Chili Cook-Off Results Announced

Trinity Lutheran Church claimed the top position in this year's Churches United for West Valley Chili Cook-off. The event raised \$1,351.29.

Chili tasters voted by placing paper dollars in a jar placed next to their favorite chili. They voted against a chili by placing coins in the jars of their least favorites. The totals listed show the net dollar amounts in each participant's jar, followed by paper money, less change for each participant.

Trinity Lutheran took first, with a total of \$599.89 (\$607 less \$7.11).

Sheridan United Methodist took second place, \$445.23 (\$464



less \$18.77); followed by New Hope Assembly of God, \$12.81 (\$29 less \$16.19).

Sheridan Church of the Nazarene's chili sold out at the cook-off and had the highest donation of change for a total of -\$19.97 (\$61 less \$80.97).

Miscellaneous donations at the dessert table totaled \$67.25. Churches United for West Valley uses the proceeds from the chili cook-off to purchase school supplies for children in the West Valley each year.

A Message from the Sheridan Superintendent

Dear Sheridan Families,

My first year as superintendent, 2020-2021, was distance learning due to COVID-19. The second year, 2021-2022, was challenging as we reengaged our students to in-person instruction. The additional challenge last year was substance abuse, grades 5-12, and it continues into the 2022-2023 school year.

During the 2021-2022 school year, SHS with an enrollment of 200 students, had 13 disciplinary hearings. These were students vaping, or in possession of a vape pen. FCS had seven disciplinary hearings, students grades 5-8, the same issue. The level of substance abuse in both schools greatly impacts a students' ability to learn, their attendance, and maintaining healthy relationships with family and peers.

Recently, Sheridan School District joined with other districts to file a lawsuit against the manufacturers of e-cigarettes that were marketed to teenagers. This decision stems from the rising number of teenagers who are addicted to nicotine. Nicotine poses a particularly potent threat to the adolescent brain, as it can damage brain development and have lasting consequences for cognitive ability and mental health. Research has also shown that adolescent use of nicotine biologically primes the brain for addiction to other drugs later in life, including alcohol, cocaine, and methamphetamine, and that these changes are long term.

In a press release statement I provided the following quote: Sheridan School District is proud to join other districts in the region to hold JUUL and Altria accountable for their predatory conduct in targeting young people to use e-cigarettes to turn a profit and secure customers for life. Every day, Oregon educators see evidence of the vaping epidemic and the resulting harm to our students and education environments. We see this epidemic impacting student attendance, learning, and our ability to maintain a positive school culture. We have invested countless hours with investigations, disciplinary hearings, and working with our families who suffer from this epidemic. Our students, grades 5-12, do not understand the dangers of nicotine addiction. The problem is staggering and will take years to correct. My hope for Sheridan School District in this litigation is that we can obtain some additional resources to help prevent and address nicotine addiction among the young people in our community.

To better address the issue of substance abuse we have formed a committee that is working on a comprehensive plan. The plan includes improved school-wide health education and interventions, along with support for our families dealing with substance abuse.

Keep in mind that the lawsuit is only one action step. There are many other things we can do to prevent substance abuse among our students. Please contact me if you would like more information about the lawsuit or our substance abuse prevention committee.

