THE CITY OF WILLAMINA, OREGON, HEREBY EXTENDS AN INVITATION TO SUBMIT BIDS FOR:

PROJECT NAME AND LOCATION:
CITY OF WILLAMINA SCA 2024 – HILL DRIVE AND OAKEN HILLS DRIVE, WILLAMINA, OR 97396
BID CLOSING DATE AND TIME:
DUE BY 2:00PM, TUESDAY, JANUARY 6, 2026

Bids shall be submitted via QuestCDN no later than 2:00 p.m., Tuesday, January 6, 2026. Immediately following the filing deadline, the Bids will be opened and publicly read via Microsoft Teams. Contact Adam Soto, PE, asoto@kellerassociates.com for a link to the Microsoft Teams Meeting. Any Bids received after the specified date and time will not be considered.

The project generally includes 1,900 square yards of asphalt paving with a 1" leveling course and a 3" wearing course within the existing public right-of-way, pavement restoration, construction of approximately 180 linear feet of new curb, gutter, sidewalk, and 4 Americans with Disability Act (ADA) curb ramps, and installation of one storm water inlet with 10 feet of 12-inch diameter storm sewer pipe, and all labor, Equipment, Materials, and incidentals necessary to complete the Work as specified.

The City will not hold a pre-bid meeting. Substantial Completion of all Work to be done under the Contract, except for seeding and plant establishment, shall be no later than September 15, 2026, with Final Completion of all Work to be done under the Contract no later than September 30, 2026.

This project is funded in whole or in part by local funds and a grant from The Oregon Department of Transportation, State of Oregon, under the Small City Allotment Program (SCA).

This is a public work contract subject to ORS 279C.800 to 279C.870 and the prevailing rate of wage required under applicable Oregon Bureau of Labor and Industries (BOLI) requirements and any amendments in effect at the time of solicitation. Only State prevailing wage laws shall apply.

All public improvements must conform to the Oregon Department of Transportation 2024 edition of the Oregon Standard Specifications for Construction,

as modified by the Special Provisions. Standard Specifications are available at the ODOT web site at: https://www.oregon.gov/ODOT/Business/Pages/Standard_Specifications.aspx.

Bidders must be prequalified by ODOT for the appropriate Class of Work for this Project, and each Bid must contain a statement as to whether the Bidder is prequalified by ODOT prior to the opening of Bids. Any new prequalification applications must be submitted according to ODOT's prequalification procedures at least ten (10) calendar days before the Bid Closing date. The Class of Work for this Project is a combination of Earthwork and Drainage, Aggregate Bases, Asphalt Concrete Paving, and Miscellaneous Highway Appurtenances. Hardcopy sets of Bidding Documents will not be available from the Issuing Office. Bidding Documents are available on compact disc (as portable document format (PDF) files) for

a non-refundable charge of \$425.00, payable to "Keller Associates". Hard copy Bidding Documents may be obtained from the Issuing Office by sending an email to asoto@kellerassociates.com. Upon the Issuing Office's receipt of payment, hard copy Bidding Documents will be sent via the prospective Bidder's delivery method of choice; the shipping charge will depend on the shipping method chosen. The date that the Bidding Documents are transmitted by the Issuing Office will be considered the prospective Bidder's date of receipt of the Bidding Documents. Neither Owner nor Engineer will be responsible for full or partial sets of Bidding Documents, including Addenda if any, obtained from sources other than the Issuing Office.

Each Bidder procuring Contract Documents will be included on the Plan Holders List maintained by the City of Willamina through QuestCDN. Addenda and additional project information will be delivered through QuestCDN. If the Bidder obtains the Contract Documents from a Contractor's Plan Center, it is

the responsibility of the Bidders, not the City, to check QuestCDN regularly for any addenda, clarifications, and other pertinent notifications prior to the Bid Closing date and time. To be notified of any addenda, register as a plan holder through QuestCDN.

