Stop in and browse the variety of sale items from local crafters, perfect for your last minute shopping needs.



Willamina Man Sentenced to More Than Seven Years In Prison for Christmas Shooting

News Release from Polk Co. Dist. Att. Office

Stephen Darrell Price, 36, has been sentenced to serve 90 months (seven and a half years) in prison for shooting a man in Grand Ronde on December 25, 2022 after a verbal altercation on the victim's property.

Price, of Willamina, was found guilty following a jury trial last week in Polk County Circuit Court of Assault in the First Degree, Unlawful Use of a Weapon, Reckless Endangering, and Menacing. Judge Monte S. Campbell sentenced Price on Monday according to Oregon's Measure 11 minimum mandatory sentencing law. He will not be eligible for any form of early release or sentence reduction. He will also be required to serve a three year term of Post-Prison Supervision upon his release.

The case was investigated by the Grand Ronde Tribal Police Department, Oregon State Police, Polk County Sheriff's Office, Yamhill County Sheriff's Office, and Hillsboro Police Department. The case was prosecuted by District Attorney Aaron Felton.

Willamina City Manager's Report From the desk of Willamina City Manager

City officials have many responsibilities. At times it can be confusing what is the responsibility of City Council and what is the responsibility of City Administration. Below are some brief descriptions of the typical roles municipal officials have.

City Council

Elected by citizens, City Council has the authority to pass or adopt policy such as an ordinance, comprehensive plan, or budget. Council develops policies by identifying needs and priorities, establishing goals, and implementing programs. City Council also "exercises significant control over administration" via resolutions, motions, special investigations, etc.

Mayor

Also elected by citizens, the mayor is generally considered the "civic leader". They preside over council meetings and engage in discussion. They may make recommendations to the rest of City Council regarding proposed actions, however the Mayor may only vote on policy in the event of a tie.

Administration

City Administration includes the City Manager, City Recorder, Directors, and other staff members. It is responsible for the day-to-day operations of the city. While Administration may be involved in the policy-making process, the ultimate decision is made by Council. Administration is responsible for implementing policies adopted by Council.

City Manager

The City Manager supervises the day-to-day operations of the city and serves at the pleasure of the Council. They carry out the policy enacted by City Council.

City Employees

City employees perform the day-to-day tasks to maintain operations. Most employees are responsible to their immediate supervisor and cannot take orders from an individual councilor.

Creating Positive Change

Cities succeed when everyone works together for positive change. Those who run for office or choose employment as a public servant desire to make a difference in their community. Citizens have the ability to enact change by running for public office, electing city officials, and participating in public meetings. It can be discouraging when change appears to happen slowly. There are local and state laws which regulate how policy change occurs and these laws must be followed by local governments. Some change can only occur at a larger level. City Officials act as a liaison at the County, State and National level.





After Twenty Years of Ho Ho Ho's, Williams' Say it's Time To Go, Go, Go

Sitting up in the hills of Willamina, this last Saturday, the Tina Miller Teen Center hosted the 26th Willamina Tree of Giving coordinated by Christi and Rick Williams. As Rick, all decked out in his Santa costume, invited kids to take pictures with him and dig through a bag filled with toys, Christi rolled around with help from friends and family to ensure everything ran smoothly. Looking around the large basketball court inside the teen center, a conga line of bags filled to the drawstrings with toys awaited distribution to families or next up on the chopping block to be plundered by a small army of tiny hands there to see Santa.

Christi was a Girl Scout leader 26 years ago and had worked closely with the school's parent organization. When the parent organization decided it was time for them to hand off the reigns to the Tree of Giving, Christi, who has always been one of those "I'll do it" type of people, found herself donning the coordinator crown, which has generally looked a lot like a reindeer themed headband.

"I really didn't know how involved it all was until I finally took it over," said Christi. Luckily, she had assistance from the old coordinator to show her the ropes and help her get her feet pointed in the right direction. "My husband, of course, always got roped into..." she started saying as her husband Rick heartily laughed, and she continued going through an extensive list of things he'd helped her with in the past.


