Deputies Arrest Sheridan Shooter

Shortly after 5 a.m. on Dec. 14, a Yamhill County Sheriff's Deputy on duty in Sheridan heard multiple gunshots in the city. Shortly afterward, the deputy received a call regarding a weapons complaint in the 200 block of NW Sherman Street.

The deputy learned an individual came to the residence, broke out two vehicle's windows, and removed items from the vehicles. The person then brandished a 9mm handgun which he pointed at another individual while threatening to shoot him. The suspect fired at least six shots from the handgun, all in the vicinity of occupied dwellings.

Deputies collected evidence, conducted interviews, and identified the individual suspected to be responsible for the incident. Deputies worked throughout the day following leads and conducting surveillance. At approximately 3:30 p.m. Stephen Tyler

Lindsey, age 22, was arrested in Grand Ronde and lodged in the Yamhill County Jail on the following charges: Unlawful Use of a Weapon, Menacing, Recklessly Endangering Another, Theft 3rd Degree, Unlawful Entry into a Motor Vehicle (two counts), Theft 2nd Degree (two counts) and Criminal Mischief 2nd Degree (two counts).

A Message from the Sheridan Superintendent

Dear Sheridan Families,

This last week we wrapped up our School Health Services Planning grant, a six-month process that included a comprehensive needs assessment. The Planning Committee, consisting of parents, staff, and community members, recommended the Sheridan School Board pursue a nursing model for our school-based health services.

The Committee selected the nursing model over the health center model due to our local data and the best fit for meeting our community's health and wellness needs.

The next phase, beginning in January, is for implementation. During this phase, the District will design our nursing model program and use the grant funds to hire an additional nurse.

Our current District Nurse, Alanna Russell, has a caseload of 107 students with health medical protocols. This includes students who are medically complex or medically fragile and require specially trained staff to be with them during the school day. Alanna teaches the team and monitors

the implementation of medical health plans. In addition, she works closely with our families and medical providers to see that students have what they need to access learning during the school day. Alanna also promotes good health by arranging special clinics, teaching classroom lessons, and conducting medical screenings.

The increase in nursing will assist our students and families with accessing health services and potentially bringing services to the schools. This may include dental and vision services and behavioral health services. The nursing model will also focus on community health,

assisting the District with communication regarding regional health concerns such as substance abuse prevention, community health concerns, and overall wellness education.

I greatly appreciate Alanna Russell's knowledge and skills that serve so many of our students and their families! In the future, our grant funds will provide additional nursing hours, someone to work with Alanna and increase our capacity to promote health and wellness throughout the

As the District closes for winter break, our staff will enjoy some much-needed time off. The last few weeks have been challenging, with so many staff and students out sick. However, the Sheridan School District staff have stepped up amazingly to cover for colleagues, keeping our schools open during the continued substitute staff shortage. Many thanks and appreciation to our custodians, cooks, office staff, instructional assistants, teachers, and administrators!

Connie Irene Campos Dec. 3, 1938-Dec.14, 2022



Community Development Grant Application Process

Purpose:

The purpose of the Community Development Grant is to support non-profits and for-profit entities and organizations that serve the Sheridan community.

Eligibility:

Let it glow, let it glow, let it glow ... While patrons at the Riverside Cafe were concerned last Tuesday that the City of Sheridan's Public Works crew were taking down the Christmas lights, they were actually adding more lights. In fact, they were installing Edison lights that will remain in the plaza year-around. Edison lights are modern, reproduction bulbs that harken back to the very first light bulb made by Thomas Edison in 1879: a glass vacuum globe that lets you see through to the filament inside. Where the original incandescent bulbs used carbon filaments, the modern versions uses a filament with a thin LED strip. The result is a modern take on an old classic. These lights can change color and flash. For example, explained Public Works Supervisor Kenny Peterson, the lights can be red for Christmas, but later changed to green for St. Patrick's Day, etc.

Nanette "Grandma" LaRue: A Life Lived Generously

Nanette I. (Jetton) LaRue June 1938-Dec. 2022

With immense sadness, the family shares the news of the sudden passing of Nanette LaRue. Nanette was born in 1938 to Martin and Helen (Robertson) Jetton. She later married Owen LaRue, and in 1967 her family moved to Oregon so that she could be near her parents.

She began working at a young age and developed a strong work ethic. She showed little interest in slowing down and retiring. Her daughter, Lynette (LaRue) Donnelly, said she ran an in-home daycare for years and often wouldn't take payment to help struggling families. In the 1980s, she worked in the laundry room and kitchen at Faulconer Chapman School (FCS). She later became an instructional assistant at FCS. She was generous with her time and often donated items when she saw a need. After she finally retired, she continued to run circles around many others.

Nanette once watched a show on television about a couple in Alaska who had been delivering food to people who lived on a small island nearby. When their boat needed repairs, they asked the public to help fix it so they could continue providing food to the islanders. When Nanette saw this, her daughter remembered that she immediately sent them a check to help.

She often asked neighbors with gardens (if she saw they had fruits or vegetables that were not being eaten) if she could share some of it with those in need. Then, she would preserve the produce and give it to the homeless or anyone she thought might need it.

She volunteered at the Golden Kitchen (at one time a Sheridan senior meal site), preparing and serving meals for the elderly.

Nanette loved children. Tim Hart, who worked with and knew Nanette for about 25 years, said that many children who attended FCS would affectionately call her "Grandma" or "Rue."

Tim remembered that she was always ready to take the kids out for recess, rain or shine, no matter the weather. Tim said the faculty wanted to recognize Nanette's support for the school and community about 20 years ago, so they voted to name the FCS eighth-grade citizenship award in her honor. He said she never handed out the award



herself because she was never one to seek recognition.

"She only did what was right for the kids," he said, "She was always there for all kids, and she really was Grandma to so many kids in the town."

Over the years, she had more than a hundred foster kids. DHS often placed kids with Nanette, or she saw a need in the community and provided temporary shelter.

Her daughter noted that she always knew when a kid needed something.

Her daughter said she was active in her kids, foster kids, and grandchildren's lives. She took the time to teach them and always tried to lead by example.

According to her daughter, she wasn't keen on public speaking. Still, she spoke to the Sheridan City Council, along with others from the Sheridan Community Youth Organization, about the importance of allowing chickens to be raised in Sheridan. She believed chickens were an excellent tool for a child's development. She used the chickens to teach the kids how to care for animals, raise animals, and foster a good work ethic.

She was highly active in the Sheridan Church of the Nazarene. Her daughter said she could usually find her at church seven days a week. She did various tasks at the church, including youth group leadership and secretary, among other jobs. She inspired many of her youth group kids to become youth group leaders themselves.

Friends and family noted that there are no words to do her justice, saying she will be missed beyond words and that they take comfort in knowing that she is with the Lord, her husband, and her son, Terry. She is survived by her children, Valerie (Tim) Holsclaw, Victor (Lucinda) LaRue, and Lynette (Todd) Donnelly; as well as seven grandchildren; 11 great-grandchildren; and one great-greatgrandchild.

As members gave their reports, Mayor Burr said there would be a tour of the holiday light displays around town, a toy drive, and a blanket drive. Again, the City's Facebook page and this paper are good sources of information for upcoming events and

what's happening in Willamina. The City is looking for bell ringers if anyone needs volunteer time to get onto Santa's Nice list. The library is seeking a location for a new library building. For inspiration, blueprints from the past are being used. They can apply for a 1.4 million dollar grant to fund the project, which will supply new, updated technology and more services for the public, such as classes, meetings, and more opportunities for the community. 
