





Unique Global Christmas Traditions

Before people start relenting on having another turkey sandwich or finally tossing out the remaining turkey noodle soup from Thanksgiving leftovers, Christmas traditions begin to pop up around us.

As Christmas trees, wreaths, inflatables, and lights decorate our society, there are some rather unique traditions you may have yet to hear about that oth-

er cultures beyond the borders of our country.

In Japan, where Christmas is not a national holiday, a festive marketing campaign in the 1970s had families flocking over to their local American fast food chain, Kentucky Fried Chicken, to enjoy their special Christmas Eve meal.

While reindeer rule the sky in our little corner of the world, places like Sweden rely on the Yule Goat as the giver of presents along side Santa.

Starting in the 11th century, the human-sized goat figure, who had the power to control the devil, was led by St. Nicholas. As history progressed, the human-sized goat turned from a protectorate to the 17th century where men dressed up as goats to pull pranks or demand gifts, to the 19th-century good guy who passed out the gifts, to present day traditional ornament in the 1960s ranging from your tree hanging size to a straw-built goat standing at a whopping 43 feet tall and 23 feet long.

Most of us are fond of the smell of cookies baked during Christmas, but in South Africa, different holiday treats have the children running to, not from as most of ours would do. Festive fried caterpillars are made from the Pine Tree Emperor Moth, or the deep-fried Christmas caterpillar, and served on Christmas

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Four Fun Facts About December

December is arguably the most festive month of the year. The holiday season and all the gatherings with family and friends make the final month of the year a busy time. But a peek under the proverbial hood reveals that there's more to December than the holiday season.

1. Armchair linguists might know that the Latin word "decem" means "ten," which is a little curious given that December is the twelfth month of the year. So why isn't December the tenth month of the year? Like other months on the modern calendar, including October and November, December once occupied a different place on the calendar, namely the Julian calendar that was used prior to the adoption of the Gregorian calendar. Back then, December was the tenth month on the calendar. Though its position changed when the Gregorian calendar was adopted, its name remained the same.

2. It's easy to overlook in a month populated by holidays like Chanukah, Christmas and Kwanzaa, but the winter solstice is a significant day on the calendar as well. According to the Farmer's Almanac, the 2023 winter solstice occurs on December 21 at 10:27 p.m. EST for the northern hemisphere. The winter solstice might not be sun worshippers' favorite day of the year, as it's the day with the least amount of sunlight all year long. However, one positive to keep in mind is that, once the winter solstice occurs, each day

thereafter experiences a gradual increase in daylight. That should give anyone yet another reason to celebrate in December.

3. December has historically been a month of firsts, particularly for women and politicians. On December 1, 1919, Lady Nancy Astor became the first woman to serve in the British House of Commons. Exactly 69 years later, Benazir Bhutto was nominated for the role of prime minister of Pakistan. Bhutto ultimately became the first woman to be elected as head of a democratic government in a Muslim-majority country. Political firsts in December are not limited to events involving women. A year after Bhutto was nominated, Russia's Mikhail Gorbachev became the first Soviet Russian leader to visit the Vatican and meet the Pope.

4. January might be the month people most associate with efforts to change their fortunes, but the birthstone of December also is considered a symbol of good fortune. The Farmer's Almanac notes that one of the birthstones of December is turquoise, which some believe is symbolic of good fortune and success.

Holiday Cooking for a Crowd Made Easy

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

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Make the Holidays a Little Sweeter With Stareos



What would the holidays be without platters full of homemade cookies? It's that time of year for pulling out favorite recipes and filling the house with delicious aromas and delectable treats.

This recipe for "Stareos" from "Classic Stars Desserts" (Chronicle Books) by Emily Luchetti adds a gourmet spin to a popular chocolate sandwich cookie. **Stareos**

Makes 18 cookies Chocolate Shortbread

1 1/2 cups all-purpose flour Pinch of kosher salt 1/2 cup unsweetened cocoa powder, sifted 8 ounces (16 tablespoons) cold unsalted butter, cut into 1/2inch pieces 1/2 cup granulated sugar Flour for dusting Filling

1 cup mascarpone cheese 1 tablespoon granulated sugar 1/4 teaspoon vanilla extract

To make the chocolate short-bread: In a bowl, stir together the flour, salt and cocoa powder and set aside. Combine the butter and sugar in the bowl of a stand mixer fitted with the paddle attachment and beat on low speed until the butter and sugar begin to incorporate, about 15 seconds. Add the dry ingredients and continue to mix until the dough comes together,

about 3 minutes. It will look dry just before it comes together.


Line 2 baking sheets with parchment paper. On a lightly floured work surface, roll out the dough 1/4 inch thick. Using a 2-inch star cutter, cut out as many cookies as possible. Gather together the scraps, reroll, and continue cutting out cookies until you have 36 cookies. Place the cookies on the prepared baking sheets, spacing them 1 inch apart. Refrigerate until firm, at least 1 hour.

