

Sarah's agreement to fill in for six months was to allow time for the City Council to search for and hire a permanent replacement.

Bridget, who has been working alongside Sarah for the past five months, will work to learn all she can from her before she returns to her position as the library director next month.

Sarah said she likely would not have survived the past five months without Bridget. "She's been my right arm. She has been in the mix with me every step



A Report from Sheridan City Hall

Elections Update:

Although the elections are not officially certified, we have a good glimpse of the turnout. For the City of Sheridan, the new Mayor will be Marianne Thomson, City Councilors: Cale George, Lucy Hebert, and Liz Hodgins. As you look at the results on Yamhill County Election's website you may notice "overvote" and "undervote." An "overvote" means that voters picked more than what was allowed for on the ballot, for example vote for three councilors and the voter selected four votes or vote for one mayor and they selected both choices. "Undervote" means that the voter did not vote for that race. We are still waiting for our turnout numbers to be calculated. Measure 36-216 regarding the two-year ban on psilocybin related businesses in the city limits passed. This means the City's Planning Commission and City Council will have an additional two years to design restrictions and approve new codes for psilocybin businesses. The restrictions must be in the vein of time, place, and manner. The types of businesses that the State allows are for manufacturing, production, or service centers. The service centers are for medical professionals to administer psilocybin on-site, meaning none of the psilocybin can leave the facility. The Planning Commission held their first meeting regarding design of these new codes on Monday, Nov. 14, 2022.

Homeless:

The City Council continues their work on developing rules regarding homelessness in our city; once again based on time, place, and manner. The Council invited local places of worship, West Valley and McMinnville based non-profits, as well as local service groups, to a community roundtable on Tuesday, Nov. 15, 2022. This meeting allowed for the City Council to learn about resources that are already being offered in our city, either enrich or develop new partnerships, and to see what resources are missing.

Sock Drive:

The City staff is hosting a sock drive that runs until Jan. 31, 2023. Locations for drop off are the City Library, City Hall, and City Public Works Shop. Please check the Bulletin for our ad that provides all the details. This is a competition between the Library, City Hall, and Public Works staff.

Parks and Recreation Survey:

Thank you for participating in the survey for the Parks and Recreation Committee. We got back 245 survey responses, which was awesome! The results were captured in pie charts and are posted on the City's website and on our City Facebook page. You can also pick up a paper copy of the results at City Hall. Thank you to all who gave your time to provide feedback, we will use it!

Thank You American Legion Hall:

On Tuesday, Nov. 15, the American Legion Hall volunteered alongside the City Public Works staff to properly retire the flags that hang on the lampposts along the Veterans' Walk on Main Street. On behalf of City staff and City Council, I want to give a BIG THANK YOU to our veterans for their service to our country and for their support for getting our flags properly retired. Next spring, the new flags will be hung and remain up until the week following Veterans Day.

Measure 36-216 in Sheridan and 36-217 in Willamina asked voters if they wished to prohibit psilocybin-related businesses in these cities for the next two years.

Approval of the measure prohibits the establishment of psilocybin product manufacturers and psilocybin service centers within the Sheridan city limits and the Willamina city limits until Dec. 31, 2024. The prohibition sunsets after the two-year period.

The temporary prohibition proposed by this measure is intended to provide extra time to consider and enact regulations before OHA issues licenses for psilocybin facilities in these cities.

Sheridan voted 941-515 to wait the two years; Willamina voted 279-210.

Sheridan School Bond Measure Defeated by Only 110 Votes

Sheridan voters rejected Sheridan School District's Measure 36-222 with 933 yes votes and 1,043 no votes. The measure asked voters to approve a \$16 million bond measure to improve Sheridan High School and Faulconer Chapman School facilities and make the schools safer for students.

Because voters said no to the measure, the Sheridan School District will not receive the \$4 million state grant for capital improvements because this grant was contingent on the Measure 36-222 passing.

Funding was to help with additional career tech offerings and equipment, renovations and upgrades to the gymnasiums at both schools, science classroom renovations, new security systems at both school's entrances,

improved and expanded parking at SHS, and more.

School district personnel explained to voters that the \$16 million bond amount was based on keeping the annual tax rate around the same as last year. The annual tax rate is approximately \$2.66 per \$1,000 taxable assessed value. Because the previous school bond was recently paid off, this bond would have replaced it without a significant tax increase.

