

Dear Sheridan Families,

With kids at home and Hometown Days behind us, there are still events throughout Sheridan being hosted by our community partners that you can attend with your student. Add a note to your calendar for some of these upcoming opportunities:

On July 31 the Yamhill County Early Learning Hub will host a free Family Picnic from 4-7pm at the Sheridan City Park. Pizza will be provided as well as games and prizes for both children and adults, alongside information on supportive resources available for residents of Sheridan. The picnic happens every year and is always a great way to spend an evening at the park. The Sheridan City Library is open Tuesday-Saturday each week and is a great reason for an outing with children who need to get out of the house! Finger Licking Chicken-Fried Steak Bites With Sauce

Country-fried or chicken-fried are terms given to breaded and deep-fried poultry and meat. In fact, chicken-fried steak is an institution in the American south, where thinly sliced cuts of cubed steak are prepared in this way and served with country gravy and biscuits. There's not much room for improvement in this classic. or is there? In "Best-Ever Steak Fingers," chicken-fried steak gets a makeover into easily picked up finger foods tailor made for dipping in a savory sauce. They are perfect for picnics and meals on the go. Dig in, courtesy of "Lord Honey Traditional Southern Recipes with a Country Bling Twist" (Pelican Publishing) by Chef Jason Smith.

Best-Ever Steak Fingers

Serves 6

Veggie oil for frying

2 cups all-purpose flour 2 tablespoons all-purpose steak

seasoning, divided

1 cup buttermilk

1 egg

4 pounds beef cube steak

Dipping sauce

1 cup mayo

1/2 cup sour cream



2 tablespoons yellow mustard 1 package dry Italian salad dressing

2 tablespoons dried dill
Probest, even to lewest ten

Preheat oven to lowest temperature.

Pour 1 inch oil into a large castiron or other thick-bottomed skillet. Turn heat to medium low. Place the flour in a shallow pan. Sprinkle half the steak seasoning over flour, and mix together.


Cut steak into 1-inch strips. Add the rest of the steak seasoning, rubbing into each piece. Turn heat to medium on skillet. Place each strip in the flour mix, then into the milk and egg mix, then back into the flour. Shake off excess and place each strip on a plate. Repeat until all strips are coated.

Sprinkle a few drops flour over oil. If it sizzles, it's ready to fry. Using tongs or a fork, place strips side by side in hot oil. Don't crowd the pan, or it will cool the oil.

After about 2 to 3 minutes, when strips start to brown on bottom, turn over. When second side is brown, remove and place on a cooling rack that has

been set on a cookie sheet. Set the sheet in the preheated oven. Repeat until all fingers are cooked.

In a bowl, whisk together all dipping sauce ingredients.

Last issue's crossword solution National Lottery Day is July 17, Where Does the Money Go in Oregon?

The Oregon Lottery allocation of funds received is as follows: Prizes 92.5%, Funded programs 4.2%, Retailers (commissions) 2%, Operating expenses 1.3%.

The main beneficiaries of the funded programs include:

Public Education: The majority of Lottery funds support public schools, from kindergarten to higher education, including initiatives like the Early Literacy Initiative, improving school attendance, funding Oregon Tech programs, and supporting the Oregon School for the Deaf.

Economic Development: Approximately 26% of Lottery funds are allocated to job creation and economic growth across a variety of industries such as manufacturing, hightech, agriculture, fisheries, solar, medical, tourism, and small businesses. These funds help local communities through employment and business expansion

State Parks: Lottery dollars support the maintenance, improvement, and development of Oregon's over 250 state parks, including projects like utility upgrades at Harris Beach State Park and the creation of new facilities at Cottonwood Canyon State Park.

Natural Habitats: Lottery funds are used to restore and enhance natural habitats and watersheds through projects like the Klamath River restoration, clearing the Willamette River of invasive weeds, and supporting the Ashland All Lands Forest Resiliency Project which reduces wildfire risk and improves water quality. The Oregon Watershed Enhancement Board (OWEB) distributes these funds, which also come from federal dollars and salmon license plate revenue.

Outdoor School: A portion of the Lottery's net proceeds is dedicated to funding Outdoor School programs for middle school students, ensuring they have opportunities to learn about wildlife and the environment


Veteran Services: Since 2016, a small percentage of Lottery funds are dedicated to supporting programs and services for veterans.

Problem Gambling Services: One percent of Lottery revenues are allocated to fund problem gambling prevention and treatment efforts throughout Oregon. These funds support programs administered by the Oregon Health Authority (OHA) Problem Gambling Services (PGS), including prevention programs, treatment, and referral services via a helpline and website.

Permits are required for garage, yard, basement, porch, estate, moving sales and flea markets or any other sale of tangible personal property.

