

On-site parking is available for loading and unloading only. Additional parking is available on residential streets around Sheridan High School.








2022 Parade Theme: It's a Magical Day

A book bike is a type of mobile library. One that's quick and nimble, compact, and unobtrusive. A simple machine to transport knowledge far and wide.



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### **Dedication of Barbara Roberts Career Technical School Honors the Form**

Former Governor Barbara Roberts was honored on March 14 with a dedication ceremony at Sheridan's Career Technical Education Center (CTEC), 540 SE Jefferson Street. Barbara is a 1955 Sheridan High School graduate and Oregon's first female governor.

After announcing the new facility's official name, "Barbara Roberts Career Technical Education Center," Superintendent Dorie Vickery welcomed the many dignitaries present for this history-making moment in Sheridan. She recognized the Sheridan School Board, Mayor Aaron Baer, and City Council members Dennis McElroy, Jim Buckles, Lucy Hebert, and Sandy Walker; Yamhill County Board of Commissioners Board Chair Lindsav Berschauer. and Commissioners Mary Starrett and Casey Kulla; Polk County Commissioner Jeremy Gordon; Marion County Commissioner Kevin Cameron; Representatives Ron Noble and David Gomberg; Senator Betsy Johnson; and State Treasurer Tobias Read.

Mayor Aaron Baer welcomed the 130 guests on behalf of the City of Sheridan. Aaron thanked Dorie for her dedication to the CTEC project and Barbara Roberts for her many contributions to the community over the years.

Dorie thanked Emerald Flash Consulting, Willamette Workforce Partnership, SEDCOR, and Chemeketa Community College for their considerable support. She also thanked the development team that meets every oth-

#### er Friday.

Dorie said the idea for CTEC started when Larry Deibel, a school board member, walked into her office and said, "We need to buy that building." This conversation led to realtor Josh Kay, who recommended Dorie contact Rep. David Gomberg to get on "the list." She said this was followed by a couple of nerve-wracking presentations to Oregon's Ways and Means Committee. Dorie recalled that she and her husband were at a conference in Seaside when she received the phone call saving the district had received the \$1.9 million to purchase the facility.

Dorie said, "I can tell you that on the sidewalk in Seaside, the superintendent was doing the 'Snoopy Dance."

Rep. Gomberg spoke next, saying that Barbara Roberts is proof that

you can graduate from Sheridan High School and do anything. He said, "When I received Dorie's initial call about the CTEC project, I told her, "I'm in. I get it." Gomberg believes that career technical education will help prepare students for good-paying jobs that are important in the community; it will create a sustainable future for students and their potential employers down the road; it will make the community better, stronger, and more resilient. So it's a good thing."

Dorie replied, "We'll need about \$2 million."

Rep. Gomberg said to Dorie, "Let's go to work on this." They filled out the forms, submitted the paperwork, and started the legislative process. They made it through the Ways and Means process and then waited and worked the process behind the scenes, which meant making daily calls and talking with people who could help.

Then Rep. Gomberg got the good news and called the superintendent to tell her they were approved for Sheridan's 'whole ask.' He said that was a good day at the Capital.

"I believe it will make a huge difference to the students in this community, families in this community, and the future of this community," he said.

Not long after closing on the property purchase, Dorie saw an NPR article about truck driving. She learned that the only high school CTE truck driving program in the nation was in Patterson, Calif. So she sent the NPR article to Emerald Flash Consultants, which resulted in a Zoom meeting with the CTE teacher at Patterson High School, the head of Next-Generation Trucking (a nonprofit organization), and several other people.

"It was exciting to see the industry need," said Dorie. She considered that if Sheridan CTEC went with an auto tech pathway, students could learn heavy equipment operation, truck driving, and diesel mechanics.

She thought it would fit CTEC's criteria. It would make good use of the facilities and prepare students for high-demand jobs that pay a living wage. And it would not replicate other CTE programs offered regionally.


Dorie also learned that the State of Oregon had opened up CTE Revitalization Grants. She scrambled to meet their deadline, and with help from SEDCOR and others, submitted the grant application with 12 partnership letters. As a result, the School District received this grant for \$125,000. Moving forward, Dorie said, United Way made a significant donation and asked how they could help. That donation led to BRIC Architecture's development of the CTEC plans.

