

Curls, Cuts, and More Closes After 23 Years of Service

Curls, Cuts, and More, owned and operated by Betty Markee with her co-shop operator and long-time friend, Cathi Burman, decided it was time to hang up the shears, put the nail files in the drawers, and turn off the hair perming machine in July after 23 years of operation.

Betty, a graduate of Sheridan High School, began working at Curls, Cuts, and More in February 2003, six months after Stella Curl, the original owner, established the business in 2002. "When I started here, there was Susan doing pedicures on the other corner, Stella and me, and the lady who ran the bookstore back then, and we all called ourselves the Main Street Mamas. Then everybody started dispersing to other places, and that went away, but we were kind of famous for the Main Street Mamas," stated

Betty started beauty school at the age of 17, splitting her time between early mornings in McMinnville at the school and attending high school in Sheridan in the afternoons, until she graduated in 1974.

One of Betty's earlier gigs was working at a salon in Willamina, where she met Cathi Burman, a client of hers who worked at the mill in Fort Hill. The two quickly became friends. As the mill was shutting down, they offered to pay for training for those affected by the closure. So, Cathi

decided to get her nail technician's license. However, Betty talked her into training for the entire cosmetology licensing, allowing her to provide more opportunities for clients.

Cathi had planned on working with Betty after beauty school. "I was gonna go to Judy's to work with Betty, then she moved here and there was not enough room, so I had to go to Mac," Cathi said.

After working in McMinnville for a while at a couple of salons, she was contacted by her favorite teacher from the beauty school she attended in Salem, who persuaded Cathi to teach nails, her favorite thing to do, at her old school.

Meanwhile, while Cathi was teaching, Betty continued at Curls, Cuts, and More until Stella decided to retire, selling the business to Betty in 2015.

Struggling to operate the business on her own, Betty would spend the next year searching for another cosmetologist to assist in running the shop and eventually reached out to Cathi to see if any of her former students would be interested. Cathi, who had spent the last 12 years teaching at the school, was growing tired of the commute between Willamina and Salem and was getting ready to retire from the position replied, "Well, actually, I am interested."

Eight years later, the two, who

have had thousands of clients walk through their door, decided it was time to let someone else take over.

Cathi stated, "She (Betty) has been the most fun person to work with in all my 40-some years. This has been the best place to work, no drama. Who

would have thought, all those years back in Willamina, we would be in the same shop?"

Betty said, "I grew up in Sheridan and moved away, thinking I'm never coming back to this town. Due to circumstances beyond my control, I had to move back. I worked in retail for a while, then decided to get back into the hair business. Eventually, I landed in this shop here in Sheridan, and it has been a blessing. Met some great people, made a living, and it's going to be sad to leave it."

Their official close date was July 11, but Betty and Cathi can be seen on occasion, taking care of regulars, until the new owner takes over in August.




Fatal Crash Impacted Highways 22 and 223

On Thursday, July 17, 2025, at 4:12 p.m., Oregon State Police responded to a two-vehicle crash on Highway 22W, at the intersection with Highway 223, in Polk County.

The preliminary investigation indicated a northbound Kawasaki EJ650 motorcycle, operated by David Peter Jorgensen (88) of Oak Harbor (WA), was stopped on Highway 223 (northbound) at the intersection with Highway 22W. The Kawasaki attempted to cross Highway 22W and struck the side of a westbound Kenworth log truck, operated by Timothy Lawrence May (60) of Sheridan.

The operator of the Kawasaki (Jorgensen) was declared deceased at the scene.

The operator of the Kenworth (May) was reportedly not injured. The highway was impacted for approximately five hours during the on-scene investigation.

Applications For Bond Oversight Committee in Sheridan Now Open

The six million dollar Sheridan School Bond was passed on May 30. 2025. The next step is to form the Bond Oversight Committee; applications are now open to be on this committee. On the District's website, it says, "On behalf of our students, staff, and yes, our buildings – THANK YOU for standing behind our community's children and passing our Sheridan Schools bond. When the District decided to put a general obligation bond on the ballot, we committed to the formation of a bond oversight committee of citizens to track bond projects and spending over the next five years, if the bond passed. The District is looking for community members who are willing to meet regularly to help us uphold this promise.

