## Willamina and Sheridan's Nutrition Director Receives Regional Award



The national, non-profit School Nutrition Association (SNA) has named Lynne Shore, Nutrition Services Director for Willamina and Sheridan School Districts, Oregon, the Western region Director of the Year. The award recognizes the extraordinary contributions of school nutrition directors who manage effective school meal programs providing healthy, appetizing meals to students.

Students are reaping the benefits of a nutrition program that Lynne Shore has spent more than a decade turning around. Shore took several steps to accomplish financial self-sufficiency while enhancing the district's cafeterias to be positive and inviting for students. She trains staff in customer service and encourages them to know students' names. It is a regular occurrence to see staff members playing music and dancing with students during lunch. The positive impact has made lasting impressions, with former students returning to district schools as parents, sharing memories of the kindness of their nutrition staff.

Shore instituted a Breakfast in the Classroom program, an after-school snack program and applied to be a Community Eligibility Provision (CEP) district to ensure all students have access to free healthy school meals through the National School Lunch and Breakfast Programs. Shore has applied for multiple grants to help improve the program's bottom line while bringing much-needed elements to improve students' experience in her cafeterias, including salad bars, milk coolers and point-ofsale kiosks.

Shore plans school events to spread fun nutritional information without the students even realizing they are learning, such as kid chef competitions and student cooking classes.

Working with local vendors and community partners, Shore teaches the students about where their food comes from, bringing in local farmers for meet and greets. Students ask guestions, take photos and learn farm facts through games, creating lasting positive impressions. The next project for Shore is a farmer's market at the district's schools. Funding from a grant will allow the students to shop for food for their families.

Shore's impact on the community is also felt outside the school walls. She volunteers to help with community events and she marches in the parade to promote the summer lunch program.

Lynne Shore's actions have made a positive impact on the children in the community. Her dedication to their nutritional well-being is evident in all she does during the school day and after school," said SNA President Lori Adkins, MS, SNS, CHE. Belonging to the School Nutrition Association is important to Shore; she's served on local and national boards. She conducts annual staff training and serves as a mentor for several area school districts. She has integrated several School Nutrition magazine articles during her annual trainings, reading articles and

quizzing staff on the training.

The Director of the Year Award was created to recognize school nutrition directors who exhibit an extraordinary commitment to their school meal programs. The directors are responsible for maintaining the quality of the program through student interaction, menu planning and a commitment to serving nutritious, tasty and well-balanced school meals. Through effective oversight of all aspects of food service operations, including budgeting, staffing, training, marketing and community outreach, school nutrition directors ensure the overall success of school meal programs.

Shore was announced as the Western Region Director of the Year during an online awards ceremony on May 2 in advance of School Lunch Hero Day, celebrated on May 5, 2023, to honor all of America's dedicated school nutrition professionals. The accomplishments of Shore and all SNA award winners will also be highlighted in a special publication and promoted in SNA's annual Hero Day social media campaign on Facebook. com/TrayTalk and TrayTalk.org.







## Oregon Health Authority Issues First Psilocybin Service Center License

This week, Oregon Health Authority (OHA) licensed the state's first psilocybin service center as part of the regulatory framework created by M109, the Oregon Psilocybin Services Act. OHA issued the license to EPIC Healing Eugene.

"We want to congratulate Cathy Jonas of EPIC Healing Eugene on being the first licensed service center in the state," says Oregon Psilocybin Services (OPS) Section Manager Angle Allbee. "This is such a historic moment as psilocybin services will soon become available in Oregon, and we appreciate the strong commitment to client safety and access as service center doors prepare to open."

Under the statewide model,

psilocybin services. While they won't need prescriptions or referrals from healthcare providers, clients must first complete a preparation session with a licensed facilitator.

If they meet the criteria to move forward, they may participate in an administration session at a licensed service center, where they may consume psilocybin products in the presence of a trained and licensed facilitator. Afterward, clients may join optional integration sessions, which offer opportunities to connect to community resources and peer support networks for additional support.

Once licensed, service centers can employ and/or contract with licensed facilitators who

ration, administration, and integration sessions to clients.

Service centers will sell psilocybin products produced by licensed manufacturers and tested by licensed laboratories. To date, OPS has issued three manufacturer licenses, one laboratory license, five facilitator licenses, and 84 worker permits. OPS expects to issue more licenses and worker permits in the coming months.

While OPS has now issued all four license types, it may take time for licensees to set up operations.

Each licensed service center, and the licensed facilitators who work for or with them, will set their own costs while managing their operations and communi-





## **USAO** Recognizes Missing and Murdered Indigenous Persons Awareness Day

The U.S. Attorney's Office for the District of Oregon joins its partners across the federal government, as well as people throughout American Indian and Alaska Native communities, in recognizing May 5, as National Missing and Murdered Indigenous Persons Awareness Day. Responding to unacceptable levels of violence that have caused a crisis of Missing or Murdered Indigenous Persons (MMIP) is a priority for the U.S. Attorney's Office and the Department of Justice.

"The Justice Department is marshaling the full strength of its resources to confront the crisis of Missing or Murdered Indigenous Persons, which has devastated the lives of victims, their families, and entire Tribal communities," said Attorney General Merrick B. Garland. "Addressing this crisis requires whole-of-government approach, and we are grateful for the partnership of Tribal and other law enforcement agencies across the nation that are working alongside the Justice Department to help reduce crime and support victims in American Indian and Alaska Native communities."

