

# A MESSAGE FROM THE WILLAMINA SCHOOL DISTRICT

Willamina School Board members develop district goals during the regular August board meeting every year. To develop our district goals, we review several key indicators of student success; attendance rates, math and reading scores, ninth grade on-track for graduation, and our graduation rate. These indicators are also used by the Oregon Department of Education (ODE) to determine a district's need for improvement. For the past seven years, we have focused on improving outcomes for students in these areas and improving our mental and behavioral health services. We are proud of the work done in each area; although the past two years have created barriers to implementing many of our strategies and activities related to our goals, we persist. We are excited to continue this work and get back to the positive trajectory we were on.

Over the past years, we saw gains of up to 20% in regular student attendance. ODE requires students to attend more than 90% of the school year to be regular attenders. This means missing fewer than 17 school days, excused or unexcused, over the year (less than 2 per month). We had set a path to reach 90% regular attendance for all students, and before the pandemic, our k-2 students were at 88%. This will be a top priority in the coming school year.

In math and reading, the state has set short-term goals of 80% of all students scoring proficient on the Smarter Balance State Assessment. This test is administered one time during the spring of each school year. The test was temporarily suspended for the 19-20 and the 20-21 school years. Initial results are in, and we are pleasantly surprised with many of our scores, particularly given the inexperience of our younger students taking this test.

Ninth grade on-track to graduate is a percentage of students who earn six or more credits their first year in high school. Six credits represent 25% of the needed credits to graduate. A successful freshman year is a strong indicator of graduating on time. In 2017 only 54 percent of our ninth-grade students were on track to graduate. We have prioritized this over the past five years and are happy to report that 85% of last year's freshmen earned six or more credits.

Finally, and most importantly, our graduation rate. In 2017 we had a graduation rate of 65%. Today we are proud to say that we have sustained a rate of 83% for the past three years and have a goal to reach 90% in the next three years.

We are excited to get back to work and focus on improving outcomes for all students; this is the heart of what education is all about!







# Sheridan City Council Addresses Hebert Plaza Uses; Upholds Abate

### J.A. Hebert Memorial Plaza

Considerable ground was covered during the July 18 Sheridan City Council meeting, but a discussion regarding the new Riverside Cafe's use of the Hebert Plaza was relatively brief.

Copies of the orginal deed were provided to the Council which clearly state that the premises may only be used as a park, gathering place, or pavillion. The deed further sets out that if the premises are ever used for any other purpose, ownership of the property would revert to its original owners or their heirs.

According to the deed, conducting a commercial business is not an allowable use of this park. If pursued, it could cause the park to be removed from the City of Sheridan's park system, which would not benefit the cafe or the people of Sheridan.

The deed welcomes everyone to enjoy food on the plaza, whether from the cafe or any other deli, restaurant, etc., as this is a permitted activity in all city parks. However, the cafe would not be permitted to offer any kind of customer service outside in this park. Customers would place and pick up their orders inside the cafe. This would continue to make the park available for cafe customers while keeping the park usuage in line with deed requirements.

The majority who commented had high praise for the new tables, chairs, umbrellas, and plants that cafe owner Barb Hofenbredl had placed next to her restaurant in the City's park. However, Council members and Parks committee members felt that these personal items should be removed in the interest of keeping the park compliant with the deed restrictions.

A few months ago, the Sheridan City Council gave a thumbs up to coordinating an Art Deco theme for the three riverfront parks to tie in with Sheridan's Art Deco style bridge. With this theme in mind, committee members suggested placing a number of picnic tables in the plaza painted with colors that coordinate with plaza's newly renovated clock kiosk, and with the bridge color. The committee is currently working with the City and Rotary to provide these tables.

The committee is also considering Art Deco style park signs to help bring the theme together and make it easier to see that the park is public and open to everyone.

# 106 S. Bridge Street Abatement Process

In the early morning hours of Jan. 31, 2021, the old Masonic Lodge building at 106 S. Bridge Street in Sheridan collapsed.

Curt Edmondson and John Bargero of Sheridan Bridge Investment Co., LLC, purchased the property from Rich Mathis less than two full days earlier. John said the property was not insured.

Now, 18 months later, photos presented at the July 18 Council meeting show the sidewalk next to the property has not been reopened for public use. The deck damage caused by the building's collapse has not been repaired and remains fenced off from the neighboring park, with planks still hanging out into the open area where the building once stood. Bricks and construction debris lay scattered under the building, on the riverbank, and in the river. Junk and garbage continue to accumulate. Pilings and foundation elements are crumbling, with pieces falling into the river and littering the grounds around them.

A Consor engineering report dated March 2, 2022, recommends demolishing the existing concrete structure and removing the debris during approved in-water work periods.

City Manager Heidi Bell noted that in the 18 months since the building collapsed, the owners of Sheridan Bridge Investment Co., LLC, have allowed asbestos to spread in the air, land, and water; left unwanted debris at the site; created an unsightly mess; reduced civic pride; and created a visible blight to Sheridan's downtown, affecting the town's economy.

The city manager said the owners received ample opportunity to bring the property into compliance with Sheridan's municipal codes.

In a letter dated March 30, the city manager sent the owners a letter listing violations to be corrected, along with a copy of a "Notice and Order to Abate" that the City planned to execute on May 1 if the owners failed to correct the violations.

At the July 18 Council meeting, Curt challenged the Declaration of Nuisance and Notice and Order to Abate Nuisances issued by the city manager on May 11, 2022.

