# Repurpose Store "The Rusty Elephant" Opens in West Valley

The Ivory Elephant, which operated in Willamina for two years before 2020, has gained a little patina over the years since its closure and reopened last month as The Rusty Elephant, located just west of Sheridan.

This isn't your local thrift shop or second-hand store. This is the repurposed passion of owner Suzi Ouimette, who moved to the West Valley area from Portland in 2000.

The knick-knacks that fill her little store from floor to ceiling range from present to passé, vintage to Victorian, doors to decor, and much more.

Suzi's passion, though, is "Boho" (bohemian), re-purposing items to socially unconventional works of art, such as a horned animal skull now adorned with jewelry, a door decked in blues, browns, and

keys galore, and other repurposed items.

"My family, my mom, and my aunt dealt in antiques my whole life, so I kind of took it on," She stated, in between greeting incoming customers. "I repurpose a lot of stuff, (pointing around the shop) I take stuff like that (pointing at a wooden box that she had put legs on), and I do stuff like that (pointing at a small doll chair with a seat that looks like a bird's nest). I redo furniture and repurpose things," she added.

Almost every nook and cranny of the store is filled. She apologized for the mess as she worked to reorganize and clean up, jokingly stating she wished she could add her storage unit just down the building to her space for more room.

Despite the cramped conditions, Individuals around town have given positive reviews on the amount, variety, and visual quality of items Suzi has for sale.



# NOTICE OF PLANNING COMMISSION VACANCY

The Planning Commission is appointed by the City Council of the City of Willamina to three year terms. If the vacancy is caused by anything but the expiration of term, the appointee shall serve the remainder of the expired term. The role of the Planning Commission is to administer the subdivision and zoning ordinances and make recommendations to the City Council concerning land use issues.

Applicants for this position must be available to attend at least one regular meeting generally scheduled in the evening.

At the discretion of City Council, appointees to the Commission may reside outside the city limits, but must own a business or property within city limits, or have demonstrated through other means, such as civic or volunteer activity, that they have a sincere interest in the future of the City. At no time shall a quorum of the Commission reside outside city limits. Other restrictions may apply based upon occupation and family relationships.

# Willamina Museum Has New Hours, Some Fun Bits of History Inside

The Willamina Museum is pleased to announce that they will be opening again every Sunday from 1-4 pm starting October 4. Previously, the Museum's summer hours were every Saturday from 1-4 pm. They invite the public to come enjoy a cup of coffee, cookies and visit the many displays depicting the history of Willamina and surrounding community.

The building in which the museum occupies was built in 1887 and served as the only church in Willamina until 1909. In 1922 it became a 7th Day Adventist school then in 1933 the Willamina Gospel Mission bought the land and building for \$100. The Primrose Rebekah Lodge purchased the building in 1937. In 1992, April Wooden along with others, wanting Willamina to have a museum, started looking at the Rebekah Lodge building. After a year of hard work and discussions the Rebekah's deeded the building to the city in 1993 and the idea of having a museum was born. The Museum opened in the early 2000's with the help and hard work of many volunteers

Willamina has a strong logging history and many tools of the trade including early pictures taken of loggers, mills and logging camps are featured. Many of our local loggers can be found in pictures of their early years out in the woods or running heavy equipment.

The museum proudly features many dioramas made by our local dentist, Dr. Gary Brooks. He has researched the history of the brick mill, plywood plant, downtown Willamina in the 1920's, the old mill and pond and schools of the area. These three-dimensional miniatures depict buildings, railroad tracks, ponds, cars and even that famous cow by the brick plant. You'll have to come in for the rest of the story.

The Museum offers an extensive research area and includes obituaries, historic photos of Willamina, story of the plywood plant, marriage records dating back to 1844, and our own famous Rocky Stone whose boat racing career began in 1930's. He was a member of the American Power Boat Association, winning most awards in all divisions over the years.

Some of the other interesting items to see include the Willamina Clay Products plant which

operated from 1907-1974, a cider press, old farm equipment and Yamhill County Fair Banners from 1960-1993. A most impressive display is an original wagon donated by Augie & Betty Frownfelter. You can also find books on who and what was brought out west in the Wagon Train Lists from 1839-1855, a most interesting read.