Rotary and Kiwanis Coat Drive Challenge



A MESSAGE FROM THE WILLAMINA SCHOOL DISTRICT

I want to thank all the students, staff, and community members who attended our Attendance Engagement Event on Nov 3, 2022. In addition to the district-run information stations, several community members also provided valuable information, including A Family Place, Confederated Tribes of Grand Ronde (Youth Education, Children & Family Services, Wellness Clinic, foodbank), and Virginia Garcia Health Clinic.

I appreciated having the opportunity to share information regarding our Student Investment Account (SIA) plan and our High School Success (HSS) plan. These two plans are funded through recent legislative initiatives. These two programs combined provide an additional \$1,000,000 in funding to the district. In addition, the Oregon Department of Education recently aligned six separate programs into one planning process, with final plans due in the Spring of 2023. Community engagement is a fundamental action step in the planning process, determining what educational priorities are most important to students and families. During the event, we had families fill out a short questionnaire ranking the importance of the key priorities for the SIA and HSS plans.

The SIA plan's key priorities are: student health and safety, increased instructional time, well-rounded learning experiences, and reduced class size. More than 45 families filled out questionnaires, and well-rounded learning experiences garnered the most number one votes, followed closely by student health and safety.

The HSS plan's key priorities are improving graduation rates, dropout prevention, career, and technical education (cte) enhancement, and expanded college credit options. CTE enhancement received the most number one votes, with dropout prevention and expanded college credit options tied for second.

Our District Leadership Team will be working on the integrated planning process and will continue to gather information from our students, staff, and community regarding strategies, activities, and budget alignment for these programs. Thank you again for your input, your voice matters!

Streetlight Out? Citizens Asked to Report Information to PGE

The City of Sheridan reports that PGE will upgrade all street lighting to LED in 2023.


Meanwhile, citizens can help with the project by reporting existing lights that are either out or blinking on a short form provided on PGE's website: https://portlandgeneral.com/outages-safety/report-a-streetlight-problem. Additionally, this link is on the City of Sheridan's website (www.cityofsheridanor.com). The form asks for the nearest street address, city, zip code,


map number, and pole number (see photo below). A dropdown menu on the form allows you to select the issue: light is not coming on; on during the day; flickering; damaged; or "other" issue. Space is available to leave comments and contact information.


Map and pole numbers are found at about eye level on the pole. A pole tag is a three-inch round metal tag.

If there is no pole tag, it is possible that it is a private streetlight that PGE does not repair. If located in a neighborhood association, the property management company may be responsible for the repair.

City Manager Heidi Bell added, "City Hall is committed to helping, so if people give us all the necessary information, our staff will complete the online form. We will work with the person reporting the issue to us regarding the contact information for PGE should there be a need for follow-up. If individuals prefer to be contacted by PGE or prefer to have the City of Sheridan serve as the contact, either is fine with us."

'58 Strawberry "5-Ton Club" Winners

Polk County growers
Tony and Stan Eisele
made an all-time record
as new members of
Berrymen's Roster;
Oregon Berryman reach
total of 35 qualifying
members, less than
half of the 1957 total
which was a high of 73.

Lack of pickers, migrant harvesters leaving to work on the cherry crop, and early harvest date were among the problems that beset Oregon strawberry farmers this year.

Yet these factors proved no hardship at all to Polk County growers Tony and Stan Eisele of Red Prairie. These growers came roaring into top past achievements with 9.64 graded tons per acre of Siletz berries on 4.35 acres. This is a new record for Oregon and surprisingly is made by the first winning growers ever to reside outside Washington County. For five consecutive years that county had a yield record when the Oregon Strawberry Council's Five Ton Club roster was made-up.

The winning Eisele brothers also qualify for the 5-Ton group for the first time. Their total sales of graded fruit reached 41.93 tons when everyone agreed they had enough strawberries for 1958. The gross tonnage picked and delivered was 12.58 tons per acre.

The second highest average yield was grown by Herb Holloman of Hillsboro who obtained 7.25 tons per acre on a six-acre planting.


Other growers, in order of their qualifications, are: Fred and Don Meyers of Salem, Polk County, who maintained their club status for the third straight year with a 5.86 ton per acre of Marshalls on nine acres.

S.E. Star of Dallas qualified a second consecutive year with a 5.03 yield on 14.2 acres of Northwests. Washington County's top producer this year, Herb Holloman, is a newcomer to strawberry production.