Applications are due by August 11, and meetings are estimated to begin in Fall 2025. This committee will consist of five community members and two members of the Sheridan School board. The team will receive updates on budget, construction, and communications for Bond/OSCIM projects from the Project Manager and District staff, ensuring funds are spent appropriately and as promised.

According to the Sheridan School District Website, "A member of the Bond Oversight Committee will:

Be available for regular meetings (likely every other month) to review updates on budget, projects, communications, and other bond-related topics. The committee will also have oversight on projects funded by the OSCIM grant and any additional capital improvement grants received by the District during this period.

Live within the boundaries of the Sheridan School District.

Serve alongside representatives from the District, the District Board, and the construction contractors.

Applicants should plan to attend the Sheridan School Board meeting on Wednesday, August 20, at 6 p.m.

Applicants will be reviewed, and a final decision regarding committee members will be made by the School Board during the August 2025 Regular Board meeting."

Applications For Bond Oversight The Buzz on Mosquitoes, Facts From CDC

Getting a handle on how mosquitoes operate can help individuals take control of these pests before they infringe on outdoor entertaining throughout the warmer months. Review the following facts about these painful pests, courtesy of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and Cumberland County, NJ.

- Mosquitoes lay their eggs in standing (stagnant) water where they will hatch into larvae. A single female lays between 50 and 200 eggs, and can do so up to three times before they die. Without adequate water, mosquito eggs will dry up. Moving water disrupts their life cycle and prevents them from successfully breeding. Maintaining water movement in ponds, fountains, and other water features can help deter mosquitoes.
- Only female mosquitoes bite.
 They require a blood meal to produce eggs. Males do not have the mouth parts necessary to bite.
- Although there are more than 3,500 species of mosquitoes, fewer than 200 are found in North America.
- The word "mosquito" comes

from the Spanish term for "little fly."

- A mosquito can drink up to three times its weight in blood.
- Mosquito eggs can hatch in as little as an inch of standing water.
- The two main mosquito predators are fish and dragonflies. Dragonfly larvae eat mosquito larvae, and adult dragonflies prey on adult mosquitoes.
- Mosquitoes can bite day and night.
- Adult mosquitoes live for about two to four weeks. Females often live longer than males.
- Mosquitoes move in on prey by detecting carbon dioxide and other chemical odors released by animals. Visual cues and body heat also can help them pinpoint targets. Genes and body odor can determine if people are more likely than not to be bitten by mosquitoes.
- Mosquitoes are vectors of several illnesses, so it is wise to deter them and do whatever possible to reduce instances of mosquito bites.











GARAGE SALE Permits Required

Permits are required for garage, yard, basement, porch, estate, moving sales and flea markets or any other sale of tangible personal property.

It's Easy! Permit applications are available online at www.cityofsheridanor.com. Once the application is submitted, we will generate the permit and email it to the applicant. The permit can be printed and posted at the location or kept available on the applicant's mobile or electronic device. Please call City Hall if you are having problems with the permit application.





Permits will only be issued between the hours of 8:30 a.m. and 3:30 p.m. Monday through Thursday and between 8:30 a.m. and 2:30 p.m. on Fridays.

General Regulations:

- Four Sales allowed per calendar year; each sale may be three consecutive days with hours between 8 a.m. and 7 p.m.
- Items for sale may not be displayed on any City of Sheridan right-of-way and may not block emergency personnel access.
- All items not sold must be removed right away.
- Sold items must be removed within 24 hours.

Signs:

- NO signs allowed on any public right-of-way.
- **NO signs** allowed on utility poles, street signs or traffic control signs.
- **Two signs** (No larger than 6 sq. ft. each) permitted on property where sale is held.
- Four signs (No larger than 4 sq. ft. each) permitted on property other than where sale is to be held, provided that the sale property is not on a major thoroughfare (Hwy 18B). Written permission must be obtained from property owners where signs are placed.

