Fire Destroys Trailer; Local Family Loses Belongings and Beloved Pets

Eric and Sharon Boekhoff's home caught fire last Thursday evening, Jan. 24. Responding firefighters were unable to extinguish the fire, thought to have started by a stand-up heater.

The Boekoff's son discovered the fire as he entered the trailer and was met with smoke. He attempted to put the fire out, but was quickly overwhelmed by the smoke and forced to exit.

The trailer was serving a temporary home for the Boekhoff family while they worked to rebuild the home they lost to a house fire on Feb. 5, 2020.

The trailer and all contents were a total loss.

Tragically, the family also lost both of their dogs, Daisy and Jackson.

Eric and Sharon Boekhoff are parents to three boys, Aiden, 17, Nolan, 13, and Jonah, 12.

A MESSAGE FROM THE WILLAMINA SCHOOL DISTRICT

A new calendar year is the time districts start planning for the upcoming school year, adopting a calendar, projecting budgetary needs, prioritizing capital expenditures, and forecasting staffing needs.

Our district leadership team has been working on next year's school calendar, setting in-service dates, grading days, conference dates, and holiday breaks. With Christmas falling on Sunday in 2023, many districts are debating when to start winter break, Dec. 23 or Dec. 16. We have reached out to other local districts in an effort to align with our neighboring schools, and most plan to begin vacation on Dec. 23, but a few are leaning towards Dec. 16, we plan to present a finalized calendar to our board at the March meeting. If you have a preference, let us

The Governor's budget will be announced in early February, and this will be the starting point for building the 23-24 school year budget. We anticipate a small increase in state school funding. In the last biennium, the state school budget was 9.3 billion, and the new estimate is rumored to be 9.5 billion. However, the Oregon Association of School Business Officers estimate the cost of operating districts at the current service level would require 10.3 billion. This is due to the rising cost of materials, supplies, utilities, and wages. Education supporters will lobby for a higher budget, and we won't know the final allocation until the end of the legislative session in late June.

Consolidation of the Willamina School District from three campuses to one occurred many years ago. Through the sale of the Washington Street and Grand Ronde buildings, we were able to add several structures needed to house all students K-12 at the Oaken Hills site. Over the course of the last ten years, our enrollment has increased along with mandated school programs. In efforts to provide a well-rounded learning environment to our students, we have added classrooms and a high-quality Career Education Center. We are currently in the process of adding six new classrooms to the middle school. In addition, we hope to renew the existing general obligation bond, due to expire in May of 2024, and add more classrooms at the high school level.


Staffing shortfalls remain a critical issue at the state and national levels. We were fortunate to have a very low turnover this school year, but a shortage of qualified substitute teachers still impacts the district on a daily basis. We hope this gets better in the near future, and we will continue to recruit local community members as substitute teachers and instructional assistants.

The City of Sheridan invited all West Valley residents to share their ideas for the concept and design of a new community/ sports complex under consideration for construction on cityowned property in Sheridan. The City of Sheridan hosted the open house last Saturday morning at American Legion Post 75. Parks and Recreation, Sheridan High School Cheer Team, Baseball Bob and Little League Lori and her husband joined City Manager Heidi Bell and city staff, the mayor, city council, and others to host the event.

Attendees voted by placing sticky dots on their preferences at stations around the room. A 17-acre parcel of land between Sheridan and Willamina was the hands-down favorite location for the complex.

Voters placed dots to indicate activities they wanted to see included. Ideas presented were tennis, soccer, pickleball, basketball, archery, rock wall climbing, a playground, skateboard park, equestrian and walking trails, RC car track, mini golf, softball and baseball fields, and a multi-purpose field and a track. Additionally, participants were urged to write down other activities suggestions and express any concerns, pro or con. The votes regarding preferred activities were not tallied during the event but will be available soon.

The City of Sheridan also provided 11x17-inch paper for those willing to sketch and submit a drawing to illustrate their ideas about what they'd like to see included in the complex and how they'd like to see it laid out. It's still possible for those unable to attend the open house to offer their ideas. The public may drop off sketches and written comments at Sheridan City Hall.

Raffle tickets, sold for \$1 each, allowed purchasers the chance to win one of several prizes donated by generous businesses and individuals. The grand prize, a \$300 Traxxas radio-controlled Flash vehicle, was donated by Erik Hanson. Lecia Myers won this exciting prize and generously donated it back for a future fundraiser. Other raffle donors included Figaro's Pizza, West Valley Mercantile, artist Sandy Walker, Kira Sandoval, Sheridan Library, Sheridan High Cheer, and West Valley Cheer.

The City of Sheridan sponsored the event to seek public opinion on a proposed community center and athletic complex that could be built on city-owned property.