Preheat the oven to 300 F. Bake the shortbread until firm, about 35 minutes. At the midway point, switch the baking sheets between the racks and rotate them 180 degrees to ensure even baking. Let cool on the baking sheets to room temperature.

To make the filling: In a small bowl, stir together the mascarpone, sugar and vanilla until smooth.

Turn 18 of the cookies bottom-side up on a work surface. Using a table knife or a small icing spatula, spread about 1 tablespoon of the filling on the bottom of each cookie. Top with the remaining cookies, bottom-side down.






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

The kids got an extra present from the school district - an extra long holiday this year. Because of the energy crisis, school will not resume until Jan. 7 instead of Jan. 2, as originally planned. On Saturday, Santa came riding into Willamina on a fire truck shortly after 1 p.m. He handed out candy to the children, then conducted the drawing sponsored by the Willamina Area Chamber of Commerce.

Following his appearance on Main St., Santa went over to the fire hall, where he had his picture taken with local children. He wasn't able to stay long. Shortly after the photograph session, Santa had to head back to the North Pole to get ready for the big job ahead this Christmas eve.

"Hello Santa"

This will be the second year that the Jaycees have sponsored the "Hello, Santa" program in this area. Jaycee President Bob Eddy said that last year's response was great, and that Santa will be expecting lots of phone calls again this year from the Willamina Sheridan area.

Schools Hit Hard by Gas Shortage

In a special Willamina School Board meeting last week, it was decided that in order to conserve energy, school will not resume on Jan. 2 as originally planned, but will remain closed until Jan. 7.

Further energy-saving decisions included: cancellation of all spectator buses to away games – cheerleaders and spectators will have to ride in the player bus; cancellation of all non-league functions. If at all possible and limiting the activity bus runs to two nights a week or, if necessary, cutting it out entirely

A public letter, released by Donn Mitchell, district superintendent, said:

"As a result of price increases in gasoline and heating oil, it is necessary for us to make some very difficult decisions in regard to the operation of our schools.

"May I point out what our most serious problems are. When we finalized our budget for this year, we were advised that heating oil would be up to about \$5 per barrel and gasoline about 29 cents per gallon. As of today, fuel oil is \$11.05 and gasoline is 33.9 cents a gallon and rising. To compound the problem, we are only receiving for December 90 percent of what we used last December. It is expected that our January allotment will be 85 percent of a year ago. This means that even if we find the funds, the gasoline may not be available.

"We know that the following directives will create hardships and dislocations for many people, but for the time being, we feel that they are necessary if our schools are to maintain their daily operation.

"School buses: As of this date, only the players' bus will travel to away events. Cheer leaders and spectators should be allowed to use what seats are available.

"Coaches and administrators are asked to make every effort to adjust schedules to allow as many events as possible to take place on the same night (such as wrestling and basketball).

"Activity buses will run two nights per week. Runs will be as follows: #1 to Grand Ronde across to Agency back to Fort Hill over Hillcrest and to town; #2 up Willamina River to Buck Hollow to Rock Creek road and back to town. If it proves that more cuts are necessary, the activity runs will be discontinued completely.

"Heating: all heating plants will be shut off at 4 p.m. Exceptions will be cold weather and special meetings or programs. Nighttime use of the buildings will be limited to the greatest possible degree. Out of-school groups (such as volleyball and basketball teams) wishing to use the facilities will be limited to an hour and a half in the building and there will be no

"All thermostats should be turned to 68 degrees.

"In order that we may have enough gas to run through January we will follow the lead of many other school districts and resume school on Monday, Jan. 7."

Here Comes the Gas . . .

After ten days with no gasoline at all, Red George's Union 76 station in Willamina finally got some fuel in its tanks Monday at 2:30 p.m. and was promptly swamped with customers.

"This is nothing," said Frances George, pumping gasoline into a line of waiting cars. "You should have seen the line up we had Saturday. Cars were stacked up halfway 'round the block trying to lay in a supply for Sunday and we didn't have a drop."

When asked Monday afternoon how long their present supply of fuel would last, Frances said, "We've only got 900 gallons left. Even though we have a ten-gallon limit per car, we'll probably run out sometime Tuesday. This stuff is selling like hotcakes."

She added that when this shipment ran out, she didn't have any idea when the next delivery might arrive.

Across the bridge, the Rocket station was still pumping as this paper went into press, but they, too, had to impose a ten-gallon limit. Mrs. George commented that they still have super, but that not

many cars use that anymore. The time when a driver could pull into any station he felt like any time day or night, and say "Fill'er up" has now be delegated to that era known as the "Good Old Days."