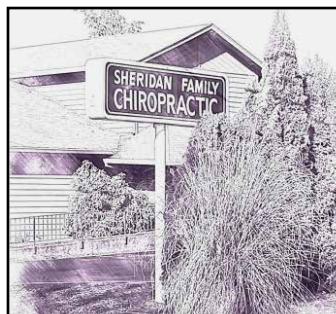

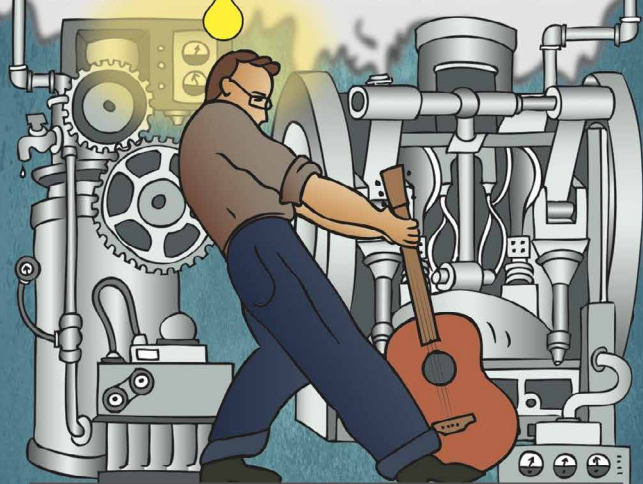

◆ Apple Cinnamon Chimichangas ◆

Ingredients

1 (21 ounce) can apple pie filling
½ cup cinnamon sugar
15 (six- inch) flour tortillas
Oil for frying

Directions

Heat apple pie filling in a small pot over medium-low heat until warmed through, about 5 minutes.

Place cinnamon sugar in a shallow dish.

Spoon 1 1/2 tablespoons of filling onto each tortilla. Fold in opposing edges and roll up as you would a burrito.

Heat oil in a large, deep saucepan over medium heat.

Place a batch of rolled tortillas seam-side down in the hot



oil and fry until browned and crispy, 1 to 2 minutes. Turn and continue frying until all sides are browned, 1 to 2 minutes more. Roll in cinnamon sugar to coat. Repeat with remaining batches.

◆ Pumpkin-Shaped Dinner Rolls ◆

Ingredients

1 cup warm milk
1 (.25 oz.) pkg. active dry yeast
1 tablespoon honey, or more to taste
4 tablespoons melted butter
1 teaspoon fine salt
3 cups all-purpose flour, or more as needed
kitchen string (4 per roll)
vegetable oil as needed

Directions

Combine warm milk, yeast, honey, and butter in a bowl; stir. Add salt and most of the flour, reserving the rest for dusting. Stir using a wooden spoon until a sticky dough forms.

Dust a work surface with the leftover flour. Knead the dough until smooth, elastic, and no longer sticky, adding more flour as needed. Form dough into a ball that springs back lightly when pressed.

Transfer dough to a lightly greased bowl, cover with greased foil, and let rise in a warm place until doubled in size, about 1 1/2 hours.

Meanwhile, cut kitchen string into four dozen 8- to 10-inch strands. Place strings in a bowl and toss with oil to coat; set aside.

Press risen dough down on a work surface; reserve 3 to 4 tablespoons for forming "stems." Cut remaining dough in half and cut each half into 6 wedges. Roll each into a round ball by cupping your hand over the dough and pressing and rolling lightly in a circular motion for 10 to 15 seconds. Cover and let rest for 15 minutes.

Preheat oven to 375 degrees. Line two baking sheets with silicone liners.



Place four pieces of string on your work surface. Crisscross strings over a center point into a star formation. Place a dough ball, smooth side-down, onto the center point. Firmly tie each string into a knot over the center of the roll. Snip off excess string using scissors.

Place tied roll onto a prepared baking sheet, knot side-down. Repeat with remaining strings and dough balls.

Let rolls rise for about 30 minutes. Sift a little flour on top of rolls. Shape reserved dough into "stems" and place them on the sheet next to the rolls.

Bake in the center of the preheated oven until lightly browned, 20 to 25 minutes.

Remove from the oven and let cool until safe to handle, about 15 minutes. Cut strings off of each roll at the tops and peel down carefully and slowly to remove. Cut a small hole in the tops of each roll and press "stems" into each hole.

Note: If your tied sections didn't come out perfectly even, don't try to adjust them. It won't work. When tying, make sure you get the strings as equally spaced as possible.

The Sheridan fire hall staff have received many visits and phone calls from area residents concerned about the pending expiration of their FireMed coverage. We are transitioning to a partnership with Life Flight, and like all changes, it takes time. Please rest assured that if you are a current member, we will honor your FireMed coverage until the transition is complete.

