NOTICE OF PLANNING COMMISSION VACANCY

The Planning Commission is appointed by the City Council of the City of Willamina to three year terms. If the vacancy is caused by anything but the expiration of term, the appointee shall serve the remainder of the expired term. The role of the Planning Commission is to administer the subdivision and zoning ordinances and make recommendations to the City Council concerning land use issues.

Applicants for this position must be available to attend at least one regular meeting generally scheduled in the evening

At the discretion of City Council, appointees to the Commission may reside outside the city limits, but must own a business or property within city limits, or have demonstrated through other means, such as civic or volunteer activity, that they have a sincere interest in the future of the City. At no time shall a quorum of the Commission reside outside city limits. Other restrictions may apply based upon occupation and family relationships.

To apply, complete a Government Office Application which can be found on the City of Willamina website willaminaoregon.gov or at City Hall. Applicants can submit the applications via email to stevensk@ci.willamina.or.us or submit the application at City Hall.

Revitalization Programs Aim to Improve City

Sheridan Revitalization Movement (SRM) is a non-profit organization that started in 2016 as a joint effort between the Sheridan Chamber of Commerce and a group of interested community members.

Today, focusing on turning ideas into action, those community members, through facade improvement grants for local businesses, murals and public art projects, city-wide cleanup events, and the Yard of the Month competition, are dedicated to making Sheridan a stronger, more vibrant town for its residents and tourists.

The SRM, earlier this year, announced its recipients for the two \$1,000 grants to help improve the facade of two businesses in town, West Valley Mercantile and Carol's Consignments.

On S Bridge St., West Valley Mercantile opted to put up a large sign close to the street, announcing its presence to passersby, while Carol's Consignments on E Main St., not owning the building it occupies, pushed the grant up to the landlord, where cleaning and painting of the building's facade was more of the focus. Both of these projects have been recently completed.

Two more grants are being launched by SRM in November. All information about the application and grant details can be found at www.revitalizesheridan.com/grants.

Tkeisha Wydro, President of the Sheridan Revitalization Movement, stated, "There are plenty of projects waiting to happen, but SRM needs more volunteers. board members, and committee leaders to make them a reality. The Public Art Committee has funding and exciting plans, but needs someone to help guide it. More hands make the work lighter, the projects bigger, and the results more noticeable."


She added, "Whether you volunteer for a few hours or take on a leadership role on a committee, your participation helps make Sheridan a better place for the families who live here."

Children of Firm Foundation Gets Boost from Local Lunch

Children of Firm Foundation (COFF), led by founder and president Lindah Hagglund, a local who was born and raised in Zambia, hosted a cross-cultural lunch at the Sheridan United Methodist Church on Sunday.

Children of Firm Foundation is a nonprofit organization dedicated to empowering youth through educa-tion and community support. They help uplift the living standard of children, such as street kids, or-phans, and vulnerable children in impoverished societies.

Attendees were treated to a lunch of chow mein, Indian fry bread, chicken and vegetables stew with nshima (Zambia's staple food - a thick porridge made from corn flour), and pasta salad. Those with room left after the meal had dessert of a cloud fruit salad and cookies, donated by Sandy Walker, with the COFF logo printed on them using edible ink.

As lunch was enjoyed, those interested in getting up and stretching their legs had the opportunity to view items being sold in the silent auction, with proceeds going to COFF.

COFF's current projects are being carried out near Choma, Southern Province of Zambia, Africa, approx-imately 181 miles from the capital city, Lusaka, and with a population of around 46,000 residents.

The organization works in covering the surrounding areas, focusing on children who have obstacles pre-venting them from attending school and children of parents affected by HIV/AIDS.

Children of Firm Foundation also partners with Intuba International, reaching out to farmers in impover-ished areas to teach new agricultural methods and drilling wells to secure permanent clean water.

The organization then establishes nutritional gardens close to those wells, teaching a water conservation program called Raised Bed Bucket Drip Irrigation systems, which use very little water.

Lindah stated on the event's lunch program, "Every child deserves to be nurtured in a safe environment with adequate nourishment, health services, shelter, clean and safe drinking water, sound education, and a supportive family system. Ultimately, our mission assists children in their homes, faith communities, villages, and towns, and helps them become able to support themselves and their families."

After lunch, SmaZama, a Koto

and Cello duo, played for the crowd as the live auction portion was getting ready to start, providing more proceeds to the organization.

Lindah gave special thanks and recognition to all the volunteers who made the event possible. Planning Committee: Lindah and Sam Hagglund, Gay Hall-Pentecost, David Kennedy, Mary Lukehart, Cliff Monroe, Julie Schumann, and Cheryl Stapleton. Children of Firm Foundation would like to thank all for the support they received. From those who helped plan, set up, cook, serve, donated auction items, music, and all those who attended.

Mother Nature and Corbett Rain on Sheridan Spartan Homecoming

With a storm looming for the Sheridan High School's Home-coming game, Mother Nature was kind enough to open up the skies and let the sun shine through for Thursday's noise parade and Friday's pre-game coronation of the Spartans' 2025 Homecoming King, Tristan Sayer, and Queen Taylor Lugo.

Unfortunately for the Spartans, this was the crowning moment for the evening, as Mother Nature and the Cardinals brought in a storm that would dampen the spirits of the Sheridan Homecoming game.

It only took three plays into the game for Corbett to set the tone for the remainder of the battle with a screen pass that broke into a 56-yard touchdown that was called back on penalty, putting the ball on Sheridan's 30-yard line.

It would only take four more plays to make the touchdown official, and with the 2-point conversion good, putting Sheridan down 0-8 against the Cardinals.

The Spartans, on their first possession of the game, would go four-and-out, punting the ball. Three plays later, the Cardinals once again found the endzone, putting Sheridan into a 0-14 hole after a failed 2-point attempt.

Corbett would continue to pour on the points, down 0-22, Sheridan would have one offensive burst, when Travis Lugo broke off two runs, one for 17 yards that put Sheridan into Cardinal territory for the first time, followed

by a 14-yard jaunt that found the Spartans on Corbett's 25-yard line to end the first quarter.

The Cardinals' defense regained control during the break, stopping the Spartan offense, falling on a fumble to take over on their 27-yard line.

From there, it was all Corbett, Sheridan going into the locker room at halftime down 0-38.

The third quarter had both teams unable to find the endzone. In the 4th quarter, with the Cardinals five yards away from increasing their lead with 4:45 left in the game, the Spartans pulled off their biggest play of the game when Travis Lugo intercepted the ball on the goal line, taking it all

the way back to Corbett's 35-vard line.

With the aid of offside penalties by the Cardinals and an amazing 10-yard reception in the middle of three Corbett defenders by Ayden Vargas, Sheridan found themselves on the Cardinals' 19-yard line, on their way to ending their five-game scoreless streak with a little over a minute left in the game. Two plays later, the Cardinals terminated that thought, intercepting the ball on the ten-yard line with 50 seconds left in the game, the Spartans losing 0-38 against Corbett.

Sheridan's final game of the season will be at home versus Colton at 7 p.m., Thursday, October 30.