A site plan and a proposed floor plan for this 24,000 sq. ft. facility were on display at the event.

Rep. Gomberg again took the podium, saying it is wholly appropriate to recognize and honor Barbara during Women's History Month. He noted her critical

impact on the history of Oregon and, of course, Sheridan.

Gomberg said he first met Barbara in 1980 when they were delegates to the Democratic National Convention. Because of her charisma and respect from all the other members of the delegation, she was the person our national delegation asked to stand up and deliver the Oregon vote to the country.

She got her start in public service, working to secure a better education for her special needs son. She became a nonpaid volunteer citizen lobbyist in Salem who worked every day to change the laws.

She was elected to the school board in Parkrose and later for the community college board at Mt. Hood Community College.

She was appointed to the Multnomah County Commission and, in 1980, was elected to the Oregon Legislature.

At the end of her first term, the other caucus members selected her to be the Majority Leader in the Oregon House. Two years later, she ran for Secretary of State and won. A Democrat had not been elected Secretary of State in Oregon for more than 100 years.

After six years in the Secretary of State's office, she ran for governor and became the first woman governor in the history of Oregon.

After being governor, secretary of state, and working in the Oregon House, you would think that she would quietly retire and fade away into the Oregon rain, but that's not the Barbara Roberts way. After leaving the governor's office, she taught at Harvard and Oregon State University. She continued to be engaged in the issues she was concerned with and the organizations she supported. She also wrote three books.

"Barbara Roberts is likely the most respected and revered elder statesman in Oregon," said Gomberg, as he welcomed Barbara to the podium.

After acknowledging Samantha Bagby, Sheridan School Board, for building and delivering the new podium used at the dedication, Barbara greeted the crowd. Barbara said it demonstrates that people step forward and make things happen when things need to be done in small towns.

She told the group she learned that in Sheridan, saying, "If you want to have a parade, you build a float, and then you ride on it. That is the Sheridan way.

"When I moved to Portland, they didn't tell me things were different there, so I kept doing things. "At Sheridan High school, we also learned to type and take shorthand, I don't know what we were supposed to do with that, but we did it. Then, there was, of course, the home economics program to prepare us homemakers for the future.

"Today we will prepare our youths for the workforce, for jobs, trades, and careers we couldn't even imagine in the 1950s.

"We couldn't have thought of the things that will be taught here and learned here," she said. Barbara thanked all contributors to the CTEC project and gave an overview of the classes (pathways) to be offered.

She acknowledged her classmates - from 67 years ago, in attendance at the dedication.

She wanted everyone to know that she never, never, never drives past Sheridan. She always drives through. "We have to go across the bridge and look at everything; we have to look at my old house on Sheridan Road. I just can't drive past." And now, she said, "I have one more stop at the Barbara Roberts Career Technical School."

Barbara concluded, "Thank you for this tremendous honor. I am thrilled; I am so thrilled. And, thank you for welcoming me home."



"Big Checks" were presented at the dedication representing the \$1.9 million received from the Oregon State Legislature; a \$125,000 CTE Revitalization Grant; and a \$74,000 grant from United Way, for a total of \$2,099,000.

#### Gordon Robert Dalgity Nov. 2, 1941-Feb. 20, 2022

On the afternoon of February 20, 2022, Gordon Robert Dalgity left behind all earthly struggles when his Heavenly Father called him home. Once there, he was welcomed by his Savior, his beloved parents, Inez and Bob, his sister, Glenna, his grandson, Cody, his nephew, Andy, stepsons Scott and Troy, and so many other loved ones who'd gone before him.

Gordon was born at home in Romoland, Calif., during World War II. He and his mom developed an extra special bond during that time as it was just the two of them until after the war was over. That closeness never waned over the years.


Post-war, life returned to normal and five siblings eventually entered the picture starting with his sister, Marilyn, who was 5 years younger than him. Next came twin brothers, John and Willie, sister, Glenna, then brother, James. They all grew up in a home which is still in the family to this day. They were a closely knit family with a profound love for one another, and each of them had an incredible respect and love for their parents. Gordon was always known as the cool older brother, especially to his male siblings, and later in life, his legend lived on through stories told to a passel of nieces and nephews.

