Commissioner King Talked With Food Bank About Funding Concerns

Yamhill County Commissioner David "Bubba" King visited the Grand Sheramina Foodbank (GSFB) on Tuesday, August 5.

King was not there to work alongside volunteers to hand out food boxes to the hundreds local citizens lined up down the street, he was there to talk with Director Judy Adams and volunteer Chris Haughton, on the impacts that the past few months of legislation, Federal and State, have had on the West Valley support organization that's hoping to get some traction on the trail of decreasing amounts of available assistance for the food bank.

Earlier this year, the GSFB reduced distribution days from weekly to twice per month, as food brought in from county and state sources became increasingly scarce. Following the signing into law of House Bill 3940A in July, which may threaten additional funding for the food bank, GSFB contacted

Commissioner King to explore alternative support options to keep the food bank open.

Commissioner King stated that he is very aware of the difficulties that a food distribution center could face. He said, "I was raised doing this work. My grandparents fed 800 families through their house every week. Before I moved up here (when he was 14 or 15 years old), I spent all my summers and all my Christmas breaks doing just this work. This is really important work to me, something that's very near to me. I have a saying since I've taken office and seen funding drops starting across the board. You guys are feeling it here with your fire district. School boards, cities, districts, non-profits —it doesn't matter who you are -if you go at it alone, you're going to die. It's about pulling resources and writing grants together."

GSFB can do to ensure continued support to the West Valley area listened as Commissoner King as he talked about what he saw at the county level and how getting the word out would be the best food forward in getting assistance out to the rural food bank. "I'm happy to help however I can, introductions to other elected officials, advocating on your behalf, emails to help open doors, and help move the needle to the right.

Chris said to the Commissioner, "I think that's one of the things that is the most helpful, gives us places to reach out to and be able to say hey, we spoke with Commissioner King, and that's why we're reaching out to you. Let us brainstorm bigger ideas on how we can get funding; we're not going to solve our long-term funding problems going door-to-door.

Commissioner King advised Judy and Chris to utilize him extensively for networking with resources. He offered to provide a letter of recommendation for grants and would discuss with the other commissioners the possibility of obtaining their signatures on the letter of recommendation as well.



Noteworthy Early Games On The Noteworthy Games In The Opening 2025 College Football Schedule

Late summer is an exciting time for sports fans. After months away from the gridiron, college football season kicks off at the end of August. Each college football season is unpredictable, as no one knows which game will mark the first big upset or who will ultimately be crowned as national champions in January. As college football fans prepare for another fun season, they can look to these notable early season games on the 2025 schedule.

 TCU at North Carolina, September 1, Kenan Memorial Stadium, Chapel Hill, North Carolina: Even though TCU and North Carolina may not begin the season ranked among the nation's top 25 teams, all eyes will be on Chapel Hill come the evening of Labor Day. That's because the game marks the college head coaching debut of six-time Super Bowl champion coach Bill Belichick. Belichick is recognized as one of the greatest professional football coaches of all time, and millions of fans are eager to see how the 73-yearold adapts to the college game. • Alabama at Florida State, August 30, Doak Campbell Stadium, Tallahassee, Florida: After a memorable 2023 campaign in which late-season injuries led to their controversial exclusion from the College Football Playoff, Florida State endured a difficult 2024 season, finishing 2-10 overall and last in the ACC. This late August matchup provides a great opportunity for the Seminoles to put that disappointment firmly in the rearview mirror. But second-year Crimson Tide coach Kalen De-Boer, who had an up-and-down first year in Tuscaloosa after replacing legendary coach Nick Saban, will undoubtedly also see this matchup as a great chance to make a statement about 2025.

• Texas at Ohio State, August

30, Ohio Stadium, Columbus, Ohio: The reigning national champion Buckeyes kick off their 2025 campaign with a matchup against fellow 2024 playoff participant Texas. While the Buckeyes are reason enough to tune in, all eyes might be on Texas signal caller Arch Manning, who should finally take over for Steve Sarkisian after patiently waiting to be the full-time starter for two seasons.

· Georgia at Tennessee, September 13, Neyland Stadium, Knoxville, Tennessee: Tennessee head coach Josh Heupel has made great strides since becoming the Vols' head coach in 2021. But Heupel has never beaten Kirby Smart or Georgia since arriving in Knoxville, and this week three clash provides another chance to do so. Complicating matters for Heupel and the Vols is the sudden and surprising offseason departure of talented quarterback Nico lamaleava, who transferred to UCLA after a financial dispute.

