) educates people about disaster preparedness for hazards that may impact their area and trains them in basic disaster response skills, such as fire safety, light search and rescue, team organization, and disaster medical operations.

Why is Sheridan School District going out for a bond?

Our high school is in need of significant updates in several locations. This includes the old gym. locker rooms, main office and the science room. We also need to address our security systems at

Using the Long-Range Facility Plan and a year of planning and discussion, the Bond Committee landed on the following areas that need significant financial support:

Student safety

FCS and SHS will have a new main entrance designs where all visitors must have a face-to-face conversation with office staff before having access to the rest of the school. There will also be upgrades to the intercom system and cameras.

Renovation of two of the old gymnasiums at FCS and SHS

Increase large event space for the community, create an emergency location (FCS gym building), and allow for sport tournaments.

CTE expansion

Provide career technical education in several areas, creating a local workforce to meet the needs of industries.

Sheridan High School

- Improved restrooms and sickroom
- Remodel the old locker rooms to team rooms
- Remodel and update the science classroom

Why \$16 million?

The amount of the bond is \$16 million, based on an analysis to keep the annual tax rate close to the same as last year's. The annual tax rate is approximately \$2.66 per \$1,000 of taxable assessed value. The previous bond was recently paid off, this bond will essentially replace it.

Should we pass the bond, the state will award Sheridan School District \$4 million in a grant, additional funding for capital improvements.

The process of creating the list of items centered on improved student and staff safety, immediate maintenance needs, the education of our students and the ability to serve the Sheridan community.







te in a Wide Range of Programs

Using the training learned in the classroom and during exercises, CERT members assist others in their neighborhood or workplace following an event when professional responders are not immediately available to help. CERT members also are encouraged to support emergency response agencies by taking a more active role in emergency preparedness projects in their community. This group attends monthly meetings and must complete CERT training requirements.

The Yamhill County Sheriff's Mounted Posse, the oldest of these programs, carries on the fellowship and traditions of the posse, horsemanship, and community service with the support of the Sheriff's Office.

Posse members serve as color guards in parades and help with traffic control and parking during special events. They are also involved with emergency assistance for search and rescue, large animal rescue, or as ambassadors and educators for good horsemanship.

The Yamhill County Sheriff's Office Cadet Unit is a program designed to let young people, ages 15-20, get an inside look at the world of law enforcement. Cadets gain firsthand law enforcement experience through patrol ride-alongs with deputies and working at community events. On patrol ride-alongs, cadets can watch and assist deputies in their duties. A few yearly events the cadets work at include Oktoberfest in Mt. Angel, the Yamhill County Fair, Independence Days, and the Swan Island Dahlia Festival.

Currently, eight high school students are participating in this program. However, the Sheriff's Office hopes more youths will become involved.

Deputy Walters said cadets are usually trained to the standards required of deputies by the time they complete the program. He said they had just hired a guy who'd been a cadet for years. He graduated at the top of his class at the state academy.



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Jump Into a Fire Career with the Bureau of Land Management

Are you looking to try a new exciting career in wildland fire? Whether you want to work outside or in the office, the Bureau of Land Management has various seasonal entry-level fire jobs to consider.

The BLM protects over 16 million acres of public lands throughout Oregon and Washington. These lands range from forested lands to high deserts, creating a variety of complex fire programs. BLM says no two days are the same. BLM is part of a larger, collaborative wildland fire management community that partners with other local, state, and federal agencies. These jobs are based in Oregon and Washington, but employees are a part of a dedicated team that spans the nation.



New team members will work in some of the country's most beautiful areas. Jobs include firefighters who work on the fire line, dispatch staff who assist with coordinating people and equipment, and more.

Job announcements are open now. They will continue to open on a rolling basis through December 2022. Applications must be submitted through USAJOBS. GOV. The work itself will begin in the early summer of 2023. BLM recommends carefully reading the job announcements since deadlines, employment start dates, and required application information may vary.

Zachary Spencer, BLM Prineville Engine Captain, said he joined the wildland fire team because he was looking for an exciting, team-oriented job with a chance to be in the outdoors.

"Working for BLM Fire was a perfect fit for me. I started on an engine crew, and it opened the door to the vast world of wildland fire," he said. "You can start your career on an engine and eventually find yourself flying in a helicopter over a beautiful area most people may never see"

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Fire Won't Wait - Plan Your Escape

Fire can be tragic. We've heard the story about the Great Chicago Fire in October of 1871 which destroyed 17,000 buildings and killed 300 people. But this is the West Valley. Most of us don't have cows, barns or lanterns to get knocked over. (Nor are many of us familiar with the game of craps if you prefer the tale of Louis Cohn gambling in the barn with the O'Leary's son and his friends when the fire started.)

But the City of Sheridan has suffered through four major downtown fires, the largest of which destroyed much of the south side of town in 1913. And it hasn't been that long since Sheridan lost two of its residents in a house fire. These two men were neighbors, friends, coworkers, family. Fire can be very tragic.