It's Easy! Permit applications are available online at www.cityofsheridanor.com. Once the application is submitted, we will generate the permit and email it to the applicant. The permit can be printed and posted at the location or kept available on the applicant's mobile or electronic device. Please call City Hall if you are having problems with the permit application.





Permits will only be issued between the hours of 8:30 a.m. and 3:30 p.m. Monday through Thursday and between 8:30 a.m. and 2:30 p.m. on Fridays.

General Regulations:

- Four Sales allowed per calendar year; each sale may be three consecutive days with hours between 8 a.m. and 7 p.m.
- Items for sale may not be displayed on any City of Sheridan right-of-way and may not block emergency personnel access.
- All items not sold must be removed right away.
- Sold items must be removed within 24 hours.

Signs:

- NO signs allowed on any public right-of-way.
- **NO signs** allowed on utility poles, street signs or traffic control signs.
- **Two signs** (No larger than 6 sq. ft. each) permitted on property where sale is held.
- Four signs (No larger than 4 sq. ft. each) permitted on property other than where sale is to be held, provided that the sale property is not on a major thoroughfare (Hwy 18B). Written permission must be obtained from property owners where signs are placed.
- ALL SIGNS must be removed once the sale ends.

helped in making the Veterans Powwow possible.

She also gave a very special thanks to the Veterans Honor Guard for their part in the ceremonies and the parking and cleanup crew that kept a regular two-day after-festivities job to one day of easy work.

July Willamina City Council Meeting: Open Council

The City of Willamina passed a review of their legal, financial, and other documents related to the loan for the Water Intake Project.

The Mid-Willamette Valley Council of Governments has re-designated the West Valley Enterprise Zone for the Willamina and Sheridan areas. Qualifying businesses within the zone can be eligible for reduced or eliminated property taxes for a set period. The purpose of an Executive Zone is to stimulate growth, attract investment, and foster job creation.

Chris McClaren from Hagan Hamilton Insurance presented to the council the renewal of the City's insurance plan that took effect July 1. The plan's premium increased to \$ 72,503.24, an 8% increase over the 2024-2025 plan. Increased property values, increased payroll projections, and a slight rise in cyber risk premiums were the driving factors for the increase. There was a drop in the City's experience modification factor, reflecting the City's reduction of workers comp claims, which led to savings in the City's insurance plan. Hagan Hamilton has been the insurance agent of Willamina for decades. Councilor Wilson inquired whether the City, having been a long-time customer of Hagan Hamilton, had ever sought quotes from other insurance agencies. A motion was made by Councilor Wilson and passed by the council to shop around for quotes to ensure the City is receiving the best value for its insurance needs.

Jennifer Eckels submitted a letter of resignation to the council on June 17, 2025, stepping down from her position due to a change in her work schedule that conflicted with council meetings. The motion to accept the resignation passed, leaving an open seat on the city council. This seat will be published to notify the public and filled by a majority vote of the council once sufficient applicants or time has been met. A motion was passed to look into the council charter to see if Council President Rita Baller could be moved to the four-year term left vacated by former Councilor Eckels, with the appointed council member filling the vacancy for a two-year term. The council will revisit once the dive into the charter is complete, moving forward with the information found.

A review of council rules and procedures conducted in 2023 has been reviewed and finalized by the city's legal team, with recommended edits and updates based on current city ordinances, processes, and state regulations. City Manager Bridget Meneley

said that there is still some clarification on when the council can or should abstain from voting. Councilors decided to refrain from adopting the new rules and procedures, motioning to table it until the next council meeting. The council will take a deeper look into the document, with further clarification on the voting procedures, at the next council work session.

City Recorder Krystal Stevens, having conducted a trial of a software called ClerkMinutes recommended by the City of Sheridan City Clerk, requested authorization from the council to purchase a subscription, stating that it lessened her workload considerably when creating meeting minutes. The basic software package would cost \$99 per month (billed annually). City Manager Meneley estimated that the software would cover an estimated \$5,000 plus through the year's subscription in labor costs, allowing Krystal to focus on other tasks that she would have spent on typing up meeting minutes. The council approved the use of the software, which will give Stevens a year to determine the future use of ClerkMinutes.

Mayor Vickie Hernandez announced that National Night Out 2025 will be held from 6-8 p.m. on August 5 in front of Willamina City Hall. Mayor Hernandez stated that those interested in volunteering for the event can contact City Recorder Krystal Stevens. This year, the event will feature live music. Starbucks coffee. a dunk tank, an obstacle course, face painting, outdoor games, popcorn, hot dogs, and more as organizations and vendors continue to sign up. City Manager Menelev stated that with the loss of Deputy Skaer, who used the dunk tank as a fundraiser for K-9 officer programs, a vacancy for a dunk tank volunteer would need

to be filled, then jokingly asked Yamhill County Commissioner Kit Johnston if no other officers volunteer, if he would submit himself to fill the position. Commissioner Johnston stated he would add it to his schedule and, if available, would make himself an option should another volunteer not fill the position.

