Shirley Hamilton April 19, 1942 - June 12, 2025

It is with great sorrow, yet profound joy in Jesus, that we share the passing of our beloved Shirley Hamilton, who gracefully entered into the presence of her Lord and Savior on June 12, 2025. Shirley was a vibrant spirit, a testament to God's love, and a constant source of encouragement and light for everyone blessed to know her. She lived each day with unwavering faith, always looking forward to her heavenly home.

Shirley was born on April 19,1942 to Rosa Anna and Vernon G. Miller. She grew up in Middlebury and Elkhart, Indiana with her eight siblings. As a little girl, she dreamed of becoming a missionary nurse. After graduating from Bethany Christian School in Rosten, Indiana in 1960, she entered the Voluntary Service program of the Mennonite church, embarking on a 1-year term of service Portland, Oregon. While working as a Nurse Aide at Good Samaritan Hospital, she met a (in her words) "handsome, kind, courteous, Christian fellow that I took a liking to..." They dated that year and drove back to Elkhart to be married on Nov. 4, 196. In 1965, they moved back to Portland where Shirley worked at Good Samaritan Hospital until her retirement.

Shirley lived out her love for God and others with remarkable generosity. One of her favorite things was cheering for and feeding all her "kids." The amount of food she made for high school and college sports teams, class trips, church youth groups, and music groups was truly beyond comprehension. If she wasn't busy supporting her sons, Rex and Kent, and grandkids in their athletic, academic, and musical endeavors, she was supporting someone else's children. She found immense joy in cheering for those she loved.

Shirley naturally gave of her time and talents. She had a lovely voice and sang songs of praise throughout her lifefirst in church choir as a child, then with her husband. Bruce. and their friends in an octet at Portland Mennonite Church, and later with the Singing Christmas Tree. She was also a talented seamstress, making countless gifts including comforters and baby blankets for those she knew and to donate to charity sales. More recently, she spent hours decorating Christmas Cards for Gospel Echoes to use in ministry. She also devoted countless hours to praying for those she loved. If Shirley met you, she loved you and likely prayed for you many times. Her prayers, hugs, and encouragement will be deeply missed

Six Charged With Offenses During Protests Near Local Ice Office

Six defendants made their first appearances in federal court today after committing various offenses—including assaulting federal officers and creating a hazard on federal property during ongoing protest gatherings near a U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) office in South Portland.

Samuel Tate Berry, 29, who has recently resided in Gearhart and Seaside, Oregon, as well as Kelso, Washington, has been charged by criminal complaint with the misdemeanor offenses of as-

saulting a federal officer and failure to comply with official signs and directions.

Juniper Perry Weed, 21, of Jackson, Michigan, has been charged by criminal complaint with the misdemeanor offenses of assaulting a federal officer and failure to comply with official signs and directions.

Eduardo Diaz Guardado, 22, of Vancouver, Washington, has been charged by criminal complaint with the misdemeanor offense of assaulting a federal

Andrew James Beason, 53, of Beaverton, Oregon, has been charged by information with the misdemeanor offense of failing to obey a lawful order.

Nokomis Lee, 22, of Grand Ronde, Oregon, has been charged by information with the misdemeanor offense of failing to obey a lawful order.

Liam Harry Houpis, 22, also of Vancouver, has been charged by information with the misdemeanor offense of creating a hazard on federal property.

According to court documents and information shared in court, on June 18, 2025, several hundred people gathered near an ICE office in South Portland where, for more than week, individuals have repeatedly targeted the building and various federal law enforcement officers with mortar fireworks, rocks, bricks, glass bottles, signs, and makeshift shields. At approximately 6:38pm, federal officers on site were informed that six official vehicles were en route and needed to enter the property via a vehicle gate blocked by the crowd.

After issuing warnings and asking the group to move, federal officers opened the vehicle gate and advanced on the crowd to clear the driveway for the arriving vehicles. Defendants Berry and Weed failed to comply with the officers' directions and, while being placed under arrest, assaulted officers. Later the same evening, a crowd again blocked the building's vehicle gate and, after being warned a second time, were cleared to allow law enforcement vehicles to exit the property. During this second clearing, at approximately 10:55pm, defendants Beason and Lee failed to obey lawful orders issued by law enforcement. A fifth defendant, Guardado, was observed possessing a high-powered laser pointer that he pointed at a federal officer, striking the officer in the eye and temporarily blinding him.

The following evening, on June 19, 2025, several dozen individuals again gathered at the South Portland ICE office, when, at approximately 10:20pm, defendant Houpis was observed using a drill and screws on plywood doors affixed to the building's exterior in an attempt to prevent federal officers from exiting the building. All six defendants made their first appearances in federal court today before a U.S. Magistrate Judge and were released on conditions pending future court proceedings.