Vegetation Fire Halted by Fire District

Tuesday, July 15 at approximately 4:30 p.m., a large plume of smoke from a vegetation fire could be seen just East of Sheridan. The fire, located 1,000 yards west, across Highway 18 from the Dairy Queen and Chevron gas station, blazed away in the middle of a grass field.

A quick response from the Sheridan Rural Fire District ensured that the fire was knocked down before it could devastate the surrounding area.

After the event, Sheridan Rural Fire District released the following post and associated image:

"Today we responded to a Wildland Fire near Hwy 18 and Gopher Valley for a farm field and combine fire.

A 2nd alarm was activated while en route to the fire due to the weather conditions and the size and movement of the smoke (header) to ensure adequate resources were responding to contain and extinguish the fire. Upon arriving on scene Brush 9 was tasked with anchoring the

fire from the lowest point of the

field and working up one of the

point along the other flank towards the head of the fire near the tree line.

Together they wrapped around the fire to contain forward progress before the tree line was impacted while additional units arrived to provide complete extinguishment.

During this time Engine 91 was tasked with securing smoking farm machinery and preventing fire spread around it.

Units responded from the following mutual aid partners (Confederated Tribes of Grand Ronde Department of Emergency Services, Amity Fire District, McMinnville Fire District, Oregon Department of Forestr, Sheridan Professional Firefighters L5384, and Sheridan Oregon Volunteer Firefighters Association) and we are incredibly grateful for their quick response and support not only in the on scene fire operations but providing community coverage for medical and fire emergencies.

Additional thanks to the farmers for using their equipment to create a wide fire line and drag the burned area helping with smoke reduction and future re-ignition issues."



Nachos for Gas: Local Teen Raises Funds for Medical Trips

Being a regular at an establishment generally brings positive vibes to your day, the barista that knows just how you like your coffee, the frequent flyer miles racked up for a vacation, or your group of friends that yells "Norm" as you walk through the door.

There are, unfortunately, some places you do not want to be a regular at, and young Travesia "Tray" Gomez has been a typical visitor at various medical centers since the day she was born.

Doctors found when her mom, Rhiann Stierle, was five months pregnant that her daughter suffered from Hypoplastic Left Heart Syndrome, missing the left ventricle valve in her heart. Doctors were unsure if her daughter would survive after birth.

Fast forward 18 years, Tray and her optimistic personality are still around to greet customers at the West Valley Mercantile Saturday Market, where she has been selling nachos and drinks for the past couple of years to help fund the multiple trips to Seattle Children's Hospital, where her medical specialists work hard to keep her stable.

This hasn't been her only battle through life, though; she also developed a protein-losing enteropathy, a blood clotting disorder that caused a stroke at age 8, and an involuntary movement disorder called Sindenham's Cho-

rea.

She overcame Sindenham's Chorea and, just recently, overcame the protein-losing enteropathy in February, which allowed her to have the feeding tube removed that was in place for the past nine years.

Her battles are far from over, as she still is a regular at hospitals in Portland and the Seattle area. "Half of the nurses know me. One time, I had a nurse's party. Nurses came in with disco lights and stuff and made that visit really fun." Tray stated.

Tray has been through three open heart surgeries, numerous catheterizations, and multiple liver biopsies, among the many other tests and visits associated with her conditions. "The doctors have pretty much done everything to stabilize her. Her last major surgery was ten years ago," Rhiann said, adding that Tray will need a heart and liver transplant in the future and are currently trying to get her on the list.

She still visits her doctors around every other month, along with a medication list that can double as a restaurant menu. She goes in to see her cardiologist, Dr. Kyser, around every three to six months. Tray said, "He is my favorite doctor; I love him. He's the one that did all my surgeries. He has these really big hands, and I wonder how he can do them (surgeries)."

Her other schedule of events consists of visiting her oncologist every six months, gastroenterologist every three months, liver biopsies once a year, and the occasional heart catheter placed through her neck and her groin, which can put her out of commission for a whole month after the procedure.

