Willamina Future Farmers to Attend National Convention in Indiana

Nine Willamina Future Farmers of America (FFA) members will be heading, via the scenic route, to the 98th National FFA Convention and Expo, held October 29 - November 1, in Indianapolis, Ind.

The event is the largest annu-

al student convention in the United States, typically hosting 70,000 FFA members, advisors, and guests, mingling around venues at the Indianapolis Convention Center, Lucas Oil Stadium (home of the National Football League's Indianapolis

Colts), Indiana Farmers Coliseum, and Gainbridge Fieldhouse.

Rozco Owens, one of the students going on the trip, stated, "There is lots of opportunities, not just leadership. 


Girls Soccer **Starts** Season with Losses

The young combined Sheridan, Willamina, and Delphian (SWD) girls soccer team received some lessons on goal scoring in their opening matches of the season, with the instructors being the Taft Tigers and Amity Warriors. The SWD, which consists of only four seniors and one junior, with the remainder filled with underclassmen, was blanked in both contests, losing 0-8 to the Tigers before being downed 0-10 by the Warriors.

Record Falls in Nine-Man Football Match

The September 26 matchup between the Corbett and Rainier was one for the record books. When the final buzzer sounded. the scoreboard looked as if Corbett demolished Rainier 90-1, but in actuality, Rainier was victorious 101-90. The 191-point total shattered the previous all-classification record of 180 points, set in 2016 when Yoncalla beat Mapleton 108-72. Rainier was led by quarterback Gage Mohammed, rushing for 448 yards and nine touchdowns on 19 carries, averaging 23.6 yards per carry. Tail back Jayden Quevido added 324 yards and five touchdowns.

Corbett's Elliott Hunter had 442 yards and Kale Mickalson 232 yards, each with 6 touchdowns.

Thursday, Willamina hosted Jefferson, winning each set 25-13, 28-26, and 25-22, winning the match 3-0 against the Lions. Willamina improved its record to 2-8 overall and 2-6 in league. Sheridan football was manhandled on offense, defense, and special teams in their match against the Santiam Wolverines. Santiam scored on their first possession, then recovered a fumble on the ensuing kickoff, marching down for another run into the endzone. Sheridan's first offensive run on the night started on the 34, but two penalties marched the Spartans back to their 14-yard line. The next play was intercepted and taken in for a pick-six by the Santiam defense. Sheridan looked to head to the locker room at half, down 0-36, when another fumble by the Spartans gave Santiam the ball on the Spartan 10-yard line with 42 seconds left in the half. The Wolverines would score on the next play, leading the Spartans 44-0 at halftime.

Sheridan was finally able to find the Santiam side of the field when Benicio DePiero broke off the Spartans' biggest play of the night with a 63-yard run around the end that put the Spartans on the Wolverines' 7-yard line. Sheridan worked it down to the 2-yard line, but was unable to punch it in. That would be the only opportunity Santiam would give the Spartans, Sheridan losing 0-58 to the Wolverines.

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

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

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NOTICE OF PLANNING COMMISSION VACANCY

The Planning Commission is appointed by the City Council of the City of Willamina to three year terms. If the vacancy is caused by anything but the expiration of term, the appointee shall serve the remainder of the expired term. The role of the Planning Commission is to administer the subdivision and zoning ordinances and make recommendations to the City Council concerning land use issues.

Applicants for this position must be available to attend at least one regular meeting generally scheduled in the evening.

At the discretion of City Council, appointees to the Commission may reside outside the city limits, but must own a business or property within city limits, or have demonstrated through other means, such as civic or volunteer activity, that they have a sincere interest in the future of the City. At no time shall a quorum of the Commission reside outside city limits. Other restrictions may apply based upon occupation and family relationships.

Oregon Lottery Commission Adopts Rules For Winner Anonymity



OREGON LOTTERY®

Oregon's House Bill 3115 takes effect and requires names and addresses of lottery winners to be anonymous.

A new law will require the names and addresses of Oregon Lottery winners to be anonymous. Previously, a winner's name was public record under Oregon's public records law. Under House Bill 3115, Oregon Lottery may not publicly disclose a winner's name and address without the winner's written authorization.

