# Willamina Council Discusses Child Abuse Prevention, Habitat Conservation Plan, and Small Business Week

The Willamina City Council kicked off its monthly meeting by declaring April as National Child Abuse Prevention Month. Because of this, the City will work to raise awareness and promote child abuse prevention. The issue is critical because of the significant impact abuse has on children. One in four children will suffer abuse, a preventable crime.

Maya Blackmun of Juliette's House was on hand to express her appreciation for the City's support and tell the Council and others in attendance that their website has more information.

"The best way to keep children safe is to raise awareness and create community connection. Each of us has a social and moral responsibility to act if we see abuse: if you believe a child is in danger of being hurt, call 911 immediately. Another number to call can be found on Yamhill County's Health and Human Services webpage, "Reporting Abuse and Neglect": 1-855-503-SAFE (7233). DHS-Child Welfare is responsible for investigating such reports. For Polk County, the number is 715-485-8400, found on Polk County's Child Protective Services webpage," said Maya.

A campaign to wear blue on Fridays throughout April hopes to show support for preventing and reporting child abuse.

Hampton Lumber's Laura Wilkeson presented an update to the Council on the current Habitat Conservation Plan (HCP).

"For some background, on Oct. 30, 2021, the Governor's Office announced, '[N]early ten months of negotiations between private forestry representatives, small forestland owners, conservation leaders, and fishing organizations have resulted in a historic proposal for new protections for sensitive species on over 10 million acres of forestland in Ore-

gon.' The proposal seeks to meet the federal standards for a statewide Habitat Conservation Plan," added Laura.

The idea is to find the best compromise for all parties.

In Oregon, ODF manages 745,000 acres of forestland in 15 counties. The State must consider these lands' environmental, social, and economic values, working toward the Greatest Permanent Value or GPV. The HCP is a voluntary agreement to protect wildlife species and ecosystems while keeping in mind the concerns of landowners.

The current HCP was developed without sufficient socio-economic analysis, according to the presentation. In other words, there are concerns about the fairness and effectiveness of the current HCP. Hampton Lumber believes that more time and analysis are needed to get this right. They feel that something this important should never be done in haste. Another important topic was that National Small Business Week is coming up in May. According to the Small Business Administration (SBA), the U.S. depends on the resilience of small businesses, which make up 99.9% of all businesses in this country and employs almost half of all workers. They believe that when small businesses are supported, jobs are created. The City supports small businesses. Skyberg Lumber and Hardware, represented on the City Council, is one example of many fine small companies in Willamina.

The Council reminded all present

that the City of Willamina always provides opportunities for the public to comment on any ongoing or future projects. In addition, the City publishes notices of these meetings in advance. "Don't hesitate to stop by City Hall for more information when in doubt," a spokesperson for the City added.

Finally, the Bulletin Board extends congratulations to City Manager Kenna West on her appointment to the 2022 League of Oregon Cities (LOC) Board of Directors. She will act as a directors, which is an honor for her and an opportunity to represent the City of Willamina. West has demonstrated skills in networking and building and maintaining relationships that help strengthen the community and create opportunities that may not otherwise exist.

# Dear Sheridan Families,

This is a busy time of year with the Budget Committee and Bond Committee.

The Budget Committee is made up of five committee members and the Sheridan School Board. All meetings are open to the public. Our first meeting is Thursday, April 28, in the district office board room.

During this meeting we will review the current fiscal year, the use of our ESSER funds, and how our budget aligns with district goals. Over the course of several meetings, the Budget Committee will provide the necessary feedback to refine and adjust the proposed budget for the 2022-23 school year. The proposed budget will be presented to the Sheridan School Board for approval during the June board meeting.

The Bond Committee meets twice monthly on Monday at 6:00 PM, SHS cafeteria. These meetings are also open to the public. At this time the Bond Committee has a general list of projects based on committee feedback and the Long Range Facilities Plan. The next meeting will be a review of approximate costs and starting to prioritize the project list.

At a recent training I learned about the impact of current construction costs and the delays of receiving materials, some up to a year. It was highly recommended to take into consideration the escalated costs when planning the budget for the bond levy. Right now our list includes improved security entrances to both schools and renovating both old gymnasiums. Our next meeting will be Monday, April 25.

Community input is a critical part of both committees. Please plan to attend one or both committees. If you are unable to attend but would like to offer your thoughts, please contact me directly.