Other displays of note include

a depiction of an old fashion kitchen featuring a Wedgewood wood burning stove, the Willamina General Store, a Parlour complete with pump organ and a bedroom showcasing antique dolls, dressing gowns and the beautiful Willamina quilt made in 1901. There is also a medical display with many items donated from local doctors and a pharmacist. These include old pill bottles, first aid kits, and other items important to a Doctor making home visits. Yes, they used to do that! They also have a military section sporting uniforms loaned

to the museum from local men who served in WWII, Korea and Vietnam complete with their pictures attached to many of the uniforms. Included in the military section are service records books from WWII that are definitely worth checking out.

You can find advertisements from

local restaurants and businesses of days gone by. We even have the original movie theatre seats! The theatre was first called the Willamina Theatre then Hi-Way Theatre and finally Gay-Way Theatre. You'll have to come in for a visit to find out where that theatre was located and see what movies were playing at that time. The newest and greatest addition to the Museum is the new computer with the Willamina Times digitalized. You can look up news articles from when the paper started in 1909 till it closed November 1972. It is easy to access whatever you may be looking for and has a printer for those documents you find.

They look forward to seeing you and visiting our wonderful museum, it definitely is a treasure and one that you will find most interesting.



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# **100 Years Ago This Month: Historical Events From October 1925**

The month of October has been home to many historical events over the years. Here's a look at some that helped to shape the world in October 1925.

- The Lerma River in Guanajuato, Mexico, floods on October 1, leaving thousands of people homeless as a result.
- Three workers are burned alive when the Church Hill Tunnel in Richmond, Virginia, collapses on October 2. The tragedy is partly responsible for the emergence of an urban legend known as the "Richmond Vampire" more than 80 years after the tunnel's collapse.
- The Soviet Union removes all restrictions on the alcohol content of beverages on October 4. Alcohol had been prohibited on a limited basis for 11 years prior to the removal of the limitation.
- Legendary baseball pitcher Christy Mathewson dies of tuberculosis on October 7. Mathewson, who notched 373 wins and five National League ERA titles during his career, developed tuberculosis after being exposed to chemical weapons during World War One.
- On October 9, the Italian state prosecutor absolves 24 officials of any responsibility for the June 1924 murder of Giacomo Matteotti. Matteotti was an Italian socialist politician who accused the fascists of fraud shortly before he was kidnapped and killed by police affiliated with fascist leader Benito Mussolini.
- The Palace Museum is opened to the public in Beijing on October 10. More than 1.1 million pieces of artwork were housed at the museum when it first opened.
- Federal Bureau of Investigation agent Edwin C. Shanahan is killed on October 11. Shanahan is the first FBI agent to be killed in the line of duty.
- Six hundred American troops enter Panama on October 12. The troops enter at the request of Panamanian President Rodolfo Chiari, who was hoping to put down a renter's strike.
- Margaret Hilda Roberts is born in Grantham, Lincolnshire, England on October 13. Roberts would come to be known as Margaret Thatcher and serve as the Prime Minister of England from 1979 to 1990.
- The Pittsburgh Pirates win the World Series on October 15. The Pirates defeat the Washington Senators 9-7 in the decisive seventh game of the series. The

Senators had opened the series winning three of the first four games.

- Rebels invade Damascus during the Great Syrian Revolt on October 17. The rebels set several colonial French buildings on fire and take control of Azm Palace during the revolt.
- Hungarian-American explorer and amateur archaeologist Bryon Khun de Prorok begins excavating the Tin Hinan Tomb in the Sahara Desert in French Algeria on October 18. Prorok begins the excavation despite objections from the local Tuareg Berber community.
- "The War of the Stray Dog" between Bulgaria and Greece begins on October 19. The killing of a Greek captain and a sentry by Bulgarian soldiers was one reason given for the start of the conflict.
- John William Carson is born in Corning, Iowa, on October
   23. Carson would grow up and host "The Tonight Show Starring Johnny Carson" for three decades, ultimately earning the nickname "The King of Late Night."
- Seven of 23 U.S. Navy Curtiss CS-1 seaplanes are destroyed by wind gusts on October 25. The planes had been brought to Maryland to compete in the Schneider Cup.
- Nicaragua President Carlos José Solórzano acquiesces to former president Emiliano Chamorro Vargas's day-old demand to make him Minister of War on October 26, effectively ceding control of the country.
- American inventor Fred Waller receives a patent for the water ski on October 27.
- The remains of Egyptian pharaoh Tutankhamun are found on October 28. English Egyptologist Howard Carter had discovered Tutankhamun's tomb nearly three years before discovering the remains, which had been covered by a death mask made of gold.
- An armored truck is hijacked and robbed of \$93,000 in cash in Buffalo, New York, on October 29. The money is never recovered and Richard Reese Whitemore, who was indicted for the holdup, was never convicted of the crime after a jury could not agree that he was guilty.
- The Persian Parliament formally deposes the exiled Shah of Persia on October 31. The deposition officially ends the Qajar dynasty, which began in 1789.

