Robert (Gypsy) Necas, loving husband, father, grandfather, and great-grandfather, died peacefully at his home in Sheridan on Tuesday, Jan. 3, 2023. Gypsy was born Jan. 9, 1937, in Eagle Nest N.M, the son of Louis Necas and Louise (Henderson) Necas.

He always said that Friday the 13th was his lucky day, and on

### **Darwin Eldon Grimm** Dec. 7, 1932 – Dec. 26, 2022

I know obituaries are supposed to be about that person who is no longer physically in our lives and never will be again. But the life we honor would never have happened without the presence and unwavering support of his beloved wife, Gwen Grimm, who went to her heavenly reward 17 months prior in May 2021. Gwen enveloped every accomplishment Darwin achieved in his extraordinary and long life. He started his life, one he describes as being extremely blessed by God, in Weippe, Idaho. His family nicknamed him "Cub" because he was chubby, like a baby cub bear. The name stuck with him throughout his life. His dad was a barber, and his mom was a housewife. In his pre-teen and teen years, the family, including his younger brother, Ron, lived in Lewiston, Idaho, where his heart still considered home. He was a self-described obnoxious, foul-mouthed liar, cheater, and selfish person with a bad temper and negative attitude. Sports were his religion, and he excelled at basketball, baseball, and track. Little did he realize his junior year in high school, 1950, was to be the pivotal year that would change the trajectory of his life. Two things occurred: It was the first time he laid eyes on Gwen Nichols, a freshman and "the most beautiful girl I had ever seen," and second, he became a Christian, which



Friday, May 13, 1988, he married his wife, Paula.

Gypsy was a mill-worker, working in the timber industry for many years. His last job was as a custodian at Sheridan High School.

He loved the outdoors, black

powder shooting, rendezvous, and building his trikes.

The last trike appeared at bike shows held during Sheridan Days and Sheridan Hometown Days.

Gypsy touched many lives and will be missed. He leaves be-

ees into George Fox's Sports Hall of Fame in 1996.

After graduation from GFC, he worked in his father's barbershop in Lewiston, Idaho, until 1962, when he and the family moved to Jennings Lodge, Ore., so Darwin could attend Western Evangelical Seminary to study to become a minister. Having a family to feed, he worked on the dock at Garrett Freightlines fulltime while attending WES.

After graduating from WES, he joined the Church of the Nazarene as a minister and was known as a church builder. He doubled or tripled every Oregon church he pastored: Grand Ronde, Prineville, West Moreland, and finally, Sheridan. He also brought his extensive collection of free weights to every church and created a gym. While sports and weightlifting dominated his free time, his ministry for God was number one, and he used his love of sports as an outreach to his church congregations and communities by coaching and training. At Grand Ronde, he created the Christian Olympics, and six Oregon Nazarene churches competed in numerous sporting events, as well as singing and bible quizzing. While in Prineville, he trained a powerlifting team of guys and gals and organized Pacific Northwest-wide powerlifting meets. He continued his sports and fitness outreach ministry at West Moreland Church of the Nazarene. While at Sheridan Church of the Nazarene, in hind his wife of 34 years, Paula; son, Matthew Necas (Nicole); son, Greg Necas; daughter, Carrie Mae Holmes; son, Alix Necas (Tammy); son, Jimmy Joe Yslas, and grandchildren, and great-grandchildren. He was preceded in death by his parents and one daughter, Sheila Bowen.

pastor and maintaining a fitness center, he trained Sheridan High School track athletes thanks to Barb Justin after she saw him doing his track training at the high school. In Sheridan, he was known as the "Running Rev." After he retired from the ministry, he devoted more time to competing in national senior adult track meets in eight states from Canada to California. His diligent training paid off with over 300 medals, 75 percent of those being 1st place medals. He also umpired and refereed school and community softball and basketball games in the Willamette Valley. Only a few 80-year-olds choose to run up and down a basketball court filled with middle schoolers. His coaching reputation also led him to train track athletes at the Sheridan Delphian School. He says his first year there, at age 85, was the most thrilling, exciting, successful track coaching season of his life. To his church and sports successes, he gave all

the glory to God. He is preceded in death by his beloved wife, Gwen, and brother, Ron. He is survived by his son, Gary, daughter, Janice McGinty (Davis), one grandson, Lee, and a 90-pound pitbull.

While we deeply mourn his loss, it is difficult also not to feel joy, as if the two feelings are mixed like a recipe - difficult to separate the flour from the sugar. He is now with his Lord and Savior and the love of his life, Gwen.

# A Message from the Sheridan Superintendent

# Sheridan Families,

Welcome to 2023! Here are a few updates regarding the projects underway in Sheridan School District.

# School Bond May 2023

I am working with the School Board and community members to update our school bond language and develop a stronger campaign plan. In addition, we have been approved by the state to receive the \$4 million capital improvement grant, which will be in addition to the amount approved by voters. More information will be coming out in the next few weeks!

# **School-Based Health Services Grant**

At the December School Board meeting, the Board approved the committee recommendation to implement a nursing model. Phase 2 of the grant begins this month, and we will have until June 30, 2023, to develop our implementation plan. The nursing model will provide our community with a second nurse to act as a connection between Sheridan families and healthcare resources.

# **Staffing Changes**

We have experienced some mid-year staffing changes and need more substitutes. We have filled the middle school science position, which allows us to offer science during the second semester. We also added a fourth-grade teacher to address large classes and hired a K-5 PE teacher. The previous K-5 PE teacher applied and was offered the high school PE teaching position.