His first marriage was in 1962 to Gloria Skyberg and produced two kids, Kristy and Tim, whom he dearly loved. Gordon and Gloria raised their kids in Yucaipa, and eventually settled in a house down the street from Gordon's childhood home, in a wholesome neighborhood where his kids were able to grow up safe and loved, making lifelong memories there.

During his life, Gordon was a gas station attendant, a forestry service worker, and as he was working at the Yucaipa water company, he decided he wanted to become a truck driver like his uncle John. For many years he spent days and nights on the road, traveling thousands of miles. Eventually, tired of being away from home, he transitioned from truck driver at Bassett Mirror Company to the plant superintendent there.

He finished his work life as a shuttle bus driver at Spirit Mountain Casino in Oregon.

He left California in 1996 to spend more time with his growing grandkids, Ashley, Cody,



and Shawn McDaniel. He was a great dad but he was an excellent grandpa. He spent as much time with them as he could, including going on family camping trips with them and even taking them to school each morning. They knew they could go to their grandpa for anything. He never let them down. In 2001, his son, Tim, and daughter-in-law, Melissa, made him a grandpa once again with the arrival of their daughter, Grace. He made sure to make frequent trips to California so Grace could know him and he could know and love her.

In 1998, he met his beloved Gladys Pond, and they married in 2002. He and Gladys might have found each other later in life, but they were meant to be. They made their home in Grand Ronde and Gordon finally got his dream of having land to tend to. He spent hours on his tractor, and often Gladys would have to go out and remind him to come in for a meal. Their sweet dog, Ali, completed their happy home. Ali was devoted to her "dad" until the day he went to heaven.

His union with Gladys made him stepfather to her four kids, Scott, Troy, Rick, and Sherene, as well as adding 11 grandkids and 17 great-grandkids to the mix. Those kids all loved him dearly and he loved them.

Gordon was love of God and country, candy orange slices, anything lemon, and homemade tacos. He was country drives and quiet time at home, plaid shirts and Levi's. He was mixed nuts... the kind you had to crack open... and a pristine car and lawn.

As his time to go neared, Gordon didn't worry about himself but instead about not being able to be here to take care of those he loved. He was assured that he had done everything he needed to do in this life and completed every task.

Betty Ann Siplinger of Sheridan died March 13, 2022, in Salem, Oregon.

Betty was born July 8, 1931, in Detroit Lakes, Minn., to Henry and Joy Flewell. A few years later, the family welcomed another daughter, Janet, and moved to Oregon while Betty was still in grade school.

Betty graduated from Parkrose High School and started working at Emanuel Hospital as a ward clerk in the pediatric ward. While working in the hospital, Betty met Lance Siplinger, and they were married on April 19, 1952. You could always count on the Siplingers to feed the deer and raccoons that came around.

In April of 2013, Lance went home to heaven. While Betty missed her husband of 61 years, she carried on with a busy social and church life. # **CITY MANAGER'S REPORT**

FROM THE DESK OF WILLAMINA **CITY MANAGER KENNA WEST** 

Success usually comes to those who are too busy to be looking for it. -- Henry David Thoreau

It's been extraordinarily busy on the governance side of our beautiful city since my last column! As many may know, the City of Willamina has con-

tracted with the West Valley Fire District to manage the administration of the Fire District and the Confederated Tribes of Grand Ronde has contracted with them to provide Fire and EMS services. Through these contracts, our wonderful community continues to receive outstanding service from the West Valley Fire District!

However, the staff at the City are busier than ever providing support to two separate agencies! Below is a summary of recent decisions and actions by those agencies:

#### City Council

 Received an update from Hampton Lumber on current forest, business, and employment related matters:

•Adopted an updated Transportation System Plan. Of note, this TSP provides the City with the ability to move forward with important improvements on our streets and sidewalks so our children can safely walk/bike/roll to and from school. This also provides city management with the ability to apply for grants for the construction of those safety improvements.