When they first took over, they were wrapping everything that came through the door. Trading reindeer power for horsepower, three Santas covered Willamina, while two more flew out to the Grand Ronde area to deliver toys from the tree to every single family. Through the years, as their Santas needed less beard dve to make them fit the role and time became more of the gift they needed to complete the Tree of Giving, they started streamlining the process. They began wrapping gifts on request only and providing wrapping paper for those who wanted to cover it themselves. The past few years, that became a bit much for the couple, so two years ago, they decided to bag the toys and provide wrapping paper to those who wanted to wrap the gifts and hold the event at a central location to have the families come to them. We've always enjoyed seeing the smiles on the faces of the kids through the years. "It's almost funner now to have the Santa party, to get to see the kids," Christi says as she explains how this way opens the event up for all, not just those on the Tree of Giving, another possibility to see Santa or get your first ever picture with him.

All good things, though, end, so after 26 years of running the show, the Williams' are looking to pass the torch to a much younger couple.

Measure 110 Unveils New Phone Access Line Providing More

People seeking Measure 110 services and supports can now access a newly invigorated helpline to connect individuals more efficiently with treatment, housing, and overdose prevention providers within the statewide behavioral health resource networks (BHRNs).

Oregon Health Authority (OHA) announced that Health Resources in Action (HRiA), a non-profit organization based in Boston, was selected as the new contractor for the helpline, replacing Lines for Life.

The firm has extensive experience working with federal and state government agencies such as the Center for Disease Control and Prevention, the federal Department of Health

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and Human Services. HRiA operates helplines in three other states: Massachusetts, Illinois, and Vermont.

The 18-month contract totals more than \$2.8 million. The firm is planning to undertake extensive statewide outreach and add new functionalities to the hotline such as texting.

This helpline will continue to be a statewide public resource for substance use screening and service referrals as well as a resource for those seeking to waive Class E citations.

Under its proposal, HRiA will operate the phone and text helpline, develop a comprehensive website to support the helpline, offer follow-up calls to support service access, and

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promote the hotline.

The new helpline number is 1-833-975-0505.The previous helpline phone numbers, 503-575-3769 and 541-575-3769, will continue to operate and will feed into the new 833 numher

Since 2021, 577 people called the helpline. Nearly half of them had citations.

"We're excited to partner with HRiA to refresh the Measure 110 helpline," said OHA Behavioral Health Director Ebony Clarke. "We know the helpline has been vastly underutilized and we're optimistic that HRiA's trauma-informed and compassionate approach to supporting individuals in need of help will make it easier for Oregonians to access Measure 110's life-saving services and supports."

Measure 110 network providers reported continued increases in the number of clients served statewide in all seven network service areas, according to the latest quarterly program reports filed with OHA.

Overdose prevention and peer support services accounted for the largest client gains in the

quarterly reporting and over all three quarters. Substance use treatment providers reported 41 percent more clients in quarterly gains and 104 percent over the first three quarters in operation.

Background: In November 2020, Oregon voters passed Measure 110, the Drug Addiction Treatment and Recovery Act of 2020, which became effective Dec. 4, 2020, to better serve people actively using substances or diagnosed with a substance use disorder. In July 2021, the legislature passed SB 755, which amended the act and made it more feasible to implement.

People who provide drug treatment and recovery services and advocates for criminal justice reform wrote Measure 110 in response to the high rate of drug addiction and overdoses in Oregon, and the disproportionate impact of those outcomes on Oregon's communities of color.

Their goal was to establish a more equitable health-based and effective approach to substance use disorder.

Yamhill County Sheriff's Office Issue Statement on Deputy Charged

News Release from Yamhill Co. Sheriff's Office

On the morning of September 1, 2023, Yamhill County Sheriff's Office Command staff received a complaint from a community member expressing concern over online content they believed to depict an employee of the Yamhill County Sheriff's Office, as well as insignia and uniforms of the Yamhill County Sheriff's Office, and areas within county buildings not accessible to the public.

Using information provided by the reporting party, YCSO Command staff were able to confirm there were, in fact, publicly accessible images and content available online which could constitute both violations of internal policies of Yamhill County Sheriff's Office and general policies of Yamhill County. Taking the initial information obtained, a consultation was made with the Yamhill County District Attorney's Office. Based on a review of the limited information that was known that day, we determined the alleged conduct may also be a violation of Oregon Re-





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vised Statute(s) and a criminal investigation was necessary.

On the afternoon of September 1, 2023, the same employee depicted in the content was placed on leave, pending an investigation. A request was made to an outside law enforcement agency, Washington County Sheriff's Office, to conduct the criminal investigation.

