#### Robert "Bob" Bishop Feb. 19, 2021 Bonnie Bishop March 16, 2021


Robert "Bob" Bishop passed away on Feb. 19, 2021. Not long after, Bonnie Bishop joined him on Mar. 16, 2021.

She worked several different jobs throughout her career but spent most of her time at Boise Cascade, putting in 25 years until she retired in 1999. Bonnie had a passion for music and enjoyed playing the piano. Her love of music started at a

young age, as her father played in a polka band.

Bob and Bonnie, as parents, grandparents, and great grandparents, were always the biggest supporters of each member of their growing family. Bob and Bonnie knew no strangers; they made new friends no matter where they went.

After retirement, they traveled the world together. They also treasured big family get-togethers. Family to Bob and Bonnie was EVERYTHING! Their deep love for their family was as strong as their deep love for one another

Their love and pride in their family were always evident. Their priority and focus was always family.



## WHS Hosts Gene Winfield, Legendary Custom Car Builder, Painter, Designer

Gene Winfield, age 94, is an automotive customizer and fabricator extraordinaire. He held a two-day workshop at Willamina High School on May 4 and 5 for adults and students alike. People traveled from New York, Seattle, and several cities around Oregon for this opportunity to meet and learn from this remarkable man. Tickets for the event cost \$600, part of which helped pay for students to participate.

Gene may be known to many for his Star Trek creation, the Galileo, a Federation Class F shuttlecraft that was in service with Starfleet in the mid-23rd century, attached to the USS Enterprise.

Additionally, his work appeared in several popular television shows, such as Bewitched, Get Smart, Batman, Bonanza, Ironside, Mod Squad, Love American Style, Flintstones, and Private Eye.

His creations can be seen in many popular movies, such as Bonnie and Clyde, American Graffiti, Blade Runner, The Last Star-fighter, Robocop and Robocop 2, Back to the Future II and Solar Crisis.

His work was also a part of several television commercials and



## Interested in Becoming Sheridan's Newest City Council Member?

The Sheridan City Council unanimously agreed to appoint Rich Cox as Sheridan's new mayor at its May 2 council meeting. Rich will complete Mayor Aaron Baer's term, which would have ended on Dec. 31, 2022. Aaron resigned at the April 18 council meeting, effective at the conclusion of the May 2 meeting. Rich's appointment resulted in an open council position which will also expire on Dec. 31, 2022. The council seat is open to the public. Requirements include at least 12 months of residency within the city limits of Sheridan. Applicants must be registered voters. Applications are available online and at Sheridan City Hall. The deadline to submit applications is 4 p.m. on May 18, 2022. The Sheridan City Council will meet at 7 p.m. on May 23 to review ap-

plications and appoint the new council member.

This seven-month council term will offer a community member the opportunity to "get their feet wet" before deciding whether or not to run for a full four-year term at the end of the year.

The Council unanimously approved giving a used surplus refrigerator to the Grand Sheramina Food Bank. Grand Sheramina Food Bank Manager Judy Adams, who attended the meeting, offered her thanks and the Council received a round of applause.

Mayor Baer stopped the council meeting momentarily to advise a Zoom guest with no apparent manners to either change their user name or leave the Zoom meeting. The unknown

individual was slow in following the mayor's direction, and was, therefore, booted off the Zoom meeting by the city recorder. This is the second time this cowardly person has tried to attend council meetings hiding behind the same idiotic and insulting name.

City Public Works Director Kie Cottam reviewed the City's code enforcement procedures. Code compliance staff received 34 reports of concern in April. Kie said most complaints stacking up are related to right-of-way vehicle issues. Kie explained that law enforcement must handle these issues, and they are doing all they can. Kie said code enforcement in Sheridan has been far more active than in the past. He said they have been trying new approaches to see what works best for this

community.

