

City of Sheridan to Hold Open House For Athletic Complex for West Valley

The City of Sheridan will host an open house regarding the proposed West Valley Athletic Complex from 9-11 a.m. on Saturday, Jan. 28, at the American Legion, 125 N. Bridge St., in Sheridan.

The City is seeking public feedback on the types of indoor and outdoor activities, exercise, and sports people would engage in if it was in (or near) Sheridan.

Ideas range from turfed baseball and softball fields, soccer fields, walking and equestrian trails, archery fields, RC car fields, pickle ball, or a large indoor multipurpose space.

The vision for this outdoor/indoor athletic complex is to provide space for people of all abilities and ages from prenatal to the oldest person on earth. Visitors to the open house can expect to engage in multiple activities that will help facilitate responses to questions like

which of the two available locations would be preferred, what activities, exercise, and sports they'd participate in, rudimentary designing of the space, and sharing feedback, asking questions, discussing concerns, and more.

The City is extending the invitation to all in the West Valley. Information from the open house will be used for grant applications and to help with the design.

Surveys will also be distributed online on the City of Sheridan's website and Facebook page. Copies of the survey will also be available to pick up and return to City Hall.

City Manager Heidi Bell said, "I am hoping for a great turnout. We want this complex to serve all community members in West Valley, and we need input from everyone."



Red Golden Pheasant Visit to Mayor Thomson

The male Red Golden Pheasant is a brilliant display of primary colors (shown above). Adult males can reach 40 inches in length, with their tails measuring nearly two-thirds of their overall length. Female Red Golden Pheasants are much more subdued in appearance and are dull, mottled brown, similar to other pheasant breeds.

Red Golden Pheasants are originally native to the western mountain of China. Today they are commonly seen in zoos and private collections, and feral flocks can be found across the U.S., United Kingdom, and beyond. Their natural habitats are conifer forests with sparse undergrowth.

These exotic pheasants are ground feeders — eating grains, leaves, and small invertebrates — and roost in trees or aviary perches at night. The average lifespan of the Red Golden Pheasant is around five to six years in the wild and as much as 20 years in captivity.

Mayor Thomson, New Councilors George, Hebert, and Hodgins Take

The Sheridan City Council meeting held Tuesday, Jan. 17, started with Mayor Marianne Thomson, Sheridan's first female mayor, and newly elected council members Cale George, Lucy Hebert, and Liz Hodgins taking their oath of office.

Marianne dove straight in with her first order of business by delivering a State of the City Address.

Marianne began by recognizing Sheridan's community volunteers, who as she said, "have dedicated themselves to rebuilding Sheridan over this past year. As a result, we've seen many unprecedented successes in 2022."

She continued, "I want to thank and acknowledge City Manager Heidi Bell, Public Works Director Kie Cottam, Library Director Gwyn Gorham, Attorney Tyler Yeoman-Millette, City Planner Jim Jacks, Finance and HR Specialist Marissa Matias, City Recorder Yvonne Hamilton, and all other City staff members who work behind the scenes to keep Sheridan moving in a positive direction. We also recognize the volunteers who serve on the Sheridan Planning Commission and Sheridan Parks and Recreation Committee for their ongoing work and dedication to the community.

"The City of Sheridan and the Sheridan City Council joined with many outstanding community volunteers such as members of the Chamber of Commerce, Sheridan Rotary, Sheridan Revitalization, Sheridan Museum of History, Grand Sheramina Food Bank, Churches United for West Valley, Hometown Days Committee, Sheridan Christmas Committee, American Legion, Tree of Giving, and others to work on projects that benefit the people of Sheridan.

"Interestingly, Sheridan's new spirit of hope has had some other incredible side effects. For example, the Sheridan Museum reported more new members in 2022 than any other year in its history.

"Sheridan Chamber of Commerce went from nearly defunct to often more than 20 people who get together for a fun and informative breakfast every other Friday.

"The Sheridan Rotary Club, which is very involved in the community, is one of the few Rotary Clubs gaining membership in the district.

"Also, in the spirit of our community working together, we are fortunate to have such incredible leadership with Fire Chief Les Thomas and School District Superintendent Dorie Vickery. Both are community-minded leaders who are always willing to work with the City and offer all kinds of valuable resources.

"We are grateful to FCI for working with the City to provide inmate workers for City projects. Their help saves the City mon-

ey and allows our busy public works crew to get more accomplished."

