State To Families: File A Return To Claim Tax Credits

For low to moderate income Oregon families, filing a tax return is the key step toward claiming a series of refundable tax credits that could mean thousands of dollars in their pockets.

Four key tax credits can provide valuable financial assistance to families in Oregon, if they file a tax return.

• The federal Child Tax Credit (CTC) helps families with qualifying children get a tax break.

• The federal Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC) is a refundable credit available to lowto moderate-income workers and families. Qualifying criteria are available on the IRS website.

• Taxpayers who qualify for the federal EITC can also claim the Oregon earned income credit (EIC). A new law passed by the Oregon Legislature makes the Oregon EIC available to taxpayers using a federal Individual Tax Identification Number (ITIN) rather than a Social Security number. See the department's website for more information on this new law.

• The Working Family Household and Dependent Care Credit (WFHDC) is a tax credit that helps low- to moderate-income families pay for the care of their dependents while they're working or looking for work.

All four of these tax credits for families are fully or partially refundable, meaning the portion of the credit that is more than what the taxpayer owes can be refunded to them. Even individuals and families who don't owe any tax can claim these credits. But only if they file a tax return.

Filing help is available:

The agency website has information on several options to file a return for free , including free guided tax preparation available from several companies for taxpayers that meet income requirements. The IRS's Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) and Tax Counseling for the Elderly (TCE) programs offer free basic tax return preparation to qualified individuals. Low to moderate income taxpayers can also access preparation services through AARP and CASH Oregon. United Way also offers free tax help

through their MyFreeTaxes program. More information on these options is available on the department's website. E-filing is the fastest way for a taxpayer to get their refund. On average, taxpayers who e-file their returns and request their refund via direct deposit receive their refund 34 days sooner than taxpayers who mail their paper returns and request paper refund checks.

To check the status of your refund or make payments, visit the Department of Revenue's website. You can also call 800-356-4222 toll-free from an Oregon prefix (English or Spanish) or 503-378-4988 in Salem and outside Oregon. For TTY (hearing or speech impaired), they accept all relay calls.

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A MESSAGE FROM THE WILLAMINA SCHOOL DISTRICT

At the February School Board meeting, I presented our Integrated Plan for public comment. Although we did not have many public comments, it was an opportunity to share our plan. The Integrated Plan combines six separate state programs into one reporting and planning process. The Integrated Plan replaces the former requirement known as the Continuous Improvement Plan.

The six programs include:

• The Student Investment Account (SIA) with funds specifically targeted for student health and safety, increased instructional time, well-rounded learning experiences, and reduced class size.

• The High School Success Fund (HSS) - formerly known as Measure 98 - with funds dedicated to improved graduation rates, expanded career and technical education(CTE), reducing drop out rates, and expanding advanced coursework and/ or college credit courses.

• CTE/Perkins Pathway with funds specifically earmarked for CTE programs of study

• Early Indicator and Intervention Systems funds targeted to create data systems used to drive intervention models for instruction related to core curriculum.

• Everyday Matter, no specific funds are allocated for this program. However, the Oregon Department of Education provides free resources to districts to enhance attendance improvement initiatives.

• Every Student Succeeds Act, no direct funds are allocated to this piece. It is intended to provide the framework for school district accountability. Outlining the key indicators in measuring school improvement; attendance rates, third-grade reading scores, third-11th-grade growth and achievement in math and reading, 4-year graduation rates, and 9th-grade on-track rates.

Based on various surveys and community feedback, we have determined our priorities for this funding will be for improving student health and safety, increasing well-rounded educational experiences in k-12, enhancing our CTE programs, and improving student outcomes, specifically in math and reading through a guaranteed viable curriculum and an enhanced tiered intervention process.

Most of the funding will be spent directly on staffing; Mental Health Clinicians, Behavior Support Specialists, CTE staff, Family Advocates focused on improving attendance, and After School Programs. Some funds will be dedicated to curriculum aligned to state standards, professional learning opportunities for staff, and expanding innovative practices k-12.



