Burst Pipe on Bridge St. Caused Disruptions in Sheridan Area

Last Tuesday, May 27, water could be seen flowing on the streets at the intersection of S Bridge St. and SW Railroad St. as Sheridan Public Works repaired a water main line that feeds the Southwest area of Sheridan. The main developed a large leak while Public Works was replacing a service lateral. Two personnel worked approximately 20 feet in the close to 10-foot wide hole at the intersection as bilge pumps were utilized to bring water up and out of the hole and safely away from the project to allow the repair to be accomplished. This leak caused the Sheridan High and Faulconer-Chapman schools to shut down early on Tuesday from a lack of water

pressure. Within two hours, the crew had a repair in place. Tuesday afternoon, the City of Sheridan put out a boil water notice for the Southwest Sheridan

Area due to the potential hazard of harmful bacteria that could

have entered the water distribution system during low pressure. Schools remained closed and

boil notice in effect until lab testing could be conducted on the water to ensure the water was safe for use. On Thursday morning, May 29, the City of Sheridan lifted the notice, and schools reopened the next day.



Richard C. "Dick" Houston October 4, 1940 - May 29, 2025 Richard C. "Dick" Houston of Grand Ronde and Sheridan left this world on May 29, 2025, to join the Lord with his son Dean and brother Denny.

He was born on October 4, 1940, to Bob and Dot Houston of Grande Ronde, OR.

A graduate of Willamina High School, he enjoyed wrestling and playing football. Dick left the area to pursue a career in the military, serving in the Coast Guard as a search and rescue specialist and aircraft engine mechanic. He returned to Sheridan in 1980 and settled in Dallas in the early 2000s.

He is survived by his brother Bud, wife Anita, sons Daniel Lehnert and Douglas Houston, and daughter-in-law Claudia, with grandchildren Shannel, Valentina, and Alysia.

Claudia and Douglas remember him as a superb example of a father, strong and hard-working. He was an exceptional father who had the love of God and family. (Rom. 8 verses 38 to 39) Death can't interrupt his union with Christ. According to Psalms 48:14, God has given us that. And He directs us by His Spirit, through His Word, so that we are never alone. As you go today, we pray that this God will be your guide from now, even into the end.

His grandchildren have great insights into the person that made Dick such a fantastic man:

"I can only speak of Richard Houston through a granddaughter's eyes, but I can testify that he was deeply loved by all who knew him. Growing up, when I learned about the cartoon "Popeye, the Sailor." I thought that it was designed after him. The similarities were uncanny for me at the time: strong, tattooed, and always wearing a hat (and

ves. bald).

One of my favorite things to do with Grandpa when I was younger would be to do something mischievous in front of him so that he would chase and tickle me. This earned me the nickname "snicklefritz" (meaning "mischievous child"). I know he liked it, though, since he also had a streak of mischief in himself.

Yes, he was physically strong and tough, but it takes a certain kind of strength to be gentle. Gentleness is a strength that cannot be taught or trained but only shaped through experience and personal choice. No matter what happened in life, he would "find a way to make it work" without complaining and always seeking the best for others.

Grandpa was someone who loved me unconditionally. I knew I could always share things with him, and he would just listen with an open mind. He always believed in me, even if it was hard for me to believe in myself. I will continue to live to make him proud, just as I always was proud of him.

I know that his love lives on through his family and friends. His soul always sought after God, and I know that he is under the Creator's care even now.

Grandpa is a man who had a strong, large frame with arms adorned in tattoos, but behind his intimidating demeanor is a man with a heart of gold. Richard is someone who always looked towards God, even contributing his carpentry skills to the church. He was slow to anger, always caring, and had a mischievous sense of humor. He was a simple man with only one wish in his life: to spend more time with his family and his sons. A strong and loving husband, father, and grandfather, he'll always rest in our hearts." The funeral date is pending.



A Message from the Sheridan Superintendent

Dear Sheridan Families,

On behalf of our students, staff, and yes, our buildings - **THANK YOU** for standing behind our community's children and passing our Sheridan Schools bond.

The message from our community following our previous two bond attempts was clear: narrow the list down to the most critical needs that will allow our schools to continue to function. We listened, did that work, and you were true to your word. We are so grateful you have stayed beside us as we sought a level of funding that worked for our community as well as our schools. While projects not included in this bond will still need to be addressed in the future, this will allow us to make the most essential updates and repairs to the buildings where our children spend hours each day.

We celebrate this moment - and we also know the work has just begun!

The next step in the bond process is the formation of a Community Bond Oversight Committee, which will ensure bond funds are spent appropriately, and as promised. The application for this 5-7 person committee will be posted to the Sheridan School District website and Facebook page later this month.