Fire spreads fast. In less than five minutes most homes will be fully engulfed in flames with temperatures exceeding 1400° F. In many cases occupants will have two minutes or less to make it to safety once the smoke alarm sounds. That is why it is so important to develop an escape plan now. You won't have much time to think if a candle catches a curtain on fire or the grease in the pan on the stove ignites.

Do you know two ways out of every room in your house including the ones upstairs and in the basement? Do doors and windows open easily? Do you have an escape plan for all members of the family including the young, the elderly and occupants with disabilities? Do you practice your escape plan regularly? Do you have working smoke alarms in every sleeping area and in common spaces outside of bedrooms? Do you know where you would go once you get outside to make sure everyone has escaped safely?

Make your plans now. Hopefully you will never need to use them. And whatever you do, don't go back inside a smokefilled building. There are too many tragic stories of kids who went back in for toys or new clothes or family members who went back to find missing pets. Once out, stay out.

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Advice for Picking The Perfect Pumpkin

It's the time of year when people want to pick out the perfect pumpkin. Whether you want to eat it or carve it and put it on display, there is a method to the madness of selecting the perfect pumpkin.

If the pumpkin is destined for a pie or some other treat, be mindful of finding the specific variety meant for eating. Although the grocery store will have signage calling them out as pie or sugar pumpkins, you can ask the folks at the farm or local pumpkin patch for them as well. They are small, three to six pounds, and are round with sweet, firm flesh, unlike the typical field pumpkin, which has watery, stringy flesh much better suited to carving. Like display pumpkins, make sure it is an even color all around, and watch out for scrapes or soft spots that could indicate internal rot.

When picking out a pumpkin for carving, focus on the stem first; it is a good indicator of freshness. Try to find one with a green, firm stem and not brown and dried out. The best option is to prune it directly off the vine, cutting it on either side of where the stem is attached. Next, thoroughly examine the skin and ensure it is free from deep scratches, bruises, and soft spots. Pumpkins are prone to rot quickly once their skin is broken, including after carving or if they sustain frost damage. Also, look closely to see if the color is consistent and not patchy with brown or green, indicating it is over or under-ripe and would be challenging to carve.

Lastly, hold the pumpkin in one hand up to your ear and knock on it with the other. It should have a loud, clearly hollow sound. If it knocks back, put it down, it's haunted!

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

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Online Dating May Have Many Benefits, But Beware of Online Dating Scammers


Online dating is responsible for many happy longterm relationships. It can open up opportunities for dating beyond your geographical location. Communicating with a potential person long before you actually meet makes compatibility more likely. But, online dating scams run rampant through many dating sites.

For example, You meet someone special on a dating website. Soon he or she wants to move off the dating site to email or phone calls. He tells you he loves you, but he lives far awaymaybe for business, or because he's in the military.

Then he asks for money. He might say it's for a plane ticket to visit you. Or emergency surgery. Or something else urgent. Scammers, both male and female, make fake dating profiles, sometimes using photos of other people - even stolen pictures of military personnel. They build relationships, some even plan fake weddings before they disappear with your money.

Here's what you can do:

Don't send money. Never wire money, put money on a prepaid debit card, or send cash to an online love interest. Realize that you won't get it back.



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Here are a few of the most common online dating scams:

1. They Ask for Money

Someone with genuine intentions will never ask a stranger online for money. If a match is asking you to pay for something block and report that person to the site right away. Under no circumstances is it okay to give money to someone on a dating site that you don't know.

2. They Use Poor Grammar and Make a Lot of Spelling Mistakes We all misspell words miss com-

We all misspell words, miss commas, and make typos here and there, but if a dating profile or message is made up of 90 percent mistakes, that's cause for an eyebrow raise. A significant number of scammers are from other countries (usually Russia, Nigeria, Ghana, Ukraine, South Africa, Jamaica, or Brazil), so keep an eye out for a lot of broken English and weird word choices.

3. Few or Only One Photo

When online dating, photos may be as important as text, so if you're communicating with someone who only has one blurry or stock photo, your Spidey sense should be tingling. Sometimes the profile's photo looks too good to be true. Sure, maybe there are model-quality single gals out there, but a lot of times a scammer will post a photo of a beautiful young woman to target single men, especially older men. You could try to prove they are who they say they are by making a game of it. Send a selfie (keep it PG) and ask for one of them in return. You can also plug the photo into TinEye's reverse image search to see if it appears somewhere else, such as a stock photo depository.

4. They Express Strong Feelings for You Too Soon

Love at first sight can definitely happen, and there have been plenty of stories about people who fell in love within weeks of meeting and who are still together today. However, online daters should guard their feelings during those early stages when they're getting to know someone because it's so easy to lie, embellish, and misjudge people online. Remember that you don't know this person or their intentions, and take things slow until you've built trust online and in person. If an online match seems to be rushing the getting-to-knoweach-other phase and jumping right into declarations of "I've been waiting for someone like you for my whole life" or "I can't believe we found each other,"

that should raise some alarms.

Especially if you haven't even met the person yet.

