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A Message from the Sheridan Superintendent

Sheridan Families,

We are currently creating our proposed budget for the 2022-23 school year. The Budget Committee, made of selected community members and the Sheridan School Board, meets with district staff to review the current budget and district priorities.

A review of the 2021-22 fiscal year budget shows priorities for student health and safety, addressing learning needs, and maintaining in-person instruction.

Emergency COVID funds supported the costs for the district child care program, hiring our own substitute teachers, and additional custodians. The Student Investment Account, a state grant, provided licensed teachers to support student learning in secondary mathematics.

Going into the 2022-23 school year, Sheridan School District budget is built on an estimated allocation of \$9,910,282. Given this estimate, and knowledge of other state and federal grants available, the budget reflects some changes to FTE created to provide additional student support.

We added a vice principal position to Sheridan High School and redesigned our 6-12 instruction to include a designated health teacher.

Additionally, Sheridan School District will continue pursuing the following initiatives:

- Barbara Roberts Career Technical Education Center, expanding our career pathways. The selected pathways include Auto Tech, Ag Business, Fire Fighting/EMT Training, and Manufacturing.
- Bond Levy November 2022, funds to cover repairs and updating parts of SHS, repairs at FCS, and remodel both Old Gymnasiums. This will give the District and community four fully functioning gymnasiums for sports, large gatherings and community events.
- School Based Health Center Grant, a planning grant to create a center that provides health services on school property.

Working with the support of our community, we have the opportunity to improve student learning outcomes, utilizing available funding to develop and strengthen programs that will ignite curiosity, resiliency and passion, fulfilling the Sheridan School District mission:

Each student will be engaged today, inspired for the future, ready for the next set of challenges and accountable for their learning.

Thank you to the Budget Committee for their time and dedication to our budget process. We are looking forward to the 2022-23 school year!

Riverside Cafe Plans June 1 Opening

Riverside Cafe owner Barb Hofenbredl plans to have the new restaurant at 128 S. Bridge Street in Sheridan up and running by June 1. Barb said the cafe would be open 7 a.m.-8 p.m. seven days a week, closing only for Thanksgiving and Christmas. In addition, they will offer take-out and delivery in Sheridan.

So they are hiring now for all positions. Barb has had the doors open at the new cafe over the past few days while they're working to give potential employees a chance to stop by. She plans to be there from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. this Thursday. Applications may also be picked up at Hofenbredl Realty in Willamina from 9 a.m.-5 p.m. Monday through Friday. Interested applicants can also call Barb at 503-910-9261 to arrange to pick up an application.

The cafe's beautiful new logo has been placed on the front window and the sign above the awning now shows the name of the new restaurant. Barb expects the new awning to arrive soon. Brickwork will be done across the front. They also plan to paint the framing around the windows black and add hanging flower baskets. This week, Barb's crew will work on the wall facing the Hebert Plaza. They plan to pressure wash the wall, fill in the mortar, repair broken and missing bricks, and seal around the add-ons. In addition, Barb is thinking of painting her new logo design in the same area that a long-ago business used for the same purpose.

Barb is also envisioning raised planter boxes, hanging flower baskets, and picnic tables to beautify the plaza area by the café. She suggested adding metal roofing in the back part of the plaza over the wooden arches to provide a covered area. She thought it might be a nice consideration for future work for this park.

Willamina City Manager Kenna

City Manager Kenna West resigned effective June 10. On June 27, she will begin her new position as city manager of Independence. The City Council officially accepted her resignation at its May 10 meeting.

Kenna, who has been Willamina's city manager for the past five years, said, "I don't cry. I am a very strong woman. I cried. I love this community. The team that I put together is amazing. They're astounding. They helped rebuild this city. To leave them is like leaving my family."

Willamina Library director Sarah Frost will serve as Willamina's interim city manager for up to six months while the Council works its way through the recruitment process with the Council of Governments (COGs).

Kenna explained that Sarah would have been her immediate successor in the unlikely event that Kenna became incapacitated or otherwise unable to perform the duties of the city manager. Kenna said, for this reason, she had already been training Sarah on the budget and other matters. Kenna will continue training Sarah through her final month.