Each Bidder shall comply with the stated bidding requirements and all associated Bid forms provided in the Contract Documents. A **ten (10) percent Bid Bond**, certified check, or cashier's check shall accompany each Bid and shall be forfeited if the Bidder fails to enter into a Contract with the City of Willamina within fifteen (15) days after the dated "Notice of Award". The successful Bidder will be required to furnish evidence of required insurance and shall furnish a faithful Performance and Payment Bond, each in the amount of **one-hundred percent (100%)** of the total amount of the Contract. Upon successful completion of the Contract, and prior to City release of the Performance Bond, the Contractor shall furnish a completed Warranty Bond in the amount of **thirty percent (30%)** of the total amount of the Performance Bond, which shall remain in full

force and effect until compliance with and fulfillment of all terms and provisions of the Contract's one (1) year warranty obligations. The successful bidder and all subcontractors will be required to furnish to the Oregon Construction Contractors Board a public works bond in the amount of **\$30,000**, unless exempt under ORS 279C.

The Contract Documents contain a statement declaring that the Bidder agrees to comply with the provisions of ORS 279C.800 through 279C.870 regarding payment of prevailing wages. The City's

Contract contains a clause which incorporates by reference all of the provisions of ORS 279A-C which are applicable to public contracts. Bidders are expected to be familiar with these provisions including, but not limited to, any most recent revisions to ORS 279C.

No Bid shall be received or considered unless the Bidder is registered with the Oregon Construction Contractors Board for construction projects, as required by ORS 701.005 through 701.128, or licensed with the Landscape Contractors Board for landscaping projects, as required by ORS 671.530. It is

anticipated that asbestos will not be encountered during the Project; therefore, the requirements of ORS 468A.700 through 468A.760 do not apply.

Each Bid must contain a statement as to whether the Bidder is a Resident Bidder, as required by ORS 279C.365(h). Out-of-state bidders may have a percentage added to their Bids in accordance with ORS 279A.120.

Bidders on public works projects with a Contract value of \$100,000 or more, as defined in ORS 279C.370, are required to disclose within two (2) hours after Bid opening, the Bidders certain first-tier subcontractors. The Bidder shall provide the information as required on the first-tier disclosure form provided in the Contract Documents.

The City of Willamina reserves the right to waive any informality or to reject any Bid not in compliance with all prescribed bidding procedures and requirements and may reject any or all Bids upon finding of the City Council that it is in the best public interest to do so.

A Message from the Sheridan Superintendent

Working alongside children and families everyday gives educators a deep appreciation for locally-available healthcare resources. Travel to McMinnville can be a barrier to getting the care families need and those who can easily travel are often faced with shortages of providers and long wait-times for appointments.

Over the past few months we have been happy to welcome Virginia Garcia Medical Center to Sheridan and to promote the services they are bringing to our community. Primary care, close to where our families live and work, ensures that essential treatment is accessible regardless of financial status or location.

The Sheridan clinic treats patients of all ages in Sheridan, Willamina, and the surrounding areas. The new clinic, which opened on Jefferson Street (across from the high school tennis courts) in October, currently provides primary care with long-term plans to add additional services as well.

Until additional services can be permanently established at the new location, VGMHC will offer services through their mobile medical vans.

On Wednesday, December 17 they are coordinating with Yamhill County Public Health to offer both dental services and a vaccine clinic on the same day:

Travis Dow Speaks at Sheridan Museum of History about

Travis Dow, world traveler, author, artist, Podcaster, YouTuber, speaker of multiple languages, history enthusiast, and Millennial Old-Timer (a book he authored), held a presentation about Christmas in Germany and Czechoslovakia at the Sheridan Museum of History on Saturday. Travis, who was born in Corvallis, spent ten years in Germany, going to German schools, before his family moved back to Corvallis, where he went to high school and then college. After graduating from College, he then moved to Prague, the capital city of the Czech Republic.

The presentation was held on the exact day of Svaty Mikuláška (Saint Nicholas Day), "Which is a big deal if you are a German or a Czech kid," stated Travis. He then went on to explain various areas in Eastern Europe, the Holy Roman Empire, the Austro-Hungarian Empire, the Czech Republic, Germany, and Slovakia. "And that all matters because a lot of these traditions do have things in common. Somewhere in the 1200s, the 13th century, the Teutonic Knights crusaded up in East Prussia towards Latvia,

converting pagans as they went. That's why they spoke German up there before World War II." Travis then continued, stating that in the 6th century, a pope said the Advent fast starts on St. Martin's Day (November 11), Central Europe's Halloween. "It's a different tradition, different things. Germany doesn't do separation of church and state the way we do, so I grew up with a bunch of Catholics and a large minority of Lutherans, and we would go to religion class together. I would go with the Lutherans, the Catholics would go with the Catholics, there would be one or two Muslims, and the Atheist kid would go off and learn about Plato or something really cool."