Criminal informations and complaints are only accusations of a crime, and defendants are presumed innocent unless and until proven guilty.



Get Involved Says Willamina 4th of July Grand Marshal Jerry Buczynski

Tucked away in a tiny office stuffed with memorabilia of past teams, gear for future teams, and almost half a lifetime of memories at the Willamina High School, Jerry Buczynski, the long-time figure of the Willamina athletic program talked about the past, his future, saying "Nope, no Walmart greeter for me, and that he was absolutely surprised at being chosen the Grand Marshal of the Willamina Old Fashioned 4th of July celebration. "I heard it through the grapevine; somebody on the committee called my wife, but no one actually called me, he said with a laugh, adding, "Then, when we were doing a highway clean-up, a member of the committee informed me, so that was the first official notification I got.

Jerry, who is retired at the end of this school year, got his start at Willamina High School in 1983 as the Junior Varsity basketball coach. For the past 42 years, he has had his hand at one time or another in almost every sport at the school but is most well known for his role as the head basketball coach and athletic director of the Bulldogs.

When asked how he felt about being chosen, he stated, "It's pretty humbling; I don't do this for things; I do it for the kids and always have. You like to have a pat on the back once in a while, but you don't do this for that."

"When I came here, I was young, and I thought I knew it all; I'll be here two to three years, then move on; I'm not going to be in Willamina that long. If someone had told me in 1983 that I would be here for 42 years if I had \$200, I'd bet against it, and I would have lost it," he laughed, adding, "I had chances to leave two different times, went through interview processes and got offered jobs and turned them down. I felt like this is where I'm supposed to be, and I've never regretted that.'

On the topic of what to do to make a difference in the community, Jerry exclaimed, "Give back! I started doing highway clean-up a little over a year ago. Why the heck was I not doing that before? That was cool; that was really a lot of fun. Then I started getting some kids involved; we must have had around 15 kids out

there; to me, that's the really neat part. Wherever you are, just get involved."

One of his favorite sayings was from Forrest Edward "Frosty" Westering, long-time football coach from Pacific Lutheran University, stating, "Make the big time where you are." Jerry added that it doesn't have to be a big place in order to make a big impact.

Asked about why he thought he was chosen, he jokingly said, "Well, they probably asked about eight other people, and they turned it down," before more seriously replying, "I don't know, I could say something, but then it feels like I'm patting myself on the back and that's not who I am.

When you spend 42 years doing things for kids, maybe somebody noticed, I don't know." He mentioned that it's been "pretty cool" coaching kids the past few years of the kids he coached towards the beginning of his career. "It was eye-opening this past year when Mark Littlejohn passed away; I know he's not the first one of former players that we've lost since I've been here. I got asked by the family to speak at his funeral. You're not going to say no to something like that, and I'm glad I didn't because I got to say some things in that area that maybe I only knew about from his time in high school that people who knew him later may not have known. Those kids are in their late 50s, and I still look at them as kids. I have a basketball that I already took

home that was signed by some of my earliest players, and on the front of it, it says Jerry's kids, and that's still how I look at them."

Jerry's had little history with the Willamina 4th of July celebration. He and his wife usually traveled to her hometown of lone, a town even smaller than Willamina, located 80 miles east of The Dalles, to celebrate with her family there. "I can't remember the year, but we used to have an old yellow van; we were taking a team to, I think it was Hong Kong, so we had a portable basketball hoop on the back of the trailer, and as we went through the parade, and had kids shooting baskets. It was an advertising that we were going on this trip." he recalled.

When asked what the Willamina 4th of July means to him, Jerry stated, "It's what the town is known for. It's celebrating America, and when you do it in a little town, it means more here than it does in a lot of places."

Jerry wouldn't change a thing about the current Willamina 4th of July celebration. He stated that the people running it are doing a great job of reaching out and getting people involved. He added though, "Like up here at the school and the booster club, it's the same people for so many years, and they get tired, so if I changed anything (about the 4th), it would be that younger people start stepping in and get involved in helping run it, because they are going to be the next ones to helping run it later on, and I don't think there's enough of them doing that."

What kept him in the City of Willamina? Jerry responded, "I like it here. Willamina is not for everyone, but I seem to fit. We would have moved here at one time, but when we looked for a house, we couldn't find one here. I wish there were more apartments for the younger kids, the ones that do stay.

There's no apartments here for them, and you end up losing those kids." He stated that Willamina Lumber has done so much for the community, with many kids heading out after graduation and having a good life. Still, he specifically named Jerry Bailey, "He's unbelievable; I know he's worked out there a long time, but what he does to help this school is unbelievable.

