Churches United For West Valley School Supplies Giveaway Aug. 16

Churches United for West Valley is doing their annual school supplies giveaway at 10 a.m., August 16, at Sheridan City Park. The backpacks with basic supplies are available to all West Valley students, regardless of whether they attend a school or are homeschooled. It is firstcome, first-served, but if they do not have enough, they will take names and try to take care of all the needs.

New Hope and Sheridan UMC started providing school supplies in 2011. The joint effort of multiple churches began in 2012. People from both churches then attended a Ford Foundation on collaboration, and Churches United was born. Trinity Lutheran was part of the original group. Since then, the group has given away as many as 250 backpacks

The backpacks are for primary

grades, middle school, and high school. Each level is slightly different, but the average cost this year is \$36.40 for the backpack with supplies.

The funds raised from the Churches United pie and dessert auction in March at Trinity Lutheran, their chili competition in October at Sheridan Nazarene. and their food sales at Hometown Days each June go to the purchase of the supplies. They have also received grants from First Federal, the Confederated



Coldwell Banker Talks Housing at Sheridan Chamber Meeting

The Sheridan Chamber of Commerce meeting, held Friday, August 1, was hosted by Coldwell Banker's Kim Greene and Lucinda Hage.



A Message from the Sheridan Superintendent

Dear Sheridan Families,

We are grateful to those families who were able to participate in our Summer Camp literacy program over the past several weeks. The program worked with over 90 students entering grades 1-8 and focused on maintaining reading skills over the summer months.

The four-week camp, which was staffed by Sheridan teachers and aides who opted into the summer program, blended basic reading skills like phonics and vocabulary, with hands-on projects. Activities were designed to facilitate positive, fun experiences that build reading skills, and maintain a level of comfort in the classroom to reduce the anxiety that can sometimes block a student's ability to learn. Ongoing access to friends, as well as the routine of going to school each week, can also help students who struggle with transitions and socialization.

We are always looking for creative ways to address areas we think may improve overall student learning and hope to build on programs we see having a positive impact on our students!

Funding for salaries and activities was provided by a \$149,000 grant from the Oregon Department of Education and demonstrates the important role that grants, bonds and other contributions play in supporting K-12 public education programs in Sheridan.

With state and local budgets often stretched thin, these additional sources of funding allow districts to offer enrichment programs, update learning spaces, and address gaps in academic achievement. Grants from state and federal agencies, as well as private foundations, can fund programs focused on reading or math, as well as large-scale projects, like the Barbara Roberts Career Technical Education Center—programs that we would not be able to offer otherwise.

Bonds, like the one passed by voters this past spring, can fund essential facility upgrades and repairs, ensuring students learn in safe, up-to-date environments that support both academic and overall development.

In rural communities across Oregon, outside funding is particularly vital. Grants and bonds help level the playing field by enabling schools to hire staff, offer additional learning options, and invest in educational opportunities that are relevant to our community, without impacting our ability to provide a strong basic education in core subjects such as reading, math and science.

Thank you to you - our community - for continuing to support these activities and recognizing the important impact they have on our kids.

It has so many sensors in it that it will tell you what needs to be maintained, and it's ready right out of the box. There is also a large database of files for download that work with the machine," Tony stated.

The machine, which cost around \$1,400, included the Automatic Material System to allow printing in multiple colors. The library used the remaining por-

tion of the grant to purchase maintenance tools and a large tote of different filaments to go along with the printer.

Sarah stated that the library will start with workshops to gain interest in the 3D printer, hoping it will lead to individuals wanting to form a club at the library. "Tony would love to have other people in the community that he can brainstorm, collaborate, and talk with about 3D printing," she added.

Sarah said that the 3D printer will also provide a means to make items for the library, such as prizes for contests, bookends, display holders, and other items as the need arises.

Tyler Crook, Library Board Chair and volunteer at the library, will head the 3D printing program, working with Tony to learn as much as he can about the machine.

Sarah stated that she and Tyler will collaborate on developing policies and a pricing model before opening it up to the community for print requests.

Applications For Bond Oversight Committee in Sheridan Due Aug. 11

The six million dollar Sheridan School Bond was passed on May 30. 2025. The next step is to form the Bond Oversight Committee; applications are now open to be on this committee. On the District's website, it says, "On behalf of our students, staff, and yes, our buildings – THANK YOU for standing behind our community's children and passing our Sheridan Schools bond. When the District decided to put a general obligation bond on the ballot, we committed to the formation of a bond oversight committee of citizens to track bond projects and spending over the next five years, if the bond passed. The District is looking for community members who are willing to meet regularly to help us uphold this promise.