 Oregon at Penn State, September 27, Beaver Stadium, University Park, Pennsylvania: These two 2024 playoff teams will be looking to make an early season statement that they deserve to play into January once again. Oregon entered the 2024-25 playoff as the top overall seed but fell to eventual champion Ohio State 41-21 in the quarterfinals. Penn State advanced to the semifinals before losing a close one to Notre Dame. Each team is hoping this late September Big Ten matchup will boost their résumé and help them earn a return trip to the playoffs.

Excitement is the name of the game in college football. These early season matchups are just a handful of the many games on the 2025 college football schedule that figure to excite fans this fall.

Weeks Of The 2025 NFL Season

The National Football League is among the most popular professional sports leagues in the world. Football fans seemingly can't get enough of the NFL, and the excitement around the start of a new season returns every year in late summer, when teams start to ramp up their preseason preparation in anticipation of the season's opening week in early September. As the NFL season gets set to kick off, fans can circle these noteworthy early season games on their calendars.

 Pittsburgh Steelers at New York Jets, September 7, MetLife Stadium, East Rutherford, NJ: Though the Jets seem to be in rebuilding mode and the Steelers are not among the favorites to win a Super Bowl in the coming season, that does not mean this matchup lacks intrigue. Aaron Rodgers returns to MetLife Stadium with his new team, the Pittsburgh Steelers, and will undoubtedly face a Jets fan base that grew frustrated by the future Hall of Famer's injury-plagued and pedestrian performance as Gang Green's signal caller over the previous two seasons.

· Washington Commanders at Green Bay Packers, September 11, Lambeau Field, Green Bay, Wisconsin: Reigning NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year Jayden Daniels led an exciting and largely unexpected revival of the Commanders franchise a season ago, and fans are anxious to see if he can continue his success in year two. The Packers enter the 2025 season with high hopes as well, and this Thursday night matchup features Daniels locking horns with Jordan Love, another of the league's exciting young quarterbacks.

 Philadelphia Eagles at Kansas City Chiefs, September 14, GEHA Field at Arrowhead Stadium, Kansas City, Missouri: A rematch of Super Bowl LIX gives Patrick Mahomes, Travis Kelce and crew another shot at Jalen Hurts and the Eagles, who largely dominated the two-time defending champions to secure Philadelphia's second Super Bowl championship in February. Football fans are eager to see if the Chiefs' run atop the league is over or if Super Bowl LIX was just a blip on the radar, while the Eagles have their eyes set on a

 Chicago Bears at Detroit Lions, September 14, Ford Field, Detroit, Michigan: Though the Lions faltered in the second round of the playoffs a year ago, excitement remains high around a franchise that has enioved considerable success in recent years. Much of that success was credited to offensive coordinator Ben Johnson, who left the Lions sidelines this offseason to take the reins with the NFC North division rival Chicago Bears. Can Johnson replicate his Detroit success with promising second-year quarterback Caleb Williams? Time will tell, but this Week 2 matchup is one no NFL fan will want to miss.

 Cincinnati Bengals at Minnesota Vikings, September 21, U.S. Bank Stadium, Minneapolis, Minnesota: The Vikings surprised many football fans a year ago when journeyman signal caller Sam Darnold led the team to a 14-3 mark after Minnesota lost first-round pick and projected starting quarterback J.J. Mc-Carthy before the season even began. Darnold is now in Seattle and McCarthy figures to make his long-awaited debut. This Week 3 matchup against Joe Burrow and the Bengals could offer insight into whether or not the Vikings can reach the same heights the franchise rose to a year ago.

Chicken is a wildly popular food source that contributes 90 percent of the world's poultry meat production according to the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations. Chicken lovers may wonder if white meat really is, as some suggest, a healthier option than dark meat. That answer is somewhat elusive, and a side-by-side comparison of the two conducted by a registered dietitian for EatingWell affirms that elusiveness. One cup of dark meat (3.4 grams) is higher in saturated fat than the same size portion of white meat (1.4 grams), and that's arguably the reason behind the former's reputation as a less healthy option than the latter. But some may note that the fat content in dark meat makes it juicier and therefore requires less seasoning than white meat. Chicken seasoning tends to be high in sodium, which can offset some of the nutritional benefits of white meat compared to dark meat, particularly since the sodium content in each type of meat is roughly the same (133 milligrams for dark meat, 104 milligrams for white meat). Individuals who have certain health conditions, such as diabetes and pancreatitis, should opt for white meat over dark meat because they have much to gain from eating a low-fat diet. Others can consult with their physicians to determine if their best option is white meat or dark meat.