The Oregon State Lottery Commission approved rules to implement the new law passed during the recent legislative session. Under the rules, Oregon Lottery may release other public information about a prize win such as the city in which the winner resides, the retailer that sold the winning ticket, the game played, and the prize amount. A winner may authorize Lottery in writing to use their name and photos but otherwise, Lottery will not release a winner's name and address.

House Bill 3115 also prohibits the purchase or sale of a winning lottery ticket in response to a cottage industry of socalled "discounters." The discounters buy winning tickets for less than their value from players, then cash them in for the prize amount. While some players choose to sell their tickets to avoid driving to an Oregon Lottery payment center, others may do so to avoid having their prize garnished for outstanding child support or public assistance overpayments, as required by Oregon law.

Under rules adopted by the Oregon State Lottery Commission, Lottery officials will evaluate prize claims to determine if the tickets were bought, sold, or claimed in violation of the law. If a winning ticket is found to be in violation, Lottery will deny the prize claim and confiscate the ticket.

Dayton Woman Sentenced to Federal Prison For Defrauding VFW Organization

A Dayton, Oregon, woman was sentenced for defrauding the Department of Oregon Veterans of Foreign Wars (VFW).

Cheryl Elizabeth Campos, 61, was sentenced to 25 months in federal prison and 3 years of supervised release.

According to court documents, between January 2022 and June 2024, Campos misused her position as Quartermaster of the VFW to access the VFW's bank accounts and embezzled large sums of money to her personal accounts. To conceal the embezzlement, Campos falsified financial documents, bank statements, and accounting records. In total, Campos embezzled more than \$1.7 million from the VFW's accounts to her personal accounts. Campos used the funds to buy hundreds of crystals, semi-precious rocks, marbles, stones, and statues. She also used the funds for personal expenses, including making credit card payments and purchasing a vehicle for a family member.

On March 24, 2025, Campos was charged by criminal information with wire fraud.

On April 15, 2025, Campos pleaded guilty to wire fraud.

This case was investigated by the Federal Bureau of Investigation and the Yamhill County Sheriff's Office. It was prosecuted by Robert S. Trisotto, Assistant U.S. Attorney for the District of Oregon.




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Willamina Mud Drags Runs Second Fundraising Race





Sheridan Chamber: Stella-Jones Talks Past, Present, and Future

The Sheridan Chamber of Commerce held its second monthly meeting on September 19, with Stella-Jones hosting the event. Roland Mueller, plant manager of the Sheridan location, represented Stella-Jones at the meeting, presenting a brief history of the plant and projects the company has completed and planned.

The property that sits on the west corner of Business Highway 18 and Rock Creek Rd., one mile











west of Sheridan, and upstream from the City of Sheridan's water supply intake, used to be the location of Sky-Way Drive-In until its closure in 1965. The property was purchased by Katherine M. Taylor, widow of John C. Taylor, who constructed the Sheridan Pressure Treated Lumber Inc., opening in July of 1966. Most of the old drive-in was demolished except the building that housed the projection room, snack bar, and bathroom, which remains on the site to this day.

Sheridan Pressure Treated Lumber Inc. would later merge with its sister company, Taylor Lumber, to form Taylor Lumber and Treating (TLT). The company would file for bankruptcy in 2001 and be brought into the EPA's Superfund cleanup program. Pacific Wood Preservation (PWP) would enter into a Covenant not to Sue with EPA and a Prospective Purchase Agreement with ODEQ, and purchase the property in 2002. PWP would later be acquired by Stella-Jones, Inc., in 2013.

The company currently employs just under 50 local personnel and has an annual payroll and benefit package of over \$4 million spread among those who work there.

Stella-Jones has been in the news lately, as the Oregon Department of Environmental Quality (ODEQ) issued a civil penalty of \$1,055,825 to the local treating plant for alleged violations of haz-

This is not the first time this patch of land has been in the news, as the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) placed the site, which was then Taylor Lumber and Treating, on the Superfund list in 2001 after finding contaminants, including creosote, polynuclear aromatic hydrocarbons, and pentachlorophenol, on the site. In full communication with ODEQ, Stella-Jones ceased using pentachlorophenol in January 2023.

