Hope's Closet Provides Free Clothing to West Valley Community

Nestled back to the side of the Nazarene Church in Sheridan. in a small building that once held youth programs, Hope's Closet has been born to serve the community in another way. Pastor Rachel Roberts, who has served the Sheridan Church of the Nazarene (Naz) since January of 2022, converted the unused building into what was a lifetime passion for her. She said. "I live in Davton, so when I started driving up here, I was seeing the property, and there are these buildings that aren't being used. I love clothes, so growing up, I wanted to have a clothing store. Since that was not something that was ever gonna be in my picture, I've always wanted to do a clothing closet. So here we have an opportunity to have a clothing store that's free to the community."

Three years later, Hope's closet is still expanding and working

to provide more for the community. The building the closet resides in has three separate rooms, one acting as the main clothing room. Another room is home to an organization that the Naz is partnered with, Churches United, which stores good food bags that are provided for school-age kids. The third room, which is still in the process of being cleaned out, will allow the closet to expand and double in size. "While this might have been my bright idea," Rachel said, "June (Palmer) has tirelessly done a lot of the work to make it look as good as it does."

Some of the plans for the future of the closet, Rachel said, "As it evolves a little bit more, we're going to want to have a little coffee station where you can get a cup of coffee or hot chocolate on a cold day, and a regular kitchen cabinet with countertops, drawers, and stor-

age. We could also use a good used refrigerator since ours died. That's the goal, to make it a cozy place where when you come in and shop, not only do you find a new outfit or something that you need, but you're going to find hospitality. You're going to find welcome. You'll get a hot cup of coffee, or a cold bottle of water, a listening ear if needed, and if you want someone to pray with you, we'll pray with you," Rachel said.

Beverly Jones, another member of the Church of the Naz and volunteer of the closet, stated, "We've gotten a really nice amount of donations from people. We go through and sort everything that comes in. If it's stained or torn, we don't put it out. If it's not clean, one of us ladies takes it home and washes it. We want nice things for people to have, and there's absolutely no charge to it, and it's for anybody in the community. The closet holds clothing for babies, women up to size 6x, and men's clothing." In case the closet does not have something someone needs, it can be annotated on the sign-in sheet, and the volunteer staff will reach out and contact the individual should something on their need list come in.

When asked about installing a washer and dryer so the clothes did not have to be washed at home, Rachel stated, "We don't have plumbing

out here, or we would have a washer and drver, so the ladies could clean the clothes here. We would also like to have a bathroom out here, with an actual place to wash your hands, that sort of thing, but I had some bids done, and it's going to cost about \$35,000. Water lines, pretty easy, it's just getting someone out here digging the trench. The big cost is we have to have somebody come out and put a camera in our drain lines to see where they go and where they need to start building, and it's a pretty labor-intensive thing.

While there is a large donation shed in the Naz parking lot, the shed is maintained by the members of the church. but donations go towards Portland-based St. Polly, which sends that clothing all over the world. The church plans on setting up a drop box in the future called Hope's Chest, but for now, those interested in donating and ensuring it stays local, contact the church office at 503-843-3262, email information@sheridannazcom, or stop by during their hours of operation, every noon - 3 p.m., 1st and 3rd Saturday of the month. Those in need of clothing and would like to look through Hope's Closet's supplies can also stop by during their hours of operation, or if unable, contact the church to make an appointment.

ADHD Study Shows Screen Time Factors

A 2023 meta-analysis published in the journal Reviews on Environmental Health found that excessive screen exposure may be a significant contributor to the development of attention deficit hyperactivity disorder (ADHD) in children. The report analyzed nine studies that examined more than 81,000 children, including nearly 29,000 who had been diagnosed with ADHD. The analysis found that

children exposed to more than two hours of screen time each day had significantly higher rates of ADHD than youngsters whose daily screen time was limited to two hours or less. Researchers behind the analysis ultimately concluded reducing children's screen time could prevent the occurrence of ADHD.