To the kids of the West Valley graduating this year, Jerry has these words, "Follow what you want to do. If it's somewhere else, then that's what you have to do, but don't ever forget about coming back, whether it's a visit or someday you move back, because this is home to many of them. The 4th of July is a good reason to return for at least a day. It's funny when I see kids that come back after being away for a while say that things really haven't changed, they've changed, but they haven't; that is the neat thing about a small town."

Willamina Held City Wide Cleanup

The City of Willamina conducted a City Wide Cleanup event this last Saturday, June 21.

The event gave residents of Willamina a chance to drop off items not easily stuffed into the garbage and recycle bins to be taken away by Western Oregon Recology, including furniture, car batteries, electronics, scrap metal, and yard debris.

The City of Willamina set up a collection point at the end of Adams St. Almost three full garbage dumpsters and 30 tires were collected. City Manager Bridget Meneley estimated that 6,000 pounds of scrap metal

were dropped off at the collection point.

An organization that also benefited from the cleanup was the Willamina Food Pantry, with the City of Willamina suggesting a two-can donation with each drop-off to help stock the shelves.

This event was only available for the residents of Willamina. Still, the City of Willamina will host a mattress recycling event from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. on Saturday, July 26, at Willamina City Hall. The mattress drop-off will be open to all Yamhill and Polk County residents.

Total Destruction Preps for Mud Drags

Started around 25 years ago, the annual Willamina Mud Drags that will take place this Saturday, June 28, has become a staple of summer events for the West Valley Community and a significant boost to the Willamina 4th of July Fireworks show.

The race, which runs the week before the 4th of July, is full of vehicles of all kinds, from stock 4-cylinder to the popular openclass featuring cars with multiple modifications and the cause for full coverage over the walkway approximately 100 feet behind the start of the drag race to others dawning hearing protection in one form or another. Recently, the addition of side-by-sides has been authorized for use in the mud drags. "It was a muddy mess out there in the pouring down rain this Saturday," Sherry mentioned about working in the storm that swept the area this last weekend.

The planning for this event starts around the April time-frame when Mud Drag Coordinator Sherry Dawkins of the approximately 30-member Total Destruction Racing Team (TDRT) starts hitting the pavement to find sponsors for the event. About a month before the event, members of TDRT hit the dirt and performed mowing, putting up safety barriers, weeding, and prepping the grounds to get things ready for

the big event. This year, the Willamina 4th of July Committee helped support the prep, along with other volunteers like K&E Excavating, Charles Quinton, Jeff Lockwood, Chris Lucia, Linnie Ledbetter, Bill Cawley, and Cliff Roselle for donating time or equipment to push the mud around for the race.

Sherry stated that in the first 10-15 years of the mud drags, the maximum 110 allowed participants were hit year after year, and teams as far as North Dakota, as far as Sherry remembers, traveled to run the mud, but as teams dwindled and broke apart, the current participation has dipped down to just around 70-80 entries in the past few years. "Too many of the kids now are getting into street bikes," Sherry stated about the drop in mud dragsters.

Sherry said that this year, bleachers will be available for seating thanks to the Delphian School and Confederated Tribes of Grand Ronde, but still advises individuals to bring chairs as seating will be limited. Awnings will be allowed only in the back area of the General Admissions area. Most of all, she mentioned that the best thing the community should do to make this year a success is come down, have some fun, be safe, and drop some dollars off to support the Willamina 4th of July fireworks.

ODHS Distributing Emergency Kits And Batteries to Eligible Individuals

Older adults and people with disabilities who qualify for assistance can request free emergency kits and batteries to stay safe during disasters.

Emergencies like wildfires, heat waves and floods can happen at any time. It's important to be ready. But for many people, it's hard to know where to begin. They also may not have money for supplies. During the COVID-19 pandemic, the Oregon Department of Human Services (ODHS) saw that many people needed help getting ready for emergencies. This was especially true for older adults, people with physical disabilities, and those with intellectual or developmental disabilities (I/DD). Many of them rely on electricity for important medical and safety equipment.

To help, ODHS got support from the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA). Two ODHS programs — the Office of Aging and People with Disabilities (APD) and the Office of Developmental Disabilities Services (ODDS) used ARPA funds to give emergency supplies to those in need.

What's available now?

APD has about 18,000 emergency kits and 1,200 power stations available for older adults and people with physical disabilities who get Medicaid in-home supports. Those who qualify get long-term services and supports through APD and some county governments These items include:

•Emergency kits — These kits are filled with supplies like flashlights, blankets, first aid


items and food.

 Power stations — These are portable, rechargeable batteries. They can provide power when the electricity is out.

If you think you qualify and want supplies, please contact your case manager. If you don't know who your case manager is, call or visit the local office where you receive APD services. ODHS lists contact information for all state and county offices that provide services.