A Superfund, the informally called name of the Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation, and Liability Act (CERCLA) of 1980, allows the EPA to clean up contaminated sites with no viable responsible party, or forces parties responsible for contamination to either perform cleanups or reimburse the government for EPA-led cleanup work.

After being placed on the Superfund list, cleanup efforts and construction of preventive measures started, paving of the area with a MatCon type asphalt, removal of contaminated soil, the building of a bentonite slurry wall 20 feet into the ground to contain groundwater in the area, construction of a groundwater extraction system within the slurry wall, and a treatment system to treat collected groundwater and stormwater prior to discharge. In a DEQ article from May 2022, it stated that Stella-Jones has performed several additional maintenance actions, including several major multi-year water line, discharge line, and curbing projects.

In 2023, human error caused an accidental release of an estimated 2,400 gallons of diesel and dichlorooctylisothiazolinone (DCOI), which made it past secondary containment infrastructure. Most of the chemicals that escaped extended onto a concrete pad and gravel at the facility, which cleanup crews remedied. However, a small percentage made its way to the lone ground urinal in the bathroom of the old Sky-Way building, into the Sheridan sewer system.

"We didn't see it right at the moment because we were more concerned about what was out there (the surrounding area). There was actually a wall-mount one in the box waiting to be installed, so we were on the right course; we just didn't have it in there (when the spill happened). It's been changed out now," Roland stated.

The company immediately had

contractors clean the entirety of that sewer line all the way out to the lagoons, placed booms, and performed testing to ensure the cleaning was complete and effective.

Now Stella-Jones is continuing its move forward in helping safeguard the area from wood preservatives used during and prior to its ownership of the treatment facility. "We put steel on top of the concrete for added durability," Roland said about the drying area for treated poles. They are currently in the process of upgrading the stormwater treatment system, moving from a bag filter system, where bags had to be manually changed, to a parallel sand filter system that can backwash itself, with the capability to run 500 gallons a minute in standard operation and 1,000 gallons during heavy rain events. This will also provide redundancy in the system for maintenance purposes or if one system should fail. For now, they are renting a system from a vendor until their project, which is expected to be sometime in January 2026. They are also on the market to find a contractor for an improved berm on the outer southern and southeastern parts of the property.

Roland also stated that the company has repainted and labeled process piping to improve visibility, safety, and prevent cross-contamination. They are also taking steps to improve the process water treatment system to increase its efficiency and reliability. "Any process water that we generate or any precipitation that falls within the process area, we don't discharge. So we do a separation of the oil and the water, then treat and evaporate the water."

The company also completely stopped processing poles multiple times in the past year to focus on environmental health and safety training for the staff.

"All the other improvements that we're doing now, the company sees this as a valuable asset and location, so they're in it for the long term. They're making these improvements just to increase the environmental health and safety protections. Some of it will help with efficiency, being able to treat more stormwater than the current system, which will help. Some of it (improvements) they're doing just because it's the right thing to do."

On October 1, Sheridan Mayor Cale George and City Manager Preston Polasek will meet with members of Stella-Jones' management in a closed meeting.

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DFR Warns Of Recent Gold Bar Scams

The Oregon Division of Financial Regulation (DFR) is issuing a warning to Oregon residents about the "gold bar" scam that is rapidly spreading across the nation. This scam involves fraudsters impersonating government officials who convince victims to purchase gold bars to supposedly protect their nest eggs.

This scam involves contact from someone claiming to be a government official, often associated with the U.S. Department of Treasury, who convinces the victim to convert money held in financial accounts into gold bars. The fraudster claims the victim's financial institution isn't safe and that physical gold is the only way to protect the assets. Once the victim agrees to convert the funds to gold, the fraudster either appears at the victim's front door or arranges for the victim to meet them at a nearby location to pick up the gold bars. DFR urges the public to stay alert, informed, and safe. Do not become the next victim of this scam.