Marianne went on to highlight grant funds obtained by City Manager Heidi Bell, such as grant funds dedicated to Sheridan Road (the road itself), the water loop project underneath Sheridan Road, and a 20-year water master plan.

Also mentioned was the \$558,047 for improvements to South Side Park, and other grants to benefit Safe Routes to School and possibly the future of the Grand Sheramina Food Bank.

Mayor Thomson applauded the council for listening to their constituents in 2022 and prioritizing Sheridan Road and the need to provide maintenance, repairs, and updates to Sheridan's infrastructure. Bringing commercial buildings into compliance with Sheridan Municipal Codes and clearing Sheridan properties of cluttered garbage and rid the City of derelict vehicles and vehicles with long-expired registrations from yards and city streets.

Elaborating further on the goal to clean up Sheridan, Marianne said, "The City of Sheridan, Sheridan City Council, civic groups, and schools led Sheridan through a "no excuses" citywide cleanup last May, the likes of which the people of Sheridan have never seen before. This cleanup provided the means and, in some cases, the muscle, to enable people to dispose of hard to get rid of junk from their property. At one point during this cleanup, 47 cars were lined up all the way down Sheridan Road to South Bridge, waiting to get into the collection area set up at the City's sewer plant property.

"The City also placed dumpsters in neighborhoods where garbage piling up around houses had become an insurmountable problem for residents. In addition, the City offered residents \$50 and free towing to remove junk vehicles for the first 30 car owners to take them up on the offer. But, believe it or not, people did not rush to take advantage of this offer.

"The City also dealt with its three rental houses that had become unsafe for occupancy following years and years of neglect. One served as a "burn to learn" training house. Another required removal of several trailer loads filled with the worst kinds of garbage imaginable. While uninhabitable, two of the three houses are still standing.

"Finally, after offering residents help in complying with Sheridan municipal code laws, the City installed new code enforcement software and began issuing citations. Offenders can choose to pay the fine or pay a visit to Sheridan's new Municipal Court Judge, Lori Coukoulis. I attended a couple of Sheridan court sessions. Our new judge listened, talked about possible solutions, gave the offenders a chance to correct the problem, and set a future court date to report on their progress. If no improvements were made, she fined them accordingly."

Marianne named some of the newer businesses and renovations made in Sheridan including. American Market's new gas station and complete remodel of the "old TJ's." She noted Valley Market, while not inside Sheridan itself, she said, "It is a beautiful, clean, and welcoming site that represents Sheridan." Valley's Edge RV Park, located at the end of Sheridan Road, is also located outside Sheridan's city limits. However, they've become a new water and sewer customer for the City of Sheridan.

The Heider and Huntley buildings were not forgotten in the address. The mayor acknowledged the community's disappointment with the lack of progress on these projects, but



noted that the scope of work is considerable.

"Many major renovation requirements have been completed, such as the custom-built steel reinforcements to make the Heider building seismically sound. The Sheridan Revitalization Movement, working with the city manager, successfully delivered a \$200,000 Main Street Oregon grant to the owner of this property. All concerned realize that getting these buildings up and running again will play a significant role in the revitalization of Sheridan's downtown.

Sheridan's future will depend on those willing to come together to build community and create opportunities. We should be extremely grateful to all who will step up and invest their time, care, and concern.

Marianne addressed the new state requirement for all cities to have a viable plan to comply with Oregon's new homelessness laws by July 1 of this year. This multi-faceted project will be difficult and expensive. In addition, the new rules are murky to many, even lawyers attempting to sort it all out.

At the conclusion of the address Marianne said, "On a brighter note, the City of Sheridan and the Parks and Recreation Committee will host an open house from 9-11 a.m. on Sat., Jan. 28, at the American Legion Hall. The committee is asking the public to give their opinions about a proposed Sheridan Athletic Complex to be constructed on

city-owned property. They'd like to know which of two possible properties people would prefer, and what activities most people would like to have included.

"The City is also working with Sheridan Rotary and Parks and Recreation volunteers to improve public recreational access to the river. Volunteers cleared brush across Morgan Street Park down to the river. This year, Newberg and McMinnville groups have expressed interest in working with Sheridan to create a water trail plan that would improve opportunities for the City to apply for State Parks and Oregon State Marine Board grants.