"Sarah has large corporation experience," said Kenna. "A lot of people don't know this about her. She has the education and experience to get the job done." Kenna is working with Sarah on the city's annual budget. Kenna said she wants to be sure the budget is complete and ready so that Sarah can take it to the Budget Committee and then present it for adoption on June 14.

Carla Johnson, who's been with the library for several years, will step into Sarah's position as library director during this time of transition.

Most people agree that Kenna has been phenomenal when it comes to finding grants for Willamina. Kenna said the City has \$5 million in hand, and an additional \$3.5 million in grants have been identified for water infra-



structure. She said the chances of these not coming in are very slim.

She added they have another \$5 million in their "just in case pot." These funds are a low-interest loan with a forgivable grant portion.

"The City has grant funding sitting in place that includes Sen. Merkley's \$2 million; and Yamhill County's \$1. These funds are dedicated to Willamina's water structure projects. Kenna said the money for this project is coming from nine different "buckets," including federal, state, and local sources. The City has applied for Safe Drinking Water funds, a revolving loan fund, which is a loan/grant. Kenna explained, "If we need it, we can pull from it. If we don't, we don't have to."

Kenna added, "I'm not going very far. My team will call me as long as they need me. There are some significant projects in the works. I will be here to help Sara 110% with pending projects. I love this community, and I'm not going to let go of them that easily."

"I'm so proud of what we've accomplished together, the City, the team, our community," said Kenna.

In addition to the tremendous grant funding obtained by Kenna over the past five years, she oversaw several other projects. Several streets have been paved

with additional funds set aside to continue with Barber and Walnut streets. In addition, more than 20 other streets have been patched and repaired.

Under her watch, the City replaced critical public works equipment.

She and her husband remodeled the entire city hall building, including a complete substation for Yamhill County deputies.

She used grant funds to replace all water meters in the city.

She created a dry food pantry at City Hall for community members. She and City staff planned and hosted Trunk or Treat, National Night Out, and the community tree lighting event.

Grant funding was used to upgrade Willamina parks.

She worked with Polk County Cemetery Savers to repair the Willamina cemetery, which included purchasing the derelict property next to the graveyard for parking.

She worked through the City's development code update, which resulted in housing starts "going through the roof."

She also updated the capital improvement plan and updated the SDC rates.

She started the critical water intake project that included the line to the school.

Kenna also received awards during her time in Willamina, including the 2019 Regional Cooperative Project Award from the Mid-Willamette Council of Governments and the 2020 SEDCOR Public-Private Project Award.

Ila Skyberg noted, "This woman has been amazing, providing just short of \$10 million dollars for the City. We wish we could've kept her forever."

Some Willamina **Ballots Contain Error**

The Yamhill County Clerk sent the wrong ballot style to voters within the city limits of Willamina. There were 988 voters within the city limits of Willamina that were sent a ballot which included the Sheridan Rural Fire Protection District ballot measure. That contest should not have been on their ballots. All other contests are correct on these ballots.

Although there are voters out-

side of the city limits of Willami-

na who live in the Sheridan Rural Fire Protection District, no voter inside the city limits should have had that contest on their ballot. Those 988 voters within the city limits of Willamina should have voted the rest of their ballot as normal. Every one of those 988 ballots will be duplicated by trained teams of staff working in teams of at least two, following the standard operating procedures Oregon Clerks have in place for damaged ballots. All of the other votes cast on those 988 ballots will be tallied as normal. Any marks made by those 988 voters on the ballot measure for

District will not be tallied. Fortunately, this error was caught before any ballots had been tallied and all affected ballots will be duplicated before being tallied. The only votes tallied for the Sheridan Rural Fire Protection District will be from those voters eligible to vote in the district. A complete accounting of each impacted ballot will be included with certification of the election. more information, call 503-434-7518 or visit the county clerk's website: https://www. co.yamhill.or.us/clerk.



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

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

Delphian Makes It Big at District Track Meet

Many Delphian and Sheridan athletes have qualified for the state track and field championships, which will be Friday and Saturday at Hayward Field in Eugene.

They qualified with their high finishes at the 2A District 2 meet Friday and Saturday at Kennedy High School. Participating high schools besides Delphian, Sheridan, and Kennedy were Colton, East Linn Christian, Gervais, Jefferson, Regis, Salem Academy, and Santiam.