All current FireMed members should receive a letter from Life Flight and an application form. You can choose FireMed (ground only) or Life Flight (air only) for \$75. You can also select a combination of the two, ground and air, for \$140. Return the completed application to Life Flight Membership Network at the address provided on the form.

If you are not a current Fire Med member, joining is still possible. Life Flight, which will administer our Fire Med program, does not have an open enrollment period. Therefore, you can sign up any time of the year. Your membership begins after Life Flight receives your enrollment form and payment. The membership is good for one year. Applications are available at the Sheridan Fire District station at 230 SW Mill St., or you can enroll online at www.lifeflight.org.

What is Fire Med, and what does it cover? Fire Med is a membership. It is not insurance. Anyone living within Sheridan Fire District is eligible to join. For medical emergencies that occur and an ambulance is used, your insurance will be billed. Any remaining balance will be written off if the transport is deemed emergent. This service is reciprocated in other areas that have FireMed. In Oregon, that is most of the state. (The places not covered are those served by private ambulances, primarily the Portland Metro area and much of the Oregon Coast.)

The key to this is emergent. Most people call an ambulance for emergencies, such as difficulty breathing, chest pain, abdominal pain, an allergic reaction, a potential stroke, or a significant injury. However, people call for non-emergencies as well. Ambulances are not meant to take people to the doctor's office or home from the hospital. FireMed does not cover the delivery of an ice pack in the middle of the night, help with a displaced Foley catheter, minor injuries, or assistance in lifting someone who has fallen. If an Uber driver or a taxi could provide the same service you are asking us to provide, it probably wouldn't be covered by Fire Med.

Is it an emergency or not? Call us! We are here to help you. Our skilled paramedics and EMTs will assess your medical needs and help you make wise decisions.

No one likes to be faced with the unexpected. An ambulance ride can be expensive. A ride in a helicopter is much more so. Joining a membership program like FireMed and/or Life Flight can help relieve the financial pressure you may face unexpectedly by eliminating out-of-pocket expenses.

We at Sheridan Fire District are here to assist you. FireMed and Life Flight memberships are one way we can help when you or a loved one is facing a medical crisis. Consider joining today.

Mental Health Safe Zones to Provide Suicide Prevention and Crisis Support

Kelsey Murray, the new suicide coordinator for Yamhill County, provided Sheridan Chamber members with information about Yamhill County's Mental Health Safe Zones program at its Nov. 4 meeting.

Mental Health Safe Zones aim to help people in a mental health crisis. In addition, the program provides organizations and businesses opportunities to support mental health awareness and offer resources and support.

Between 2007 and 2021, Yamhill County had 23 suicide deaths, which is higher than the state level. Also, statistics show that the Pacific Northwest has higher suicide rates than the rest of the United States, indicating the need for this program.

Most deaths by suicide are in the 45-64 age range, followed by those ages 25-44.

Firearms, suffocation, alcohol, and drugs are the top methods used for suicide in Oregon.

Weather can be a contributing factor in this area. In rural communities, there is often a lack of mental health professionals and resources.

The national suicide hotline phone number is 9-8-8, America's first 3-digit number dedicated to suicide prevention and crisis support. When people call 9-8-8, they are connected to trained counselors (staff and volunteers) who are part of the existing National Suicide Prevention Lifeline network. These trained counselors listen, understand how the caller's problems are affecting them, provide support, and con-

nect them to resources if and when necessary.

Yamhill County Mental Health Safe Zones assures those suffering from a mental health crisis that they are not alone, that they can go to many locations, be met with care and support, and learn about available resources.

These safety zones allow local businesses and organizations to support suicide prevention efforts by visibly identifying their business or organization as a space free from mental health stigma and a resource for obtaining mental health care.

Mental Health Safe Zones may include businesses, civic organizations, churches, healthcare facilities, social service agencies, or schools.

