



A MESSAGE FROM THE WILLAMINA SCHOOL DISTRICT

Summer has officially begun for the students of Willamina School District! While students are no longer in school each day, the campus will host many summer activities as well see many capital improvement projects.

K-5 summer school is planned for six weeks this summer, operating June 19 through July 27, Monday through Thursday. Registration information can be found on our website. Middle and high school students that participate in FFA, Willamina Kustoms, and athletic activities will be preparing for county fair competitions, local community events, and summer workouts. The campus will also host the Hampton Lumber "Girls Build" day camp. Information is located on the Hampton Lumber facebook page.

We are very excited to begin construction of our Middle School expansion project. Site prep was completed in the fall of 2022 and building permits have been secured. The project includes; six new classrooms, new restrooms, administrative office, and staff room. This project was made possible using the Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief funds awarded to school districts during the pandemic and a large portion of our capital improvement reserve fund.

In addition to the routine summer work of deep cleaning, painting, and repair, we will be refinishing the floor of our main gymnasium, replacing sidewalks leading to our main entries, and installing more seating in the football/track complex. Our facility crew will be extremely busy the next few months.

The full week of school had many celebrations; kindergarten promotion, eighth grade promotion, field trips, and "Last Blast". 70 kindergarteners celebrated promotion to first grade with friends, family, and school staff. The eighth grade class also had 70 members celebrate promotion to high school. Families joined their student for an outdoor barbeque at school, Joseph Goodwin and Camille Crowe were selected as boy and girl of the year by the middle school staff. The big finale for the elementary school was "Last Blast", a day filled with outdoor games and activities, on the final day of school. It is a much anticipated event and a great send off to summer.

The price will be \$10 for adults, \$7 for kids 12-18. Kids younger than 12 are free.


They will serve blueberry and regular pancakes, biscuits and gravy, sausage, ham, scrambled eggs, coffee, and juice.

The Sheridan American Legion Post 75, located at 125 N. Bridge Street in Sheridan has several great resources for Veterans in our community.

Sheridan City Council Grants Ordinace Allowing Fiber-based Internet in Sheridan

At the May 15 regular meeting of the Sheridan City Council, Hunter Communications and Technologies LLC gave a presentation requesting that ordinance 2023-01 be passed. This Ordinance allows the company, a Non-Exclusive Franchise, and Right to Construct, Operate and Maintain a Fiber-Based Service Facility; to Occupy City Rights-of-Way; and to Provide Fiber-Based Services in the City of Sheridan, Oregon.

During the presentation, the CEO of Hunter Communications, Michael Wynschenk, stated. "The service we offer is low priced, priced for life, there are no contracts, and it's faster than anything else you can get out there. Our baseline, the lowest service is 500 megabytes per second and runs about \$60 per month, a gigabyte service that's \$69.99 per month and, then a gigabyte by gigabyte that has a faster upload speed for \$100 per month, we even have a 2.5-gigabyte service which is probably more than most people need about \$150 per month, we also do voice services. We also participate in the Affordable Connectivity Plan (ACP), which gives an additional \$30 off service if you qualify. We also have

a teachers program, so if you're an employee of a school, we provide our \$100 service for \$30 a month, and we do a similar program for veterans and active military. Our goal is to find communities where there's a need close to where we operate to build where many of the current companies rely on more outdated services. We want to bring something newer and more robust to those areas."

Councilwoman Roxy Acuff asked, "Once this resolution passes, how soon will it be available to our customers?" Michael Wynschenk replied, "Once this passes, we have to do engineering, design, and permitting. We typically have crews scheduled on the ground about 60 days passed when we do engineering. Permits typically take about 45 days. Once construction starts, we can usually knock out pretty sizable areas within 1-2 months. We do it in phases so we can start some customers in the early phases. On our website, you can put your address in if you are interested in service, and it drops a marker on a map, which shows us where we should prioritize building first." After the presentation, the Ordinance passed Unanimously.

James Earl Black Sr. 1926-2023

James Earl Black, Sr., 96, formerly of Sheridan and McMinnville, passed peacefully where he resided in the Veterans home in Lebanon, Ore.

Born Sept. 6, 1926, in Hammond, Ind., to Sherman and Susan (Spisak) Black, he attended Lewis and Clark High School, and in 1944, at age 17, he joined the U.S. Army. He was assigned to the 96th Infantry Division. On April 1, 1945, they made an assault landing on Okinawa. Seven weeks later he received a severe head wound that ended his military career. For his honorable service as Private First Class, he received the Purple Heart, Bronze Star, the Asiatic Pacific Campaign WWII, and WWII Victory Medals, Rifle Expert Badge and Presidential Unit Citation Medal.

Jim attended the University of Indiana, earning a degree in business. In 1951, he moved to West Covina, Calif., where he received his teaching degree and taught school for 40 years at Edgewood and Bishop Amat High Schools.

He was captain of the West Covina Police Reserves, Badge #1, for 20 years. He was captain of the California Guard in Pasadena, Presbyterian Church deacon, and a Masonic Mason of Covina, Sheridan, and McMinnville lodges. He was also a member of the Shriners, the American Legion and VFW.