Curl's, Cuts, and More Continues Clipping Under New Owner

Crystal Danielson, born and raised in McMinnville, never really spent much time out in the West Valley area except for the occasional drive down Highway 18 on her way to Spirit Mountain Casino. This will no longer be the case, as she is now the new owner of Curl's, Cuts, and More on Main St. in Sheridan.

Graduating from McMinnville High School in 1990, Crystal, who played softball for the Grizzlies, went to Western Oregon University to continue her softball career and earn her degree to become a physical education teacher. Unable to make the cut for the W.O.U. softball squad, Crystal re-evaluated things and decided to fall back on her lifetime passion. "I used to do my friend's hair and makeup when I was a teenager, but I think what really got me into it was when I was seven or eight years old, I had those little Barbies, the ones that were just the head and hair, that I would spend hours doing their makeup and hair," she stated. 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City of Sheridan Parks and Recreation Receive Updated 2025

On Thursday, August 28, the Parks and Recreation Committee (PRC) for the City of Sheridan held its monthly meeting with special guest Jim Jacks, Senior Planner from the Mid-Willamette Valley Council of Governments (MWVCOG).

The MWVCOG is a voluntary association of over 40 local governments, including Marion, Polk, and Yamhill counties, 32 cities, seven special districts, and the Confederated Tribes of Grand Ronde. Their mission is to expand interaction and improve dialogue among the local units of government. They also provide coordinated regional planning and development activities, as well as providing technical assistance and local services tailored to each of the local governments. Jim, who has been with the MWVCOG since 2008, had Sheridan as one of his original assignments. He was the individual who created the 2014 Park Plan for the City of Sheridan, and he felt this year was the time to update and amend the 11-year-old plan to reflect changes in growth of the City, the City's outlook for the future, and other specific items that have occurred since the adoption of the 2014 plan.

"One reason the city wants their park plan updated," said Jim, "is because at the very end in Chapter 6 is the Capital Improvement Program (CIP). If a local government doesn't have that CIP, with the plan to back it up, and you go off asking for money, whether it's the Oregon Department of Recreation and Parks or any-

body else, they are going to say when you get it in writing, have an agreement, and it's adopted by your governing body, then come back with us with a grant request."

The City of Sheridan currently owns and maintains approximately 16 acres of developed parkland and 60 acres of open space for a total of 76 acres. The four developed sites are Sheridan City Park, South City Park (fishing pond), Hebert Memorial Plaza (Ernie Hebert mentioned that in the document it should be pavilion and not plaza due to two different legal definitions and restrictions on the property, and this should be reflected in the next packet), and Veterans Memorial Park.

Undeveloped properties include riverfront properties, Chester Moore Park and Morgan Street Park, a site at the north end of Orchard Street, and three sites west of Rock Creek Rd., West Main Street Site located on the north side of Business Highway 18, and two riverside sites named Riverside East and Riverside West, each split by the South Yamhill River. Though not owned by the City of Sheridan, recently, the City and the Sheridan School District worked together and have started the project of turning the unused triangular piece of land just east of the high school softball field on Jefferson St., owned by the school, into a dog park.

Jim stated in his presentation packet to the PRC, "Updating the 2014 Plan provides the city an opportunity to review the old Plan and determine if it was on the right track and make midcourse adjustments to ensure it stays on track."

Some of the changes made from the 2014 to 2025 plan are minor updates to reflect dates, the current 4,625 residents of Sheridan, up from 4,327 in 2014, changes to park descriptions based on improvements to the parks over the past 11 years, and terminology changes to broaden and/ or better express descriptions in the plan.

The 2025 plan must still be discussed and approved by the PRC and forwarded to the planning commission and city council.

