West Valley Mayor and Council Candidates Urged to Submit Applications ASAP

Sheridan and Willamina need residents to get involved and take responsibility for their communities.

The mayorship of both cities will be on the ballot in the upcoming election; both towns have multiple council positions open.

The time to apply is now.

Do you live in the West Valley because you enjoy the benefits of small-town living? Did you grow up here? Did you move here because of the beautiful river? Or because it's a great place to raise kids?

Opportunities for improvement exist in all towns. Will you take responsibility for problem-solving and making improvements in the West Valley? Do you work or volunteer at local schools or fire districts? Do you own or work in a small local business? Are you involved in agriculture? Are you retired? Maybe you participate in local civic, youth, or church groups? Here's your opportunity for community representation. Young adults are welcome to apply. No fees are charged.

Do you want potholes fixed? More activities for kids and families? Access to the river for small boats, kids to play, and dogs to swim? Here's your opportunity to work toward making these things happen.

Good candidates are interested listeners who can work toward solutions and compromises with

a balanced perspective.

Doing the job right includes a significant dedication of time and energy. Candidates' primary motivation should be to serve all facets of the community. The city manager and current council

members can help newcomers find the information they need.

The council and mayor positions are more or less unpaid positions with considerable reading requirements, which sometimes will not be exciting or interesting to all readers.

Candidates must be registered voters, at least 18 years old, who have lived within the city limits for at least 12 months preceding the Nov. 8 election.

While it may be nice, it is not necessary to own a business, hold a Harvard degree, be able to program all software ever invented, speak seven different languages, or to have served as a Supreme Court Justice. In other words, most citizens can tackle these jobs.

The deadline to apply in Willamina is 4 p.m. on Aug. 16, less than two weeks away. Potential candidates can find applications, instructions, and other forms at city hall or on the City of Willamina website: https://www.willaminaoregon.gov/important-notices.

In Sheridan, the cutoff is 4 p.m. on Aug. 29. Sheridan's easy-to-complete two-page application can be found at city hall or on the City of Sheridan's website: https://www.cityofsheridanor.com/candidates.

Both cities urge those seeking these offices to submit completed applications as soon as possible.

The city government significantly impacts Willamina and Sheridan citizens and businesses. A well-run, financially strong, clean local government is key to continuing our positive momentum.

Sheridan Approved for \$558,047 Grant For Improvements to South Side Park

City Manager Heidi Bell announced that the City of Sheridan received early notification of approval for a \$558,047 South Side Park grant. The City's required match of \$378,421 will be met through labor and by providing asphalt shavings the City has had in its inventory for quite some time. The total value of improvements to this park will be \$936,498.

Heidi said the City and volunteers are really going to have to step up to the plate and work together on this project.

The grant will fund two new pavilions with ADA access. "I want everybody to be able to go to their family barbecues," said Heidi.

The 30,000 sq. ft. parking area will be paved, bollards with chains added, permanent ADA restrooms constructed, and a large dog park is in the plans. The park will include a 20-basket disc golf course that will compliment Grand Ronde's professional course.

The park will have new benches, and a total of three picnic pavilions. All three will have heavy-duty picnic tables and grills.

Plans include adding asphalt to the quarter-mile walking trail, and adding aerators to the pond. The Forestry Department will help pick the types of trees and the right locations to plant them. A tree planting event will be held. The new trees will offer proper shading for the pond which should result in bigger, better fish.

Electricity, lighting, and drinking water will be added.

The project will open 34 acres of land for park use.

Heidi became Sheridan city manager last November. Since then she has landed a \$1 million grant for Sheridan Road improvements for the water department; \$185,000 grant for Sheridan's water master plan; and a grant from the Safe Routes to School Program (SRTS) to study Sheridan's needs. SRTS works to improve safety and mobility for children by enabling and encouraging them to walk and bicycle to school. Funding from this program is for projects within two-miles of primary, middle and high schools (K-12).

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

Opioid Treatment Van Available in Sheridan

The Great Circle Recovery mobile unit is parked in front of the American Legion from 11 a.m. until noon Monday through Friday. The Legion is located on North Bridge Street in Sheridan. The mobile unit provides help for those addicted to opioids, such as a heroin or fentanyl who have active Oregon Health Plan (OHP) or tribal insurance. Great Circle Recovery staff is available to assist the uninsured with the OHP application process.

