Frequently Asked Questions and Answers about Veterans Day

Each November, millions of people recognize the service and sacrifice of military veterans on Veterans Day. Initially commemorated as Armistice Day but renamed Veterans Day in the United States in 1954, the holiday is a federal holiday throughout the country.

The first Armistice Day was observed in 1919. Despite that lengthy history, the general public may still have questions about Veterans Day.

When is Veterans Day observed?

The U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs notes that Veterans Day is always observed officially on November 11, regardless

of which day of the week that happens to be. In 2023, Veterans Day is Saturday, November 11. Because Veterans Day falls on a Saturday in 2023, the federal observation date is Friday, November 10.

Why is November 11 so significant?

November 11 is a significant day in world history because it marks the signing of the armistice between the Allies of World War I and Germany at 5:45 a.m. on November 11, 1918. Though the formal peace treaty, the Treaty of Versailles, was not signed until 1919 and hostilities between the sides continued for hours after the

armistice was signed, the day is still viewed as the end of World War I.

What distinguishes Veterans Day from Memorial Day?

The VA notes that Veterans Day honors all those individuals who served honorably in the military during both wartime and peacetime. Memorial Day is a day to honor and remember military personnel who died in the service of their country, particularly those who lost their lives in battle or as a result of wounds sustained in battle.

What is the significance of red poppies?

Red poppies are ubiquitous on Memorial Day, but they're also visible on Veterans Day. Though it's not taboo to wear red poppies on Veterans Day, it's a tradition that aligns more with Memorial Day. That's because the poppies are typically worn

to honor fallen military personnel. A 1915 poem written by a Canadian Lieutenant Colonel named John McCrae referred to the fields of poppies growing around the graves of World War I soldiers in Flanders.

Do other countries honor their military veterans?

Many countries across the globe honor their military veterans, and many do so on November 11 as well. For example, Canadians and Australians observe Remembrance Day in honor of their nation's respective veterans on November 11. Great Britain observes Remembrance Day on the Sunday nearest to November 11.

Veterans Day is a day to honor and commemorate the brave men and women who have honorably served in the U.S. military during wartime and peacetime.

Dear Sheridan Families,

Our fall sports for FCS and SHS have ended and preparations begin for winter sports. This fall FCS offered football, cross country, and volleyball for 7th and 8th grade students. We had 45 middle school students participating in fall sports. SHS had its first soccer team, along with offering football, cheer team, volleyball, and cross country.

This year was a growing season for football and soccer. The new soccer program was a partnership with Delphian School and Willamina High School. Our coaches for football and

soccer focused on skill development and team building. SHS football and soccer received sportsmanship awards from the OSAA, the only teams within our league awarded. Under

OSAA, SHS competes at the 3a level for all sports except football, which competes in a 2a league.

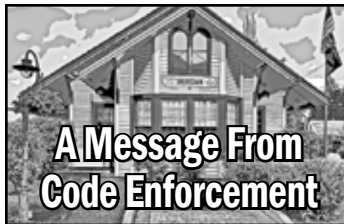
Volleyball finished in 5th place, against a very tough PacWest Conference. Cross country, boys and girls, competed in several meets this season. At the last meet in Lebanon, the 3A/2A/1ADistrict 2 Championship, all athletes beat their PRs. Cheer held pre-football game events and attended regional competition. In total, we had 90 high school students, or 40% of our students, participating in fall sports.

These opportunities could not happen without our athletic directors, coaches and assistant coaches, many of whom work full time jobs! Our SHS Boosters provided refreshments at a variety of events, using the funds raised to support our athletes. I would also like to recognize our custodial team for the work they do in maintaining our soccer/football field, stadium, and gym space.

A Message From Code Enforcement

Happy November!

The topic I would like to touch base on vehicles being parked and abandoned. There are four things that constitute your vehicle being tagged for tow according to the Sheridan Municipal Code. According to Sheridan Municipal Code 10.20.030, it is prohibited for vehicles to be parked upon a street for the purposes of displaying a vehicle for sale, repairing, or servicing the vehicle, displaying advertising from the vehicle, or storage; or as junkage or dead storage for more than 24 hours. If you see an abandoned vehicle, please fill out a report of concern on our website www.cityofsheridanor.com.