The following detail updates presented to the PRC with omissions from the 2014 to the 2025 plan lined out and inclusions in bold (not all inclusive, parts of the plan without major or key changes left out):

City Park - The horseshoe pit area is on the west east side of the park. Previously, The three horseshoe pits are were in the northwest portion of the park enclosed by a 6 foot high chain link fence with an open gate on the north side. The pits have been moved, but the chain link fenced area remains.

There are two is one swing sets with several swings. One is in the southeast area of the park with 3 seats, although 1seat is missing. The second is in the east central area of the park with 4 seats, although 3seats are missing.

Two small child play structures are in the northeast and north central areas of the park. Additionally, there is a teeter-totter and a spring tilting "animal" to ride. The two small child play structures should be renovated to be ADA compliant, enlarged and provided with permanent benches and/or picnic tables around the structures. Additional items are a bike rack and a bench at the small child play equipment.

South City Park - South City Park is 23 acres (11.7 acres developed) with a **bermed** fishing pond and two ADA platforms a 24 foot by 24 foot covered fishing area for disabled fishers with a 75 foot long sidewalk from the 2 concrete handicapped parking spaces in the parking lot. An asphalt pedestrian path circles the pond and provides access to the two fishing platforms. A 17-space paved parking lot serves the site with 2 additional ADA spaces at the south end of the pond and 2 more ADA spaces at the standalone permanent bathroom building at the south end of the park. The ADA spaces at the pond are near one of the fishing platforms and the 24-foot by 36-foot covered picnic area with picnic tables under the roof. Two porta-potties (one is handicapped accessible) are on the site as is a drinking faucet and faucet to wash off shoes. A small child play apparatus is on the east side of the parking lot and is served by the asphalt path. The bathroom building includes two bathrooms, a drinking fountain and a dog drinking basin. Two dog waste bag dispensers and 3 garbage cans are on the site.

Features: • Covered concrete pad with picnic tables for disabled fishers picnics. • 3 additional picnic tables dispersed on the south and east portions of the pond. • Large area An asphalt path circles around the pond suitable for future pedestrian/bike path. • 21- space paved Large gravel parking area can accommodate many vehicles.

Key Deficiencies: • An ADA compliant permanent bathroom is needed. The current ADA accessible rented portapotty is inadequate. • There is limited access to the pond due to soft edges. Two ADA compliant docks are needed to allow greater accessibility for wheelchairbound, young children and the elderly to fish. • The site's large size, 23 acres, is sufficient to accommodate additional pedestrian and bicycle trails, but no such trails exist. A pedestrian and bicycle trail system is needed to allow greater accessibility for wheelchairs, voung children and the elderly to the upland areas of the park. • A small child play structure is needed with benches and/or picnic tables nearby. • The driveway and parking area is gravel, rather than paved. Hebert Memorial Plaza - The building that was abutting to the north collapsed on January 31, 2021. Its south wall includes included a wall mural on its south wall which provides provided visual interest to those in the park. The collapsed building has been demolished, except for the vertical support posts and a few horizontal connectors.

Key Deficiencies: • The wood deck and wood posts need replacement. Such replacement could be considered as part of a determination whether the park as it exists should be replaced. In the last few years the City and

the Hebert Family have worked together to develop a plan to renovate the Plaza and connect it to Chester Moore Park and to the newly designated Morgan Street Park to the west. City funding to support the reconstruction was committed in July 2025. - verify. Veterans Memorial Park - The memorial structure will be o On the upland portion of the site outside the National Flood Insurance Program's Floodway Boundary an ADA accessible interpretive station, flag pole, stone memorial, four benches and a trash can were installed. A site plan has been created and fund raising has been initiated. Pedestrian access will be is via the 8 foot wide pedestrian/bicycle path on the south side of W. Main Street. Abutting the park site to the east is an unpaved parking area on the 60 foot wide south end of the Florence Street right-of-way between W.