Due to the criminal investigation taking precedent, and the need to preserve any information obtained for purposes of any subsequent criminal prosecution, no internal affairs or human resources related investigation was initiated until the completion of the criminal investigation. The criminal investigation was completed in a relatively quick timeframe, given that search warrants had to be obtained and served to large digital content platforms headquartered outside Oregon.

Once the criminal investigation was completed, it was forward-

ed to the Yamhill County District Attorney on or about December 7, 2023. Yamhill County District Attorney's Office requested an outside review, given the fact that Yamhill County deputies work closely with the Yamhill County District Attorney's Office. The investigation was reviewed by the Benton County District Attorney's Office, and after review, charges were filed in Yamhill County Circuit Court on December 14, 2023.

Now that the criminal investigation is complete, the internal affairs investigation to determine



if any Sheriff's Office or County policies were violated will be completed expeditiously. While the filing of criminal charges is a very serious consideration for a law enforcement agency, we must be thorough and accurate in our response, follow the appropriate due process steps, and follow the applicable steps as outlined in the collective bargaining agreement.

As law enforcement professionals, we understand it is our responsibility to live up to the standards and expectations placed upon us.

Seven Ways to Organize and Store Decorations After the Holiday Season

Decorating a home for holidays is guite popular. A survey from the National Retail Federation found that 53 percent of respondents said they were planning to decorate their home or yard for Halloween in 2023. Lombardo Homes polled 1,000 Americans in 2021 and 94 percent said they celebrate Christmas in at least some way, and 84 percent said they decorate. According to Time2Play, which surveyed 1,000 Canadians about their holiday decorating habits, Manitoba puts up Christmas decor earlier than any other province, with these residents taking out decorations 4.3 weeks ahead of Christmas Day on average.

With so many avid holiday decorators, individuals will need to find ways to organize and store their seasonal items. Holiday decor comes in many different sizes - from the smallest tree ornaments to illuminated statues for the yard or inflatable items. Figuring out a storage plan can take a little effort. These seven tips can help.

1. Purchase clear, similarly sized storage bins and shelving racks, hanging them where you plan to keep the decorations. Most people prefer an out-of-the-way spot, such as in the garage, attic or basement. Label each bin by holiday and put the bins in chronological order to make finding items more convenient. 4. Use overhead or wall storage for holiday decor. Overhead spaces in the garage or basement walls can be good spaces to keep holiday decorations. Always keep bins and boxes off the floor so they are not vulnerable to damage related to leaks or floods.

5. Garment bags can protect larger decorations, such as wreaths, artificial trees or signs. If you have a large number of mechanical, illuminated or inflatable lawn ornaments, consider investing in a small shed where these items can be safely kept. Wrap the extension cords and any bracing stakes or strings used with the decorations so it's easy to find.

7. Preheat oven to 350 degrees F.

8. Coarsely chop the chestnuts and put in a large bowl. Add the stuffing mix, raisins, celery, apple, onion and salt and pepper. Toss to combine. Pour in the chicken stock, butter and cream and mix until evenly moistened. 9. Transfer to a baking dish and bake until the top is browned and crisp, about 1 hour.

Cumberland Sauce:

10. In a saucepan, combine the stock, port, vinegar, shallots, peppercorns and orange juice. Bring to a boil, cook until reduced by 2/3, about 25 minutes. Strain and refrigerate. Serve cold over roast goose.

Holiday Baking is Even Sweeter With Brownies

What would the holidays be without delicious foods to share with loved ones? In fact, crafting elaborate meals and baking goodies is par for the course once the weather begins to cool and decorations turn up on businesses and homes.

Many people have tried-and-true recipes they rely on each year, but there's always the possibility to give new tasty tidbits a try. There are so many tantalizing desserts to tickle the tongue, but this recipe for "Rocky Recchiuti Brownies" from "Chocolate Obsession" (Stewart, Tabori & Chang) by Michael Recchiuti and Fran Gage yields rich and chewy brownies that no holiday celebrant will be able to resist.

Rocky Recchiuti Brownies Makes 16 brownies

5 1/2 ounces 100 percent unsweetened chocolate, coarsely chopped, divided

10 tablespoons (5 ounces) unsalted butter with 82 percent butterfat, cut into 1-inch slices.