Applications are due by August 11, and meetings are estimated to begin in Fall 2025. This committee will consist of five community members and two members of the Sheridan School board. The team will receive updates on budget, construction, and communications for Bond/OSCIM projects from the Project Manager and District staff, ensuring funds are spent appropriately and as promised.

According to the Sheridan School District Website, "A member of the Bond Oversight Committee will:

Be available for regular meetings (likely every other month) to review updates on budget, projects, communications, and other bond-related topics. The committee will also have oversight on projects funded by the OSCIM grant and any additional capital improvement grants received by the District during this period.

Live within the boundaries of the Sheridan School District.

Serve alongside representatives from the District, the District Board, and the construction contractors.

Applicants should plan to attend the Sheridan School Board meeting on Wednesday, August 20, at 6 p.m.

Applicants will be reviewed, and a final decision regarding committee members will be made by the School Board during the August 2025 Regular Board meeting."





The month of August has been home to many historical events over the years. Here's a look at some that helped to shape the world in August 1925.

- The National Football League awards franchises to four new teams on August 1. Among the newly minted franchises is the New York Giants, a team that remains in the league today.
- The Fascists win local elections in Sicily on August 3. The Blackshirts, an all-volunteer militia loval to Fascist leader Benito Mussolini, are stationed at voting booths throughout Sicily during the election.
- The last United States Marines are withdrawn from Nicaragua on August 4. The U.S. occupation of the country began thirteen years prior.
- The President of Turkey, Mustafa Kemal, divorces his wife of less than two years on August 5. Kemal is upset that his wife, Latife Usaki, publicly promoted emancipation of women and encouraged their independence in regard to choice of clothing.
- The Dallas Hilton opens on August 6. It is the first high-rise hotel to bear the Hilton name.
- Tens of thousands of Ku Klux Klan members march down Pennsylvania Avenue in Washington, D.C. on August 8. Heavy rains force the cancellation of a planned ceremony that had been scheduled to begin at the conclusion of the march.
- Twin brothers Norris and Ross McWhirter are born in Winchmore Hill, Essex, England on August 12. The brothers would eventually create The Guinness Book of World Records.
- American sculptor Gutzon Borglum is invited to the Black Hills region of South Dakota on August 14. Borglum, who is now best known for his work on Mount Rushmore, visits the region to scout for a location for carving a monument on the side

of a mountain.

- The Cuban Communist Party is founded in Havana on August 16. The party eventually merged with Fidel Castro's Integrated Revolutionary Organizations in
- The Fourteenth World Zionist Congress opens in Vienna on August 17. Protests by Austrian fascists outside the Congress turn violent and result in injuries to 30 people and 50 arrests.
- Fidel LaBarba defeats Frankie Genaro in a 10-round decision to win the vacant World Flyweight Championship in Los Angeles on August 22.
- A boxing match between welterweight champion Mickey Walker and William "Sailor" Friedman ends in a no-decision in Chicago on August 24. In a dressing room meeting prior to the match, Walker was advised by Al Capone to go easy on Friedman.
- A Spanish naval bombardment effectively levels the Moroccan city of Rif during the Rif War on August 25.
- African American singer Marian Anderson first achieves fame after performing with the New York Philharmonic orchestra on August 26. Anderson would go on to perform with renowned orchestras throughout the United States and Europe in a decades-long career, all the while serving as an important figure as African Americans struggled to overcome racial prejudice in the U.S. in the mid-twentieth century.
- Several notable Nicaraguan politicians are kidnapped in Managua on August 28. Armed men ultimately take the hostages to La Loma, a mountain-top fortress.
- Babe Ruth is fined \$5,000 and suspended for one week by New York Yankees manager Miller Huggins on August 29. Ruth was disciplined after failing to show up for batting practice.

Oregon State Agencies Remind Everyone To Be Informed And Prepared

As Oregon heads into its peak wildfire months, August and September, Oregon's public safety services and natural resource agencies want to remind Oregonians to practice wildfire prevention, prepare their home and a go-bag for evacuation and know where to sign up for alerts.