He graduated from Harlem High School as a stellar athlete and enlisted in the Army as a construction engineer. After his military service, he went to Northern Montana College as a three-sport athlete and got his degree in education. While attending college, he met his future forever chicky sweet Beth by sitting on her lap as he sold concessions at a basketball game where she was a cheerleader.

They were married in 1962 in

Montana, and he began his teaching career there before moving to Sheridan in 1968, where he taught for 30 years. He was a coach for many sports during that time, and he also taught PE, health, social studies, and math. He spent many years as a counselor for the outdoor school program, teaching students survival skills. He painted houses during the summer months to bring additional income for his family, and it was there it became apparent that he did not have a fond working relationship with ladders.

Many knew him as Bill, Billy, Wild Bill, Dad, Uncle Bill, Mr. Warwick, Coach, Chow Hound, Grandpa, and his favorite, Papa Bill.

He was a man of many talents: volunteer firefighter, EMT, golfer, skier, avid hunter, and fisherman, and he enjoyed playing and watching many sports. Once retired, Bill and Beth became snowbirds, spending many winters in Arizona, where he was fond of walking in the desert and shooting the breeze with friends and family. He was heavily involved with the church and loved his church family.

Fondly known as "Candyman," he always had a pocket full of

sweets to give to the children (and adults). He and his wife enjoyed their retirement years and kept busy with senior swim time, Thirsty Thursdays on Third, coffee or happy hour with friends, working in the yard, traveling, and spending time with grandchildren.

Bill leaves a legacy of his beloved family: daughters Anita (Jim) Marble, Corinne (Dave) Marshall, and Janell (John) Warwick-Fuhrer (we all know who his favorite is); grandchildren: Reese, Kera, Claire, Wesley, Wil, Ally, Stephanie, David, Eric, Renae, Michael, and Emily; seven great-grandchildren; brothers: Tom & Joe; Sisters: Ann, Mary, Kay, Jackie, Patti, & Jeanine and preceded in death by his wife Beth, and brother Johnny and sister Annette.

This Years Fendall Hall Pie Auction

Nestled at the bottom of the coastal range, just outside of Willamina, on Saturday, Fendall Hall held its annual free stew feed and pie auction.

About 50 people plus ten volunteers were rubbing elbows in the small school-turned-event center, initially built in 1892 and rebuilt in 1897 after the first structure was destroyed in a fire. In 1950, community members got together to turn this quaint historic building into the Fendall School Community Center with the goal of restoring a "sense of community" that has always characterized our valley. The event started as individuals and friends chatted quietly with each other, shaking hands and asking about each other's well-being. Here and there, an introduction of new faces to the others as they were greeted warmly.

Some of the biggest smiles in the building came from Alyssa Green, Naomi Kelley, and Debbie Hyatt as they served up hot soups and stews to those in attendance.

Once bowls were empty and bellies were full, things really started heating up as the pies

and various other desserts hit the floor for auction.

Roy Whitman, the volunteer auctioneer, generally started the bidding at \$25 for each of the sweets, but it didn't take long before bids of \$50 to \$75 were being answered as Roy checked the crowd for raised hands and nodding heads. Ken Kelley, a long-time patron of this event, was on a mission that day as he always has been with the highest bid of \$320 on a coconut cream pie made by Connie Bobb. "Every year I'm here, I always win that pie she makes, no matter how much it costs me," he stated.

The funds raised will help pay for a new patio for the small schoolhouse/event center. Their goal is to make Fendall Hall available for larger groups and gatherings than it can currently provide. Overall, it was a very fun and successful event, evident with the smiles and laughter bouncing around the room. Fifty pies and other desserts were auctioned off, raising \$3,300 towards the new patio. 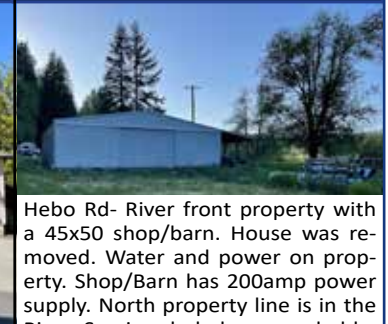

