A Message from the Sheridan Superintendent

Dear Sheridan Families,

Before starting this job, I was told by other superintendents the most difficult decision I'll make as a superintendent is what to do on days of winter weather conditions. Unfortunately, we recently had one of those days. So I make the best decision I can with the information I have at the time.

Our students need to be in school, and I take this decision very seriously. I also understand the mad scramble to figure out work and childcare and how to manage the day. I raised five children and still remember the days school was delayed or closed, trying to figure out what to do.

While no decision regarding school delay or closure will be acceptable to everyone, let me explain our procedure when we know the road conditions are expected to be a concern.

Our process begins with the Mid-Co Bus manager driving the bus routes up in the hills, starting at about 4:30 a.m. I also have two other community members with early commutes who will contact me about the road conditions. The additional information I use is the weather app, looking at the hourly temperatures and predicted precipitation. I will also check what other districts have decided, delayed, or closed for the day. I must decide to delay or close school by 5:10 a.m. due to food service, custodial staff, and school bus transportation. Once I have made the decision, I start the communication chain by texting the administrative team and district office support staff, and they notify building-level staff. At roughly 6:00 a.m., communication will go out to Sheridan School District families via text and robocall. We also post on Flash Alert, which goes to the local media and our district website.

It is very important that student contact information is kept up to date. If you become aware of a school delay or closure through other information sources and have not received the phone call/text, please contact the school office and check to see that we have the correct contact information in the system.

If the decision is made for a two-hour delay, I will continue to monitor the weather conditions. Given that several bus routes are on roads north and south of Sheridan, I must also confirm with the Mid-Co Bus Manager that the roads are safe for school buses.

Should the district experience several days of closures, we will add days at the end of the school year. This is a district calendar change and will need approval from the School Board.

Please remember, my first priority is student safety, and I must weigh that with the need to have our students in school learning.

I only got into verbal fisticuffs with Rene once when he told me he would no longer run for council. He won the discussion.

His love for the library, the park, and the City is a void that will be difficult, if not impossible, to fill. As a friend, he is irreplaceable.


The mayor signed a proclamation honoring Rene at the Dec. 5, 2022, Sheridan City Council meeting.

Fiber Enthusiasts of All Skill Levels Invited to Attend Monthly Meetings

Beginning on Dec. 17, West Valley Fiber Enthusiasts will meet from 9 a.m. until noon on the third Saturday of each month at the Tina Miller Center, 172 NE 4th Street in Willamina.

"These gatherings are for anyone who is either curious or a master with all things fiber," reports Jennifer Eckels, the coordinator of the first meeting.

Jennifer and her husband, Chris Eckels, are the owners of Willamina Alpacas, LLC. Their herd of seven female huacaya alpacas, ranging in age from 1-13 years, provide mountains of the raw fiber after shearing every spring. Eckels has slowly been learning what to do with the fiber. Since 2020, she has discovered weaving, crocheting, knitting, and spinning the fiber into yarn.

Recently, she has been traveling outside of the West Valley to attend gatherings and classes to learn more.

"My hunch is there may be others here who love working with fiber. Either beginners like me or more advanced, wanting to network with others and share their knowledge or feel a part of the community," said Jennifer. Though the path for the group is still developing, the hope is that

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Sour Cream Christmas Cookies

Makes 22 cookies

11/2 cups all-purpose flour, spooned and leveled 1 teaspoon baking powder 1/4 teaspoon salt 1/2 cup (1 stick) unsalted butter, softened

3/4 cup granulated sugar 1 large egg, room temperature 11/2 teaspoons pure vanilla extract

1/2 cup sour cream at room temperature

Vanilla Buttercream Frosting 1/2 cup (1 stick) unsalted butter, softened

11/2 cups powdered sugar 1 tablespoon heavy whipping cream or milk

1 teaspoon pure vanilla extract Gel food coloring (optional)

Directions to make cookies

Preheat the oven to 350 degrees. Line two large baking sheets with parchment paper or silicone baking mats and set aside.

In a large mixing bowl, whisk together the flour, baking powder and salt until well combined. Set aside.

In the bowl of a stand mixer, fitted with the paddle attachment, or in a large mixing bowl using a hand-held mixer, beat the butter and granulated sugar together for 1 to 2 minutes, or until well combined.

Mix in the egg and vanilla extract until fully combined, making sure to stop and scrape down the sides of the bowl as needed.

Mix in the dry ingredients in two additions alternating with the sour cream. Make sure to mix in each addition until just combined being careful not to overmix the batter.

Using a 11/2 tablespoon cookie scoop, scoop the cookie dough onto the prepared baking sheets, making sure to leave a little room between each one.

Bake for 14 to 16 minutes, or until the tops of the cookies are set and spring back when touched lightly. Remove from the oven, and allow to cool on the baking sheets for 10 minutes, then carefully transfer the cookies to a wire rack to cool completely.

Buttercream Frosting Directions In the bowl of a stand mixer fitted with the whisk attachment, or in a large mixing bowl using a handheld mixer, beat the butter for 1 to 2 minutes, or until smooth. Add the powdered sugar, 1/2 cup at a time, mixing in each addition until well combined.

Add the heavy whipping cream, vanilla extract, and gel food coloring (if using), and continue



mixing until fully combined. Once the cookies have cooled completely, spread the frosting on top of the cookies.