"As Oregonians and visitors enjoy the beauty of an Oregon summer, we have to remember that we are still in the middle of wildfire season," Governor Kotek said. "Ignition risks present a real threat to our parks, forests and coastal areas – and it's on us to act responsibly, doing our part to prevent wildfires wherever we recreate."

According to the Northwest Interagency Coordination Center's predictive services, the Pacific Northwest area is anticipated to be at elevated risk of significant fires from August to October. With fire crews responding to new fire starts every day, now is the time for Oregonians to be prepared for wildfires and help prevent future ignitions.

How can people help prevent wildfires?

The Oregon Department of Forestry is urging the public to actively practice wildfire prevention as the state continues to put out new fires every day. Additional human-caused fires on the landscape will draw the firefighting efforts away from the lightning-caused fires and put extra strain on ground and aviation resources, which are already spread thin. YOU can help prevent wildfires by:

- Checking and following your local fire regulations. The majority of the state is either in high or extreme fire danger right now, meaning even the smallest of sparks could start the next large wildfire.
- Debris burning may be prohibited where you live.
- o Check local restrictions or contact your local ODF office.
- o Return to check on your burn

site if you burned earlier in the year.

- Make sure your car has been recently serviced to avoid faulty parts throwing sparks.
- Don't drag tow chains.
- Avoid parking vehicles on tall, dry grass.
- Recreate responsibly. Where campfires are allowed, make sure your campfire is DEAD OUT before leaving it by drowning it with water, stirring it with a shovel and repeating that process until it is cold to the touch. If there is heat coming off it, there are still embers that could reignite.

Take Simple Steps Now to Protect Your Home from Wildfire

The Oregon State Fire Marshal reminds Oregonians that summer is not the safest time to tackle large landscaping or defensible space projects. Hot, dry conditions increase the risk of starting a fire with tools or equipment. But there are still small, safe steps you can take now to reduce wildfire risk around your home. The Oregon State Fire Marshal encourages everyone to plan ahead and do light cleanup tasks that protect your property without increasing fire danger.

Here are a few easy tasks to reduce risk in the first five feet around your home:

- Clear leaves, pine needles, and other debris from your roof, gutters, and under decks.
- Cut back plants and bushes that are touching your home or growing under roof eaves. Give trees and shrubs space from each other and from structures.
- Remove dead plants and wood mulch. Use nonflammable materials like rocks or gravel near your home. Avoid bark mulch or dry grasses right next to buildings.
- Move firewood, propane tanks, and other flammable items at least five feet away from your home.
- Cover attic vents, soffit vents, and spaces under decks with 1/8inch metal mesh to block embers.
 Avoid using power tools or equip-

ment that could spark a fire, especially during the heat of the day. Summer is a good time to plan defensible space projects so you're ready to work safely once wildfire season ends.

How can I prepare myself in case I need to evacuate?

The Oregon Department of Emergency Management (OEM) urges everyone to prepare for wildfires and other emergencies by knowing evacuation levels, staying informed, having a plan, and having a go-kit ready.

Evacuation Levels

- Oregon follows a three-level evacuation notification system, each structured around safety threat level.
- Oregonians should become familiar with "Be Ready, Be Set, Go!" evacuation levels to make informed decisions when receiving evacuation notices.
- OEM urges people to evacuate whenever they feel unsafe, conditions can change rapidly; individuals should always make the best decision for their safety.
- Following evacuation, people should not return to the area until public safety officials state it is safe.

Stay Informed

- Stay informed sign up to receive evacuation at, ORAlert.gov remember to update information if need be.
- Find the websites for your county emergency management, sheriff's office, or tribal police and follow them on social media.
- Check your phone settings to ensure wireless emergency alerts are turned on.
- Build redundancy into how you can access alerts. Have a personal P.A.C.E plan for what you will do if your cell phone stops working. A good place to start is a hand-cranked NOAA radio.
- If you use a third-party app for alerts and situational awareness and notice a discrepancy information, default to the information provided by your local emergency management office.

Have a Plan

- Do you know what to do during an evacuation? This evacuation checklist explains what to do before, during and after an evacuation.
- Establish a communication plan with a list of important contacts and a safe place for loved ones to meet if they are separated during an emergency.
- Identify multiple evacuation routes from home, work, or school and plan for transportation needs.
- People with disabilities should consider individual circumstances and specific needs when planning for evacuation, such as special equipment, transportation, and service animals. Then plan extra time, when possible, this may mean treating a level 2 notice like a level 3 notice.
- Have an evacuation plan for pets, make a pet evacuation kit in a tote bag or pet crate, and plan for transportation and sheltering of large animals such as horses and other livestock.