These visits are why she sells nachos at the Saturday Market. "A trip to Portland for one or two days of appointments can cost around \$100 to \$200. The trips to Seattle Children's Hospital cost around \$600 to \$800 each trip," stated Rhiann. She added that insurance would usually cover one night of stay at a hotel, so the family often drives up the night before and then makes the trip back down after a full day at the hospital. "We've had instances that the insurance company said the reservations for the hotel were good to go, but as soon as we got there, the hotel would let us know that the room wasn't paid for, so I'd have to use gas money for the trip to pay for the room until insurance would reimburse us."

She also has fundraising cans at the Select Market and Best Stop Market. The one at the Best Stop Market was the target of a theft back in April when a woman picked up the can and left the store with it.

Despite the challenges she faces, Tray remains as active as possible, taking on roles in leadership and the yearbook. "I've always wanted to play volleyball and soccer," she said. While soccer may still be out of the question, the doctors did finally clear her to participate in volleyball with warnings to be careful when doing so.



ODOT, OEM, and DEQ Urge Drivers to Plan Ahead, Stay Informed, and Prepared

As wildfires continue to impact parts of Oregon, Governor Tina Kotek has declared a State of Emergency, effective July 16, 2025, through December 31, 2025. Travelers are urged to use extra caution on the roads and know the conditions in the areas they are traveling to. Smoke can severely reduce visibility and create dangerous driving conditions. In some areas, wildfire activity has led to road closures or detours. The Oregon Department of Transportation (ODOT), Oregon Department of Emergency Management (OEM), and Oregon Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) are working together to keep Oregonians safe—and they're asking the public to do their part before hitting the road.

"If you're planning a road trip this summer, make sure your car is ready," OEM spokesperson, Erin Zysett, said. "Start your trip with a full tank of gas or electric charge, check your tires and air conditioner, and know your route. Conditions can change quickly during wildfire season."

OEM urges travelers to carry a well-stocked emergency car kit in case they become stranded or delayed. Your kit should include:

- Jumper cables
- Flares or a reflective triangle
- Flashlight and extra batteries
- First aid kit
- Blanket

- Map or printed directions
- Cell phone and car charger
- Backup power supply
- Hand-crank Weather Radio
- N95 mask (to help filter smoky air)
- Plastic sheeting and duct tape (to shelter in place if needed)
- Wet wipes, garbage bags, and toilet paper for sanitation
- Whistle to signal for help
- Water and non-perishable snacks
- Cash or traveler's checks
- Portable shovel

"Smoke affects visibility as well as air quality and can lead to sudden changes in driving conditions," said Chris Varley, DEQ Spokesperson. "If visibility is poor or the air is hazardous, consider delaying your trip. Your safety comes first. If you must drive in smokey conditions, close all the windows and direct the car's air system to recirculate to help reduce the amount of smoke entering the car."



People may not be eager to do much in their gardens come August, particularly because the air may be hot and the dew point high. And spending the final days of summer at the beach or in the pool may take priority. However, late summer is a great time to focus on certain tasks.

Deadheading

Many plants look better with the wilted flowers removed. some plants, Furthermore, such as with lilies and roses, will benefit from having spent blooms removed so that no unnecessary energy is drawn away from the roots or bulbs. Research your plants and learn which can benefit from some late-summer deadheading to keep them thriving.

Weeding

Weeds can become problematic if they're allowed to grow unabated. Routinely go into the garden and cull the weeds.

Keep an eye open for pests

According to Garden Smart, caterpillars and beetles may be chewing on garden plants by late summer, and aphids still may be problematic. Handpick insects off of vegetables and ornamental flowers, or use safe sprays for treating these issues. Plant cool weather vegetables Many plants will grow well when planted in late summer, according to Homesteading Family. Some such plants in-

clude turnips, beets, carrots, kale, chard, mustard greens, and peas. You can begin turning your summer garden, or a portion of it, into a fall and winter

garden.

Consider succession planting

Growing vegetables like beans or peas may be more successful if you try succession planting. This involves sowing new seeds every seven to 10 days to extend the harvest.


Harvesting what's ready

Convert planter boxes and containers

This is a good time to start changing over summer annuals in containers and planter boxes to those that do well in fall, such as mums, asters, pansies, and goldenrod.