Travis stated that when he was around six or seven years old, they made little plastic lanterns to put a tea light in, while learning about St. Martin. Afterwards, they all would march off towards the Lutheran church in a march called a Laternenlauf (lantern walk) or Laternenumzug (lantern pageant), singing a song while they walked. "Now, in parts of the Czech Republic, you might

see this procession following a knight on horseback representing a Roman soldier. "That's a little bit like their Groundhog Day," stated Travis, adding, "If the horse is wearing a white blanket, it's going to be a snowy winter, and if it is wearing a black blanket, it's going to be clear weather."

Showing up a picture of Old Town Square and Charles Bridge in Prague, taken by his friend Pete, Travis reported that the knights would throw sand and sawdust throughout the whole square, having jousting tournaments, reenacting the Hussite or the Thirty Years' War. "You can just be walking around Prague, doing your grocery shopping, and you might come across knights yelling at each other, talking smack, and eventually fighting or jousting each other."

He then discussed the days of Saint Andrew and Saint Barbara. "It's interesting because you kind of see some pagan traditions seep through these feast days," he said, reporting that on Saint Andrew's Day, molten lead was poured into water to obtain

a divination of the future. This was mostly utilized by women to predict if they would find love in the next year or not.

Travis explained that on Saint Barbara Day, women would dress up, wearing a white gown and a green wreath. "I think that has very little to do with Christianity and a lot to do with paganism," he stated, adding, "It's already fall time, winter is coming. They'll pick a cherry blossom, put it in water, and if it blooms again in November or December, then that means you'll get married or find love next year. They also have a stocking tradition, but it is not like stockings on the chimney; they will put stockings in the window, and St. Barbara fills them with goods, candy, and stuff."

Then Saint Nicholas Eve arrives (December 5 or 6), Travis stated, "Last night I talked to Pete, my buddy, and he just got back from Old Town Square (Prague). I don't know what you guys were doing last night, but in the Czech Republic, people were getting into trios, one St. Nicholas as a bishop, one dressed as the devil,



The Stamp Act 1775-1776

The American colonists were taxed by the British on all printed materials in the colonies, including newspapers, legal documents, and even playing cards, through a law known as the Stamp Act. At the time, paper was already costly, making the tax especially burdensome. Parliament justified the tax by arguing that the colonies should help pay for the 10,000 British troops stationed in America to protect them. However, the colonists were used to being taxed only by their own elected assemblies and saw this as a violation of their rights, as they had no representation in Parliament. Widespread protests, boycotts, and riots began and were so strong that the British repealed the Stamp Act in 1776, but the damage had already been done.



The Tradition of St. Nicholas, angel, and the devil emerged in 15th century Central Europe, particularly in Germanic and Slavic Lands, and became common on St. Nicholas Day.

and another an angel. They got drunk, and publicly, (emphasizing) publicly intoxicated, wandering around, just kind of causing chaos, that's really the start of the Christmas tradition, when you see a drunk Santa Claus walking around, it's about to get good. They ask questions along the lines of like, have you been a good kid? Then they hand out fruits, toys, and stuff to the good children. So it's a little mixture of trick-or-treating and just plain old debauchery.

I don't know how common this is, but there are two kinds of traditions to trick kids. One time it happened when I was at my friends house when I was maybe ten years old. All of a sudden, there was a loud bang on the door. We opened the door, and in came my buddy's uncle, dressed up like Saint Nicholas. We pretended like we didn't recognize him, and I felt like we were way too old for this. But he came in and brought presents and everything. There would be a Santa Claus who would come into the classroom if December 6 fell on a school day.

They have the angel and the devil in Germany, Holland, and other parts of German-speaking central Europe. Now, Knecht Ruprecht or Krampus, this is the kind of Grinch character that, depending on what part of the country you live in, especially if you get into the Alps, Krampus just pretty much eats children. There's no coal or potato.