Participants receive a window decal, resource materials, and a designated Mental Health Safe Zone listing on the Yamhill County Public Health website. In addition, businesses and organizations in the program agree to consistently strive to eliminate mental health stigma and to support staff and community members who may be experiencing mental health crises.

The program seeks to normalize access to mental health care.

Before businesses can participate, 20 percent of their staff must receive training in suicide prevention, follow-up care, and learn how to access resources. Kelsey said training is free and takes about 90 minutes. For further information, call Kelsey at 503-434-7525, ext. 6092, or email murrayk@co.yamhill.or.us.

CTGR Emergency Services Signs Five-Year Agreement with WVFD

The Confederated Tribes of Grand Ronde (CTGR) Emergency Services and the West Valley Fire District (WVFD) board signed a contract stating that CTGR will provide emergency services for the WVFD, effective Jan. 1, 2023, through Dec. 31, 2027.

Coverage areas include the current WVFD area and the Willamina Ambulance Service Area (ASA).

WVFD will pay CTGR \$650,000 per year based on satisfactory services.

An ambulance, recently purchased by WVFD, has an outstanding balance of \$177,000. The Tribe and WVFD agreed that each agency would pay half of the balance. Once paid, WVFD will transfer the title and all rights to the ambulance to CTGR.

The annual payment to the Tribe will increase by the percentage increase of the district's tax revenue, up to three percent, each year the contract remains in effect.

According to the agreement, if the current tax levy, an estimated \$360,000 per year, is not renewed, the Tribe will reduce career staff at the Willamina station, equal to the reduction in funds.

WVFD agreed to transfer ownership of all apparatus and equipment used in response and emergency operations to the Tribe.

The contract requires the Tribe to provide sufficient staff at the Willamina station to ensure rapid responses to all hazards and emergencies, as funding allows.

A minimum of two full-time staff will be housed at the Willamina station 24 hours a day, seven days a week. These staff members will have Firefighter I and Emergency Medical Responder certifications.

Administrative, supervisory, and some indirect expenses, such as but not limited to responding to public records requests, processing invoices, and budget preparations, are included in the

agreement. Additional expenses incurred independently by the WVFD board will be the responsibility of WVFD.

The Tribe will be responsible for regular maintenance, operations, utilities, and insurance coverage of the stations owned and leased by the WVFD.

The Tribe will maintain complete control and ownership of its personnel and equipment.

On Jan. 1, 2028, the contract will auto-renew for five additional years unless terminated. The agreement includes the ability to terminate by either party. Upon termination of the contract, the Tribe agrees to return any remaining WVFD apparatus and equipment.

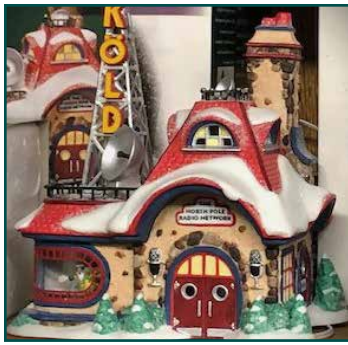

Sheridan and Willamina School Districts Join Others in Lawsuit

Dallas, Dayton, McMinnville, Sheridan, Yamhill-Carlton, and Willamina School Districts have filed lawsuits against the manufacturers and purveyors of e-cigarettes marketed to teenagers, joining over 1,000 other school districts nationally, including Portland Public Schools.

Youth vaping is an epidemic in the United States, and Yamhill and Polk Counties are no exception. The 2019 Oregon state survey shows that 15.6% of Yamhill County 11th graders and 12.8% of 8th graders reported vaping within a 30-day period.

Many youths also do not understand the dangers of vaping, that e-cigarettes contain nicotine, and that vaping poses serious health risks. This dramatic rise in youth vaping rates and the lack of knowledge of the dangers directly result from the defendants' ad campaigns and marketing strategies designed to target teenagers and youth.