Anonymous reports of concern are very time-consuming, said Kie. He said they take twice as long as those with a phone number they can call to verify information. In addition, Kie said many complaints are vague, like "red car" or "black pickup" or "long grass," with no address or contact information provided.

Kie added, "There's still one subject that needs to be addressed, and that's building codes."

Heidi responded with enthusiasm, "I think we should share some really good news tonight! The good news is we have successfully budgeted for a full-time code enforcement position - if

the budget passes."

Kie said he'd heard a lot of positive feedback from the public lately. "I definitely think that the group in this room has caused a lot of buzz in the community. And for the better. People are supporting the programs. People are supporting the people in this

As of 8 a.m. on May 9, Sheridan residents can go to Sheridan City Hall and fill out a card to have their derelict car removed from their property by Gale's Towing. The City is using Gale's Towing for this program only. Gale's Towing will not be doing the tows arranged by the police, who will stick to the county rotation of towing companies. Thirty car owners will receive \$50 for participating in this clean-up effort.

Sheridan City Manager Heidi Bell said the community curbside clean-up program, where citizens who need a hand can call public works to have items picked up,

has been too successful. She said they've had to move "numbers 41 through 50" to the week of May 16. She said, "We physically don't have the capacity to handle that much in a day. The success is overwhelming," said Heidi, "And we're learning for next year."

"We are going to have one clean town," said Councilor Roxy Acuff. Willamina High School students made the 30-foot clean-up banners displayed across the Sheridan bridge. The city manager said, "They were a really good deal; they're reusable and get your attention with nice big lettering. They turned out great!" Finally, all council members signed up for various duties on clean-up day.

The City sent a letter to FCI asking them to allow the City to restart the program with their work crews. "Hopefully, with fingers crossed, the warden will allow us to do that," said Heidi. The "speed trailer" the city manager requested has been spotted in various places around town. Councilor Sandy Walker reported that Forest River held an employee meeting regarding driving complaints involving their employees on Sheridan Road.

Sgt. Stackpole will address the Council about programs they will start working on in this area for enhanced safety.

Installation of the new park cameras was expected to be complete the day after the council meeting. The other cameras should be installed within the next couple of weeks.

An update on City-owned property followed. Both tenants are expected to vacate the City's rentals in May and June.

City Attorney Nicholas Peasley and the city manager sent a letter to the owners of 106 S. Bridge Street (old Masonic Lodge). The attorney explained, "The letter we sent out goes active on May 1, so with ten day's notice from that point, on May 11, abatement proceedings, in theory, begin."

The city manager asked the city attorney to prepare an update for the Council's next regular

revealed that the project is on schedule with hopes to have all of the retail spaces open by August; sooner for the coffee shop. However, progress may not be as fast as many would like to see because of flood permit requirements. Stuck Electric is currently working inside the building.

The Huntley Building has plans to open by Thanksgiving. The owner told Heidi that the plywood should be coming out around June 1.

Another project Heidi said she feels passionate about is bringing all of Sheridan's nonprofits together for a meeting. She would like to hear about their goals, needs, and plans. She would like to see what is available in the community and what they have in common. Heidi wondered if there would be an interest in collaborating on a "mega nonprofit center" where several nonprofits could have their own offices, but share overhead expenses such as electricity, water, sewer, and possibly share a commercial kitchen, meeting space, and conference areas, copiers, etc. Possibly each nonprofit could take turns hosting public events. "Who knows, the sky's the limit, right?" said Heidi with a smile.

## House of Representatives District 24 Candidate Lucetta Elmer has Local Roots

Lucetta Elmer, who is proud of her West Valley roots, is currently running for District 24 House of Representatives. She attended the Willamina Chamber meeting last Wednesday and the Sheridan Chamber breakfast meeting last Friday.

Lucetta Elmer is a Willamina High School graduate whose first job was wrapping meat for Augie at The Corner Store (now the IGA) in Willamina. She grew up on Heuser Road with a Sheridan address, so she has fond memories of both communities. She now lives in McMinnville with her husband, Denny, also a Willamina graduate.