I was introduced to St. Nicholas Day at church one year. Me and my brother go to church, not knowing any better, we're Americans, and we sit down. One by one, there's maybe 30 kids all in Sunday school, and their laps are just full of candy and toys. One by one, they (the other

kids) went in order, describing the stuff they got, like Legos, Kinder Chocolates, all these cool things. Then it finally gets to my brother's turn, and we just look at each other and start crying because we didn't get anything.

When Sunday School was over, I think what happened was they shared some of their chocolate with us, and we stopped crying. Then the Sunday School instructor pulled my parents aside, telling them this is how we do it here. You have to give your kids chocolate. What you do is put your boots outside the front door, on the night of the 5th, and on the morning of the 6th, they're filled with chocolate. I mean the good chocolate, like Lindt's, Milka, and Kinder."

After his talk of St. Nicholas Day, Travis talked about a day that he has not come across in his own life, Saint Ambrose Day, which falls on December 7, and Saint Lucy Day December 13 ((considered a time when the veil between worlds thinned, allowing spirits, trolls, and ghosts to be active), where a woman dresses up as St. Lucy, would wander through the dark, dressed in white, and with her candle went looking for spinners (turning motions like spinning, grinding, or stirring were taboo to and could stir up bad luck).

Travis said that all these Saint Days can be kept track of on some of the astronomical clocks. At the very edge of the astronomical clocks, the 365 days are broken up and will tell you the name days, and there is at least one saint associated with each day of the year.

"In Europe, France, Germany, everywhere but England, pretty much, you celebrate your name day. If your name is William, there is a St. William some-

where, you get presents like it is your birthday, and for some of my friends in Germany, it was kind of more. There is no St. Travis, so I didn't grow up with a name day," Travis mentioned.

Decorations during the Christmas holiday are a bit different as well, Travis said. There are a lot of hand-knitted and crocheted decorations. The Christmas tree is just one of the decorations that would adorn an entire house, instead of being the centerpiece. There would be candles everywhere, Advent wreaths, clay, straw, fabric stars, angels, crosses, or doves, dried fruits, evergreen branches, red ribbons, and even gingerbread cookies as decorations. Travis expressed, "Gingerbread seems to last forever. At some point, they tell you don't eat it, but it just turns into rock. I've seen 30-year-old gingerbread cookies hanging off the trees."

"As you approach Christmas, St. Nicholas is come and gone," stated Travis, adding, "On Christmas Eve, it's all about Yezishek, or Baby Jesus. Baby Jesus is the one who answers your letters, and Baby Jesus is the one who brings you your gifts.

Then there's the tradition on Christmas Eve, where you have dinner very late in the day, because it is kind of a fast day, where you don't eat dinner until the sun goes down, so everyone is starving. When the dinner bell rings, it's pandemonium. When you are done eating, you go back into the living room, and voila, the Christmas tree is there, com-

pletely decorated with the gifts underneath. So Germans and Czechs don't have a Christmas tree until December 24, which is why you have all these other decorations and stuff going on. So the parents buy the ornaments, and it is just Baby Jesus that puts it up while you're having dinner.



'Tis the Season for Winter Sports; Bulldogs, Spartans, and

It is that time of the year again, while most people are dreaming of egg nog and Christmas Carols, high school athletes in the West Valley have visions of headlocks and dribbling dancing through their minds, hopefully in their correct sport, as basketball and wrestling seasons begin in the land of Oregon High School Sports.

Bulldog Girls Basketball

The Lady Dawgs, 10-15 last season, had a sense of Deja Vu in their inaugural week, again facing off against Gervais and Banks in their opening week of the season, and again with the same results.

The Bulldogs on Monday made their way to battle against Gervais. In the first quarter, both teams looked to get their game plan in place, with the Cougars taking a slim 9-7 lead over Willamina.

In the second quarter, the Lady Dawgs got to work on both ends of the court. Bridgette Manley and Elizabeth Neese led the of-

fensive charge, each dropping in four apiece, while a staunch Bulldog defense allowed only one score, giving Willamina a 19-12 lead going into the half.

It was all Bulldogs in the second half, with Neese and Manley dropping in 6 more points through the two quarters, and Grace Terbush finding some open lanes to score nine of her own. Willamina beat the Cougars in the opening game for the second year in a row, 51-24. Terbush led the scoring with 13, with Manley adding 12 and Neese knocking in 10 points in the match.