Great Circle staff work with individuals to determine the best course of treatment which could include Methadone, Suboxone, or Buprenorphine (which is said to be safer for pregnant women).

While the mobile unit cannot offer every treatment option, the team is ready to guide those in need in the right direction.

"Individuals can walk in without fear of judgment and begin the process of recovery," said Aaron, a licensed nurse who works in the mobile van.

Increased SNAP Benefits to Continue

Most Oregonians who receive SNAP benefits will continue to receive temporarily increased emergency food benefits in August.

Approximately 430,000 SNAP households will receive approximately \$69 million in extra food benefits in addition to their regular SNAP benefits.

These emergency benefits are a temporary support that Oregon can provide because of the federal COVID-19 public health emergency.

To find resources to meet your basic needs call 2-1-1 or text your

zip code to 898-211, 211info.org, Oregon Department of Human Services COVID-19 help center.

The federal government has approved emergency allotments every month since March 2020. This gives SNAP recipients additional support during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Because the federal government approved these emergency benefits for August, Oregon will also be able to issue them in September. However, the emergency benefits are expected to end when the federal public health emergency ends.

Sheridan Families,

It is hard to believe that August is here. I am really looking forward to the start of the 2022-23 school year!

Our community and the District have endured many challenges since the spring of 2020, navigating through many state-level requirements and learning how to adapt to the constant state of change.

Very soon, staff will return, and the preparation for the first day of school begins. I have always felt that preparing for the start of school is like jumping on a moving train. Everything must come together very quickly with schedules, school operations, transportation, nutrition services, and classroom instruction. We will have a new English Language Arts curriculum this school year and continue working on several initiatives.

The initiatives include the November Bond, expanding CTE programs, and conducting a needs assessment for a school-based health center. Each of these needs community support and involvement. The City of Sheridan, the Sheridan Education Foundation, AGILE, and Sheridan Rotary are just a few of the organizations that support our youth and vital education programs.

In the coming weeks, the District will review student assessment data from the 2021-22 school year in math and reading, along with attendance reports, and use this information to create our goals. In addition, state grants and other available resources are allocated to address the learning loss stemming from the pandemic, knowing that students need more instructional time. As the 2022-23 school year progresses, we will collect and review data, determine what adjustments need to be made, and monitor our progress. I am looking forward to diving into the continuous improvement cycle, bringing together staff, parents, and community organizations as we work to improve student learning.

The start of a new school year is exciting, and I believe this one will be even more so.

Record High: U.S. Now Has Two Job Openings for Every Unemployed Person

Data released recently from the Bureau of Labor Statistics states that U.S. employers posted a record high of 11.5 million job openings in March. The struggle to find labor continues, and open positions continue to pile up: 11.5 million job openings were posted in March. The new data from the Bureau shows how expansive the labor shortage is, further contributing to inflation as the job market tightens.

With a tight labor market and seemingly endless openings, Americans have been quitting their jobs in droves. As many as 45 million people gave notice in March alone.

The gap between employers and the unemployed has been steadily expanding since 2020, with an average of 540,000 jobs added every month over the past year.

According to data from FactSet, the Labor Department was expected to report 400,000 jobs were posted in April, which would mark the twelfth month in a row where hiring has come in at 400,000 or more.

Many companies found themselves unprepared for the rebound of spending following the unprecedented Covid-19 affects on the economy, and have been scrambling to hire workers and meet consumer demand — resulting in significant supply-chain delays and rising wages to attract workers, which contribute to inflation.

Inflation jumped to a staggering 8.5% in March, the highest surge in 40 years, and the lopsided job market isn't helping the record-high consumer price index.

Ads for Cattle Feed Below Market Prices? Stop. Check It Out. That Could be a Scam.

Widespread drought, rising prices, and feed shortages in the Great Plains and West have created a fertile field for cattle feed scammers to take advantage of ranchers working to protect their livestock and their bottom line.