He married Lois Stam in 1947. He was preceded in death by Lois; grandson, Robbie; and second wife, Ruth McKibben. He is survived by his children, Jim (wife Pat), Susan Parrish, Frank and Karen Maben; and many grandchildren and great-grandchildren.

He will be missed.

A memorial service was held on May 11 at the Chapel of Macy and Sons.

Petition Has Started Collecting Signatures For Safer Road Conditions in Willamina

The Board at Fendall Hall has been working on a project to collect signatures to petition Yamhill County Public Works to alter or improve the 90-degree corner at the junction of Tindle Creek Road and Willamina Creek Road.

The county took some shrubs and trees off the side of the hill, giving Tindle residents another 2-3 seconds of visibility before crossing the hazardous intersection there. However, they would like to see more done.

There were two recent accidents there.

On May 23rd at 11:00 pm, a vehicle launched about 50 feet into the pasture.

Then on May 24th at about 5:00 pm, a sports car took the corner too fast, hit the shoulder, and careened into the other lane and into the ditch on the other

side of the highway.

A resident that has lived there for 40 years says she has experienced at least one accident per year. She's had motorcycles, log trucks, bales of hay, and 1/2 of a mobile home in her field.

"It is a dangerous corner, and those who have to traverse that intersection feel like they take their lives in their hands every time they cross it. There is not adequate signage for the severity of the corner for people not used to the area, so they inevitably take it too fast. The hill-side obstructs any visibility of cars coming south on Willamina Creek. "


Last year a motorcyclist was life-flighted from the Willamina Football field. Reports say he survived.


"Be a mentor to as many people as you can," he said. "Be courageous, and do disrupt the status quo," he added.

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




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



Another high school commencement for Sheridan is over, and another class of young people has gone out, carrying with them their diplomas, which may help them land many jobs. But the holding of them will depend upon the lessons of life, learned during the years spent in school. When the curtain rose last Friday, the crowded house showed their appreciation by the hardy applause given the seven young ladies and 15 young men, who, for a large part, were the product of the community, and of whom it was justly proud.

The salutatory address was given by Lawrence Hipple and the valedictory by Paul Ottinger, both of which were presented in a very credible manner and expressed the individual views of each exceedingly well.

Pleasing features of the evenings program were the musical numbers rendered by a student from Linfield College, who played on an instrument, called by him, the League of Nations, the materials that composed its parts, coming from four different nations, Japan, Germany, the Philippines, and the United States. The address of the evening by Dr. D.V. Polling of Oregon State College was well received by the audience and showed a masterful understanding on the

part of the speaker of the problems that confront young people. The subject so well treated was "Grips That Hold." The grip of power is the power that comes from storing in our intellectual storehouse for development. The grip of pleasure comes from sharing legitimate pleasure and is for the enlarging of the individual. The pleasure you share with others is the only pleasure worthwhile. The grip of peace is the power that comes from serving humanity.

Superintendent B.A. Teats presented the diplomas and the scholarship signifying the highest standing by one pupil over the period of four years. This honor was attained by Paul Ottinger, whose average was better than 94%.

At the close of the exercise, the class received the congratulations of parents, friends, and patrons, who wish them the best that this life can give and years of service to others.

Three Sheridan Girls Complete the Course at Oregon State College

The 60th commencement exercises of the Oregon State College will be held in Corvallis Monday, June 3, at which time Sheridan will be represented by three of the 534 graduates of the class of 1929. They are Glyde Dilley, Helen Hulac, and Ethel Sargeant. Of the total number being graduated 489 will receive bachelor of science degrees, 23 master of science degrees and 22 of the degree of pharmaceutical chemist.

Men out number women in the class 336 to 198.

Home economics is the one school in which no men major, hence the 96 graduates this year of which Glyde Dilley and Helen G Hulac are two, all are all co-eds.

Two main curricula are open to students in the school, one leading to commercial pursuits, or teaching, and the other to homemaking and general citizenship. Miss Dilley and Miss Hulac have had to work in household administration, foods and nutrition, home economics, education, clothing, and textiles, and institutional economics, in addition to the liberal studies afforded in other schools of the college. As 75% of the young women of the United States, are married before they are 30, considerable emphasis is placed on training for the home making career.

Aside from the regular classwork, these two co-eds have been active in student affairs. Miss Dilly is a member of the Madrigal Club and Miss Hulac is a member of Omicron Nu, Home Economics Honor Society, and a member of the Madrigal Club. She was a lieutenant in the Memorial Union Drive, when the necessary money was raised to erect the memorial union building on the campus. Miss Hulac was on the staff of the student directory and a member of the Big Sister Committee. She was on the class basketball team for two years and sang in the chorus of the Operetta.

The School of Commerce, in which Ethel M. Sargeant has taken her work is the largest in the college in point of numbers and is represented by 120 of the graduating class this year. Of these 82 are men and 38 are women. Miss Sargeant has had to work in business administration, economics and sociology, and political science with opportunity to major in these or in secretarial training, commercial education or advertising and selling.

Miss Sargeant was active in campus activities during her four years in college. She is a member of Temenids, Eastern Star Sorority for coeds and played basketball during her sophomore

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