Main Street and the South Yamhill River. It is accessed off of W. Main Street by two driveways. Parallel parking is available along the south side of W. Main Street. The site is buffered to the east by the 60 foot wide unimproved Florence Street right-of-way which runs down to the river. East of the right-of-way is a single family dwelling. Key Deficiencies: • About 70% of the site is in the floodway, thus the memorial structure will be on the approximately 30% of the site between the floodway boundary and the north property line along W. Main Street. The parking area in the Florence Street right-of-way is not paved.

Orchard Street Park/Site - The property can could still be developed with youth sports facilities, but the wetland review and approval process would need to be re-started, and as noted below, the current lack of improved street access to the site would need to be resolved. Improving the currently unimproved rights-of-way would be costly, as would extending public water and sewer lines to the site. City sewer and water are not available to the site. They are in W. Main Street to the south. The city has discussed the recreation condition with the Hampton Lumber Company and found that if the land is traded for other land that would be used for recreation, or sold and the proceeds used for recreation, the Company would not oppose the action.

The site is in the western portion of the city about 1,400 feet north of W. Main Street. Orchard Street extends northerly from W. Main Street to the site, but it is not improved and about 1,200 feet north of W. Main Street the right-of-way ends for 170 feet due to the city vacating the ROW in 1996 per Ordinance 1996-03. The 170 foot long vacated area is where, at that time, a grass airfield runway runs ran east-west. It is not expected the city would be able to reacquire the 170 feet of vacated right-ofway. The city has had preliminary contact with the current owner (the solar energy facility) with an initial indication that the owner would be open to discussing the situation, but follow-up discussions have not occurred. Potentially, the solar energy site could be expanded onto the 10 acres. This Plan assumes If the site is not to be sold for industrial development and, instead used for a city park, the city would apply to Yamhill County to change the Yamhill County Comprehensive Plan Map designation from Industrial to Public, and change the zone from Industrial to Public Facility, and develop the site for youth sports, such as soccer fields with picnic facilities on the east side on the bank of Rock Creek.

The issue for any development, industrial or a park, State law prohibits public sewer systems from serving land outside the UGB, thus adding the land into the UGB and annexing it into the City Limits would be necessary for any development needing a bathroom. Alternatively, the city would initiate a UGB expansion process to add the land to the UGB and City Limits for industrial or park purposes. The site is west of the City Limits, the urban growth boundary, and the residential areas of Sheridan. It could serve Sheridan children, but, potentially, it could be a site for a joint cooperative recreational program serving Sheridan and Willamina children. An alternative disposition of the site would be to sell it and use the proceeds to purchase parkland elsewhere or for recreation purposes.

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

Mixed Tostadas

Makes 14

Oil, for shallow frying

14 freshly prepared unbaked corn tortillas

1 cup mashed red kidney or pinto beans

1 iceberg lettuce, shredded Olive oil and vinegar dressing (optional)

2 cooked chicken breast portions, skinned and thinly sliced

8 ounces guacamole

1 cup coarsely grated sharp cheddar cheese

Pickled jalapeño chiles, seeded and sliced, to taste

- 1. Heat the oil in a shallow frying pan and fry the corn tortillas, one by one, until golden brown on both sides and crisp but not hard.
- 2. Spread each tortilla with a layer of mashed pinto or kidney beans. Put a layer of shredded lettuce (which can either be left plain or lightly tossed with a little dressing) over the beans.
- 3. Arrange chicken slices on top of the lettuce. Carefully spread over a layer of the guacamole and finally sprinkle over the grated cheese.
- 4. Arrange the mixed tostadas on a large platter and serve immediately, while still warm. Use your hands to eat tostadas, as they are extremely messy.

Variations: Instead of chicken, try using shredded pork, ground beef or turkey, or sliced chorizo. For a more authentic taste, use queso fresco or feta cheese instead of cheddar.


The individual or team with the highest number of correct answers will be declared the winner. In case of a tie, the winner will be drawn from the winning entries at the event's conclu-