In Montana, authorities are warning ranchers to treat with suspicion ads offering cattle feed at below-market prices. Ranchers report that shady dealers promising grain hay, barley straw, and wheat straw at low prices are collecting hefty advance pay-

ments, but never deliver. People have reported losses as high as \$120,000, the state Office of Consumer Protection says.

Investigators warn that bogus ads from feed scammers may show up in agricultural publications, on radio, and on social media. Dishonest sellers also may create professional-looking websites and videos to convince you that they're legitimate.

To help protect yourself from losses:

- Check out a seller before you buy. Search online for the company's name plus words like "review," "scam," or "complaint."
- Consider how you're asked to pay. Don't deal with a seller who requires payment by wire transfer, cryptocurrency, or gift card. That's sure to be a scam.
- Go slow. Avoid high-pressure sales pitches that require you to "lock in" prices by paying for all or part of your order before getting delivery, particularly if you don't know the seller.
- Talk with someone you trust. Before you pay, tell someone such as a friend, family member, or neighbor, about the deal. Talking about it could help you realize it's a scam.
- Contact your state's U.S. Department of Agriculture Farm Service Agency office. Learn about USDA programs to help ranchers and farmers affected by drought and other natural disasters.





The Truth Behind Weight Loss Ads

It would be nice if you could lose weight simply by taking a pill, wearing a patch, or rubbing in a cream, but claims that you can lose weight without changing your habits just aren't true, advises the Federal Trade Commission's (FTC) Consumer Advice Division. They said some of these products could even hurt your health. FTC advises learning to recognize false claims in weight loss ads and false online stories about weight loss products.

Dishonest advertisers will say just about anything to get you to buy their weight loss products.

Here are some of the false promises you'll often see in weight loss ads:

- Lose weight without dieting or exercising. (You won't.)
- You don't have to watch what you eat to lose weight. (You do.)
- If you use this product, you'll lose weight permanently. (Nope)
- To lose weight, all you have to
- do is take this pill. (Not true.)
 You can lose 30 pounds in 30 days. (Nope.)
- This product works for everyone. (It doesn't.)
- Lose weight with this patch or cream. (You can't.)

Here's the truth:

- Any promise of miraculous weight loss is simply untrue.
- There's no magic way to lose weight without a sensible diet and regular exercise.
- No product will let you eat all the food you want and still lose weight.
- Permanent weight loss requires permanent lifestyle changes, so don't trust any product that promises onceand-for-all results.
- FDA-approved fat-absorption blockers or appetite suppressants won't result in weight loss on their own. Those products need to be taken with a low-cal-

orie, low-fat diet, and regular exercise.

- Products promising lightningfast weight loss are always a scam. Worse, they can ruin your health.
- Even if a product could help some people lose weight in some situations, there's no one-size-fits-all product guaranteed to work for everyone. Everyone's habits and health concerns are unique.
- Nothing you can wear or apply to your skin will cause you to lose weight. Period.

Recognize Fake Stories Online

Scammers place false stories online through fake news websites, blogs, banner ads, and social media to sell their weight loss products. For example, they create so-called "news" reports about how an ingredient - like garcinia cambogia or gonji found in a diet pill is supposedly effective for weight loss. But there's no new discovery. The stories are false.

Know that

Scammers often use the stolen logos of real news organizations, or they use names and web addresses that look like those of well-known news websites. They may even add public photos of reporters to make you think the report is real.

Scammers write glowing online reviews themselves or pay others to do it, or they just cut and paste positive comments from other fake sites.

Scammers use images showing dramatic weight loss, but these images are just stock or altered photographs, not photos of people who actually used the product they want you to buy.

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

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Deputy Brady Walters Presents Stroke Information

Deputy Brady Walters is a Yamhill County Sheriff's Office (YCSO) paramedic, deputy, and Polk County Fire District volunteer firefighter and paramedic. He made a presentation about strokes at the Rotary Club's July 27 meeting at the Monroe Event Center.

He said that stroke is the fifth leading cause of death in the U.S. for men, and the fourth for women.

Brady explained that a stroke, medically known as a cerebrovascular accident (CVA), can cause the death of brain tissue. Plaque buildup can block arteries, resulting in a stroke. A ruptured artery results when a blood vessel is broken and leaks blood to the brain. They both deprive oxygen to the brain.