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1 1/2 pounds russet potatoes 2 tablespoons canola oil

1 cup chopped onion

2 carrots, peeled and finely diced

- 2 cloves garlic, minced
- 1 1/2 pounds ground lamb

1 3/4 teaspoons kosher salt

3/4 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper

- 2 teaspoons tomato paste
- 1 cup chicken broth

2 teaspoons chopped fresh rosemary

1 teaspoon chopped fresh thyme 1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce 1/4 cup half-and-half

4 tablespoons unsalted butter 1 large egg yolk

1/2 cup corn kernels, fresh or frozen

1/2 cup English peas, fresh or frozen

1. Heat oven to 400 F.

2. Peel the potatoes and cut them into 1/2-inch dice. Put them in a medium saucepan and cover with cold water. Set said pan over high heat, cover and bring to a boil. Uncover, drop the heat to maintain a simmer, and cook until tender, 10 to 15 minutes.

3. Heat the oil in an 11-inch saute pan over medium-high heat until shimmering. Add the onion and carrots and saute



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just until they begin to take on color, 3 to 4 minutes. Add the garlic and stir to combine. Add the meat, salt and pepper, and cook until browned and cooked through, approximately 3 minutes.

4. Sprinkle the meat with the flour, toss to coat, and continue to cook for another minute. Add the tomato paste, broth, Worcestershire sauce, rosemary, and thyme and stir to combine. Bring to a boil, then decrease the heat to low, cover, and simmer slowly until the sauce is thickened slightly, 10 to 12 minutes.


5. Meanwhile, combine the half-and-half and butter in a microwave-safe container and microwave until warmed through, about 35 seconds.

6. Drain the potatoes and return them to the saucepan. Mash the potatoes (a masher is an excellent tool for this, though a hand mixer will do), then add the hot half-and-half mixture, as well as the salt and pepper. Mash to smoothness, then stir in the egg yolk.

7. Add the corn and peas to the meat mixture and spread evenly in a 7-by-11-inch glass baking dish. Top with the mashed potatoes, starting around the edges to create a seal to prevent the mixture from bubbling over, and smooth the top with a rubber spatula. Place on a half sheet pan lined with parchment paper on the middle rack of the oven and bake for 25 minutes, or just until the potatoes begin to brown. Remove to a cooking rack and let rest for at least 15 minutes before serving.



Tony Coleman, His Llfe, Love for Music and Passion for the Community and Arts

Tony Coleman (T.C.) has had an illustrious career touring the world with B.B. King, Otis Clay, Bobby Blue Bland, Johnnie Taylor, Albert King, Albert Collins, Etta James, James Cotton, Katie Webster, Z.Z. Hill, O.V. Wright, and Buddy Guy.

T.C. and his wife Sabian moved to Sheridan about two years ago.

He and all seven Three King Tribute band members will be playing Wet Season Music at 7 p.m. Saturday, March 18, at West Valley Community Campus in Willamina.

When asked why he chose to move to Sheridan, he said," I've been living in Tigard for 20-something years, and we decided we wanted to have a place with some land and quiet. We found it out here and bought ten acres. It's quiet like it is really quiet out here. It's very relaxing. You know, the calming effect of not being in the city, no traffic, not a lot of uptight type people here. I grew up in a small town called Kissimmee, Florida. It's right next to Orlando, Disney World. It was one of those places where I would dream about traveling the world, And when I think about it, most of

the famous musicians and artists in the world are from small towns. So these kids should be inspired to achieve. We say if you believe you can achieve, and something about when you grow up in a small community, a lot of times you feel like, well, there's no hope for me ever to become something successful like that. Well, that's not true. It can happen, You just have to stay focused and keep believing in yourself, and you have to work at it, and it'll happen. I have visions to contribute to being part of the community, I sit out there, and when I'm quiet, I start thinking, there could be a cool music week where I don't necessarily wanna have my big artist friends give a concert, but more something that is strictly for the community to get involved with, to support some of the youth in the arts, where there's painting, music and what have you. It could be like a little event one weekend where the community can support kids that would like to be artists or musicians or whatever. Because as I said, when you're from a small place, you dream, but you go, nobody really cares about that, and I think the community can inspire and support youth. Kids are dancing and singing and painting. The world needs the arts. The arts is something to take people away from all their work-related things, just to relax, you know."

Discussing how he became involved with Wet Season, he responded."Well, I met Recca Maze, and she told me about the campus and gave me a tour of the campus, and I was like, sure, I'd love to participate in playing, you know, bring my guys out here and play. I think it'd be great. Then, of course, when Amanda got the position, we spoke, and so here we are. I'm here, and I still tour, but if there's anything I can do to contribute to helping it grow and bringing bring music and art into the community, I want to do that. We're so blessed. I'm happy to do that.'