"Meanwhile, we will continue to work on other important projects to provide the City with safe, clean, well-maintained, and dependable infrastructure that will support growth. We will work to promote economic development and business growth in Sheridan.

"We should all be proud of what we accomplished together in 2022. We appreciate Heidi Bell's leadership, transparent style, knowledge, experience, sense of humor, and willingness to pitch in and help, even on her days off. For example, Heidi was up to the armpits of her overalls clearing brush along the river at Morgan Street Park.

"Again, we thank every individual who contributes in any way they can to keep Sheridan's

Following the State of the City Address, the council was addressed by Ryan Pasquarella, auditor with the firm Grove. Mueller and Swank, P.C. addressed the council. Ryan reported the annual audit found no cause for concern and passed the standard tests.

Library Director Gwen Gorham gave a brief presentation on the status of the Sheridan library. Gwen announced due to the staff shortages, the library will temporarily reduce its hours to 10 a.m.-6 p.m., Tuesday through Saturday. They will be closed Sunday and Monday.

Sheridan residents,

The City of Sheridan is recruiting for several positions. Working for a City means being a public servant and finding great fulfillment by accepting this honor. Our employees work daily and tirelessly to do the best work possible to deliver people a livable and functional City that you are proud to call home or proud to work in.

Library clerk general programming and outreach services:

Our Sheridan library is developing new and exciting ways to serve our community. This clerk position is centered around public outreach and specializing in adult services. The City is looking for someone that has the drive to serve the public, is happy to answer questions through research, and will become a powerhouse of local knowledge. Local Graduate Directs Movie on the Big Screen

Kyle Marvin's drama career began in the Delphian School's Drama and Music Department. A few years after graduating, film became his life's passion. In 2007 he began to learn skills for the film industry by working at a commercial production company. His career then moved to movie "shorts." A short film he wrote, produced and acted in, premiered at the Sundance Film Festival in 2018. It was at Sundance that a financier agreed to adapt their short into a feature film. That feature-length independent film, The Climb (2019) premiered at the Cannes International Film Festival in France and went on to win the Coup de Coeur Award at the festival and be released by Sony Pictures Classics. In December 2021, Paramount Studios tapped Marvin to direct "80 for Brady" and a few months later he was behind the

80 for Brady starring Lilly Tomlin, Jane Fonda, Rita Moreno and Sally Field opens at the Mac Cinema 10 on Feb. 3. A Message from the Sheridan Superintendent

Sheridan Families,

On Tuesday, Jan. 17, the Sheridan community and our local region experience serious, life-threatening situations due to Fentanyl. Our students are at increased risk for overdose or witnessing overdose from Fentanyl and other substances. There has been a significant increase in reported Fentanyl-laced drugs in our community.

The Yamhill County Health Department reports students purchasing Oxycontin, Xanax, Adderall, and other pills from individuals they meet on social media platforms have unknowingly received pills laced with fentanyl. Fentanyl can even be in vape cartridges (dea.gov, 2019 data). One in four pills tested by the Department of Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) labs contain a potentially lethal dose of Fentanyl, which can be as small as two grains of sand (Yamhill County Public Health).

How to Keep Your Teen Safe

Communicate openly: Talk to your child about never taking any medication that doesn't come directly from their doctor or pharmacist, even if it's from a friend. Listen to your child without judgment. As a trusted adult in their life, it is crucial to connect and hear what they have to say.

Look for changes in behavior: Irregular eating or sleeping patterns, low energy, general signs of depression or anxiety, unusual irritability, slipping grades, lack of interest in activities they love, and even drastic clothing style changes can be warning signs. If you notice a difference, ask about it

Monitor social media: Talk to your child and monitor their social media use. A friend can offer substances or a stranger they met online. Fake pills are sold online and on apps that are popular with teens, who may believe they are buying something safe for anxiety or depression or what they believe to be "study drugs."

What Sheridan School District is Doing

This District has a Substance Abuse Prevention Task Force that meets regularly to work on ways to prevent vaping and other forms of substance abuse. Community members interested in joining the task force are encouraged to contact the district office for more information. The District is also in the process of obtaining Narcan from the county health department, which is the rescue medication for an opioid overdose. This would allow trained staff to respond to an overdose on campus if one ever occurred.

The District has also implemented an anonymous reporting system that will enable students, staff, and parents to report school substance abuse concerns.