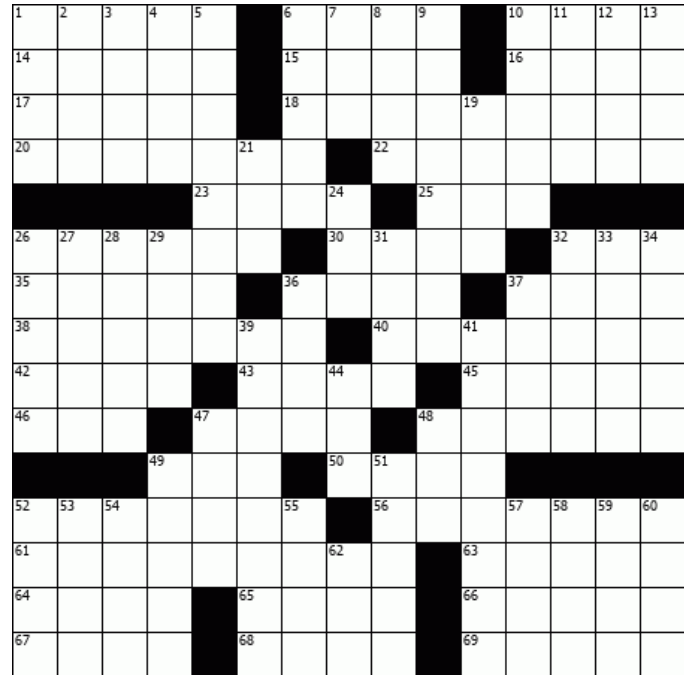

Waters Recede After Near-Flood



Nobody we know of actually started building arks, but it looked like floods were here last Thursday after five days of rain. Above, South Bridge Street in Sheridan sits under water, looking like an Oregon version of Venice. Water covered parts of Highway 18 and overran its banks on Willamina Creek and the Yamhill River in several places before the sun came out and the rain stopped on Friday. The weatherman is predicting more of the same this week. Surprise, surprise.

Blood to be Drawn at High School

The first blood drawing in Willamina's history will take place on Monday, Nov. 12, at the Willamina Union High School auditorium.

The drawing will begin at 1 p.m. and will continue until 5:30 "Or as late as possible, depending on the turnout," said Woodrow F. Woods, manager of the Willamina Chapter of the American Red Cross.

The drawing was prompted by open-heart surgery recently undergone by Danny Scott, 30, who works at Fort Hill Lumber Co. The crew at Fort Hill Lumber raised \$1,793 to help out with the cost of the surgery, which involved replacing two heart valves. "You don't have any idea how proud I am of those boys," said Bud Gordon, plant superintendent at Fort Hill. Scott is now recuperating at home in Dallas and is reported to be "doing just fine."

Red Cross volunteers will be on hand to do the actual drawing, and Dr. Ed LeBold, Salem, will supervise. Approximately twelve people per hour can be handled by the facilities at the high school.

Cookies, juice and other refreshments will be provided.

Woods emphasized that this is an all-community affair. Willamina was chosen as the location of the drawing because it is centrally

located in the Sheridan-Willamina-Grand Ronde area. Sheridan and Grand Ronde donors are urged to participate, he stated.

The quota set for the drawing is 50 unites.

As this is the first such drawing in this area, Mr. Woods supplied the following information which he said might be helpful to potential donors:

Anybody between the ages of 18 and 65 can be a donor. Those who should not give blood include: anybody with a cold, flue or who has been ill in the past month; any woman who is pregnant or who has delivered within the last six months; anybody who has undergone major surgery during the past six months; anybody who has received blood transfusions or plasma during the past six months; anybody who presently has symptoms of hay fever or who takes drugs to prevent it; a pilot, crew member or paratrooper who plans to fly within the next two weeks; anybody who has taken immunization shots within the previous 24 hours; anybody with contagious disease in his family at the present time; anybody who weighs less than 100 pounds; or anybody with tuberculosis, diabetes, heart disease, a history of convulsions, a history of infectious hepatitis, or an active stomach ulcer.

Hawaii Bound

The Willamina and Nestucca basketball teams and their coaches will board a Pan American Airlines plane in Portland Tuesday, Dec. 4th, at 9:15 AM. and will arrive in Honolulu, Hawaii at 1:00 PM. From there the boys will take a 27 minute trip on a Aloha Airline plane to their destination, which is, Kahului, Maui.