Store the cookies in an airtight container at room temperature or in the refrigerator for up to 4 days.

The mobile bookstore is going through some revamping and will be back in business early spring... watch for it!

Meanwhile, her collectible greeting cards – Keeper Collection Gift Cards™ - are available online as e-cards, including haiku e-postcards, all of which go to the support of the Christ's Child Care Foundation in Fumbisi and Accra, Ghana, West Africa. While Ms. Jaye was a participant in its inception in 2003 in Vienna, she is now a dedicated stateside partner for financing, as its founder and dear friend Maria is the moving force in Ghana. 

Add a couple of drops of scented oil to pinecones and set them out in a decorative bowl or basket.





Preheat oven to 375 degrees. Grease cookie sheets.

In a large bowl, cream together the shortening, peanut butter, brown sugar, and 1 cup white sugar until smooth.

Beat in the eggs one at a time, and stir in the milk and vanilla. Combine the flour, baking soda,

and salt; stir into the peanut butter mixture until well blended.

Shape tablespoonfuls of dough into balls, and roll in remaining white sugar. Place cookies 2 inches apart on the prepared cookie sheets.

Sheridan Library Works to Inspire More Patrons to Explore Resources

Did you know that your library card never expires? (unless you don't use it for three years...) Did you know you can use your Sheridan library card to check out books from 18 CCRLS member libraries?

Cardholders can order books online via the Libby app that can be downloaded to their phones. You can order books through the CCRLS system. It truly opens up access to an astonishing number of books.

The Libby app allows access to e-resources. This app allows the check-out of up to six items at a time, such as e-books, audio-books, and magazines. You can also place six holds at a time.

The limit on a regular library card is 50 items for Sheridan residents who live within the city limits. Those who live outside the city limits are limited to 10 items unless they purchase a full-access library card which increases their limit to 50 items.

The Sheridan library is increasing the number and scope of programs offered. Many children's programs will be added throughout the Christmas holidays when kids are on a break from school. Natalie, a newer library employee, has been working to establish additional programs for adults. Attendance will help her design programs based on popularity.

Like most CCRLS libraries, the Sheridan library allows patrons to check-out of magazines, except for the current month's editions.

The library accepts donations of books and DVDs, many of which they sell to raise funds for the library. The library also accepts toy donations, such as the little red kitchen currently being used. The staff rotates the toys to keep the area interesting for the kids.

The McNaughton Collection consists of hand-selected books rotated among several libraries, including Sheridan's. These are fun, fresh books covering a wide range of subjects. This collection

draws people to the library to see what's new.

The library's children's section features some Spanish books, children's DVDs, toys, and several shelves of books. In addition, the City will soon add new computers for children, especially for those kids who do not have computers at home, to use for homework, etc.

The library allows patrons to check out T-Mobile and ATT wi-fi hotspots. Hotspots are small devices that deliver Internet anywhere at no cost. Zoom access to Sheridan City Council meetings is available via hotspots. They allow unlimited data and must be recharged as with a cell phone. Patrons may check them out for three weeks, which will automatically renew for one additional week as long as the library does not have a hold in place for them. Yamhill County ARPA funds allowed the purchase of 18 for the library. Currently, they have five on hand for checkout.

Children can use them for homework; adults can use them for job interviews; they can facilitate virtual doctor's appointments and more. While there is no charge to check them out, there is a \$90 replacement fee for failure to return the device.

The library also offers computers for adults, which receive heavy use by the public. In addition, library staff does their best to assist patrons who have various levels of computer skills. The library will also print and fax materials for the public. (A fax machine is also available at Sheridan City Hall.)

A quiet room is available for various things, such as tutoring, interviews, or meetings for up to 15 people.

The library has a couple of "honor racks" for those who cannot show proof of a Sheridan address and an ID required to obtain a library card. Patrons who can't provide these things are welcome to take books from the honor racks. Whether or not they return these items is up to them. They can choose from books and magazines, mostly donated items. Library staff tries to ensure that current items are available on these racks.

Some donated items go on the library's regular bookshelves, and others go on the honor racks. Due to limited space, Library Director Gwen Gorham said they try to keep books on

the shelf limited to publications released within the past ten years. In addition, some books are available for sale. Proceeds from these sales enable the library to buy new books.

The Sheridan library does not fine patrons for overdue library books. They see library fines as an obstacle for some people to use the library. They want to avoid fines that may cause people not to come to the library for books.

Gwen said that statistics have shown that libraries get their materials back sooner when no fines are involved. She added that most CCRLS libraries do not charge fines for overdue materials.

Eventually, patrons who fail to return books will be charged the replacement cost of the item plus a \$5 processing fee for such things as barcodes and book covers. If the book is returned, these fees are waived. The library will work with those who can't afford this cost, sometimes by accepting another book or DVD as a replacement.

Gwen said the bottom line is that she wants everyone to be able to use the library and to have access to its resources.





Some signs of a water leak include water bubbling up along the street or in yards. Other indicators include wet areas along streets on a dry day, with puddles of water collecting. An unusually high water bill, for no known reason, may also indicate a water leak.

Sheridan Public Works, located at 358 NW Washington Street, is responsible for the water system. During business hours, call them as soon as possible at 503843-2660.

By the time City water reaches water mains for public distribution, it has been treated, making these water leaks an expensive waste. Public Work's goal is to repair the cause as soon as possible.