2/3 cup (31/2 ounces) unbleached all-purpose flour

1/2 teaspoon kosher salt

3 extra-large eggs, at room temperature

1 teaspoon pure vanilla extract, preferably Madagascar Bourbon 1 1/3 cups granulated cane sugar 1/3 cup walnut halves, roasted and roughly chopped

6 Tahitian Vanilla Bean Marshmallows, each 11/2 inches square, cut into quarters (see recipe below)

Preheat the oven to 325 F. Line the bottom of an 8-inch square baking pan with parchment paper and liberally coat the paper and the pan sides with flavorless vegetable oil.

Put 3 ounces of the chocolate and the butter in a medium stainless-steel bowl and set over a pot of simmering water. Heat, stirring occasionally, until the chocolate and butter melt and are fully combined and the mixture is smooth. Lift the bowl from the pot. Set aside.

Sift the flour and salt together into a bowl. In another bowl, combine the eggs and vanilla extract and whisk together by hand





until blended. Whisk in the sugar. Whisk the egg mixture into the chocolate. Add the flour and the remaining 21/2 ounces chocolate to the batter and, using a rubber spatula, mix well. Then mix in the walnuts.

Pour the batter into the prepared pan. Spread it evenly with a small offset spatula. Scatter the marshmallow pieces evenly over the surface and push them halfway into the batter. The tops should remain uncovered.

Bake on the middle shelf of the oven until the marshmallows are browned and a skewer inserted into the center of the brownie sheet comes out with some batter clinging to it, about 45 minutes. Let cool completely in the pan on a wire rack, then cover with plastic wrap and refrigerate until cold.

Run a table knife around the edge of the pan to loosen the sides of the brownie, and then slide the brownie, still on the paper, onto a work surface. Using a ruler to guide you and a sharp knife, cut into sixteen 2-inch squares. Store in an airtight container in the refrigerator for up to 3 weeks.

Tahitian Vanilla Bean Marshmallows About 40 marshmallows

Flavorless vegetable oil for the pan

3 3/4 teaspoons unflavored gelatin

3 tablespoons water

2 cups granulated cane sugar, divided into halves

1 1/2 cups light corn syrup

4 extra-large egg whites, at room temperature

1 Tahitian vanilla bean, split horizontally

About 3 cups powdered cane sugar for finishing



Line the bottom of an 8-by-12inch sheet pan with parchment paper and lightly coat the paper and the pan sides with flavorless vegetable oil. Put the gelatin in a small bowl. Add the water and stir. Set aside to soften.

Combine 1 cup of the sugar with the corn syrup in a large, heavy-bottomed pot. Use an unlined copper pot if you have one. Place over medium heat and cook, stirring occasionally with a wooden spoon, until the sugar melts. Then continue to cook, without stirring, until the mixture reaches 230 F on a candy thermometer. If any crystals form on the sides of the pan and the mixture heats, wash them down with a wet pastry brush.

Meanwhile, put the egg whites in the bowl of a stand mixer fitted with the whip attachment. Scrape the seeds from the vanilla bean into the bowl.

When the sugar syrup reaches 240 F, start to beat the egg whites on medium speed. When the whites form very soft peaks, add the remaining 1 cup sugar and continue beating.

When the sugar syrup reaches 250 F, remove it from the heat and stir in the softened gelatin. The syrup will foam up and triple in volume. Switch the mixer to high speed and slowly pour the syrup into the beaten egg whites, aiming for the side of the bowl. The whites will almost double in volume. Reduce the speed to medium-high and beat until the whites (not the outside of the bowl) are lukewarm to the touch, about 114 F, about 15 minutes.

Scrape the marshmallow mixture into the prepared pan and, using a small offset spatula, spread it evenly to the sides. Let cool completely at room temperature.

To cut the marshmallows, sift about 1/2 cup of the powdered sugar onto a work surface in a rectangle the size of a sheet pan. Sift another 2 cups powdered sugar into a large bowl. Run a thin-bladed knife around the edge of the pan to loosen the marshmallow. Invert the pan onto the sugared surface to unmold, then lift off the pan and peel off the parchment paper. Sift about 1/2 cup powdered sugar evenly over the top. Using a ruler to guide you and a lightly oiled sharp knife, cut the marshmallow sheet into 1 1/2-inch squares. It is easier if you use a pressing motion, rather than pull the knife. After cutting, toss the marshmallows, a few at a time, in the bowl of powdered sugar, coating them lightly.

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
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