For the Delphian boys, London Whitworth placed first in the 800-meter run at 2:14.78 and also qualified by coming in second in the 1500-meter run with a personal record of 4:47.92. Teammate Rei Yamazaki placed first in 1500 at 4:45.60 and the 3000-meter run at 10:10.89. Zahar Rotman led the 100-meter run at 11.56 and the 200 with a personal record of 24.17.

Both Dragon relay teams came in first. In the 4x100 meters, Mingham Cui, Neal Chinodakufa, Memo Cervantes, and Rotman combined for a time of 46.03. In the 4x400, Emiliano Chaparro, Sage Daniells, Cervantes, and Lucas Curry were timed at 3:41.70. For the Sheridan boys, Wesley Henley placed first in the javelin at 156-0 and Randy Gibson in the high jump at 5-11. Spartan boys qualifying in the long jump by tying for second at personal records of 20-07.5 were Pedro Anthony Nambo and Caden VanScoyk.

Two first places for the Delphian girls went to Portia Binford with a personal record of 12.89 in the 100 meters and 50.23 in the 300-meter hurdles. Also qualifying in the 100 were the Lady Spartans' Chloe Ayala, second at 13.43, and the Lady Dragons' Taeyah Saechao, third at 13.49.

Saechao placed first in the 200 meters at 27.86.

Coming in first for Delphian in the 4x400 relay was the team of Saechao, Ava Raphael, Coco Rosa-Cortes, and Sanjana Garlapati at 4:30.61.

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

Blind Child

All the players stand in a ring. One is chosen for the Blind Child and is blindfolded. The others join hands and skip around him in a circle while he slowly counts to ten. At ten all stand still while he advances and touches one. He tries to guess the name of the one touched by feeling of his face, clothes, etc. The one whose name is correctly guessed becomes blind child next time.

A variation of this provides that the blindfolded child point a wand or stick at some child in the circle, ask him questions, and guess his identity by the voice. Another form provides that the child pointed at shall make some certain sound, as grunting, barking, or the like. The blindfolded child guesses the player's identity from this sound.

Slipper Slap

The players form a close circle. One player is chosen to stand in the center. The players in the circle, holding their hands behind their backs, pass a slipper around the circle. From time to time some one slaps the one in the circle with the slipper. This must be done very quickly and the slipper must be passed on immediately. If the center player can catch one of the circle men with the slipper in his hand, that man becomes "it."

Several thicknesses of paper may be folded to simulate a slipper.

Farmer in the Dell

The children stand in a circle about the one who has been chosen as farmer. They circle about him, singing the first verse. As they sing the second verse, circling the other way, the farmer chooses a wife, and takes her into the circle with him. At the third verse the wife chooses a child, and so on, until at the last, "the cheese stands alone." The others in the center join the outside circle, and all stand and clap hands. The cheese chooses another farmer, and the game goes on as before.

Bear in the Pit

This game is liked by the small boys. There is also an opportunity here to teach the boys that the girls are not so strong as they, therefore are hurt more easily, and that they must not be too rough when girls are playing. The pit is formed by the players joining hands to form a ring. One player, the bear, stands within the pit. The bear tries to get out, over or under or by breaking the bars (clasped hands). If he escapes, the others give chase, and the one who catches him becomes the bear next time.



Charlie Over the Water

The players join hands, form a circle, and dance about one of their number who has been chosen to stand in the center. As they dance they chant the following:

> "Charlie over the water, Charlie over the sea, Charlie caught a black fish, But can't catch me."

On the last word all squat, and the player in the center tries to touch one of the ring players before he can stoop. The one touched then takes the place in the center.

Gypsy

This game is liked by little girls. Any even number can play but small groups of six or eight are best. One child is chosen to be the gypsy and another to be the mother. The other players represent the children. The gypsy hides in some convenient place while the mother talks to her children, pointing to each one to emphasize her remarks as she repeats the following rhyme:

"I charge you, my children, every one, To keep good house while I am gone; You, and you, and especially you, Or else I'll beat you black and blue."

Then she goes away and blinds her eyes with her hands. The gypsy appears and stealthily sends the children away to hiding places. When all are hid, the gypsy hides herself again. Then the mother comes home, finds her children gone and searches for them. When all are found and brought home, they search for the gypsy and chase her. The one successful in catching her becomes the mother. The former becomes the gypsy and the game is repeated.