The third type of stroke is called

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a transient ischemic attack, a mini-stroke, or a temporary stroke where symptoms last for an hour or two and then go away. Brady said that some people don't do anything about it but should be aware that this is a huge red flag that a real stroke may be imminent.

He explained that the leading causes of stroke are obesity, chronic alcoholism, heart disease, brain aneurysms, genetic predisposition, diabetes, smoking, stress, high cholesterol, and aging. He noted that the best way to prevent stroke is to give up smoking and alcohol, maintain a healthy diet, reduce salt intake, maintain a healthy weight, and exercise.

Strokes are a medical emergency, and 911 should be called immediately. Every minute counts. Every second, brain cells die during a stroke.

Swiftly identifying a stroke can save a life. Symptoms include a sudden loss of balance; sudden loss of vision in one or both eves: a face that looks uneven:

one arm that drifts down when attempting to hold up both arms; a severe headache that comes on suddenly; and speech that sounds strange.

What's the difference between heat exhaustion and Heat Stroke? Signs of heat exhaustion include dizziness, thirst, heavy sweating, nausea, and weakness.

Heat exhaustion can lead to heat stroke. To assist a victim of heat exhaustion, move the individual to a cooler area, loosen their clothing and provide sips of water. Seek medical help if symptoms don't improve.

Heat Stroke symptoms include confusion, dizziness, possibly unconsciousness. Call 911. Then move the person to a cooler area, loosen clothing and remove extra layers, and cool with water or ice. Heat stroke can cause death or permanent disability if emergency treatment is not given.

The CDC advises, "Stay cool, stay hydrated, stay informed."

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Sheridan Fire Hosts Chamber Breakfast at New and Improved Fire Hall

The Sheridan Fire District welcomed Chamber members to its recently renovated fire hall for the July 29 Chamber breakfast.

Coffee, tea, hot pancakes, and parfaits were a hit with everyone at the meeting.

While enjoying breakfast, the traditional "shout out the answer" trivia game got underway. The trivia questions focused on local businesses and events.

Next, a round-robin allowed everyone around the table to talk about their businesses and announce upcoming events or other matters of interest to the group.

Lucy Hebert talked about Sheridan's SDC (Service and Development) rates. She said the cost to developers in Sheridan is \$9,986. She noted that surrounding towns of comparable size, including Willamina, have a rate of \$25,000. Lucy clarified that increasing the SDC rates does not effect tax-payers. More information will be available at a later date. Lucy said the city intends to include the SDC rate increase issue on the May 2023 ballot.

Amanda Widemark, WVCC's new executive director, introduced herself to the group. Amanda has been in the area for about two weeks. She moved to Willamina from Phoenix. She said she is looking forward to bringing additional resources into the West Valley.

Marilyn Levy announced that the Sheridan Museum of History would bring back its speaker program and is planning to host its annual wine tasting again this fall. Fire Chief Les Thomas, the meeting host, explained how the \$2.1 million seismic grant was used to renovate and update the firehouse.

The chief said he hired additional staff since the levy passed, resulting in the ability to staff two ambulances "24/7." However, he noted, Sheridan still needs volunteers. He discussed the importance of a positive culture within the department.

The meeting concluded with a fire hall tour and an introduction



Sheridan Bridge Investment Co., LLC, owners Curt Edmondson, and John Bargero, along with Dick Paay and ELC Landscaping of Portland, worked hard in the hot 100-degree sun Saturday and Sunday to clean up the property at 106 S. Bridge Street in Sheridan. Among other tasks, they removed two steel I-beams, several piles of bricks and debris, and painted over graffiti on the walls and supports on their property. John said they're working to figure out the best way to address the fencing issue so the sidewalk on the west side of the bridge can reopen for public use. They are also discussing options for the property's future.

At the July 18 Sheridan City Council meeting, the Council upheld the abatement declaration issued by the city manager giving the property owners 30 days to complete abatement on all violations noted in the order. The Council allowed for the possibility of extending the 30-day abatement order based on timely progress and demonstrated efforts made in complying with the order.
