The group will stop and have lunch on the return trip.



Larry Deibel Steps Away after 23 Years as School Board Member

Stepping down from his post on the Sheridan School District Board after 23 years, Larry Deibel has sat in his position through five sitting presidents, five Sheridan superintendents, the building of the Faulconer-Chapman School, the Iraq War, the launch of the Nintendo Wii, The Great Recession, introduction of the iPad, the building of the Guantanamo bay detention camp, the launching of Facebook, Instagram, and Twitter, and the beginning of the Barbara Roberts Career Technical Education Center to name just a few events that have happened the past two decades.

I sat down with Larry and discussed the past two decades of being on the board.

Originally, Deibel had no intentions of running for the school board until three members were recalled from the board, another resigned, and his friend, Lucille Cruickshank, a former board member herself, talked him into

running.

With eleven individuals looking to fill the school board positions, including himself, He won one of the four spots, along with Scot Breeden, Harry Cooley, and Carol DeJong, to fill the Sheridan School District Board vacancies. "We had to be interviewed by the County Clerk and a County Commissioner since there wasn't anyone around to do it," Larry

stated.

Deibel has seen a lot of change since he took up his post in 2002. He stated that the most significant change over the past two decades was the board's control over the education of students in the district. He noted that as a board member, they are responsible for graduations, budgets, curriculum, and superintendents. When he started, he said, "We used to have more control over the school. We'd have to follow what the state says, but today, there are more guidelines, fewer options, and it seems to be getting worse."

When discussing the difference between then and now, he brought up two main points, stating teachers had five different insurance companies they could choose from back then. Oregon decided to change that and lump the teachers into the state, with Moda as their only option. He added that the limitations on curriculum from the Oregon Department of Education (ODE) took away some of the decision-making from the board. He said Faulconer-Chapman (FCS) is looking at a new math program. There were five to choose from, so the staff at FCS had to dig into only those and bring one before

Larry stated that funding for the schools is better today than back then, bringing in more student programs.

One of the biggest challenges was finding a good superintendent to run the schools. Two years after Larry was voted to the school board, Clair Garrick stepped down, and Roy Williams came in from Washington State to be the new superintendent. From there, he has helped hire superintendents A.J. Grauer, Steve Sugg, and the current superintendent, Dorie Vickery.


board faced during his time was The Great Recession. He stated, "We struggled to keep the school afloat when other schools were laying off people. We didn't lay off anyone because the teachers, when asked, were willing to give up their raise for a year or two." Though stepping down, he did talk about his thoughts of the future that he'd like to see for the Sheridan School District. When asked about lowering graduation requirements, Larry said, "It doesn't help the students. You have to raise that bar, keep that level high, and bring the students up to that level. He would also like to see the amount of students in the district fluctuate less, stating that Sheridan is more of a transit school. "The total student body was (in 2002) around 1,050 kids; the total now is 705," he said, adding that only a handful of certified teachers reside in the district. Most commute from McMinnville, Salem, Dallas, or Monmouth. "It would be nice to have teachers who reside in the same community as they work and be part of it. It makes it feel like we're juggling balls all the time."

When asked about any decisions he was overruled on, Deibel said he was the only board member who didn't want the four-day school week, feeling that it shortened the kids' learning time and cut too close to the minimum amount of school days required by ODE.

Larry did weigh in on the ongoing question of whether Sheridan and Willamina School Districts should join together.


"We've had several meetings with Willamina. Sheridan would vote yes and Willamina no one time, then the next Sheridan would vote no and Willamina yes. We got to the point where we had a member of the ODE come to the meeting to see how the two districts could be combined. They said Sheridan, with the largest population, would control the seven-person board with four seats, and the idea got cut from there." Larry said. He added that the school districts joining up could mean more classes and programs for the stu-

Larry is unsure of what he will do in the future, but running for another office or position may not be out of the question. Until then, his parting words for the incoming board members are, "If you believe in something, tell your opinion and stick to it."

Slow Day for Kiwanis Kids Fishing Derby

sun rays during the event.

In the 6-Under, the youngest contestant, Carter Gilmore, at 1-1/2 years old, was the big winner, bringing in an 11-1/2-inch catfish, with the help of his parents, of course. Others in the division were Stella Webber, James Bowman, and Colton Reynolds.

Top winners in each category walked away with a new fishing pole and second and third-place finishers a new tackle box. All winners received a jar of Powerbait to add to their gear.