Curt said the building collapsed on Jan. 27, 2020. (It collapsed on Jan. 31, 2021.) He said that because of the weather, they moved expeditiously to clean up the project.

"We cleaned it up. We had DEQ oversee it. They were fully satisfied with the job that was done. We paid for that cleanup at our expense," said Curt.

He said that homeless camps in the area had created the trash, and they are not responsible for that.

He also said they reached out to the County to work out the fencing situation but didn't get any response or cooperation from the City or the County.

"We have worked at great speed to solve this problem that we inherited," said Curt.

He said during the ten years before they purchased the property, the City Council did not move at any great speed to address any of the abatement issues with the prior owners.

(Note: Council and community members worked diligently for a couple of years before Curt and John purchased the property to have the building and foundation inspected and code violations addressed. Heidi was not the city manager during this period. This Council information was published continuously.)

"So, from our view, we are being treated extremely unfairly as per the prior owner," stated Curt.

"I've outlined the procedural defects in the Notice of Abatement dealing with the City codes. But, we're here to work with the City to try to resolve this problem. Certainly, the solution of removal of the foundational structure is not feasible since it's in a salmon enhancement zone. I don't think you'll get any cooperation from the State in that regard.

"The Consor report is not definitive on whether the structure lacks integrity," said Curt.

Curt addressed the fencing issue, "We have jurisdictional issues there. There's a real question of whether we're even obligated to have fencing at all. One solution to the fencing problem is simply for us to remove the fencing we've been paying for. That would leave the City with exposure and liability for anybody who would fall from City property or County property into that location.

"We haven't had any issues until this May notice. From our view, everything is in good shape to the extent that you want the I-beams removed. We will call Cherry City Metals and see if they want them and will come out and remove them. "It (106 S.Bridge) isn't any worse image to the city than a lot of other structures are in the city," he said.

Councilor Dennis McElroy asked if they intended to clean the fallen bricks and concrete in and around the river.

Curt answered, "We can't go into the river to clean anything because that's under the State of water."

Dennis, "I'm sure there's a way because it happened several years ago when the Huntley Building fell into the river. Permits were granted to go into the river to clean all of that up. The whole back of that building fell into the river."

Curt, "The feedback we've gotten from the people we've talked to is that the State prefers that type of brick debris remain in the river because going in and removing it will create sediment and problems. We're in between a rock and a hard place. It is a protected water."

Curt said they could remove up to one cubic meter of materials from the water. "That's the salmon enhancement zone restriction," he said.

Councilor Jim Buckles asked Curt if he was trying to postpone while waiting to finish up his court case against Rich Mathis before the Council takes action on the abatement.

Curt said," No, I don't think the two are linked. The court case against Mr. Mathis deals with the issue of damages, not for any sort of equitable relief against him."

Curt said if the Council specifically identifies the things they want, such as brick removal, they could remove them.

He said, "If the abatement requires removal of the foundation, I think we'll end up with bigger issues.

"If you can narrow the abatement, we can probably live with that. The current request for abatement is for removal of an entire structure that's been there for 80 or 90 years and supported the building very well for that time."

City Attorney Walt Gowell reminded the Council that the issue before them was whether or not to uphold the abatement declaration made by the city manager. "If that is upheld by the Council, a new notice would go out to the property owners specifying a time period approved by the Council for the property owner to take action before the City's ability to seek

City abatement."

In her final remarks, Heidi said she ensured the removal of homeless camps and garbage near this property and that any remaining trash is from other outside influences.

She said the Council needs to analyze the property's existing condition and what it looks like today.

She requested that the City Council gets any reports Curt has obtained from the State giving direction about the cleanup or about being unable to get into the river. She thinks the Council needs to see this information.

Heidi wanted to be clear that, via email with Curt discussing fencing, he was proposing to install fencing into the foundation, where the sidewalk was, stating that he would go out there and do the work himself.

However, a City review of his request found it deficient in meeting the liability. The City wanted to see adequate plans and traffic ratings for the fence. Heidi said that was where the subject left off.

The City attorney added that the abatement notice and order do not require the removal of the foundation. Instead, it requires either the removal or significant repair to eliminate any safety issues or crumbling that would bring it into compliance with the City's ordinances.

Curt said the engineer's report on the property, purchased by the City, would be biased in the City's favor.

When asked if he would obtain his own engineer's report, he said it would depend on what the Council decides.

"If it becomes a basis for abatement and we have to take it uphill to the next round, then I would order that report, and the money would go toward the adversarial process, as opposed to, if I didn't have to order the report, then the money could go to a productive process," said

Curt.

Following further discussion and statements by the Council, Councilor Roxie Acuff made a motion that the Council uphold the determinations of the city manager contained in the May 11, 2022, nuisance notice issued to Mr. Edmondson with a 30-day deadline to complete abatement on all violations noted.

The city attorney said that if the abatement is not complete within 30 days, that will trigger the City's ability to request a warrant from the municipal court to enter and complete the job.

Curt said, "If it's going to result in going up to McMinnville and going to court for a warrant, then that can be challenged there; that just delays the whole process.

"If it becomes economically disadvantageous for us, the remedy for the corporation is to go to federal court and bankruptcy. That would put a stay on everything, probably for many years, as your council may advise you. Then you won't have any solution to the problem for a long time. So, yeah, that's how these things go," concluded Curt.

The Council voted to uphold the 30-day abatement order, allowing for the possibility of extending the 30 days based on timely progress and efforts made in complying with the order.