TC talked about his musician "My dad King Colefather, man, created a dance called The Mashed Potato with James Brown. You probably saw Michael Jackson making those moves, and a lot of people, the dance was famous. He created that dance with James Brown, and he was the M-C at the Apollo Theater in Harlem New York. So he introduced a lot of the Southern soul RMB artists to the world up in New York. He and BB King were really good friends, and I think, and once B.B. realized that he had hired his friend's son, he stayed on me. It was like working for my dad or something."

He spoke about becoming a drummer, "as long as I can re-

member being alive, every time I hear music, and I hear the drum beat, my hands hit the rhythm, and I, I get excited doing that. It's just something that was always in me, and I always had a dream if I see somebody on television or listen to a record, I would think one day I want to do that."

He spoke about how he met the Johnny Wheels Band. "It really was a coincidence, but, one year, I was judging to send a local blues band to Memphis, and I picked their band, and I thought they were great, and I went up and met him, and then he said "I remember you B.B. played at the casino. You guys played two nights at the casino, and after one of your shows, I was playing at the bar at the casino, and you walked in and with Linda Hornbuckle, and he said, "Wow, there's BB King's drummer, I recognize him." I said to Johnny, "Hey, you guys mind if I sit in with you? I did that. And then, several years later, I'm voting for him. I didn't know where Johnny Wheels lived, and when we got this property, Johnny called me. He said I heard you moved to Sheridan. I'm right around the corner. I said, really? I didn't know that. So we get together, and I've sat in with him and stuff sometimes."

Editors note: It was a pleasure to sit and talk with TC. His passion for community was inspiring. I look forward to getting to know Tony more, and seeing the positivity he can share with our community and how he can inspire music and arts to our children.



Ingredients To Make Your Own Beer

Millions of people are interested in brewing their own beer at home. Craft brewing may start as a hobby or curiosity, and once successful, turn into something individuals do again and again. While it's possible to eventually make money by brewing, most people engage this hobby for the pride that ensues after sipping their own ales, pilsners and stouts and sharing them with friends and family.

Those ready to engage in home brewing will be happy to learn that there are plenty of resources available for getting started. Even with a simple set-up, it's possible to brew a decent beer. Here are the items to consider. -Brew pot: Home brewers will need something in which to boil the wort, which will eventually become the beer. This vessel should be made of aluminum. stainless steel or enamel-coated aluminum and be large enough to handle the size batch of beer. -Fermenter: Fermenter vessels will hold the beer while it is going through the fermentation process. Food-grade plastic buckets or glass carboys are options. The fermenter should seal tightly to keep out air and microorganisms, but have a space for an airlock that will allow the carbon dioxide to escape.

-Tubing and siphon: A siphon and vinyl tubing is needed to rack the beer from one fermenter to the next or from the fermenter to bottles.

-Hydrometer: A hydrometer, according to Beer Tola, a resource on brewing and beverages, is a tool that measures the density of liquid, known as specific gravity. This helps one calculate when fermentation is complete as well as the alcohol content of the finished product.

Sanitation is essential when brewing, and all equipment needs to be sanitized correctly so that the beer is not introduced to microorganisms that can affect taste or even the fermentation process. Only the yeast used for fermentation should be present. Many experienced brewers say that sanitation is the most important part of the process. Brew shops sell specialized chemicals for sanitizing all equipment, but some home brewers also stand by boiling water for cleaning gear. The basics of beer recipes include hops, grains, water, and yeast. When the hops and grains are boiled down, one has wort, which essentially is sugar water. The yeast will feed on this sweetened water to produce carbon dioxide through fermentation

The beer-making process is one any beer lover can explore. And with so many beer kits for sale with step-by-step instructions, any initial foray into brewing beer can be successful.

Their slogan for 1953 is "working together for world understanding.' More than 25,000 boys and girls in Oregon are enrolled in 4H club work according to Burton Hutton, state 4H club leader. The 4H Clover will be much in evidence throughout Oregon and the nation during this week. There will be door window displays, showing the nature and objectives of the 4-H club work. Special radio programs will be given.

The most important projects in Oregon are livestock, clothing, food, preparation, home management, flower and garden clubs, and health clubs. 

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