RC Vehicle Club Forming in Sheridan

Eric Hanson is working with Faulconer Chapman School to launch a radio-controlled car building and RC racing club.

Eric said that kids who join the group would build cars like the model pictured above.

Grant funding will allow all kids to join the group at no cost to their families.

Erik said most schools use the program as a positive reinforcement tool. To participate, students must have good attendance and keep their grades up. In the process of building the models, the kids discover their mechanical aptitude, diagnosing mechanical issues, and troubleshooting, along with a slew of other skills that go along with this hobby.

Another benefit, said Eric, is that it gets kids off the computer, off the couch, and outside running around and having fun.

Erik attended the open house

last weekend and proposed an outdoor RC racetrack for the new complex. However, the Sheridan club is currently forming and will not wait for the complex to be constructed.

The track in Salem, which measures 75 feet x 35 feet, hosts races once or twice a week. Erik said they usually host 40 or more racers every time. He would like the Sheridan track to be 100 feet x 75 feet. He said this hobby attracts a wide age range, from toddlers to 90-year-olds.

FCS Principal Adam DeLatte agrees that the club would be a welcomed educational opportunity for middle school students.

He said the kids had expressed an overwhelming interest in RC car building and racing.

The principal requested a \$500 community development grant from the City of Sheridan, which the Sheridan City Council approved at its Jan. 17 meeting.

Salt Dough Hand Bowl What you need:

- -Salt dough (any recipe)
- -A small oven-proof bowl
- -Acrylic paint
- -Mod Podge all-in-one glue and sealer

What to do:

- 1. Make a salt dough using the recipe of your choice. Most recipes use only flour, salt, and water which means this bowl is an inexpensive and easy craft to
- 2. Flatten the salt dough using a rolling pin. The salt dough should be about one centimeter thick.

Press your child's hand firmly onto it to create an imprint of their hand. Then, press down on each finger to make a good print.

- 3. Use a sharp knife to cut around the hand print's edge carefully.
- 4. Put a small oven-proof bowl upside down on a baking tray and place the salt dough hand print on top of the bowl. This creates the shape of your hand



print bowl. Take your time to ensure you are happy with the shape of the salt dough hand.

5. Bake the hand print in the oven at a low temperature (about 100 degrees Celsius) for three hours.

When you remove it from the oven, check that the salt dough is completely hard on both sides. If it isn't, place it back in the oven for a little longer.

- 6. When the hand print bowl is completely cool, use the acrylic paints you chose to paint and decorate the bowl.
- 7. Use Mod Podge all-in-one glue and sealer to coat the finished bowl to protect and preserve it.

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Learn About The Link Between A Healthy Diet and A Healthy Heart Heart disease is a leading cause

cording to the World Health Organization, ischaemic heart disease is responsible for 16 percent of the world's total deaths. The WHO also points out that, between 2000 and 2019, deaths due to ischaemic heart disease rose by more than two million. Though not all deaths due to heart disease are preventable, many are, and researchers have discovered various ways individuals can reduce their risk for heart disease. One way individuals can protect their heart health is to eat a healthy diet. The link between diet and heart health is significant. Recognition of that link can help people concerned about heart disease develop a dietary plan that reduces their risk for this all-too-common killer.

A healthy diet, weight and heart health

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention note that a healthy diet is balanced and includes a variety of nutritious foods. In fact, one easy way to determine if a plate is healthy is to see how colorful it is. The CDC notes that "eating the rainbow" means a plate is filled with an array of colors, which typically means an individual is eating healthy foods. Such a plate may include dark, leafy greens; bright red tomatoes; colorful fruits like oranges: and even fresh herbs. Such foods tend to be loaded with vitamins, fibers and minerals and low in added sugars, sodium, saturated fats, trans fats, and cholesterol. That makes it easier for individuals to achieve and maintain a healthy weight, which in turn reduces their risk for heart disease. A recent study from researchers at Johns Hopkins found that obesity itself can lead to heart failure, even in the absence of markers for heart disease like high blood pressure, diabetes and elevated cholesterol that have long been used to determine an individual's risk for heart disease. So by using a nutritious diet to maintain or achieve a healthy weight, individuals are thus lowering their risk for heart disease, even if they do not presently have any of the established markers indicating that risk has been elevated.

A healthy diet, cholesterol and heart health

Of course, many people already have learned that they are at an elevated risk for heart disease due to certain lifestyle choices, including poor diet. A poor diet can cause a host of health problems, including elevating cholesterol levels. According to the Heart & Vascular Center at Valley View Hospital in western Colorado, a diet high in saturated fat can lead to heart disease because it can increase cholesterol levels. The Mayo Clinic notes that, when a person has high cholesterol, fatty deposits can develop in the blood vessels. Those deposits eventually grow, making it difficult for sufficient blood to flow through the arteries. The deposits also can break and form clots that can cause heart attack or stroke. Though Harvard Health notes that some people are genetically predisposed to high blood cholesterol, a diet that limits intake of saturated fat can help most people maintain healthy cholesterol levels, thus reducing their risk for heart disease. Foods high in saturated fat include pork, beef, lamb, cream, butter, and cheese.