# **Sheridan Fire Chief Paints Financial**

Sheridan Fire District held a town hall meeting on April 12 to discuss Measure 36-211, the replacement local option levy to be on this May's ballot.

"Our apology is based on the simple premise that in the past, our organization, no matter who was here or who was in charge, did not do a good job with communication and being transparent with the public. I now own that, and I will do a better job at every turn that I can, sharing information and being transparent about our organization and what we want to accomplish," said Fire Chief Les Thomas to start the discussion.

He continued, "I can't do this alone, we have an outstanding group of people, and I want everyone to know transparency, truth, accountability, and physical responsibility are our concerns. 'Others before self' is one of our mottos, and 'do the right thing' is another. If we stick to this, we can serve our community better."

Since 2003, Sheridan Fire District (SFD) has operated on the same levy. Operating costs continue to increase while SFD has tried to maintain operations with the same tax revenue.

In 1995 the state of Oregon decided the SFD base tax rate would be \$1.11 per \$1,000 of assessed property value. In 2003 the voters approved the local option levy, which added 35¢ per \$1,000, which created the tax rate still paid today of \$1.46 per \$1,000.

This June 30, the local option levy expires.

A subcommittee of the Sheridan Fire District Board was formed to review the current operational costs and propose a replacement levy cost that would meet the community's needs and enhance services.

The subcommittee proposed the replacement levy be 88¢ per \$1,000, an increase of 53¢ from

the levy set to expire. As a result, the total will cost \$1.99 per \$1,000 of assessed value.

Chief Thomas explained, "A yes vote on Measure 36-211 will replace the expiring levy; it will staff a second ambulance 24 hours per day to meet the increased demand for service and replace expiring personal protective equipment.

"It will also increase the essential operational revenue that will allow continuous services, and I want to expand on that by offering better. We want to offer more, as much as feasible. "This would keep our insurance service rating at a four. We are three points away from a rate of three. If the levy fails, our rate could potentially drop to a five. If that happens, insurance rates could potentially cost two times as much as the levy would have cost. It is not a scare tactic; it is the truth. The potential is there. We don't control insurance organizations, so we don't know the rates, but I want the public to be aware of it."

To explain what will happen if the levy fails, the chief said, "A no vote would not renew the levy, and the current 35¢ per \$1,000 would end, leaving us with \$1.11. As a result, operational funds would be reduced by approximately 31.5%. We would have one ambulance in service, and wait times for a trained responder would increase. In addition, the personal protective equipment will not get replaced, which would limit entry into fires and other situations based on available equipment."

SFD staff prepared graphs and other documents to describe and provide examples of how inflation has affected fire districts from the year 2000 through 2020.

Chief Thomas, for an example, used personal protective equipment for firefighters, both structural and wildland, which is

required in our area for all volunteer and career firefighters. Without the proper gear, firefighters can not engage or enter a structural fire.

In 2000, a structural suit consisting of a helmet, uniform, bunker coat, breathing apparatuses, everything including the belt and boots, cost the district \$5,080 per person. In 2022, the same outfit ran \$12,590, increasing by \$7,510.

Wildland suits in 2000 ran the district \$1,905. By 2022 the cost increased to \$5,467, a difference of \$3,562. For each volunteer and career firefighter, the required gear has gone up by \$11,072.

Chief Thomas noted, "When we talk about replacement PPE, this is what we mean. In 2000 we could have purchased a lot more equipment than we can now. So we have to be very careful how we spend the community's money," said Thomas.

The cheif said that uniforms are not the only item needed by the district.

Documents produced by SFD staff showed that in 2000, the district could purchase a brush truck for \$65,000 to upwards of \$110,000. In 2022 the same truck starts at \$102,000 and runs upwards of \$300,000.

A standard fire truck in 2000 was \$285,000 to \$455,000. In 2022 the same truck will run anywhere from \$605,000 to \$955,000.

"These numbers are from service organizations and manufacturers. We reached out to get these numbers; these are real," said Thomas.

"This is just the tip of the iceberg for costs. A monitor for an ambulance is \$38,000; the stretcher system is around \$58,000. Without anything in it, the ambulance itself is \$265,000 to \$285,000.

"Our board, being responsible, was able to save funds to purchase our new ambulance. That



is how our district has zero debt. But, we don't take it for granted. If we have the opportunity to move forward with this levy and there is a yes vote, rest assured your money will be treated appropriately and correctly and used for the greatest advantage for our community."