Mayor Hernandez also announced the next City Chat session has been scheduled from 6-7 p.m., July 23, at Tina Miller Park, next to Willamina City Hall. She invites the community to join this opportunity to chat with her, city staff, and city councilors about the City's projects and voice concerns and/or ideas.

In response to questions from the city council the previous month, City Manager Meneley presented a video (https:// mattressrecyclingcouncil.org/research/) explaining what is done with the mattresses dropped off at the Bye Bye Mattress event being held from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. on July 26 at the City Hall parking lot. The mattress recycling program helps break down used and discarded mattresses. It also includes a program to collect illegally dumped mattresses from roadways and other locations, providing the materials to be reused in new products instead of filling up landfills.

Bridget also reported that the City's extension request on the \$1.7 million obtained by Rep. Lucetta Elmer for use at the Huddleston Pond at Hampton Park was approved during the last legislative session. This extension will give the City of Willamina access to the funds for another two years, giving them more time to find a solution to the erosion problem.

Another city project Bridget reported on was the old department store located at 115 NE Main Street in Willamina, which





is owned by the city. She stated that the old building is filled with asbestos and mold, and she has been talking to Business Oregon about possible solutions to restore or demolish the building. She will provide more information to the council as she receives it.

Mayor Hernandez asked Bridget if the City has reached out to the Confederated Tribes of Grand Ronde Emergency Services (CT-GRES) team to see if the City could utilize the new digital display installed at the Willamina fire hall to disperse information to the public. Bridget stated that the conversation has started with CTGRES, and CTGRES is collaborating with the City to discuss the types of messages the city can share on the new display. She added that emergency notifications, such as boil water notices, would be allowed.

Yamhill County Transit Authority (YCTA) Board Member and Willamina's liaison to the public transportation organization, Councilor Craig "Captain" Johnson, reported that the YCTA is still in the process of analyzing fare rates should they decide to start charging. Currently, no fare is reguired to utilize the YCTA busses. The organization is also looking into adding a Saturday bus service to the area and adjusting routes to improve hospital access. Johnson also stated that the YCTA is facing driver recruitment and retention challenges due to wage competition in the transit industry.

Finance Manager Marissa Matias reported that since the City's budget was approved, they are currently setting up the next fiscal year inside the software, are close to finalizing last fiscal year's payments, and are preparing for the fiscal year audit, looking to have it completed by November 30. The City is also purchasing a volleyball and pickleball net set to be installed at Oaken Hills Park, estimating the total cost for both purchases will be around \$350. She informed the council that the council has \$6,000 budgeted for donations to organizations for the 2025-2026 year (July 2025 to June 2026).

Bridget, speaking for Library Director Sarah Frost, who was absent from the council meeting, reported that the Willamina Public Library food pantry received a significant donation of food, including macaroni, chili, peanut butter, potatoes, spaghetti sauce, and more from Polk County.

Public Works Director Jeff Brown reported that they had completed the hydroflushing of the water system, and no major issues arose during the flushing and exercise of the system. This month, Public Works will conduct a leak/ loss survey, listening to water meters and valves to minimize water loss in the system. They will also be conducting a cleaning of the catch basin within the next few months. Other minor detailed projects as they can fit in will be the painting of the basketball court and the building of the volleyball and pickleball court at Oaken Hills Park, Jeff also announced that an outside company would be coming in to help determine the location source of the water coming from up above the Willamina Post Office. Jeff added that the goal is to complete the emergency repairs to the Huddleston Pond Erosion Project by the end of August or the beginning of September. The emergency repairs will be a temporary fix while the City seeks additional funding to support a permanent solution.







Shopping locally not only means getting to see the same friendly faces each time you patronize a nearby business, it also means keeping money in your community. A 2018 study from American Express, the company that founded Small Business Saturday (which is celebrated the day after Black Friday), and the National Federation of Independent Business found that roughly two-thirds of every dollar spent at a small business ultimately stays in the local community. That boils down to 67 cents out of every dollar. The American Independent Business Alliance also references the "local multiplier" regarding local spending. This occurs when people spend at a locally owned and independent business instead of chain stores or mega online retailers. Although the exact amount of dollars recirculated by locally owned businesses varies due to certain unique criteria, retail studies conducted by Civic Economics has found a person's dollars at these locally owned businesses recirculate through the local economy two to four times more than money spent at non-local companies. This money helps generate more local wealth, charitable contributions and jobs.

The evening's second game between Teams 4 and 2 went to 2 on the basis of a forfeit.


WEDNESDAY GAMES