More generally, the scam goes like this: Victims are contacted through text, email, or phone call and told their financial accounts are at risk of being compromised for various reasons. The reasons given may include that the accounts were subject to a cyberattack or are being used for illegal activity and must be closed. Victims are advised to empty the account, purchase the gold bars, and then deliver the bars over to the "government official." For those unable or unwilling to purchase the gold themselves, the fraudster will offer and even insist on making the purchase for them. Sometimes this includes giving the "government official" remote access to the victim's electronic devices. Victims are tricked into believing that converting their assets to gold and storing it with the government via the scammer, or "government official," is necessary to protect their assets. This is positively - and always – a scam.

It has already caused millions of dollars in losses to Oregon investors and others across the country.

"It is troubling that these criminals are using fear and a false sense of urgency to pressure victims into making devastating financial decisions," said TK Keen, DFR administrator. "Even more troubling is the reality that they are in our communities and facilitating these crimes in person." As an additional precaution, DFR emphasizes that government officials will never contact you and demand payment using gold bars. To stay safe:

- Be cautious of someone contacting you and claiming to be a government official. The imposter scam was the most common scam reported to the Federal Trade Commission in 2024. Government officials will never threaten you or demand that you make a payment using cryptocurrency, gift cards, or gold. If you need to communicate with a government agency, look up the contact information yourself, verify that you have not been directed to a scam site, and - only then - contact the agency using the information provided on its official website.
- Never click on suspicious links or respond to unsolicited messages. If you receive an email or text from an unknown sender (even if the details appear accurate), do not respond, and do not click on any links or attachments found in that email. You could unknowingly download malicious software.
- Never give out your personal and financial information. Do not share personal and financial information with strangers.

Local Fires Keep Sheridan Firemen Busy; Bulk in Rural Area

Fire Prevention Week, October 4-10, has a greater meaning each year to members of the Sheridan Fire Department, who annually spend countless hours in fighting them, some of them unnecessary, and many hours in learning how to combat a blaze and preventing damage. Another important part of their program is the salvage operation, which has been put into practice with considerable success in recent years.

The past few months have been exceedingly rough on the rural firemen, who have answered 45 calls since the first of July, most of them in the rural district.

Fifty-seven alarms have been called in since the first of the year, according to Fire Chief Cecil Harrison.

Friday, August 14th, set the alltime record for the department with 11 calls received during the day. Low humidity and harvesting activities were responsible for the many alarms during that day.

Serving Sheridan's rural fire district, an area of approximately 100 square miles, is quite a chore with a 25-man department made up of volunteers who donate their time fighting the fires and attending weekly meetings, which are often drill sessions, plus the repair and improvement of equipment owned by the department and the city.

Candy and other sweets are enjoyed in full force on Halloween. Whether trick-or-treaters are scouring the town looking to increase their treasure trove or guests are spending time at a party circling the dessert table, there are plenty of options to indulge a sweet tooth or two.

Making something decadent at home to share on Halloween is relatively simple when choosing a simple candy to create. Try this recipe for "Cheesecake Truffles" from "Jane's Patisserie" (Sourcebooks) by Jane Dunn.

Cheesecake Truffles

Makes 25

10 ounces full-fat soft cheese, like cream cheese or mascarpone

2 ounces icing sugar

6 ounces cookie crumbs, finely crushed

Decoration

7 ounces milk chocolate, melted


2 ounces cookie crumbs, finely crushed

Add the soft cheese to a bowl and mix briefly until smooth before adding the icing sugar and briefly mixing again until combined.

Pour the crushed cookie crumbs into the mix and fold together until combined. Refrigerate the mixture for at least 2 hours.

Take the chilled mixture out of the fridge and scoop into truffle shapes using 2 teaspoons or a melon baller, then place onto a tray lined with parchment paper. Return the truffles to the fridge for another hour, or the freezer for 30 minutes.

To decorate the truffles, carefully dip each into the melted chocolate and place back onto the lined tray. You can use small spoons or forks to help with this. Once dipped, sprinkle the tops with the extra crushed cookies.