Adopted a supplemental budget;

- •Adopted an updated Capital Improvement Plan;
- •Renamed the southern end of "B" Street to "Skyberg Way";
- •Adopted the 2022 City Council Goals.

Those goals include

- (1) Continued focus on upgrading and improving city infrastructure
- (2) codification of the city's municipal code,

(3) continued focus on parks projects

- (4) continued focus on economic development
- (5) continued focus on youth opportunities

(6) continued focus on street safety (bike/pedestrian pathways, lighting, etc.)

#### West Valley Fire Board

City management and staff are moving forward on taking over the administration of the West Valley Fire District. It will take time to fully develop and create an organizational process that can be utilized by WVFD once the City's contract has ended; however, the WVFD Board has done an extraordinary job in working together to help create an opportunity for a strong future!

Below is some of the work that was completed at their last meeting:

• Approved and signed "Thank You" letters to those county commissioners who took a personal interest in the WVFD situation and supported the fire district as it worked to transition through the recent difficulties:

• Changed the regular monthly meeting date to the THIRD THURSDAY of the month. The Board moved the meeting date to the third Thursday to provide more opportunities for our community to attend both the City Council and the Fire District meetings. They were previously held in the same week which made it difficult from many of our community to attend both meetings.

• Provided authority to the City Manager/WVFD Contract Administrative Manager to handle a number of operational matters including

(1) contract with the Mid-Willamette Valley Council of Governments to provide budget services to the WVFD

(2) loan equipment (in coordination with CTGR) to other fire agencies

(3) negotiate the purchase by other agencies (or return) of equipment currently retained by those agencies

(4) coordinate cleaning services for the WVFD

(5) authorize supportive advertising in the local news publication, and

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(6) assist with the replacement of the flags at the WVFD fire hall.

•The Fire Board heard from the Confederated Tribes of Grand Ronde Emergency Services Director regarding on-going service for our community. Of note, the CTGR crews have been able to reduce response time to 7.5 minutes.... that is astounding! Thank you CTGR for providing such amazing service to our community!

It's been a busy and productive month for both your City Council and Fire Board. Both governing bodies continue to move forward and work together on behalf of their communities.

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
#### It's All About Daffodils This Saturday in Amity

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

### Willamina Chamber Pledges Donation to Pump Track Project

Mayor Bob Burr, speaking at last week's Willamina Chamber meeting, asked if everyone is familiar with the pump track in the plans for Willamina.

He said David Hampton of Hampton Lumber came to council a year or so ago after driving through Redmond, where he noticed their pump track, which is a place where kids can ride BMX-style bikes. Bob explained that, rather than doing a lot of peddling, riders pump their handlebars and use their muscles to get up and over the hills and around the track.

"Rita and I stopped by the pump track in Redmond one night and noticed there were all kinds of kids, families, young kids, too. So it just looks like a really neat family thing that the community could do," said Bob.

David Hampton paid for the original engineering study on the pump track for Willamina, and Hampton Lumber has agreed to provide supplies and a lot of the construction.

City Manager Kenna West is working on grants for the pump track that will be located in Oaken Hills Park, near the school. The pump track would be in the grassy area at the park. Plans call for a three-sided covered area with benches and bike racks. Lighting and restrooms are included in the plans.

Bob said, "What we need are matching funds. I'd like to see the Chamber donate \$1,000 toward this project. That will help Kenna get grant funding because it shows that the community is involved."

Willamina Library Director Sarah Frost added, "The pump track is a very exciting project and much needed. Once the pump track is available, the library has plans to incorporate some form of literacy down at the pump track, adding walking stories around the track. So, yes, we're eager for that opportunity."

Superintendent Carrie Zimbrick said, "There is an opportunity right now to apply for funding through Oregon Department of Ag. They've reserved \$50 million for community programs that serve kids. This money cannot be funneled through schools. It's specifically for organizations and communities that provide services for kids. I sent the information to Kenna and Sarah, but the application hasn't come out yet; but as soon as it does, I will be sure to send it to Kenna. I'd be happy to help complete the application piece."