Heart disease claims the lives of millions of people across the globe every year. Diet is an undeniable ally in the fight against heart disease, and individuals who commit to eating right can greatly reduce their risk for heart disease.







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
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
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Sheridan's Heider Building Named After its First Owner

Otto W. Heider • 1890-1978 • A Legendary Figure in Sheridan History

With the community keeping a close eye on the reconstruction of the Heider building in downtown Sheridan, we wondered if anyone was curious about the person behind the building's name.

Otto Heider was born in Sheridan in 1890, grew up in Sheridan, and died in Sheridan in 1978 at age 87.

He served as the city attorney for many years but never threw his hat in the ring for mayor or council.

Otto's older brother was Sheridan High School's first graduate, with Otto among other students in Sheridan's second graduating class.

During World War One, Otto served in the U.S. Army.

He married Callie B. Beck in 1918 in Sheridan. The couple had two sons, Wallace B. Heider and Otto W. Heider. Jr.

A friend described Otto and his wife as lifelong non-smokers and non-drinkers who were both early risers, up at 3:30 a.m. daily, typically completing a day's work by the time most folks were starting the day.

Otto, a charter member of Sheridan's American Legion, was also active in several other civic groups.

His philanthropy benefitted the Methodist Church, Scouts, Sheridan Rodeo, and other causes he found worthy.

The Heiders lived in a large home on East Main Street for several years before building their new six-bedroom, three-bath, 5,088 sq. ft. home at 1330 W. Main (shown right) in 1941. This home is now the Sheridan Country Inn. Otto was considered one of the wealthiest people in the area, some speculating he was worth nearly a million dollars. However, many believed much of his wealth came from making high-interest loans and foreclosing on property and equipment when a payment was missed.

A friend describing Otto said he was the type of man who, if he thought a person was okay, would go to bat for that person on just about anything. However, if Otto felt a person was no good, 'watch out'

Although his friend said he'd never heard of Otto turning down a leniency plea. It was only the ones who did not go to him and

rious legal problems of his own along the way. In 1964, Chief Judge Solomon wrote in United States V. Heider: "Otto Heider and his confidential secretary, Irene Lawrence, were indicted for wilfully filing false and fraudulent income tax returns on behalf of Heider for the years 1953 and 1954 in their attempt to evade income taxes owing by Heider in the amounts of \$141,252.04 and \$131,646.38 respectively.

"Defendants are residents of the town of Sheridan, Oregon, where Heider was engaged in the practice of law for many years until his disbarment in 1959. Heider's primary occupation, however, was money lending. He made some real estate loans, but primarily he made loans on motor vehicles and heavy equipment. In addition, he engaged in some flooring arrangements with local retailers, and he handled rental properties. Heider also received

income from a garage and repair shop, which he operated primarily to make serviceable the equipment he repossessed.

"Heider's books and records concerning the prosecution years were in bad shape. His accountants, as well as the accountants for the government, were required to construct a set of books, partially from the records which Heider kept but primarily from the original contracts, deposit slips, and canceled checks. During the two years in question, there were more than 300,000 entries. Subsequent to the indictment, the attorneys and accountants for the defendants spent many months with the attorneys and accountants for the government in an effort to agree upon the authenticity of documents and entries. The schedules on vehicular inventories may best illustrate the results of such meetings. These lists contained 1,700 items. They agreed on the correctness of all but 16 of them. Had there been no such cooperation, this case probably would have required at least a year to try. Actually, it was tried in 11 trial days.

"The evidence showed that Heider was under investigation for tax deficiencies from 1939 through 1951. These deficiencies were settled, and the defendant paid approximately \$300,000.00 in taxes, interest, and penalties. Thereafter, an investigation of Heider's tax returns for the years 1952 through 1954 was commenced. However, prior to the indictment in this case, the statute of limitations for the year 1952 ran out. Thereafter, the defendant, for the first time, disclosed a group of contracts totaling \$268,000.00, which had existed in 1952.

"Defendants Heider and Lawrence kept incomplete books and records; they maintained their own methods of accounting which were often unintelligible to anyone else; they deliberately omitted receipts; and they wrote checks in greater amounts than the payees actually received, and yet recorded the higher amounts as disbursements in their books.

"In my view, if a taxpayer reports a large loss when he has a net taxable income which he wilfully failed to divulge, he is guilty of a violation of the income tax law even though the amount of his net taxable income is comparatively small. I find the defendants guilty of the crimes charged in Counts I and II of the indictment."



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
