The Fourth of July has been a federal holiday in the United States since 1941, but the tradition of Independence Day celebrations goes back to the 18th century and the American Revolution.



Berneice Newbill enjoys a drive with Willamina Mayor Bob Burr. 101-Year-Old Berneice Newbill Named Willamina's 4th of July Grand Marshal

Willamina is honoring longtime resident Berneice Newbill by naming her grand marshal of this year's Fourth of July parade.

101-year-old Berneice was born June 26, 1921, in Brainerd, Mo., to Marie and Elry Cain.

She and her family moved to Willamina in 1939. With no homes available for rent, her aunt and uncle, Clarence and Amanda Green, remodeled their chicken coop for them. Her Uncle Clarence even built a bathroom on the back of their house for the family to use.

Berneice's father found work at the brick plant, later moving on to work at the plywood mill.

Berneice joined her cousin Lynn Green at Willamina High School, graduating there in 1940.

After graduation, she worked as a housekeeper before going to work at the dime store. She also worked at the post office.

Berneice married Clifford Lord in 1942 and moved to Stockton, Calif. They'd been there about three years when Clifford was sent overseas with the Air Force. Berneice moved back to Willamina during that time.

Berneice and Clifford had two children, Louella and Larry.

After Clifford died, Berneice married George "Merle" Newbill in 1960. With George came three more kids Berneice says are "her own."

She worked at the Willamina department store for 35 years.

"I enjoyed the people, they were good people, and I loved them all," said Berneice thinking back about her working years.

She also reminisced about hunting parties and spending time with family. "Those were the best of times," she said.

Berneice's cousin Lynn is right there with her at age 101. They try their best every year to celebrate their birthdays together.

This year, in addition to serving as parade grand marshal, Berneice will celebrate her 101 years with an open house for all friends and family.

When asked about her secret for living a long, full life, she said with a laugh, "moderation."





A Message from the **Sheridan Superintendent**

Sheridan Families,

Summer is finally here! And with that comes our three week summer enrichment program at FCS and academic credit opportunities at SHS. Both programs are supported through grant funds and are a great learning opportunity for students!

Summer also brings time for our staff to rest and reset. This year was far more challenging than I think anyone anticipated. We started with COVID protocols of face masks and social distancing, along with having to contact trace every case and ask students to quarantine. By the time we made it to November, cases had subsided. January brought more COVID cases and a staff shortage. Our students in grades 4-8 did a fantastic job going to online learning, a team effort to keep the district open.

Spring break brought another set of changes with local control. For the first time since starting as superintendent, the district started to feel more normal with a return to larger events such as field trips and music concerts. I greatly appreciate the flexibility of staff and parents as we navigated so many changes during the 2021-22 school year.

Looking ahead, we are diligently working towards a November voter approval of a \$16 million dollar bond levy. The funds will provide improved safety and security features at FCS and SHS.

We will remodel the old gym building at FCS, improving the choir and band rooms, locker rooms and gym. The SHS old gym will also be renovated to a fully functioning gym. Through this community effort, there will be four full gymnasiums, capable of hosting multiple tournaments and community events.

I hope our community will pause to take a deep breath, enjoy the summer weather and family time. Sheridan is a beautiful place to live, grow and learn!



Willamina's Awe-Inspiring Fireworks Have Captivated Audiences for Years

Willamina commemorates the Fourth of July with a variety of festive activities, but the town's fireworks display is a hands down West Valley favorite. Thousands of community members and visitors come together to watch this spectacular show in which blazing pops of color light up the night sky.

This year will be no exception. Live music featuring the Forest Grove Outlaws will begin at 7:30 p.m. and play until the fireworks begin at dusk at the West Valley Community Campus.

Smithsonian Magazine reports that pyrotechnics displays have been astounding audiences all over the world for centuries. As early as 200 B.C. fireworks were developed in China to first scare off mountain men and later evil spirits. However, soon the Chinese incorporated "fire drug," essentially saltpeter, sulfur and charcoal (a recipe for gunpowder), into their cultural celebrations. Early Chinese fireworks consisted of the gunpowder mixture stuffed in bamboo tubes.

Fireworks have evolved since then, but by and large they're still comprised of the same main parts: an oxidizer, fuel and chemical mixture to produce desired colors. Fireworks are a wonder to behold when they are part of professional displays, and their history can be interesting as well.

• While the Chinese invented fireworks, Italians helped finetune them. Italians are credited with designing aerial shells and figuring out that certain metallic powders could create specific colors.

• The largest consistent fireworks show in the United States is the Macy's show in New York over the Hudson River on July 4th. More than three million people view the show, which includes more than 40,000 shells.

• The Walt Disney Company is the largest consumer of fireworks in the world, according to Business Insider. It also is the second largest purchaser of explosive devices, behind only the U.S. Department of Defense.

High-energy metal compounds like copper chloride emit colors like violet and blue in fireworks. Low-energy compounds like strontium chloride produce orange and red.

• The pattern fireworks will produce in the sky is determined by how stars are arranged inside of the shell. Stars are the cubes or spheres that contain the chemicals needed for the firework reaction.

 \cdot Mental Floss notes that "day-time fireworks" are made up of colored smoke and can be seen during the day.

 Individuals who are employed in the manufacture of fireworks must wear cotton clothing, including undergarments, as synthetic clothing can create sparks capable of detonating fireworks, according to Alamo Fireworks.

 Various fireworks shapes have their own names. They may be called willows, palms, crossettes, horsetails, rings, cakes, and more.



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



"Bang Up" Old-Fashioned Fourth