### ODHS Announces Federal Changes To Snap, Thousands May Be Impacted

### News Release from Oregon Dept. of Human Services

Oregon Department of Human Services announces federal changes to SNAP so that thousands of Oregonians who may be impacted can prepare

(Salem, Ore.) The Oregon Department of Human Services (ODHS) is announcing federally required changes to the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) in Oregon. These changes are required under House Resolution (H.R. 1), a federal law passed on July 4, 2025. More than 740,000 people in Oregon currently receive SNAP benefits, and ODHS expects more than 313,000 people enrolled in SNAP may be impacted by the H.R. 1 changes.

"We are announcing these changes today so that families can prepare for the impact we expect many Oregonians who depend on this resource will feel," said Dana Hittle, who is co-leading ODHS' federal response team. "Oregon families enrolled in SNAP receive an average of \$300 a month, and any reduction makes it harder for families to put food on the table. Oregon has no choice but to follow federal law that will result in increased hardship across our communities, but we remain committed to helping families adjust and prepare."

ODHS will begin notifying affected households in mid-October. The people who will be most affected by the new federal law include older adults, immigrants and people living in rural communities with limited access to transportation.

The changes won't happen to everyone at once — they will roll out over the next year.

- For people who already get SNAP: The changes will affect those who applied or recertified between July 4 and Oct. 1, 2025. Notices will be sent around Oct. 15, 2025 to this first group of people who are impacted. The first group will have SNAP benefit reductions or closures on Nov. 1, 2025. For people approved for SNAP before July 4, 2025, the changes will happen over time throughout the next year and a notice will be sent.
- For people who apply or reapply for SNAP after Oct. 1, 2025: The new rules will apply right away.

Key changes affecting people in Oregon

These changes will affect three main groups of SNAP recipients: households receiving utility assistance, able-bodied adults ages 18 through 64 with no child under age 14 in their SNAP group, and certain lawfully present immigrants.

Utility assistance and SNAP benefits

- Households previously eligible for the Heating and Cooling Full Utility Allowance (FUA) through energy assistance programs like Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) or "Heat and Eat" will see changes.
- Only households with at least one member who is age 60 or older or a member with a disability will automatically qualify for FUA.
- Approximately 29,000 households will lose this allowance, reducing their SNAP benefits by an average of \$58 per month.
- About 9,600 households who applied or renewed between July 4 and Oct. 1, 2025 will get notices around Oct. 15, 2025. Their SNAP will be reduced Nov. 1, 2025.
- Another 20,000 households will see benefits go down when their SNAP is reviewed.

Able-Bodied Adults Without Dependents (ABAWD)

- Beginning Oct 1, 2025, people with ABAWD status in 6 counties (Multnomah, Washington, Clackamas, Yamhill, Benton, and Hood River) will be reviewed at application or renewal for required work rules.
- People who don't meet work rules may lose SNAP benefits after 3 months.
- The work rules will apply to adults ages 18–64 without a disability or without children under age 14 in their SNAP household. Previously the work rules applied to adults ages 18 to 54 without a child under 18 in their SNAP household.
- People with ABAWD status must work or participate in a qualifying activity for at least 80 hours per month.
- Veterans, people experiencing homelessness and young adults aging out of foster care are no longer exempt from the work rules.
- Tribal Members and people who meet the federal definition of "Indian, Urban Indian, or California Indian" are newly exempt from the work rules.
- In January 2026 these ABAWD requirements will be implemented statewide.
- It's estimated that 310,000 adults will have to be newly evaluated to see if they have to meet the work rules.

