



A MESSAGE FROM THE WILLAMINA SCHOOL DISTRICT

It is hard to believe we have wrapped up another school year. Despite the unforeseen circumstances that COVID brought to our daily routines, we were fortunate to keep our doors open throughout the 21-22 school year. While we experienced a shortage of available substitutes, many student and staff quarantines, and ongoing changes to the school and health protocols, we also saw some great successes. For the first time in three years we had a full year of student academic data to review. Despite the attendance concerns, our students reported improved academic gains, even better than pre-COVID years.

Most of this can be attributed to the hard work of our staff and students. Teachers were focused all year on the unfinished learning for our students and focused lessons on the most critical skills needed to grow academically. In addition our graduating class had the highest number of Valedictorian's ever, at eight. Not only did these students all post a 4.0 GPA, but all acquired college credits while earning their high school diploma. One student earned 67 college credits! I want to mention Garrett Hembree, one of our Valedictorian's, his name was missed in the last Bulletin column. Along with his 4.0 GPA he received a Presidential Award and multiple scholarships.

As we move into summer, students will have multiple opportunities to participate in ongoing activities at the school. Families may view the programs offered and sign up their child through our Parent Square app. Our school campus is also happy to be hosting the Art Conspiracy program this summer as well. This two-week program is open to students throughout Sheridan, Amity, Willamina and Grand Ronde.

The campus will be a busy place all summer. Along with student activities we also have some major construction projects underway. As I write our track is in the first phase of a full renovation. We hope to have it completed in time for our first home football game next school year. The middle school will be adding six new classrooms in the near future. We are in the design phase of that project, but plan to break ground and complete site development this summer while the weather is dry.

He is preceded in death by his father, Archie Bergan.




In more recent years, Rick had





You've Got Worms

My Great Grandmother Ange was a nomad in her later years. During the summers, if she wasn't chasing down swap meet booths on the western side of Washington, she was hosting national campgrounds in the east. If she wasn't living in our yard or helping the ski patrols on Snoqualmie pass in the winters, she was off somewhere living life to the fullest.

Ange was a busy lady with friends from Bellingham to Ashland, Astoria to Coeur d'Alene, always equipped with an idea for the day and a plan to complete it. During my childhood, if we were not out hiking, camping, swap meets, rock hunting off of the side of the highway while drivers gave us the what for, we were dumpster diving and bringing home thrown away baby dolls that, "We can clean up, put a pretty dress on her and give her to your little sister." When we were not doing all of that, we were fishing; she was the one who taught me to fish, not the first one to take me but the one who gave me insight. I remember waking up way too early, so we could stop by Texaco to pick up some night crawlers a good friend of hers used to distribute in the county stores, then we would hit the lakes and streams before the sun came up. I had a great childhood.

One cold fall morning, I woke to discover Grandma had set up camp in our yard while we were all sleeping. I softly raced outside, testing the wind to see who was awake on our property, and wouldn't you know it. Grandma was up walking the dog while coffee was brewing. Her newest grift was this metal garbage can she had on my uncle's property, opposite our house, that she was about to open as I came dressed for the day. "You want to see something?" she asked as I walked up with "good mornings." The garbage can lid revealed a billowing plume of breath smoke. Inside was a moving organism of red brains over-lapping on itself, consuming the newspaper I delivered to the whole neighborhood a day before.

I jumped. She laughed, "They're tiny red worms." In shock, I turned away, gasping for air. "I've been selling worms!" Her exclamation, louder than her usual tone, probably woke up the rest of the property. She then went on to tell me she had been sell-

ing worms to start up a business. These were not the night crawlers I was familiar with hooking. They were smaller, hoarded together in a heaping mass, unlike the four to nine crawlers we would get in Styrofoam containers from Texaco. I will not go into any further details for those soft stomach readers.

Decades later, I now have my own family living in a different but comparably beautiful small town, I have a property, and now I want worms too! So we went to a red worm farm in this great valley, well, that's what I thought the sign said. Come to find out, they do not sell red worms, but instead, they are a boutique soil manufacture distribution center (they do not ever make compost on-site, they truck it in) with a price three times the cost when compared to the Wilco in Mac, who also trucks it in. I bought a quart of worms from a nursery in Portland, wishing I could have found someone in the area who sold them. If there is a company or family in the area selling worms, please email me.

This region does not have yard waste disposal cans. I've noticed that everyone has it hauled away or burns it when the county allows them to. Most of our close neighbors ask us if we want their throwaways before they haul them off. Yes, it does feel strange asking people from down the street to dump their rotten haul in my driveway, but it pays off. Some scraps of wood for burning in the next couple of years, a few apple trees to cure for smoking meat, and a lot of yard clipping waste. "Do vou want this trailer full I'm about to take to the mulcher?" "Yes, Sir, I do; how else am I going to follow in the footsteps of my Grandma Ange, terrorizing the children in this neighborhood and feed all these worms at the same time?" 



The Legion Riders will also host a bike show and games at the high school for Hometown Days.





Sheridan Council Seats Applications Now Accepted for Nov. 8 Election

Sheridan voters will decide who will fill three council positions and the mayor's seat in the upcoming Nov. 8 election.

The open mayor's seat is currently held by Rich Cox, who was recently appointed to fill the remainder of Aaron Baer's term.

Councilors with expiring terms are Rose Hauck, who was appointed to fill Rich Cox's term, Sandy Walker, and Lucy Hebert. All candidates wishing to be considered for these four-year positions must submit completed applications to the City of Sheridan no later than 4 p.m. on Monday, Aug. 29, 2022. The city opened to accepting applications on June 1.

To qualify, candidates must have resided within the city limits of Sheridan for the 12 months preceding the election.

All terms will begin on Jan. 1, 2023. The oath of office will be administered at the first regular Council meeting in January 2023.

All persons holding elective office in the City of Sheridan must file a "Statement of Economic Interest" with the Oregon Government Ethics Commission. This report must be filed by April 15 of every year in office. The information requested will include sources of income, property, business interests, and gifts related to the office. Civil penalties may be imposed for failure to file or for insufficient information.

The City application, Form SEL 101), and the Joint County Voters' Pamphlet Candidate Statement form with pamphlet instructions and attachments are now available at City Hall, 120 SW Mill Street in Sheridan, and online at the City's website.