The department's response to the MMIP crisis is a whole-of-department effort taking many forms. One year ago today, Deputy Attorney General Lisa Monaco joined Secretary of the Interior Deb Haaland to launch the Not Invisible Act Commission with the mission of reducing violence against American Indians and Alaska Natives. Later this year, the commission will deliver recommendations for addressing the MMIP crisis to the Attorney General and Secretary Haaland.

"Missing or Murdered Indigenous Persons Awareness Day calls on our nation to pause and honor the loved ones who have gone missing or who have been the victims of violent crime," said Deputy Attorney General Lisa O. Monaco. "Acknowledging the many American Indian and Alaska Native people who have suffered, and continue to suffer, from the pain of a missing loved one or of violent crime serves as an important reminder of the urgency and importance of the department's work to respond to the crisis of missing or murdered indigenous persons. The Justice Departmentincluding our dedicated agents, analysts, and prosecutors-remains steadfast in our pledge to work as partners with Tribal governments in preventing and responding to the violence that has disproportionately harmed Tribal communities."

"The Justice Department is committed to using every resource at its disposal to combat the Missing or Murdered Indigenous Persons Crisis," said Associate Attorney General Vanita Gupta. "In addition to our core law-enforcement work, we are providing grant funding and guidance to help Tribes develop response plans for missing-persons cases, partner effectively with local law enforcement, and provide resources for victims of crime.'

In July 2022, Deputy Attorney General Monaco issued a memorandum reaffirming the department's commitment to addressing the disproportionately high rates of violence experienced by American Indians and Alaska Natives and the high rates of indigenous persons reported missing. In early 2022, the District of Oregon established an MMIP Working Group to increase multi-agency communication and collaboration in support of and response to Oregon-connected MMIP cases. The working group includes at least one representative from each of the nine federally recognized Tribes in Oregon, the FBI, Bureau of Indian Affairs, U.S. Department of Interior Regional Solicitor's Office, U.S. Marshals Service, Oregon Department of Justice, Oregon State Medical Examiner's Office, and Oregon State Police. 

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## Head Start Has Openings, Parents Encouraged to Apply for Programs

Head Start of Yamhill County has openings for children to participate in its Head Start and Early Head Start programs for the current school year, summer services, and the next school year starting in September 2024. Families have the option of full-year or school-year services. Services are free. Children need not be toilet-trained because they support that process and provide pull-ups. Families who receive SNAP and/or live with others, friends, family, in a shelter, transitional housing, or without a home automatically qualify. 45% of participants may be over-income, and they recommend everyone apply. A bus and transportation for most children is available. Services are for expectant mothers and children from birth until kindergarten.

Enrolling early in these programs guarantees your child and family participation until they transition to kindergarten. Head Start is licensed through the Oregon Early Learning Division for Child Care and boasts a five-Star rating. Teachers have, at a minimum, an Associate Degree in Early Childhood Education. Many of our staff have been parents in the program and live in the West Valley.

Head Start is a two-generation development program. First, it supports children and parents. Their partnership with parents focuses on children's development and addresses any concerns parents might have, including parenting supports, parent education (cooking, crafts, dad's days, etc.), and self-sufficiency and crisis support. Head Starts staff have been parents in the program, and they hire and train parents as a priority. Research shows the positive impact that Head Start has on school and life readiness for children and their families well into adulthood.

Children three - or four years old by Sept. 1 may attend preschool classes, Mondays through Thursdays. The younger children attend for four hours, and those transitioning to kindergarten may attend for six-hour days. Yearlong toddler classes are held twice a week for children at least 24 months of age by Sept. 1. Children receive two to three meals each day along with developmental screening and support to prepare them for the transition to kindergarten. Head Start offers weekly visits and family play times at the center in Sheridan

for infants and young toddlers. To apply, call our administrative office at 503-472-2000, pick up an application outside of our center at 1500 West Main Street, or visit our website for an online application. www.yamhillheadstart.org.



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
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

## **Public Asked to Visit Top Fire Outfit**

Area residents are invited to visit and inspect the Sheridan Volunteer Fire Department when Open House is held Saturday from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m., according to Fire Chief Cecil A. Harrison.

Visitors to the department will have the opportunity to talk with volunteers and examine the top-flight equipment of the community's outstanding department.

Chief Harrison, with the department for 40 years and as chief for 35, pointed out the department has six rigs on call to protect the city and a 100-square mile area that makes up the rural fire protection district.

Coffee and donuts will be served at the open house event, the chief announced. He urged everyone to come in for a tour of the facility and to see the equipment used.

In the six pieces of apparatus, Harrison said, a replacement cost of \$85,000 is represented. He said the fire department, which is strictly volunteer and is operating on a 32-man enrollment, has a 750

gallon per minute pumper, which carries 1,000 gallons of water; a 750 gpm rig with 500 gallons; a 350 gpm with 1,000 gallons; a 500 gpm apparatus with 500 gallons; a transfer unit carrying 1,200 gallons; and a salvage and disaster unit termed by some to be the finest in a small department in the state of Oregon.

The department rigs are fully radio-equipped, a big point in maintaining a Class 5 insurance rating for the residents of the area served. This is one of the lowest ratings obtainable by a volunteer department.

Chief Harrison said the Sheridan department was one of the pioneers in rural fire district protection, by obtaining equipment in 1941 specifically designed for rural firefighting.

He pointed out that he and the volunteers attend many training schools during the year and frequently drill as well as entering inter-department competition
