County Hazardous Waste Collection Event June 4

A Yamhill County household hazardous waste collection event is scheduled 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. on Saturday, June 4, at Newberg's waste management transfer station, 2904 Wynooski Street. Residential household hazardous waste only will be accepted.

Registration for Yamhill County events is required. Registration opened four weeks before the event date at www.co.yamhill.or.us/YCSW. A limited number of spots are available.

Items to be accepted include household cleaners, detergents, greases, auto fluids, old gasoline and diesel, pesticides, herbicides, fungicides, paint, household batteries, car batteries, fluorescent light bulbs and tubes, aerosol cans, items labeled as poisonous, flammable, reactive, hazardous, toxic, corrosive, dangerous, etc.

The following will not be accepted: empty containers, asbestos, ammunition, explosives, tires, propane or butane tanks, medications, sharps, syringes, or radioactive material.

Sheridan City Council Fills Open

Rose Hauck was appointed to fill the Council seat vacated by Rich Cox when he was appointed mayor on May 2, 2022. Rose's appointment will end on Dec. 31, 2022, when Rich's term would have ended. At that time, Rose will have the option to run for a council seat in the Nov. 8 election later this year.



The councilors had a difficult decision to make when three qualified citizens stepped forward to offer their services to the Council. City Manager Heidi Bell said, "These are three really great candidates that we were able to recruit in such a short time." She reminded everyone, "We start the election process on June 1. Three council seats and the mayor's seat will be on the ballot in the upcoming election. So I whole-heartedly hope that the two who are not selected tonight put themselves out there for the election process."

Cale Aaron George was nominated by Councilor Roxie Acuff, which Sandy Walker seconded. However, he received no other votes. Councilor Lucy Hebert nominated Rose, pointing out that Rose has attended several Council meetings, served on the Budget Committee, and has recently participated with the Council and the community in working through the process of changing City ordinances to allow chickens inside the Sheridan city limits.

Lucy added, "They are all good contenders, but when you have to choose one, I look at Council involvement, community involvement, City involvement. So that's what I'm basing my nomination on."

Councilor Jim Buckles, who seconded the motion, commented, "All three are well-qualified. It's hard to make this decision." Councilor Dennis McElroy, addressing the candidates, said, "You're all very qualified. I really hope all three of you apply for a position when they come up in a few months."

Mayor Rich Cox addressed citizen and Council concerns regarding the dangerous prisoner who escaped from FCI on Apr. 25 and the lack of a timely notification to the public. Rich said that he immediately began investigating the facts when he eventually learned of the escape. He said he is eager to work with the City Council, FCI, and the Sheriff's Department to resolve this issue and find answers. Rich and Heidi plan to attend an FCI board meeting on Jun. 8.

Ernie Hebert talked about Morgan Street and adjoining park sites during the first public comment period. He explained that Morgan Street runs into the river and, at one time, was used as a boat launch and a place for the fire department to fill up their pumper trucks.

Sheridan's Parks and Recreation Committee determined a lack of access, parking, and a restroom as deficiencies at these park sites. The pros of these park sites are that they provide riverfront access and an oasis in the middle of town. Ernie provided maps of the parks to the Council to illustrate how these three parks make up a riverfront park system.

Ernie explained that the Parks and Recreation Development Plan is a 20-year plan that is ten years old. The capital improvement plan was a five-year plan that expired a few years ago.

tam gave a recap of Sheridan's extremely successful town clean-up effort last month. He said City staff is working on ways to improve logistics for the next clean-up event.

Councilor Jim Buckles said, "Without a doubt, the huge success of the clean-up was because of Public Works."

Kie noted, "There was quite a bit of work that went into that, that no one got to see. A lot of that was the curbside work; that was a messy job. But, the crew powered through and got it done." Public works are also working with FCI and Yamhill County Corrections to re-establish inmate worker programs as an affordable way to get more community projects completed. The mayor and city manager will further discuss this topic at the June 8 FCI meeting.

Inmate programs administered by the State of Oregon are no longer an affordable option for small cities like Sheridan, Kie explained.

Library Director Gwen Gorham said she is working with Energy Trust of Oregon to upgrade the library's lighting to LED at no cost to the City. The library qualified for this grant because it has fewer than 20 employees, and it is smaller than 5,000 square feet.