The couple has seven family businesses and, Lucetta said, a great life.

The youngest of their four children is preparing to move out soon. Lucetta and Denny have been traveling a little and enjoy this fun new phase of their lives. Rep. Ron Noble, Republican, District 24, approached Lucetta a couple of years ago, before the pandemic when they thought that Sen. Brian Boquist might vacate his seat during the term. If that happened, Rep. Noble said he would be appointed senator, and he would like to appoint her to his position. So Lucetta spent time shadowing him to better understand the job and to find out exactly what he does and if



she also believed she would be a good fit. Lucetta said she found it fascinating.

However, Sen. Boguist did not leave, and the pandemic came, and nothing became of the idea. Last fall, Lucetta got another call from Rep. Noble telling her about the formation of Oregon's new Congressional District 6. He told her he planned to run for U.S. Senator and said, "That means you're up."

So she talked the idea over with her family and decided to run. She sees it as her opportunity to give back to Oregon. She said, "I think Oregon has some amazing things, and we have some things

that need some work. I think my platform will lean more toward businesses since that's where I'm most interested. Also, my degree is in education. I did spend time teaching, and I have such a heart for children. So I would be very interested if asked to be on an education committee.

In her senior year at Willamina High, Lucetta was chosen as a National Young Leader and traveled to Washington, D. C. This trip was the first time she'd ever been on an airplane.

She said she always liked politics. She usually rises to leadership positions within many civic groups in which she is a member. For example, she chaired the McMinnville Chamber and served as a McMinnville Downtown Association board member. From that, she's gained experience working with people and understands working together to make a community better.

The Elmers own the new RV park under construction in Sheridan. When asked about the Sheridan park, Lucetta said they have several RV parks, one in Washington and the rest in Oregon. The Sheridan park is their first in Yamhill County. She said her husband worked diligently for years to find land with the correct zoning for an RV park because there is such a need. They finally found the Sheridan property, had it locked up, and the next day the building caught on fire. After that, she said it's just been one thing after another.

"Essentially, what happened was we lost our window. The people who should have done all the paving were two weeks late, and then the rains came. We have to have a certain number of dry days and a certain number of days with temperatures above 50 degrees to pour the asphalt. It just feels like it's been the wettest winter in history. We were supposed to be open last year. The latest I've heard is this year by July 1 - if everything goes well.'

She said, "We really don't want to miss the season again. There's so much interest; people are so excited. We get calls every day. There are just not many other options, and that's a really nice location. So we are very excited, and we're praying for sunshine. 

The outreach hopes to serve the people of Sheridan, Willamina, Grand Ronde, Buell, Ballston, everyone in the West Valley.





## 1950-1960s Kids Loved Heck Harper, the Singing Cowboy





#### **Heck Harper with Zorro in 1958**

When television came along in Portland, Heck Harper (Hector Vincent Flateau) was hired to take his talents on the air with KPTV and appeared as Heck Harper. His first show was The Bar 27 Corral. As foreman of the Bar 27 Corral, Heck sang and told stories of the Old West to children of all ages. Heck demonstrated many talents: he was musically gifted as a singer and guitar player, knew many stories, was an able horseman and a natural with young audiences. Soon, other television programs followed, including "Heck Harper's Cartoon Corral" and "Circle 8 Hoedown." Kids carried wallet cards identifying themselves as "Ranch Hands," members of Harper's big fan club. Television made Heck Harper a local celebrity who was easily identifiable and perennially appearing in rodeos, fairs and in the Portland Rose Festival parade every June. In 1954, he was the grand marshal of the Rose Festival Parade. Heck continued life as a local celebrity and continued to appear in many club dates, restaurants and small venues performing solo or with small combos. He was the grand marshal of the Phil Sheridan Days parade twice in the 1950s-1960s. He passed away in Oregon City at age 79.