Bob added, "In talking to Kenna, she's definitely going to be applying for grants. But, it's really important for those grants that we have some matching funds. That's the reason I'd like to see Willamina Chamber contribute \$1,000 toward the project."

Chamber members unanimously agreed to make the donation. Others who wish to donate to this project can call the city manager for more information.

### WHAT ONE BOY DID OTHERS MAY DO

#### Prize-winning boy in industrial club work tells how he did it.

Alfred Wilson, the 12-year-old Polk County boy who has interested himself in industrial club work and been so successful in potato culture and in securing both county and state prizes, is here shown with one of his prize exhibits. He is very fortunate in having a father who takes a great interest in him and his club work and gives him much encouragement and helpful suggestions as well as furnishing him sufficient ground for his potatoes. The following is his letter of experience as just published in the red book for the 1922 of Club Work of Oregon Boys and Girls:

"I am twelve years old and live on a farm two and one-half miles from Sheridan just over the line in Polk County. My club work began in 1920 and I won first in Polk County on both my potato and garden projects, however, I received nothing at the state. This year I took up both the projects again and I feel I have done remarkably well, having won first prize on my potatoes in both state and county fairs and third on gardening at the state fair and second at the county fair.

"I believe seed selection to be the most important part in growing potatoes. Therefore, I really begin my potato work a year in advance in hill selection. This year I went through my field at blooming time and staked 1,500 hills that showed strong vigorous growth, uniform shape and free from vorietal mixture. In October I dug these hills and only selected tubers from those that were heavy yielding, uni-form in shape, and true to variety form. This next spring I will go through this lot at treating time and select tubers only that are sound and free from Rhizoctonia, vorietal, scab, wild, etc.

Wilt is the disease I am most interested in now as the other diseases have been pretty well done away with through other inspections. To discover this I am obliged to cut a thin slice off of the stem and if it shows a brown ring I discard it as it is pretty likely to be wilt. I always treat my seed in a solution of 'corrosive sublimate' using four

ounces of sublimate to thirty gallons of water. I let them soak for two hours and then spread them out in a light place to dry and green up. I like to do this treating about two weeks before planting time. In cutting my seed I just cut lengthwise between the eyes. Then I cut two or three eyes to the piece, aiming to have the cut as far away from the eyes as possible. I plant in rows three and one-half feet apart and plant the potatoes sixteen inches apart, one piece to the hill. I aim to harrow my ground twice between planting and coming up, and hoe and cultivate every two weeks until blooming time, when I lay them aside. I have grown this year six varieties: Netted Gem, New York Rurals, Burbanks, Carmen No. 3, White Rose and the Earliest of All.

"I won a high honor this year which I am sure would never have been possible but for the aid of such men such as H.C. Seymour, J.E. Caliban, Josiah Wills, Prof. A.G. Bouquet, and Papa and also Mama. I am greatly interested in this club work and expect to continue until I am a man. I thank all my kind friends for their assistance."

The county health nurse will be in Sheridan on Wednesday, May 3, at which time there will be held a meeting in the city hall at 2 o'clock in the afternoon to consult with committees from various city organizations regarding the holding of baby clinics here. When arrangements for the clinic are made, notice will be given to the public. And it is expected local physicians will be present to lend their aid to anything beneficial to the health and conditions.

#### Whitney Boys Will Give Concert

The Sheridan Whitney Boys Chorus, assisted by some twenty boys from the Portland chorus and probably as many from McMinnville, will give a sacred concert Sunday forenoon at 11 o'clock in the Sheridan Opera House. The churches will unite in a union service at this time that all may be able to attend and listen to one of the most remarkable choruses ever given here.

It is expected that one hundred or more of the Whitney boys will take part under the direction of Prof. Whitney and the program presented will be a most pleasing one. In the afternoon the boys will go to McMinnville, and being joined by some from Newberg, will give a concert there at three o'clock, and later will go to Newberg where an evening concert will be held.

All are invited to attend and hear the boys sing.

The boys will have to be transported to McMinnville at 1:30 after lunch at the Methodist Church, and all parties having autos and willing to donate their services will confer a favor by doing so and notify either Mrs. Geo. W. Epley or Mrs. C.H. Knickerbocker, the committee on transportation.