Refugees, Asylees and certain

other lawfully present immigrants

- Refugees, asylees, trafficking survivors and other conditionally allowed non-citizens who were eligible for SNAP as of July 3, 2025, will lose eligibility under H.R. 1.
- In Oregon, it's estimated that at least 3,000 individuals will no longer qualify for benefits.
- About 1,000 people who applied or renewed their SNAP between July 4 and Oct. 1, 2025 will get notices around Oct. 15, 2025. Their SNAP will end on Oct. 31, 2025.
- Another 2,000 people will lose SNAP when their SNAP is reviewed.

### Notifications to households

Around Oct. 15, 2025, ODHS will mail notices to:

- Roughly 9,600 households receiving energy assistance to notify them that their SNAP benefits will be reduced starting November 1, 2025.
- Approximately 1,000 refugees, asylees and other lawfully present immigrants whose SNAP cases will close on Oct. 31, 2025.
- Affected households do not need to take any action. ODHS will adjust benefits automatically.

### **Preparing for changes**

- If you think you may be in one of the impacted groups, go to www.oregon.gov/odhs to learn more.
- Watch your mail for notices

from ODHS and open them right away. The first wave of notices will be sent on Oct. 15, 2025.

- If you think the ABAWD work requirements may apply to you, don't wait to start planning how to meet them. Call the ODHS ABAWD team directly at 833-947-1694 or SNAP.ABAWD-Team@odhsoha.oregon.gov.
- Know what other food resources are in your community.

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# Sheridan Fire Recharges Community With Pancake Feed

The Sheridan Volunteers Association (SVFA) held its annual pancake feed on Sunday, Sept. 28. This year the volunteers served around 400 people raising approximately \$4,500 for the organization. Those funds will be used to support the training cost of four volunteers taking EMT courses to help with staffing and response coverage for Sheridan Fire District (SFD.)

The pancake feed took place just before National Fire Prevention Week (NFPW), Oct. 5-11, 2025. NFPW is observed

during the week of October 8 to commemorate the Great Chicago Fire that started on Oct. 8, 1871. It caused devastating damage that burned more than 2,000 acres of land, destroyed more than 17,400 structures, killed more than 250 people. and left around 100,000 people homeless.

SFD, working together with the volunteers, used the event to provide useful fire prevention information and resources to the public. One of the services available, FireMed, is a mem-

bership program that protects against the cost of emergency transportation. People living within Sheridan Fire District are eligible to join. Residents can sign up for membership year around, not just during an open enrollment period, as it was for many years.

Another service provided by the fire district is the loaning out of chimney brushes.

The main focus of information on the information table this year was the National Fire Prevention Association's (NFPA) theme for this year's NFPW "Charge into Fire Safety™: Lithium-Ion Batteries in Your Home."

Lithium-Ion (LI) batteries, which have become more nu-

merous over the past few years with the ever-growing list of rechargeable electrical and electronic devices, have created a significant hazard both in the home and at landfills, Reuters reporting an expected 600% increase in LI-battery fires between 2023 and 2030.

NFPA stresses how important it is to buy, charge, and recycle safely when it comes to lithium-ion batteries.

Buy only lithium-ion batteries and chargers that have certification marks such as UL, ETL, or CSA, which are regulated to meet important safety standards. Batteries that do not meet these standards can be appealing due to their lower cost; however, what you save on the price of a rechargeable battery may cost you more in fire damage from thermal runawav.

Charge devices on a hard surface, using cords from the manufacturer, and unplug or remove the battery when it is fully charged. Hard surfaces allow heat to dissipate during charging, minimizing the chance of thermal runaway.

When the battery or item is no longer needed, do not throw it away or toss it in the recycle bin. Discarded LI-batteries are not always discovered at landfill and recycling center acceptance locations, and damage from heavy equipment like tractors or trash compactors can cause the batteries to ignite, causing surrounding flammable material to catch fire as well. Instead, take them to a local safe battery recycling location such as Lowe's or Staples (found on call2recycle.org) or call Western Oregon Recology for information on how to pro-