The rising number of teenagers who are addicted to nicotine is a public health crisis. Nicotine is a neurotoxin that poses a particularly potent threat to the adolescent brain, as it can damage brain development and have lasting consequences for cognitive ability and mental health.

Research has also shown that adolescent use of nicotine biologically primes the brain for addiction to other drugs later in life, including alcohol, cocaine, and methamphetamine, and that these changes are long-term. Sheridan School District Superintendent Dorie Vickery remarked on the decision to join this litigation:

"Sheridan School District is proud to join other districts in the region to hold JUUL and Altria accountable for their predatory conduct in targeting young people to use e-cigarettes to turn a profit and secure customers for life. Every day, Oregon educators see evidence of the vaping epidemic and the resulting harm to our students and education environments. We see this epidemic impacting student attendance, learning, and our ability to maintain a positive school culture. We have invested countless hours in investigations, disciplinary hearings, and working with our families who suffer from this epidemic. Unfortunately, our students in grades 5-12 do not understand the dangers of nicotine addiction. The problem is staggering and will take years to correct. My hope for Sheridan School District

in this litigation is that we can obtain some additional resources to help prevent and address nicotine addiction among the young people in our community."

The lawsuits allege that JUUL and Altria violated the federal RICO statute and that the defendants created and contributed to a public nuisance on school grounds. The lawsuits seek damages as well as abatement. The defendants' conduct has caused our students to suffer significant and ongoing harm that will continue well into the future as these children age. As alleged in their complaints, these school districts believe the defendants should help fund public health efforts to address the youth vaping epidemic they created.

The districts have retained Keller Rohrback partners Dean Kawamoto and Yoona Park as outside counsel in this litigation. Keller Rohrback is a nationally recognized law firm based in Seat-

tle with offices in Portland and Phoenix that routinely litigates against the largest corporate defendants in the country on behalf of local governments. Keller Rohrback also represents King County, Skagit County, Seattle Public Schools, Portland Public Schools, and the Milwaukee Public Schools in their suits against JUUL and the other defendants for creating a youth vaping crisis. Defendants include JUUL Labs, Inc. and the Altria Group, Inc., the parent company of Philip Morris USA and one of the major investors in JUUL Labs. These defendants also initiated youth-oriented social media campaigns like "Doit4juul" and the viral "Vaporized" campaign, complete with launch parties, social media influencers, and billboards in Time Square.

The lawsuits have been filed in the United States District Court for the District of Oregon, which will be part of the multi-district

litigation in San Francisco before Judge William Orrick III, where other cases from across the nation against JUUL and other defendants are pending.

Obituary



Frank Holstad

June 18, 1935-Oct. 22, 2022

Frank Holstad was born on June 18, 1935.