# **Barbara Roberts Career Technical Education Center**

In June 2021, the District received notification that the state legislature approved \$1.9 million to purchase the property. Since then, we have been seeking funding for the continuation of the project. This fall, we received \$1.4 million from the Yamhill County Board of Commissioners. The funds are being used to complete the design phase and create the Tech Center's construction plans. By the end of February, we should be 75% through the design phase and have a 3-D rendering of the building, along with the site plan. Once we are at that stage, we can determine the construction cost. To this point, our construction budget has been a very rough estimate.

This project is challenging and complex. Turning a vacant manufacturing plant into a career tech center takes work! However, a large team is working to make this project a reality, a regional center to prepare high school students and adults for the workforce. As I continue to

attend meetings, it has become more and more evident that companies in the area cannot find people to hire. The Barbara Roberts CTEC will align with industry needs and provide the skills and knowledge needed to enter the workforce.

It is important to note that while this project will serve Sheridan High School students, it will not be part of the May 2023 school bond. Instead, the Barbara Roberts CTEC project is made possible through state and federal funding, grants, and private donations.

Along with these projects, we continue to focus on improving our school learning environment, evidenced by increased student attendance and a reduction in behavior referrals. We are also developing an instructional system of how teachers respond when students, evidenced by assessments, struggle to learn. Providing student feedback, using assessments, and reteaching with different strategies are all critical to improved student learning.

January 2023 is here, and Sheridan School District continues to focus on meeting the needs of our students by creating a welcoming school climate, improving instruction, and providing programs that serve our students and the community.



# Fentanyl Pills, Powder and Meth Seized in Lincoln City Drug Search

On Monday, Jan. 2, 2023, Lincoln City Police patrol officers and detectives, along with McMinnville Police, executed a search at Siletz Bay Lodge (1012 SW 51st St) after a lengthy investigation into the distribution of narcotics coming from suspects staying at various hotels in Lincoln City. During the search, officers located and seized a criminal quantity of fentanyl pills, fentanyl powder, and methamphetamine, along with other narcotics paraphernalia including digital scales and packaging materials.

Arrested at the hotel was 59-year-old Gregory Brooks of Portland. He was charged with Possession, Delivery, and Manufacture of Methamphetamine, Possession, Delivery, and Manufacture of Fentanyl, Felon in Possession of a Restricted Weapon, and Frequenting a Place Where Drugs are Kept and Sold. Brooks was transported to the Lincoln County Jail and lodged on the above listed charges.

A second suspect arrested at the hotel was 26-year-old Clorissa Wood of Portland. She was charged with Possession, Delivery, and Manufacture of Methamphetamine, Possession, Delivery, and Manufacture





of Fentanyl, and Frequenting a Place Where Drugs are Kept and Sold. Wood was transported to the Lincoln County Jail and lodged on the above listed charges.

In addition, police would like to thank citizens and businesses who provided tips and information that helped this investigation. # State Urges Home Radon Testing During Radon Action Month

The best time to test for radon is during the heating season – the winter months – when windows and doors are closed tight. It's why Oregon Health Authority (OHA) recognizes National Radon Action Month during January by encouraging people to test their homes for the odorless, tasteless, invisible gas.

Many parts of Oregon remain at risk of high radon, a naturally occurring radioactive gas that comes up from the ground and is drawn into buildings, where it can build up to dangerous levels. The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) estimates radon is responsible for more than 20,000 lung cancer deaths per year in the United States. Radon is the second leading

cause of lung cancer behind smoking, and it's the leading cause of lung cancer among non-smokers.

"Now, more than ever, we are spending more time in our homes. That means more exposure to potentially high radon levels," said Jara Popinga, OHA's Radon Awareness Program coordinator. "The only way to know if you have a high radon level is to test. The best time to test for radon is during the heating season or colder months when the windows and doors are closed for long periods of time."

Many test kits are priced between \$20 and \$30 and can be found in most hardware stores or available for purchase from online retailers. High radon levels can be fixed by a certified radon professional for a cost similar to that of common home repairs ranging between \$2,000 and \$3,000, such as painting or having a new water heater installed.

The Radon Awareness Program collects radon test data from test kit manufacturers to understand which areas of the state have the potential for high radon levels and to identify regions where educational outreach efforts need to be focused. The program is offering a free radon test kit to residents whose homes are in ZIP codes with fewer than 20 radon test results. Residents can learn more about the free radon test kit program and how to apply at www.healthoregon.org/radon. Free test kits are available while supplies last.

# Look at the Grocery Bill - A Guide


Let's look at the grocery bill. We are not trying to avoid answering a question of food costs, when we say, "That depends on the income, size of the family, age of the family members, their food habits, and likes and dislikes."


As a buying guide, the U.S. Department of Agriculture issues figures to show that in 1952, a city family of four could be fed for \$20.00 to \$22.00 a week. This was the low cost budget. A moderate budget would allow \$28.00 to \$30.00 a week for a family of four.

The low cost budget allows only \$5.00 to \$5.50 to feed one person for a week. The moderate budget allows only \$7.00 to \$7.50 to feed one person for a week.

It is possible to provide good and adequate food for a family of four on \$3.00 to \$4.00 a day. This takes careful management of the food dollar. By management we mean careful and deliberate planning, buying, preparing, and serving. The process is not complete until the food is served and eaten and the leftovers planned for another meal. To the homemaker, management of the food dollar means serving meals that:

- Taste good and look good.
  Provide the proper food nu
  - trients-- protien, vitamins, and minerals.
- 3. Supply the necessary calories for each member of the family.
- 4. Fit the family budget -- for time, energy, and money.


The current problem is that to continue the existence of the pack a new charter must be granted to the local Cubs, and unless a cub-master is obtained the charter will not be granted.