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

Banana-Filled Breakfast For School Days

When a new school year is on the horizon, that means families once again must adjust to getting out of the house to the school bus or carpool on time. It is important to begin busy days with a breakfast that will facilitate learning, but parents know convenience is important as well. Parents may want to incorporate some new breakfast options into the mix, particularly ones kids will enjoy.

This tasty recipe for "Banana and Pecan Granola Bowl with Caramelized Bananas" from "Rainbow Bowls" (Sourcebooks) by Niki Webster relies on bananas in two different ways to impart a sweet taste that is hard to beat. The granola makes about four to six portions, so there will be leftovers to enjoy as a snack later in the day or stored away for another time.

Banana and Pecan Granola Bowl with Caramelized Bananas

Serves 2
2 tablespoons coconut oil
4 tablespoons maple syrup
2 very ripe medium bananas
1 teaspoon almond extract
3.5 ounces oats of your choice
3 tablespoons unsweetened shredded coconut
2 tablespoons ground almonds

3 tablespoons sunflower seeds 3 tablespoons chopped nuts, such as hazelnuts or almonds 1.4 ounces pecans Pinch of sea salt

For the caramelized bananas 2 unpeeled bananas

1 tablespoon coconut oil

To serve

Coconut yogurt
1 teaspoon maple syrup (option-

Pinch of thyme (optional)
Preheat the oven to 350
Blend the coconut oil, maple syrup, bananas, and almond extract in a blender until smooth.



Add all the dry ingredients to a large bowl and mix well. Add the wet mixture to the bowl and stir well to combine.

Line a large baking tray with baking paper and then tip the granola mix on to the tray and flatten out. Bake for 25 minutes, until starting to brown. Carefully flip over on the tray, then return to the oven and bake for a further 15 minutes (until you get a nice brown color).

Leave to cool before breaking into smaller chunks, then store in an airtight container for up to 1 week (if not eating straight away).

To make the caramelized bananas, chop off the top end of each of the bananas, then carefully slice through the middle lengthways. Now, peel the bananas.

Melt the coconut oil in a pan on medium heat. Add the banana slices and fry in the oil on one side for 1 to 2 minutes until browned, then flip over to caramelize the other side for another 1 to 2 minutes.

Serve the granola with yogurt, caramelized bananas, a drizzle of maple syrup, and a pinch of thyme if you fancy.





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


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Local Girls Ramp it up During Build Day

Over 30 West Valley young girls, and a few from surrounding areas, traded a week of summer vacation for the chance to hammer and saw their way through projects, under the watchful supervision and guidance of the Portland-based Girls Build group.

Girls Build runs approximately 10-15 camps per year throughout the I-5 Valley and Coastal region of Oregon. For the week, the girls are placed into smaller age groups of no more than ten, each led by at least two to three instructors, and guided through projects that could last anywhere from 80 minutes to a whole week. During downtimes of the camp, the girls are often led in games to help break the ice or promote team building.

Last week's camp at the Sheridan High School (SHS) marked the group's 4th year in the West Valley area, starting in Willamina the first two years, before moving to SHS last year.

This year's camp featured a variety of workshops, including woodworking, copper spoon making, leather-working, bicycle repair, and projects such as concrete soap dishes and bars of soap, as well as wiring a small motor to a solar panel. "We try to bring as many trades as possible to the week-long camps," said Becca "Soda Pop" Schulze, a lead instructor for the Girls Build group, who has a background in carpentry.

At each camp, Girls Build has the young ladies accomplish one major project that stays with the community. Last year, they built an ADA ramp to one of the outbuildings at the school. This year, they repeated the project but for a different outbuilding at

SHS.

Cost for these week-long camps ranges from \$250-\$500. Girls currently in or who have previously been in the foster care system can attend the camps at no charge.

Girls attending a camp can also apply for a Girls Build scholarship. To qualify, ensure the scholarship box is checked on a camp registration form, pay a small \$5 processing fee, and fill out the additional parts of the scholarship portion of the registration.



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