Gwen also said Terry Crisman would paint the library and re-stripe the parking lot by the end of the month. As it is now, she said it's almost impossible to see that handicap parking exists. She told the Council that Terry would make some repairs to boards and siding before painting the building.

Replacement of the long-neglected library roof is also in the plans, with one roofing company reporting that he could stick his finger through the wood.

Gwen also said patronage had increased significantly since the library began being open on Sat-

urdays and Sundays, saying they could use more staffing on the weekends.

The city manager announced the resignation of a part-time City staff member effective June 30. Heidi is looking into hiring a full-time staff member, which she said could be the key to keeping City offices open to the public during the lunch hour.

Heidi said she and City Attorney Nicholas Peasley are working on city ordinances related to homelessness and camping.

The attorney said a campsite has been set up adjacent to Morgan Street right next to the sign that says "no camping." He said they are working on the legal response from the City to address that issue. Sheridan Ordinances prohibit camping in City parks and will discuss enforcement options with the Sheriff's office. Heidi suggested further discussion regarding Sheridan's camping ordinances at the Council's upcoming workshop.

More than 40 artists and vendors will offer unique and sustainable products such as art, clothing, jewelry, and home items. In addition, food trucks will be on site. Saturday events will feature Compostapalooza (learn how to make rich compost), a farm petting zoo, and casting a vote for your favorite family art project. Sunday will feature "Edible Landscapes of Yamhill County" and "Caesar the No Drama Llama."

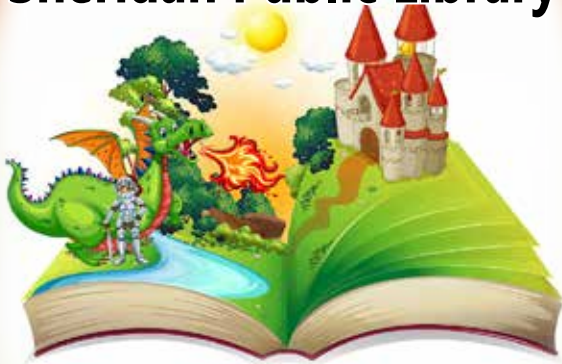

Permits will only be issued between the hours of 8:30 a.m. and 3:30 p.m. Monday through Thursday and between 8:30 a.m. and 2:30 p.m. on Fridays.

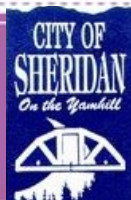


General Regulations:

- **Four Sales** allowed per calendar year; each sale may be three consecutive days with hours between 8 a.m. and 7 p.m.
- Items for sale may not be displayed on any City of Sheridan right-of-way and may not block emergency personnel access.
- All items not sold must be removed right away.
- Sold items must be removed within 24 hours.

Signs:

- **NO signs** allowed on any public right-of-way.
- **NO signs** allowed on utility poles, street signs or traffic control signs.
- **Two signs** (No larger than 6 sq. ft. each) permitted on property where sale is held.
- **Four signs** (No larger than 4 sq. ft. each) permitted on property other than where sale is to be held, provided that the sale property is not on a major thoroughfare (Hwy 18B). Written permission must be obtained from property owners where signs are placed.
- **ALL SIGNS** must be removed once the sale ends.

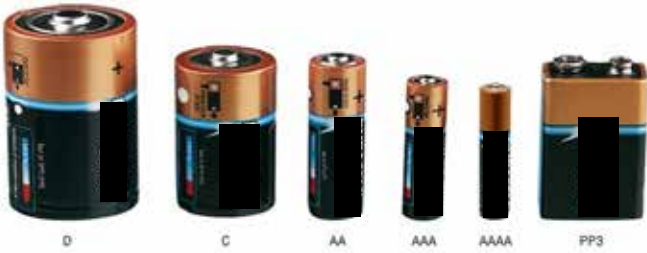

Oregon Business Management Group Gives Updates on Heider and Huntley Buildings

Michael Colvalt and Rich Lorimor attended last Wednesday's joint Chamber of Commerce and Rotary Club meeting at the Monroe Event Center.

Michael and Rich operate Oregon Business Management, the company that owns the Heider and Huntley buildings in downtown Sheridan. Both buildings have been undergoing massive rehabilitation and renovations for the past few years.

