
The following is Nevaeh's essay as submitted.

## Art Conspiracy's Summer 2023 Brochure and Registration Available

The Art Conspiracy's Summer Arts 2023 brochure listing classes being offered and instructors' biographical information is now available. Registration for this year's program has begun. 

# House Fire in Grand Ronde Sparks Community Fundraiser

Grand Ronde, Willamina, and Sheridan communities all came together to show their love and support to Grand Ronde Tribal Elder Wayne "Butch" Lillard and his family. On April 29, 2023, they lost everything in a tragic house fire, escaping with only the clothes on their backs and beloved pets.

The fundraiser, organized by his daughter, tribal member Jessica Lillard, included a taco feed, had both Indian fry bread and homemade flour tortillas served with all the toppings and a drink.

The proceeds from the event went to help replace everything that was not covered by insurance. At the event, Tribal member Alexandria Warren donated stickers she designed and donated over \$250 from the sale to the family, and an unnamed Tribal elder donated a 55-inch flat-screen TV they were no longer using.

The event was held on May 16, at The Grand Ronde community center and was a massive success as more than 200 people showed up for the fundraiser. The event, which was supposed to go from 11 a.m.- 2 p.m., was so successful that at 1:15 p.m., everything was sold out. The Confederated Tribes of Grand Ronde Fire Department, some of whom were on duty and responded to the house fire on April 29, attended the event, and Chris Greenhill bought

Confederated Tribes of Grand Ronde Tribal Council members Jon George and Denise Harvey.





#### Healthier Salad Makes Barbecues Better Greek Yogurt Potato Salad

Serves 6 2 pounds potatoes (Yukon Gold or red potatoes)

1/2 onion 6 eggs

1 cup plain Greek yogurt

4 tablespoons sour cream

1 tablespoon vinegar

2 tablespoons yellow mustard


3/4 teaspoon salt

1/2 teaspoon black pepper 1/2 teaspoon celery seed

1/2 teaspoon dried dill weed or 1 teaspoon fresh

1/2 cup dill pickles, chopped Paprika, for garnish (optional) Parsley, for garnish (optional) 1. Peel and dice potatoes and onions. Put them and a teaspoon of salt in a pressure cooker and cover with an inch of water. Close valve. Set pressure cooker to high pressure. Set timer for 5 minutes, cook and quick release when it's done. Drain potatoes. Cool until just warm. (If you don't have a pressure cooker, boil potatoes in a






pot of water on the stove until tender.)

2. Set eggs on a rack in the pressure cooker. Add 1/2 inch of water. Close valve, set to high pressure for 5 minutes. Cook for 5 minutes, quick release, and leave lid closed for 5 minutes. After 5 minutes, take lid off. Drain eggs and cover with ice water to stop the cooking process. Let sit in ice water bath for about 5 minutes, then peel eggs. (If you don't have a pressure cooker, hard-boil eggs according to your favorite recipe.) 3. Add Greek yogurt, sour cream, mustard, vinegar, salt, pepper, celery seed, and dill weed to a large mixing bowl. Stir until smooth. You can taste test to see if you need to add ingredients.

4. Add cooled, diced potatoes, pickles and hard-boiled eggs. Gently stir until potatoes are coated with dressing. Adjust seasonings to taste. Refrigerate for at least 1 hour.

### Willamina Elementary School Students **Learned About Farmers' Markets**

With the award-winning Lynne Shore, longtime nutrition services director for both the Willamina and Sheridan school districts, in charge, the students received play money and shopping bags and bought various kinds of foods at tables set up just outside the school.

Afterward, Shore saw that the participating farmers were reimbursed for what the students bought.

Providing the food were Mama Tee's Farm and Bare Farms, both of Willamina; Sawtelle Acres of Sheridan; and Draper Farms and Bernards Farm, both of McMinnville.

Assisting Shore was Darlene Snell, an education manager for food brokers around Oregon. She has been working for the brokers for 17 years and offering consultation for menus to schools.

Each student received the Kids Farmers Market Activity Book, describing the ways farm products get from farms to stores and including recipes and farm-related puzzles. Its contents, which include a page describing food careers, were provided by the above farms, Oregon Dairy Women, the Oregon State University Extension Service, the Tillamook County Creamery, Oregon Farm to Child Nutrition

Programs, the Oregon Farm to School & School & School Garden Network, the Washington Dairy Products Commission, Max Scarbrock, Rhys Mahurin, and Kylie Anderson.

An example of what the Activity Book provides is the route of milk from the farm to the store. Oregon's cows, the book notes, come from families that provide nutritious diets, places to exercise, and regular health checkups. In the milking parlor, the cow's udder is washed, and the milking machine sends the milk through pipes to a storage tank. The tank cools the milk to keep it fresh and safe.

A tanker truck hauls the milk to a dairy plant, where it is repeatedly tested, and any milk that fails a test is discarded. In another safety move, the plant then pasteurizes the milk by quickly heating and then cooling it.

Once cooled, the milk is packaged in jugs or cartons, then stored in a refrigerated room, then transported to schools, grocery stores, and restaurants. Some of the milk is made into products that include yogurt, cheese, ice cream, and butter. This was the first farmer's market on Willamina school grounds. "Funding for it was provided by a grant from the Oregon Department of Education," Shore said.