Committee members must live in the boundaries of Sheridan School District and will be joined by representatives from the District, the District Board and the construction contractors to receive updates on budget, projects, communications and other bond related topics. In addition to bond projects, the committee will also have oversight on projects funded by the OSCIM grant and any additional capital improvement grants received by the district during this period.

Applications are due by June 30, 2025, and meetings are estimated to begin in Fall 2025.

We are very anxious to begin the work outlined in the bond, and will be working through the process of selling bonds, forming the Oversight Committee and selecting contractors in the coming months. Some smaller projects may be completed during the 2025-26 school year, however large-scale projects will be scheduled to begin in the Summer of 2026, which will allow time for planning and permitting processes to be complete.

We are grateful for your support and look forward to seeing these improvements be implemented over the coming years!

Summer EBT For School-Aged Children Returns For Second Year

News Release from Oregon Dept. of Human Services Need to know:

- Oregon Summer EBT is a federal benefits program to help families buy food for their school-aged children during the summer.
- Oregon expects to provide up to 370,000 school-aged children with around \$40 million in Summer EBT food benefits this year.
- Each eligible child receives a one-time payment of \$120 in food benefits.
- About 341,500 eligible chil-

dren received Summer EBT automatically on May 22, 2025 but some families need to apply.

(Salem, OR) – Oregon Summer Electronic Benefits Transfer (Summer EBT) is a food benefits program that helps shrink the hunger gap when children are on summer break and don't have easy access to healthy meals at school. Summer EBT provides \$120 per eligible child to buy food.

This is the second year of Oregon's Summer EBT program. On May 22, 2025, about 336,000 children got the benefit on an Oregon EBT card. Families should check their EBT card balance at www.ebtedge.com to confirm receipt.

Families who didn't automatically get Summer EBT on May 22, 2025 should check program requirements before applying. Families can check requirements at sebt.oregon.gov or by contacting the Summer EBT Call Center at 833-673-7328. The Call Center is open weekdays from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., PDT. Apply online in English and Spanish or with a paper application in multiple languages at sebt.oregon. gov.

"When school doors close for the summer, the need for regular, healthy meals doesn't disappear. Last year, the summer EBT program bridged a critical gap for thousands of Oregon families, helping to replace those essential 10 meals per child, per week, that they receive when school is in session," said Dr. Charlene Williams, Director of the Oregon Department of Education (ODE). "We are proud to continue this partnership with ODHS to not only feed children, but to nurture their potential during crucial developmental months. Our continued commitment ensures that summer can be a season of growth and opportunity for all children, regardless of their economic circumstances."

In 2024, about 362,000 children participated and received \$43 million in Summer EBT food benefits their families spent in their local grocery stores, farmers markets, and other places.

"Summer EBT is one more way we can prevent kids from going hungry when school is out. Summer EBT is an evidence-based program proven to reduce child hunger and support healthier diets," said Fariborz Pakseresht, ODHS Director. "Child hunger can have lasting impacts on health and academic achievement. Getting every eligible child connected to Summer EBT will help Oregon's children thrive year-round and as they grow up."

Who is eligible for Summer EBT food benefits?

Families can find details about Summer EBT at sebt.oregon.gov. Your school-age child may be automatically eligible if:

- Your family received Summer EBT benefits through an approved application in 2024.
- Your family gets SNAP, TANF or Oregon Health Plan (Medicaid) and meets income rules.
- Your child gets free or reduced-price school meals and meets income rules.
- Your child is in foster care, in

migrant education, in a qualified Head Start, experiencing homelessness, or part of the Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations (FDPIR).

Children who are automatically eligible received Summer EBT on May 22, 2025.

Your school-age child may be eligible by application if:

- Your family meets the federal income requirements for free or reduced-price meals at school, and
- Your child attends a school that participates in the National School Lunch Program (NSLP) or School Breakfast Program (SBP).
 Families must apply by Sept. 3, 2025.

Receiving Summer EBT does not impact participation in other summer meal programs.

Summer EBT benefits are not considered in a public charge test and are available to children regardless of immigration status.

How will families receive Summer EBT food benefits?

The benefits will be placed on an Oregon EBT card and can be used at most grocery stores, farmers markets, and more.

Families that need a new card should call 855-328-6715, Monday through Friday, from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. (PDT).

Families that think their children may be eligible and didn't get benefits on May 22 must apply by September 3. If approved, they will receive an Oregon EBT card by mail.

Stolen Summer EBT benefits can't be replaced.





The long-time restaurant in the heart of Willamina, Coyote Joe's, changed ownership earlier this year and finally reopened its doors on Monday, June 2, as the community questioned when it would finally happen.

When asked about the delay, Chris DePrimo, one of the owners of the Bonanza Restaurant and Bar and now one of the owners of Coyote Joe's, stated the state took a while with the paperwork. "Last Thursday I got my OLCC and final health, all in the same hour. So we knew we would open on Monday."