With such ardent love declarations, they could be trying to appeal to your emotional side, so you'll throw caution to the wind and let someone untrustworthy into your life. Maybe they're sincere. Or maybe they are more attracted to your bank account than your personal qualities. Only time will tell, so give yourself plenty of space and time to figure out the truth.

5. They Delay Meeting in Person The end goal of online dating is to find someone you like and get off-line ASAP. When the person you're talking to constantly has an excuse for why they can't meet up, you should be wary. They're either not that into you and or they aren't who they say they are and are trying to scam you.

A majority of scams involve people who say they're in a different countries, so it makes sense that it would take a while to go on a real-life date, right? However, this is their reasoning for why you should send them money. Something else to consider is why would they be looking for someone outside of their own country, and why would they do so if they can't afford to get there in the first place?

Voters Will Decide Whether to Postpone Psilocybin Treatment Centers for Two Years

The Nov. 8 ballot will contain measures 36-216 and 36-217, which asks voters whether or not they are in favor of a temporary stay on psilocybin service centers that could potentially open next year under the Oregon Psilocybin Services Act (OPSA).

Concerns over the specifics of the new law and its implementation may have led to the drafting of the city ordinance that would prohibit the state from issuing new psilocybin-related licenses within the cities of Sheridan and Willamina for two years. The text describing the measure in the official voter's pamphlet says it is intended to provide additional time for cities to enact reasonable time, place, and manner restrictions on these licensed facilities.

Psilocybin is a naturally occurring psychedelic compound found in certain mushrooms, and according to the Oregon Health Authority (OHA), research suggests it may help treat depression, anxiety, trauma, and addiction.

Under the OPSA, the state will begin accepting applications for licensing manufacturers, lab testing facilities, and open service centers on Jan. 2, 2023.

There is a comprehensive process to receive a license, including an on-site inspection for proposed psilocybin manufacturing, lab testing, and service center locations.

Licensing also requires the applicant to be 21 year of age or older and possess a high school diploma or equivalent certificate. It

also requires applicants reside in the state of Oregon, pass a criminal background check, complete and pass the official Oregon Psilocybin Services training program and pay the required fees.

Additionally, center locations are mandated to be at least 1,000 feet from schools, and cannot be located on property zoned exclusively for residential use if within city limits.

Finally, the law requires the substance to be administered onsite by a facilitator who is also licensed by the state. All facilitators will be required to receive extensive training, testing, and pass a background check. And, again, must be at least 21 years old.

The fact sheet provided by the OHA says clients wishing to access services from the center must also be at least 21 years of age or older, but do not need to be residents of Oregon and can access care for any reason. Clients need to have a consultation session with the facilitator to find out what to expect and then schedule an administration session where they will consume whatever preparation they prefer and, lastly, have the option to participate in a follow-up session to learn about peer support and other resources.

To reiterate, a YES vote on either measure 36-216 in Sheridan and 36-217 in Willamina would postpone any licenses from being issued by the state for psilocybin manufacturing and service centers for the next two years.





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
Four Projects Keep Downtown Sheridan Bustling, Alert

First slabs poured were for the three shops, Riverside Floral, Brad's Barber Shop, and Sackett and Wright Insurance, which will occupy the south section of the structure.



GAS PIPE ALONG Bridge Street was laid this week by crews from the Salem Sand and Gravel company. The Northwest Natural Gas Company project disrupted parking and traffic, but the crews were creating a minimum of problems with their rapid progress.

West Main Water Project Bid Call Set With Loan, Service Due In September Calls for bids to lay water pipe for the West Main Water AssoWhen the pipelaying project is awarded to a contractor, it will

Calls for bids to lay water pipe for the West Main Water Association District west of Sheridan have been issued and bids will be opened at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday, Aug. 17, in the City Council chambers. According to secretary Charlie Jordan, an association meeting will be held Wednesday, Aug. 11, at 8 p.m. in the council chambers. This will be the last opportunity for anyone living in the area to sign up for water service from the city.

Jordan said the project calls for the laying of about 1.2 miles of six-inch pipe along Hwy 18 B, to a point about 600 feet west of the Rock Creek Road junction. About 35 proposed users are signed up to be included in the project, which will bring city water from Sheridan to this area west of town.

About 15 years of work on the project neared conclusion with approval of a \$27,000 Farm Home Administration Loan, Jordan said. The association must put up the other \$3,000 on the \$30,000 project. The loan was approved by the Department of Agriculture.

When the pipelaying project is awarded to a contractor, it will take only a week to 10 days for the 1.2-mile stretch to be laid. Roy Waggoner is the engineer on the project.

Association officials said the city water service in the area should be a big assistance to the building and improvement of the district. The contract will be awarded at the Aug. 17 session and work should start about a week to 10 days afterward. Jordan said anyone wishing to make either the 10% down payment or the whole assessed payment may do so at his office at Strout Realty, 142 S. Bridge Street in Sheridan.

Another advantage to be gained by residents of the area with the installation of the water line will be a decrease of about 30% in fire insurance rates. Since fire hydrants will be installed at intervals along the line, the area will be reclassified from a class 8 to a class 6 district, the same as the city. Property values are also expected to be boosted with the water from the city.