At this joint meeting, Tkeisha Wydro, Sheridan Revitalization Movement, announced a \$200,000 Oregon Main Street grant awarded to assist with the rehabilitation of the Heider building.

The announcement resulted in thunderous applause from all in attendance. Tkeisha thanked City Manager Heidi Bell for her time and support in preparing the grant application.

She also thanked Rich and Michael for investing in the community.

In addition, she thanked all who wrote letters in support of the grant. She added, "There were so many letters from community members. I'm fairly certain that is part of why the grant went through for the maximum amount."

The city manager thanked Tkeisha, saying, "You guys should know how much work Tkeisha did for this grant. She did an enormous amount of work."

Michael thanked Tkeisha and the community. Rich added his appreciation, especially to Tkeisha and Heidi, for their efforts on the grant application.

Rich acknowledged that the community might not be happy with him because of the lack of progress on both buildings.

But, he said, "We are happy to announce that we are moving forward on both projects. We expect to complete the Huntley building by the end of the year. We are actually on a faster track than that, but we're not going to commit to anything sooner with supply chain issues. We expect to complete the Heider building around this time next year."

"It's been a very expensive project. I believe we are at a \$2.4 million budget line," said Michael, "So this \$200,000 grant is going to go a long way, almost ten percent of the overall budget."

"From the bottom of our hearts, thank you for everything you did. We think the whole community will really enjoy these buildings

when they are completed. We're really excited."

The city manager told Michael and Rich that Chamber and Rotary are really great groups to communicate with when they're ready to start recruiting for business tenants and to explain how the process will be handled.

Michael responded, "The Huntley will be finished first. It will be a family restaurant. It won't be just a small "mom and pop" cafe. It will include a bar within the building, but not like the other local bars. Our goal is breakfast, lunch, and dinner - not on a high-class scale, but not diner-style. It's going to be a little bit nicer. We hope to offer good quality homemade food, 'warm your belly, warm your soul' kind of stuff. We will be looking for kitchen management, front office management, bar staff, waiters, and servers. Rich will be heading up this effort. He will be the one in tune with the business side as we work through the construction aspects."

Michael added, "When it comes to the Heider building, there's a little bit up in the air as far as whether we will operate it ourselves. But, there will be four commercial spaces on the lower level, as always. Those will be available to the public for lease. We will also complete eight apartments on the second floor to offer additional housing to the community. We will build both one- and two-bedroom apartments. The commercial spaces are not dedicated to any one source yet."

Michael said they had not reached a point of advertising to lease these spaces out yet but are hopeful they will be ready for this around the beginning of the year. Michael reminded the group about all of the hoops they've had to jump through at every project stage. "The Heider building sits almost two feet below the flood plain, and because of that, we are limited in how quickly we can move in certain aspects. We have to keep FEMA at bay as we work through the project. The community may see a lot of work happen and then a bit of a resting period. That, unfortunately, is the way things have to be done."

The Sheridan restaurant will have its own general manager. However, at a higher level, their goal as a company is to have various restaurants across the state, all operating under a parent company called "Good Eats, inc."

Oregon Main Street Awards \$200,000 Grant for Heider Building Rehabilitation

Oregon Main Street Organization awarded the Sheridan Revitalization Movement a \$200,000 grant for the rehabilitation of the historic Heider Building on Bridge Street. Located in the downtown core, the renovated Heider Building will house four commercial units at street level and eight residential apartments on the second floor.

The grant program was created during Oregon's 2015 legislative session, and placed with the Oregon State Historic Preservation Office. The legislation established a permanent fund for the Oregon Main Street Revitalization Grant, and provided an initial infusion of funds from the sale of lottery bonds. The funds must be used to award grants to participating Oregon Main Street Network organizations to acquire, rehabilitate or construct buildings to fa-

cilitate community revitalization. The program also requires that at least 50 percent of the funds go to rural communities as defined in the bill.

Oregon Heritage, a division of Oregon Parks and Recreation Department, awarded 28 matching grants worth \$5 million to Oregon Main Street Network organizations across the state for building projects that encourage economic revitalization. Projects range from facade improvement to basic facilities and housing with awards ranging from \$23,850-\$200,000.

Sheridan Revitalization Movement members said they are pleased with what they hope is the first of many major grants to help revitalize Sheridan.