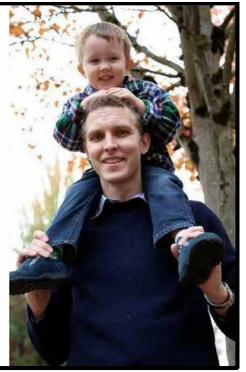

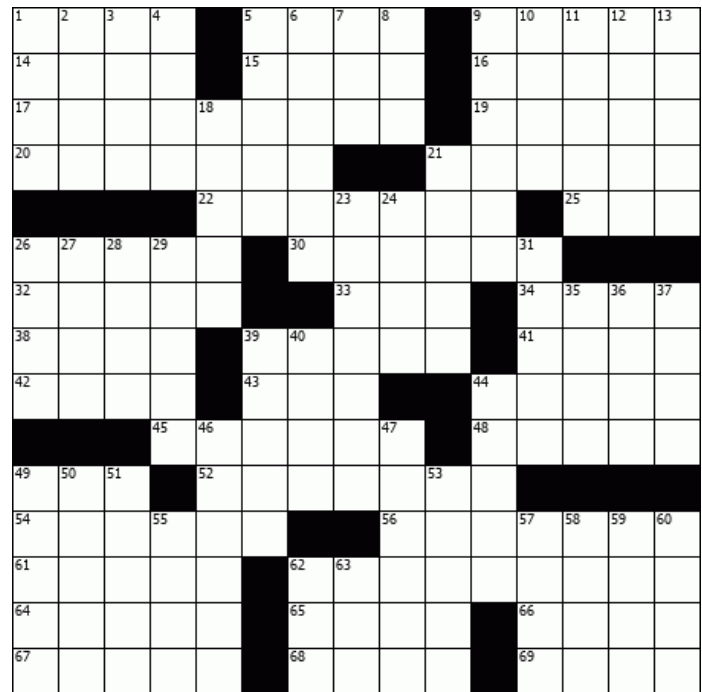

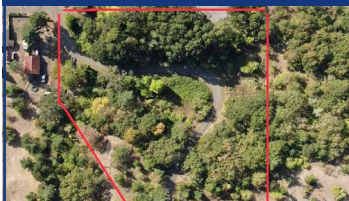

Caramel Apple Grapes

Grapes are dipped in caramel and then in nuts. A little treat that tastes like caramel apple in every bite. Great for Thanksgiving appetizers!

Ingredients

- 50 seedless green grapes, wiped completely dry
- 50 toothpicks
- 1 cup caramel bits
- 2 tablespoons heavy cream
- 1 cup salted peanuts or cashews, crushed finely

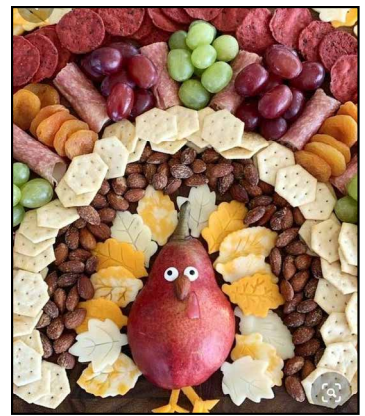

Sheridan's First Phone • McCormick-Deering Corn Sheller



MAGNETO WALL PHONES by Western Electric were introduced in 1907 and remained in production for 30 years. This is one of the earlier years, determined by the backboard's arch design. The phone pictured is called a Cathedral Top. Although the case was basically a plain box, it was made from well-finished oak or walnut. The nickel plated metal work made it a rather handsome phone.

The phone dialed into an operator who would connect the call to the receiving party.

SHERIDAN'S FIRST TELEPHONE

During World War II, telephones were very difficult to obtain. The individual who donated this phone to the museum, Ann Beardslee Phillips, relayed the following information:

"We had a family emergency with my youngest brother Phillip being in the hospital at five years of age. Doctor Wilbur had said he would call my family if there was any change in his condition. My dad called Bob Wells at Bell Telephone Company to see if we could get a telephone, as ours was broken and they had been unable to obtain parts. Bob Wells called back and said he had one in the basement of the phone company that we could have, but to please take good care of it."

McCormick Deering Sheller

The first corn sheller was made in 1839 by Lester Denison of Connecticut. Cobs were harvested by hand and put into corn cribs to dry. Once dried, they were shelved and the cobs were used for fuel in cook stoves.

The McCormick-Deering hand corn sheller was made by International Harvester in Chicago in the 1930s. This conglomerate was formed in 1902 when McCormick, Deering, Milwaukee, Plain, and Champion Harvester lines all merged together. They made these machines and later models from the 1920s through the 1950s.

This model is designed to be operated by two people. One person would crank the handle (made easier by the flywheel) and the other would feed the ears of corn into the sheller. This machine appears to be a two-ear machine. They were made to take up to six ears at a time.

There is a spur wheel enclosed in a central housing that is the sheller of the kernels. The cobs drop out of the bottom of the machine and the kernels go into the tray. Two people could shell 60 to 80 bushels of corn a day. One bushel equals about 8 gallons of kernels.