Later in the week, the Lady Dawgs hosted Bank, who were opening their 2025-26 season after last year's 41-43 defeat at the hands of Amity in the state championship match.

The Braves returned this year, down only three players from that second-place finish, and their experience showed in the matchup against the Bulldogs.

The Braves barged ahead to an

18-0 lead over Willamina before the Bulldogs finally got on the board, courtesy of two free throws by Bridgette Manley.

That first quarter lead would be all that Banks would need the remainder of the game, Willamina losing 14-52, making it the second year running losing to the Cougars in the second game of the season.

Bulldog Boys Basketball

The boys Bulldog basketball squad, which looked to rebound from their 1-22 record last season, started their season facing off against the Gervais Cougars. This matchup was a close contest, each having a lead at the end of two separate quarters.

Gervais was up first, taking a minor four-point lead at the end of the first quarter, Willamina down 9-13 after eight minutes of play.

Willamina opened up the second quarter, taking an 18-9 lead, scoring nine unanswered points spread out among five different Bulldogs. Gervais would battle back to cut the Bulldogs' lead to 26-20 right before halftime, when Austin Verdino dropped in a long three, four feet behind the arc at the buzzer, to make that lead 29-20, going into the locker rooms.

After the half, Willamina would go on to keep their lead, ending the third quarter up 36-21. As stated earlier, though, each team led at the end of two different quarters, and the Cougars

snagged their second quarter-ending lead where it mattered most, Bulldogs losing 42-51 against Gervais.

Willamina would go on later in the week to lose an extremely close contest against the Yamhill-Carlton (YC) Tigers, Bulldogs up 56-54 with just under a minute left, the Tigers knocked one in from long range, taking a one-point lead over Willamina. YC then capitalized on a fast break after poking the ball away to bring their lead up to three points over the Bulldogs with 24 seconds remaining in the game.

Willamina's Austin Verdino launched one from beyond the arc to try and tie the game, but was fouled in the attempt. Verdino's first free-throw attempt bounced inside the rim, but did not go in. He followed it up with another that was nothing but net, bringing the Bulldogs to within two points. Willamina called a timeout with 0.8 seconds to work on a game plan for the third free-throw, but no Christmas miracles would happen this match, the Bulldogs falling 57-59 to the Tigers.

Delphian Girls Basketball

The Lady Dragons, ending their 2024-25 season with a 3-16 record, including their first league victories since 2014, started their season in a dominating way, defeating Horizon Christian 40-18 in their home opener.

The Bulldogs pulled off a second-place team score, thanks to six 1st-place finishes by Elisha Stanton (126lbs), Adonijah Stanton (132lbs), Quincy Clemans (138lbs), Kisor Savage (150lbs), Mahiashlok Eaglepipe (215lbs), and Landon Risseeuw (285lbs).

Bodhi Baller snagged 2nd in the 190 lbs division, and Jacob Bazy landed third on the podium in the 157 lbs bracket.

At the end of the night, Coley Smith announced that funds this year will go to Wildwood Hotel's Feed the People Meal Drive, a program created by the restaurant to help those suffering from food uncertainty without requiring proof of income or hardship. The program's goals are to provide a quality dine-in meal and restaurant experience for those who may not be able to normally afford such an experience, and help anyone who is in need of a hot meal have the ability to escape the elements and enjoy a comfortable, judgment-free space to get warm and get full.





PLAN TO HARNESS VESUVIUS

Italy Would Direct Flow of Lava and Utilize Heat of the Big Volcano.

In the future, great volcanoes can throw out molten fire and lava and attract no more attention than the passing of a motor car, if plans now being considered by scientists of Italy are carried out. After the gigantic accomplishments of the engineers in the World War, such a scheme does not sound impossible, and plans are being seriously considered to tunnel through mountains known to be dangerous in such a manner that a sudden volcanic activity will only result in the gas and lava being carried away from settled sections and valuable property.

Especially are such plans being worked out for Etna and Vesuvius, the two most destructive volcanoes.

And with the plan goes another providing for harnessing the heat for industrial purposes.

Premier Mussolini has been investigating the plan, and now, it is said, no obstacle remains except the expense. It is hoped that some way may be found whereby Italy will be relieved from dependence upon the outside world for fuel and the power that fuel produces.