Danielle Vollman, manager of the Bonanza, said that Trisha Huey, who worked at Coyote Joe's before becoming the

weekday morning waitress at the Bonanza, will take on managerial duties at Coyote Joe's.

Some of the work done at Coyote Joe's while the doors were closed included cleaning and renovations to the dining room and diner, new flooring and siding inside, installation of a salad bar in the dining area and an ice cream bar in the diner area, renovating the old conference room area into a small bar, and the installation of televisions throughout the establishment.

The menu is similar to the Bonanza, featuring American fare of burgers, entrees, sandwiches, and breakfast.

Danielle said that they plan to have an outside seating area in the future.









Sheridan School District Bond 36-236 Should Pass in Voting

As of May 29, 2025, the 36-236 Sheridan School District 48J: Bonds for Safety, Security, and Capital Improvements looks like it will pass with a current vote of 601-555, with 52% of votes saying yes in the May 20 Special Elections.

This \$6 million (M) bond will be supplemented by the Oregon School Capital Improvement Matching Program, which will also provide the district with an additional \$6M grant, raising the total funds available to the Sheridan School District to \$12M. The last bonds that citizens of the Sheridan School District approved were an \$8.5 million bond in 2003 to build the now Faulconer-Chapman K-8 school building that opened in 2004 and a \$2.1 million bond for renovations and start the removal of asbestos tiles in the high school that ended in 2022.

The National Center for Education states a school building begins to deteriorate rapidly after 40 years, and after 60 years, most schools are abandoned. The current Sheridan High School was built in 1963, making it 62 years old.

Once the final results are certified, and if the bond does pass, the Sheridan School District has planned the following list of

upgrades and repairs:

Safety and security upgrades include paging systems, clocks, intercom devices, access control, security cameras and systems, and exterior lighting.

Sheridan High School upgrades will include a secured entryway, continuing to replace asbestos flooring, repair and replace roofing, upgrade interior lighting and paint, paving and parking lot improvements, newer gym roof restoration, exterior lighting, and modernizing the science lab that is original to the construction of the school.



The bond will go towards projects like restoring this corroded, deteriorated exit door at the Sheridan High School.

Faulconer-Chapman will have improvements made to its HVAC system, the addition of security cameras and intrusion system, parking lot lighting, upgrading lights to LED to meet current coding, refinishing the new gym floor, and an update to its music classrooms, gym, locker rooms, bathrooms, storage areas, and roof restoration of the old gym. Some renovations will also serve

the community in general, as spaces allocated will be updated


to accommodate the public as an emergency shelter in case of natural disasters.

The bond will cost taxpayers within the Sheridan School District \$0.80 per \$1,000 assessed property value. The amount each property would pay may vary depending on assessed values each year as housing market fluctuation occurs. Still, once the taxes collected hit the \$6 million mark, taxpayers will no longer be charged for the bond. The passing of this bond would jump Sheridan from last to second to last place on the amount paid for bonds in the Yamhill County area, with Willamina taking the lowest spot at an estimated \$0.53 per \$1,000 of assessed property value.

Once approved, the district will appoint a Citizens Bond Oversight Committee of community members, parents, and district staff that will actively monitor and report to the school board the progress and use of funds to ensure it falls within the bond's outline and state laws. This bond will not use funds to support the Barbara Roberts Career Tech Education Center project.







Fans of grilled food may insist grilling is an art form, and there are tricks of the trade that suggest producing delicious foods cooked over an open flame is more complicated than novices may think. Seasoning a grill is one such endeavor. Novices may not know what goes into seasoning a grill, but doing so can make it easier to remove cooked foods from grates that can become sticky as grills are used with greater frequency. Seasoning a grill involves oiling its cooking surfaces and warming it. Some grill manufacturers even recommend seasoning brand new grills prior to using them. Various cooking oils can suffice when seasoning a grill, but the grilling experts at ThermoPro advise using an oil with a high smoking point. When applying oil to the grates, users can utilize a basting brush, rag or even a spray bottle. Once the oil has been applied, heat the grill, without any food on it, for roughly 30 minutes, or until the oil begins to smoke or burn.



Bulldogs Fall in Second Round Playoff

The Bulldogs' Paisley DeLoe singled in the bottom of the seventh in hopes of starting a rally for Willamina, followed by two base-on-balls for Brianna Buswell and Zoie Sickles to load up the bases. Lily Crowe hit a sacrifice fly to center, scoring her sister Camille Crowe (sub-runner for DeLoe).

A wild pitch on ball four to Cicily McKenna scored Brianna Buswell, bringing the Bulldogs' score to 4-10 against Glide with two outs left in the game and two runners in scoring position before the Wildcats were able to

put down the Bulldog rally.

The Bulldogs, who had a season team batting average of .411, had a hard time connecting with the ball, getting only two hits and stranding 11 runners on base from the 13 walks provided by the Wildcats pitcher.