Make a Go-Kit

- Assemble an emergency kit of essential supplies that can be grabbed quickly.
- Pack an easy-to-carry backpack or bag for each household member with health and safety items such as food, water, medication, flashlights, phone chargers, clothing, and important documents.

Recreate Responsibly

Oregon Parks and Recreation Department (OPRD) encourages visitors to know before they go when it comes to campfire restrictions. Due to the continued risk of wildfires, OPRD has banned campfires at all Oregon State Parks in high-risk areas around the state until conditions improve. Most Oregon State Parks currently have a campfire ban. Please check park webpages or the wildfire feature story at stateparks.oregon.gov/ before your next visit.

Spartans' Gym Gets A Lift from OHSU Students

Sheridan High School athletes will be coming back to school with an upgraded weight room, thanks to the assistance of Oregon Health and Science University (OHSU).

Sheridan School District Nurse Rebecca Boris, a Sheridan alumnus and 2015 nursing graduate from the University of Portland, collaborated with OHSU nursing students Erika Breeden and Tolo Hafoka, at the school for community based clinical experience during the spring, as a potential project for the nursing students to complete their required clinical hours, while also giving back to possible future students and Olympians in the Sheridan community. Clinical instructors at OHSU agreed and gave the green light for Tolo and Erika.

Erika and Tolo worked with Rebecca to discuss her wish list for the room, which included addressing safety concerns, removal of non-functioning equipment, and adding storage for yoga mats, jump ropes, medicine balls, and other pieces of workout gear. The goal was to make the weight room more organized and inviting for students, giving

them more opportunities to be active.

The group got the project rolling, finishing phase one towards the end of last school year, which involved a comprehensive rearrangement of the equipment, a deep cleaning of the storage closet to increase storage capacity, and a thorough cleaning of the floors and equipment. A new bike, an elliptical, a stair climber, and two treadmills were also installed in the weight room. A personal records chalkboard for the students to use was added. and the relocation of first-aid supplies to a more accessible spot was implemented. A quote now adorns a wall in the weight room from Dave Johnson, former Sheridan High School Dean of Students, track and field coach, and Olympic decathlete bronze medal winner at the 1992 Barce-Iona Olympics. Equipment that was beyond use was disposed of at Cherry City Metals in Salem to fund additional weight room projects.

Other OHSU nursing students, Sydona and Emma, reached out to multiple companies after working alongside seniors for their senior project at the high school, where they surveyed student needs to develop a personal hygiene closet. This closet serves as a place for students to access


free personal hygiene supplies. Sheridan's Gentle Dental was one of those companies that donated supplies for the closet.

Future projects include additional equipment, quotes from Joni Huntley, Sheridan High School graduate and 1984 Olympic bronze medalist and gold medalist at the 1975 Pan American Games in the high jump, collaboration with the high school art students for additional quotes, painting of the SHS logo and mascot, sanitizing stations, and posters to show correct form for the equipment.

Rebecca Boris has reported that students are thrilled with the project, especially now that weight training for fall football has begun, finding it much easier to work out in the redesigned space.

The project is scheduled to be completed in December of this year, either by Erika and Tolo or new OHSU students stepping in. Donations and volunteers solely funded the project in collaboration with Sheridan High School Athletic Director Sarah Hillyard, District Nurse Rebecca Boris, and Sheridan High School Principal Pat Schrader.

1 1/2 cups favorite mild barbecue sauce

3/4 (10-ounce) bag tortilla chips 1 cup shredded Monterey Jack cheese

1 cup shredded mild cheddar cheese

15 pickled jalapeño slices

- 1. Preheat the oven to 400 F.
- 2. Combine the meats and barbecue sauce in a small saucepan over medium heat.
- 3. Spread half of the tortilla chips on a small cookie sheet. Cover the chips with half of the meat and sauce. Top with half of each cheese.
- 4. Repeat the process on top of this layer, using the other half of the ingredients.
- 5. Bake until the cheese is completely melted, about 10 minutes. Remove and top with the jalapeños.