If experimental boring is tried, it will probably be on Etna, because that volcano, being on an island, can do less damage than Vesuvius if stirred to unusual activity by man's efforts.

Cutting tunnels through the mountainside would be simple in its earlier stages, and would become complicated only when the heat, on approach to the eternal fires, became unendurable to the workers. Explosives might do the rest.

BOOZE TREATY SOON TO BE READY

Britain and America Virtually in Agreement on Rum Traffic.

London. — America and England have virtually reached an agreement on the form of the proposed treaty granting the United States a special extension of the three-mile limit for the confiscation of illicit liquor in British-owned vessels and conferring upon Britain the right to ship legitimate alcohol stores in passenger liners to American shores under seal for consumption on the homeward voyage.

Secretary of State Hughes has returned the British governments outline of the treaty with the state department's comments and suggestions thereon, and it is expected that the convention in its final form will soon be concluded so that it can be submitted to congress at an early date.

Secretary Hughes found no substantial objection to the fundamental points of the treaty as formulated by Foreign Secretary Curzon and the British legal experts.



INDIANA GOVERNOR INDICTED

Alleged to Have Embezzled Sums Totaling About \$225,000.

Indianapolis, Ind. — Eight indictments embodying a total of 192 counts were returned here against Governor Warren T. McCray by the Marion County grand jury, which for several weeks has been investigating the governor's financial affairs.

The eight separate indictments returned against the governor charge embezzlement, larceny, forgery, issuing a fraudulent check, false pretenses by the use of a promissory note, and making a false statement in regard to his financial condition and using the same to obtain credit. The indictments, which embody a total of 192 counts, charge in all that the governor embezzled a total of \$225,000. One indictment alone covers 75 typewritten pages.

BASKING SHARK NEVER BITES

This May Have Been Fortunate for Men Who Caught Monster Off Long Key.

The 40,000-pound sea monster caught off Long Key has been identified as an Indo-Pacific basking shark by L. L. Mowbray, vice president of the New York Aquarium.

The basking shark, Mr. Mowbray announces, is harmless when let alone. Permit him to bask placidly on the undulating bosom of the sea, and he bears no creature ill will.

It is fortunate for those who go down to the sea in ships or down to the surf to swim that the creature is thus disposed. It required an all-day struggle and 50 shots from a high-powered rifle to subdue him, once his wrath was stirred by the stab of a harpoon. He was 35 feet long, 28 feet in greatest circumference, and had a tail span of 12 feet.

Were such a creature of an aggressive nature, the sea in his vicinity would be hardly safe for the average submarine, while pleasure boats would afford no protection whatever from his fury, and if he used the waters of the North Atlantic coast as a basking ground, surf bathing would soon become obsolete.

Hitherto, the children of the earth have found abundant reason for the gratitude that rattle-snakes cannot fly like hawks, or tigers run like antelopes, or houseflies sting like wasps. To this list of blessings, we can now add the fact that basking sharks do not bite.

Substitute for Rubber

Chemists have worked out what they claim to be a practicable substitute for India rubber. They use, as a basis, the oil of the soya bean. Two parts of this oil are treated with one part of nitric acid, and the result is an emulsion. This emulsion is heated to the boiling point of water, when it becomes converted into a uniform gummy mass. Upon being washed in water, this mass is dissolved into dilute ammonia water (5 per cent), and from this solution a precipitate is obtained by neutralizing with some dilute acid. This precipitate is again washed with water and heated to about 112 degrees Fahrenheit.

700 DIE IN FLOOD DISASTER IN ITALY

Bergamo, Italy. — Seven hundred dead, three villages destroyed, and 50 square miles made desolate. This was the toll of the flood from Gleno Lake, 40 miles northeast of Milan, when the great dike guarding it collapsed, releasing the water which carried all before it. It swept over the hills and down into the valleys for a distance of 15 miles to Lake Iseo, which checked the momentum of the vast stream.

Bergamo valley Sunday was nothing but a barren waste of mud and water—a veritable lake in which it was dangerous to venture, for in some places it was over a man's head. In this soggy mass, the bodies of the victims lay tangled among fallen trees, telegraph poles, buildings, and bridges.

The homeless were counted in the thousands, most of whom were mourning for lost relatives—and searching for their bodies.