Last summer, the task force recommended to the school board that SHS close campus, changing district policy. As a result, a system was designed that allowed sophomores, juniors, and seniors to leave campus for lunch with parent permission, good attendance, and passing all classes.

The campus is closed for freshmen except for parental permission.

Currently, the task force is exploring a student drug testing program to provide support and recovery services.





Students and Deputy Likely **Affected by Fentanyl Exposure**

On Jan. 17, 2023 a Yamhill County Sheriff's Deputy went to the campus of Willamina Middle School to conduct follow up investigation on a case. While there, the deputy was asked by a staff member to assist on a bathroom check regarding a suspicious odor. The deputy went to the classroom, (not connected to main campus buildings)and entered the bathroom located in the classroom.

He noted a strong acrid smell and requested staff and students to evacuate the modular classroom. The deputy began feeling poorly, and after ensuring everyone was out of the building, began exhibiting symptoms indicative of a possible overdose. At this time students also reported feeling unwell.

Fire/EMS staff from the Confederated Tribes of Grand Ronde Emergency Services responded and began rendering aid to one student, and checked on two others. One student was transported via ambulance to Salem Hospital.

The on-duty Yamhill County Sheriff's Office shift supervisor observed the affected deputy to be in need of medical attention and loaded the deputy into a patrol vehicle and drove to the hospital. The deputy received treatment in the Emergency Department.

The results of a toxicity screening on the affected deputy are pending. The deputy reported having tightness in his chest with a restricted ability to breathe, tingling in the fingers, loss of feeling in the lower extremities, and a sensation of floating. The deputy exhibited confusion, inability to speak coherently, and inability to articulate what had happened.

Evidence collected, and information obtained, indicate that another student may have been burning counterfeit pills on a piece of foil in the bathroom of the modular classroom facility. Officials believe this time the pills are counterfeit M30 pills containing fentanyl.

The Willamina School District sent a notification to parents re-

The Yamhill County Sheriff's Office is releasing this information to highlight the dangers of fentanyl, and how even exposure to smoke from pills being burned can have significant consequences. There have been multiple documented fentanyl overdoses in Yamhill County recently, one of which was fatal. Based on the clustering of overdoses in the West Valley area of Yamhill County in a short time span, there is concern of regional distribution of a particularly potent batch of counterfeit pills.



Sentence of 25 Years Given to Local Abuser

Derrick Shane Jones, one of two men arrested for child sexual abuse in April of 2022, received a 25-year sentence after pleading guilty to one count each of first-degree rape, second-degree rape, third-degree rape, and using a child in a display of sexually explicit conduct. Jones will be under lifetime post-prison supervision once released. His earliest release date is Apr. 27, 2047.

The investigation began with a report by a patrol officer who gained information about a juvenile being victimized by two separate males in Sheridan. On Apr. 28, 2022, detectives obtained a search warrant for a residence in Sheridan, which was served, and potential items of evidence related to the case were recovered. Prison Sentences Being Meted Out in Circuit Court

Jury Hearing Evidence In Willamina Depot Robbery Case - Other Court House News

Three years in the state penitentiary was the punishment meted out last week by Judge Arlie G. Walker to Clarence Turner, 27, McMinnville, convicted of grand larceny. Turner was immediately taken to Salem to begin his sentence.

Trials for Herman Brank and J.W. Harmon, arrested for burglary of the Willamina depot, are underway in circuit court this week. The two men are being tried separately with Branks trial having started Tuesday morning and Harmon's scheduled to follow Wednesday afternoon. Harmon's conviction in the Yamhill circuit court will bring him under the "habitual criminal act," according to authorities, and there is a possibility of his being tried on that charge, conviction of which would mean life imprisonment.

Officers alleged that the two men were working a highly profitable "racket" through their robbery at Willamina, where a number of money order blanks and office paraphernalia are missing.

Officers claim that the men had been accustomed to buying a small order from agents and then using the blanks and equipment to make almost perfect forgeries. The total profit that might have been realized from the blanks missing from Willamina could have run into the hundreds of thousands of dollars if they could have been cashed, officers state. Faced with an almost hopeless stack of evidence, the two men are said to have made an attempt at escape Sunday when they were prepared with a heavy frying pan and a wooden club to attack Sheriff Manning when he entered their cell. But as Mr. Manning was accompanied by his son they quickly dropped their weapons and it was only after other prisoners informed the sheriff of his narrow escape that the situation was known.
